EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S STATEMENT

The Executive Officer informed the SAB of the following:

Construction Cost Indices Updates

At the January 24, 2024 SAB meeting, OPSC was directed to research alternative construction cost indices that could be used for the annual adjustment to School Facility Program (SFP) grants and was further directed to provide updates on these efforts as well as provide updates related to a potential statewide school facilities bond. An informational item presenting the results of OPSC's research and a comparison of alternative construction cost indices was included in the SAB Agenda.

Statewide School Facilities Bond Update

Proposed Legislation

The Governor expressed intent to negotiate with the Legislature to reach agreement on an education facilities bond proposal to be considered in the November 2024 election. There are two bond bills pending in the Legislature, and OPSC continues to monitor these two bills and will provide further updates:

- Assembly Bill 247 – Education finance: school facilities: Transitional Kindergarten through Community College Public Education Facilities Bond Act of 2024 (Muratsuchi, Fong, Wilson, et al.)
- Senate Bill 28 – Education finance: school facilities: Public Preschool, K-12, and College Health and Safety Bond Act of 2024 (Glazer)

It was noted that the last day for a legislative measure to qualify for the November 5, 2024 General Election ballot would be June 27, 2024.

Developer Fees

Statute authorizes school district governing boards to levy developer fees for construction or reconstruction of school facilities within district boundaries. An overview of the three levels of developer fees, which are levied on a square-foot basis, was included in the Executive Officer's statement for the February 28, 2024 SAB meeting.

State Budget Updates

As part of addressing the projected state budget shortfall, the most recent revision of the Governor's Budget eliminated the one-time investment of \$375 million from the General Fund for the SFP in fiscal year 2024-25, and eliminated the \$550 million one-time General Fund investment for the California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program in fiscal year 2025-26. In the May Revision Budget Summary, there was an indication that such an investment could be considered for inclusion in education facilities bond proposals by the Legislature.

There is no reference in the May Revision concerning OPSC's current processing rate of \$1.5 billion in SFP projects annually. If SFP processing continues at that rate, currently authorized funding for New Construction and Modernization projects (after Unfunded Approvals) may be exhausted by January 2025. The Status of Funds report included in this May SAB Agenda reflected updates from the May Revision proposals.

As previously announced, with the release of the Governor's Budget in January, the Governor expressed intent to negotiate with the Legislature to reach agreement on an education facilities bond proposal to be considered in the November 2024 election.

Currently, two education facilities bond bills remain pending in the Legislature. Earlier this week, Assembly Bill 247 was withdrawn from the Senate Appropriations Committee and re-referred to the Committee on Rules.

Assembly Bill 247 – Education finance: school facilities: Transitional Kindergarten Through Community College Public Education Facilities Bond Act of 2024 (Muratsuchi, Fong, Wilson, et al.)

Senate Bill 28 – Education finance: school facilities: Public Preschool, K-12, and College Health and Safety Bond Act of 2024 (Glazer)

Pursuant to California Elections Code Section 9040, the last day for a legislative measure to qualify for the November 5, 2024 General Election ballot is June 27, 2024. However, Senate President Pro Tempore Mike McGuire was quoted in a news article earlier this week indicating the deadline has some flexibility and the Legislature is working with the Secretary of State and Legislative Counsel on bond measures to be added to the November ballot by July 3, 2024.

Staff continues to monitor any developments and will provide further updates.

NEXT MEETING

The next meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, August 28, 2024. The time and location of the meeting will be determined and announced at a later date.

SCHOOL FACILITY PROGRAM

This Resolution of the State Allocation Board (hereafter referred to as the “Board”) is applicable to the appropriate sections of the Education Code and is described and filed in the office of the Executive Officer and will be made available to all interested parties as the Resolution pertains to the documents attached hereto. Said documents were acted upon by the Board at its meeting on June 26, 2024.

WHEREAS, the Board has previously approved or determined to be approvable a number of projects for construction or modernization eligibility of facilities for school districts and is making apportionments and/or unfunded approvals for the grant amounts for projects that meet the Board’s criteria for the apportionment of grants pursuant to Education Code Sections 17072.10, 17078.52, 17078.70, 17079 or 17074.10 or Board Regulations 1859.81.1 or 1859.83;

WHEREAS, Treasury Regulations Section 1.150-2 require the State (on whose behalf the Board is acting) to declare its reasonable intent to provide grant funding to school districts, in accordance with Board policy and law, for costs of the projects with proceeds of State bonds.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

1. This Resolution is adopted by the Board for the purposes of establishing compliance with Treasury Regulations Section 1.150-2 and this Resolution does not bind the Board to make any additional apportionment or bind the State to incur any indebtedness.
2. The Board anticipates that some or all of the school districts listed on the list of “Projects” referred to in this Resolution will pay certain capital expenditures in connection with some or all of the project’s cost prior to the issuance of bonds by the State to pay for the grants for the projects. The reimbursement of such costs is consistent with the State’s budgetary and financial circumstances, and in accordance with Board policy, as no other funds or accounts of the State have been budgeted or are available to pay the costs of the projects on either a short-term or a long-term basis.
3. The Board, acting on behalf of the State, hereby declares that it is the State’s official intent to use proceeds of general obligation bonds and/or General Fund proceeds that may become available for such purpose, consistent with the requirements of law that are in effect at the time the funds are available, to provide grants, in accordance with applicable, laws and regulations.
4. This Resolution shall be continuously available for inspection by the general public during normal business hours at the offices of the Board at 707 3rd Street, West Sacramento, California, commencing within one week after the date of enactment of this Resolution.
5. Any eligibility determination does not constitute a commitment of future funding by the Board.

SCHOOL FACILITY PROGRAM APPORTIONMENTS

PURPOSE OF REPORT

To present to the State Allocation Board (Board) a list of School Facility Program (SFP) applications for Apportionment.

DESCRIPTION

On September 21, 2022, the Board took action, due to the availability of General Fund proceeds, to return to making direct Apportionments while keeping the same benefits of the quick distribution of funds, as the priority funding system, by adopting proposed emergency regulations that revised the fund release deadlines from 18 months to either 180 calendar days for non-financial hardship school districts or 365 calendar days for school districts that qualify for financial hardship. The SFP new construction and modernization projects presented on the Attachment are in date order of a complete application being received by the Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) and are Ready for Apportionment. The list also includes health and safety facility hardship applications for funding that have been processed and are ready for approval regardless of received date.

AUTHORITY

SFP Regulation Section 1859.90 states:

“(a) With the exception of an apportionment made pursuant to Sections 1859.81.1(e) or 1859.81.2, apportionments provided through the Priority Funding Process and subject to 1859.90.2, or of an Inactive Apportionment subject to Section 1859.96, the OPSC will release State funds that the Board has apportioned to the district after submittal, by the district, of the Form SAB 50-05 and a Grant Agreement, pursuant to Section 1859.90.4.

(b) With the exception of an apportionment made for a Type II Joint-Use Project, not part of a qualifying SFP Modernization project, pursuant to Article 12 of these Regulations, a district must submit the Form SAB 50-05 and Grant Agreement, within 180 calendar days of the Apportionment of the SFP grant for the project or within 365 calendar days for Apportionments that include financial hardship assistance. If the district does not submit the Form SAB 50-05 and Grant Agreement within the above specified time, the entire New Construction Adjusted Grant, or Modernization Adjusted Grant or Type I or II, part of a qualifying SFP Modernization, or Joint-Use Project apportionment shall be rescinded without further Board action, and the pupils housed in the project, if applicable, will be

added back to the district's baseline eligibility. The district may refile a new application for the project subject to district eligibility and available State funds at the time of resubmittal.

....“

BACKGROUND

As part of the Governor's approved Budget Act for the 2022-2023 fiscal year, one-time General Fund dollars were appropriated to the Board in the amount of \$1.3 billion for new construction and modernization projects under the SFP, as well as \$1,960.5 million was appropriated from the Governor's approved Budget Act for the 2023-2024 fiscal year. As a result of receiving funding for the SFP that is not contingent on bond sales, the Board was able to return to using an existing regulatory process that allows for Apportionments to be made on a flow basis outside the current Priority Funding process, which is designed to accommodate twice yearly bond sales. Making Apportionments on a flow basis will enable school districts to more quickly and efficiently access much needed cash for construction projects. In order to ensure that cash moves quickly once allocated to school districts, regulations were changed to shorten the deadlines for fund release from 18 months to either 180 calendar days or 365 calendar days for districts that qualify for financial hardship.

School districts must submit the Grant Agreement and a valid *Fund Release Authorization* (Form SAB 50-05) 180 calendar days from Board approval for non-financial hardship projects and 365 calendar days from Board approval for financial hardship projects.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Approve the SFP applications as presented on the Attachment.
2. Specify that the projects are subject to the fund release deadlines as outlined in SFP Regulation Section 1859.90.

AUTHORITY

Pursuant to Regulation Section 1859.105 (c)(4), sufficient evidence of substantial progress shall include other evidence satisfactory to the SAB detailing the reason(s) that plans have not been completed and accepted by the DSA. If the SAB determines that substantial progress has been made, the SAB shall condition its finding of substantial progress upon the District commitment to complete and submit an Approved Adjusted Grant application within 18 months from the date of the SAB's determination of substantial progress.

STAFF COMMENTS

The Attachment represents the project application in which the District received a design grant apportionment and a subsequent fund release. The District has submitted acceptable explanation of why a substantial progress extension is required. Staff recommends approval of the request for additional time to submit evidence that Substantial Progress has been met on the design grant.

DESCRIPTION

DESCRIPTION OF HEALTH AND SAFETY THREAT

Five reports by KNA Structural Engineers, Inc., identify several structural deficiencies in Buildings 100, 200, 300, 400 and 500 at the at the Sowers Middle School site. The reports for Buildings 100, 200, 300 and 500, each dated January 26, 2022 with a revision date of April 5, 2022, and the report for Building 400, dated January 26, 2022, identify material insufficiencies with the wall anchorages, precast wall panels and uplift at pile caps for all five buildings. These material insufficiencies detailed in the reports render the five buildings at high risk of collapse in the event of seismic activity. These buildings qualify for the SMP based on the qualifying criteria in Education Code Section 17075.10 and SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.2.

SCOPE OF PROJECT

The scope of this SMP application is broken out into two phases and includes the demolition of Buildings 100, 200, 300, 400 and 500 and replacement of the five buildings with a total of nine new buildings. The first phase includes the construction of seven new buildings including a new administration and food service building, a new Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) building, and five modular classroom buildings. The second phase includes the demolition of the original buildings and the construction of a new gymnasium and a new locker room building. The project does not result in any increase in classrooms.

The plan set for this project includes work beyond the scope of this seismic application that will relocate four portable classroom buildings and make alterations to an additional four portable classroom buildings on the site. The District has not submitted any funding application for this additional work.

STATUS OF SCHOOL SITE

The District has completed the first phase of the project, and the new classroom, Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM), and administration buildings are all occupied as of Monday, February 5, 2024. The second phase including demolition of the original five buildings, construction of the new gymnasium and locker building and other work is anticipated to be complete in February 2025.

QUALIFYING CRITERIA

GOVERNMENT/STATE LEVEL CONCURRENCE

Buildings 100, 200, 300, 400 and 500 have been classified as a Most Vulnerable Category 2 Building type as defined in SFP Regulations and has met qualifying criteria of the SMP. The Division of the State Architect (DSA) has approved the District for Phase One (Eligibility Evaluation) and Phase Two (Replacement Option Analysis and Design Criteria) as well as providing final plan approval. These approvals enabled the District to apply for funding from the Board.

Education Code (EC) Section 17075.10(a) states:

A school district may apply for hardship assistance in cases of extraordinary circumstances. Extraordinary circumstances may include, but are not limited to, the need to repair, reconstruct, or replace the most vulnerable school facilities that are identified as a Category 2 building, as defined in the report submitted pursuant to Section 17317, determined by the department to pose an unacceptable risk of injury to its occupants in the event of a seismic event.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.82 states, “A school district may apply for Facility Hardship, including Seismic Mitigation, Program assistance in cases of extraordinary circumstances that have caused an imminent health and safety threat.”

SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.2 states that “A school district is eligible for funding to repair, reconstruct, or replace the Most Vulnerable Category 2 Buildings which were originally constructed to be used as School Facilities and pose an unacceptable risk of injury to its occupants in the event of seismic activity. Program eligibility is determined by the Division of the State Architect while determination of grant funding is determined by the Board based on the following criteria.

Notwithstanding Sections 1859.93 and 1859.93.1, all applications for the seismic mitigation of the Most Vulnerable Category 2 Buildings shall be funded in the order of receipt of an Approved Application for funding. Any grants provided for the purpose of this section shall be provided as a new construction project and allocated on a 50 percent state share basis.”

SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.2(a) states,

- (a) Seismic mitigation projects must meet all of the following requirements:
- (1) The construction contract was executed on or after May 20, 2006;
 - (2) The project funding provided shall be for the minimum work necessary to obtain DSA approval;
 - (3) The School Building is designed for occupancy by students and staff; and
 - (4) The DSA concurs with a report by a structural engineer, which identifies structural deficiencies that pose an unacceptable risk of injury to its occupants in a seismic event. The structural engineers report shall conform to the guidelines prepared by the DSA, in accordance with Education Code Section 17310.

If the unacceptable risk of injury is due to the presence of faulting, liquefaction or landslide, these hazards must be documented by a geological hazards report prepared by an engineering geologist in accordance with California Building Code, Part 2, Chapter 18, section 1803A and with concurrence of the California Geological Survey

DESCRIPTION

DESCRIPTION OF HEALTH AND SAFETY THREAT

A report by KNA Structural Engineers, Inc. dated June 15, 2021, and with a revision date of September 28, 2021, identifies structural deficiencies in Building A-Library/Administration on the Los Alamitos High site. The report identified that the existing cast-in-place pour strip between roof members does not have sufficient shear capacity for load transfer or proper rebar development length into the pour strip. In addition, the site was found to be associated with high liquefaction susceptibility. A geotechnical engineering report by Terracon Consultants Inc., dated March 9, 2022, detailed the liquefaction hazard further. These insufficiencies as detailed in the reports render Building A-Library/Administration at high risk of collapse in the event of seismic activity. The building qualifies for the SMP based on the qualifying criteria in Education Code Section 17075.10 and SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.2.

SCOPE OF PROJECT

The scope of this project includes the demolition of and Building A-Library/Administration and the construction of a new three-story Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics building, which will include replacement of the administrative and library facilities at the Los Alamitos High site.

The plan set for this project includes work beyond the scope of this seismic application and is associated with SFP Career Technical Education Facilities Program Application Number 55/73952-00-002, which funded a new robotics computer lab and a new robotics fabrication lab, and SFP new construction application 50/73924-00-007, which will fund three new Non-Severe classrooms. The project also included an additional 13 classrooms and 14 science labs funded solely by the District. Therefore, the grants provided in this application are limited to the replacement square footage eligible for SMP funding.

STATUS OF SCHOOL SITE

The District has completed the construction of this project, and the new building is currently occupied.

QUALIFYING CRITERIA

DESCRIPTION

DESCRIPTION OF HEALTH AND SAFETY THREAT

A report by ENCORP, dated March 15 and 29, 2022 with an addendum dated December 19, 2022, noted that site visits to Katella High were conducted on March 15 and 29, 2022, to conduct an asbestos inspection and contamination assessment in response to asbestos cement pipe deterioration at the pool facility within the Katella High School campus. According to the report, District Maintenance staff observed suspected cement pipe deterioration in the pool water and cement pipe circulation lines during maintenance repair activities and further observed that the suspected debris in the pool water was cross-contamination resulting from the deteriorated asbestos cement piping.

The report identifies friable asbestos contamination in the Pool Equipment Room, Pool Equipment Reservoir and Pump Basin, and the exterior of the Pool. Equipment Room. It goes on to identify asbestos as, "a general term applied to a group of naturally occurring minerals which separate into fibers," with a "tendency to break into a dust of tiny fibers which can float in the air and be inhaled or swallowed." The report also indicates, "Asbestos inhalation exposure has been shown to increase the risk of developing lung cancer, mesothelioma (cancer of the lining of the lung and/or abdomen) and asbestosis (chronic lung disease), as well as other damage to the lungs," and concludes that the "Damaged asbestos cement pipe lines have impacted the associated pool facility, returns and water circulation systems," and that the removal of the underground cement lines will have to be performed under an approved South Coast Air Quality Management Division (SCAQMD) Procedure 5 plan.

SCOPE OF PROJECT

A Licensed Abatement contractor was contracted to perform the abatement and decontamination cleanup activities under the required Procedure 5 plan, as approved by the South Coast Air Quality Management District (ACAQMD). The Procedure 5 abatement work was performed as the minimum project scope to mitigate the health and safety hazard and included removal and proper disposal of approximately 1,600 linear feet of underground cement pipe, approximately 2 linear feet of TSI jacketing on a 5 foot gas pipe, approximately 30 square feet of roof mastic, and 3 asbestos containing fire doors. This work results in the demolition and replacement of the pool deck and pool bottom.

STATUS OF SCHOOL SITE

Construction of the Katella High School pool rehabilitation project began in April 2023 with the commencement of demolition activities. Abatement and removal of hazardous materials occurred between June and August of 2023. The replacement of the pool facilities is currently 47 percent complete, and pool construction is scheduled to be complete in Fall 2024.

The minimum work necessary to mitigate the health and safety threat includes the conversion of the existing open-loop canal water cooling system in the Small Gymnasium into a closed-loop chilled water system connected to a chiller that was installed to serve the Main Gym on the Anderson High campus to also serve the Small Gymnasium.

DESCRIPTION

DESCRIPTION OF HEALTH AND SAFETY THREAT

A report by Pace Engineering, dated June 15, 2022, noted that the heating system, comprised of a central boiler system with pipes to deliver heated water to fan coils throughout the Dunsmuir Elementary site, is failing and that about 40 percent of the school's classrooms are completely without heating due to fully plugged heating water coils. The report further explains that service contractors have not been able to unplug these coils, "likely due to the coil flow paths having a small diameter, bends in the coil tubing, and the content of the sludge plugging the tubes." It states that the problems appear to be related to leaks in the underground piping that allow dirt to enter the system. The report also states that the failing heating system poses an imminent health and safety risk to students and staff, because "Dunsmuir is in the Upper Sacramento River Canyon where winter morning temperatures below 20°F and snow depths exceeding 2 feet are common events."

A second report by Persinger Architects and Associates based on a site visit in November 2022 describes structural deficiencies in the existing covered walkways on the site. The deficiencies include widespread dry rot and failures in the decking of the covered walkways due to water intrusion and construction materials that are not water resistant. The report states, "In its existing condition, the roofing of the walkway and 4X10 beams pose an imminent safety concern for students and staff that walk under the walkway as they could collapse at any time."

SCOPE OF PROJECT

The minimum work to mitigate the failures of the existing heating system is to replace all of the heated water piping and fan coils. Because much of the existing piping is buried underground this would necessitate extensive digging. Therefore, the District is electing to replace the original school-wide heating system with individual heat pump systems in lieu of repairing the existing system.

The proposed scope to mitigate the structural hazards in the covered walkways is to remove the existing roofing, remove and replace any decking and beams that exhibit dry rot and then replace the roofing. The project will also include access compliance and fire life safety upgrades required in order to obtain Division of the State Architect (DSA) plan approval.

STATUS OF SCHOOL SITE

The District awarded a construction contract January 23, 2024, and issued a notice to proceed on February 8, 2024. The contractor has mobilized and is in the process of ordering equipment. Construction will commence once the project is apportioned and is expected to be complete by August or early September 2024.

QUALIFYING CRITERIA

GOVERNMENT/STATE LEVEL CONCURRENCE

In a letter dated June 29, 2022, the Siskiyou County Department of Environmental Health provided concurrence with the imminent health and safety threat posed by the failing heating system, and with both the minimum work required to mitigate this issue and the proposal to replace the system with individual heat pump systems. DESCRIPTION

DESCRIPTION OF HEALTH AND SAFETY THREAT

Graves Elementary School relies on a well for domestic potable water and fire protection water. A report prepared by Dougherty Pump and Drilling, Inc., dated September 19, 2023, and based on a series of site visits and video investigations between November 2022 and June 2023, finds that "Recently the well experienced a series of mechanical and structural failures, rendering it ineffective, posing a significant health and safety risk to students and staff." The report further notes that on May 24, 2023, following a failure of the well pump, the Monterey County Health Department issued a "Boil Water Notice," to the District. Therefore, students and staff must rely on bottled water delivered by staff and families. The report concludes, "Due to the age, original construction features, and degree of failure, repairing the existing well structure is not possible. The only allowable permanent, minimum work necessary to mitigate this health and safety threat is the construction of a replacement water well and proper destruction of the existing well."

SCOPE OF PROJECT

This project consists of the construction a replacement well to provide potable water and fire protection water for the Graves Elementary site, and to properly destruct the existing well.

STATUS OF SCHOOL SITE

The District competitively bid the project but received no responses. Following that effort, it reached out directly to a local plumbing and drilling contractor and received a bid. The District is planning for construction to begin in June and anticipates completion in July 2024.

DESCRIPTION

DESCRIPTION OF HEALTH AND SAFETY THREAT

On January 16, 2018, the Stanislaus County Department of Environmental Resources, Division of Environmental Health (DEH), issued a Compliance Order to the Shiloh School District regarding the water system for the Shiloh Elementary School Site. The order stated that the system was in violation of California Health and Safety Code (CHSC) Section 116555(a)(1) and Title 22 of the California Code of Regulations (CCR), Section 64431 due to levels of nitrate in the drinking water in excess of the maximum allowable level of 10 milligrams (mgs) per liter. The Compliance Order required the District to quit using its well for drinking water for students, staff and visitors and to prepare and submit a Corrective Action Plan (CAP) to DEH for approval.

A Specialist Report for Potable Water Supply dated December 10, 2020, from E-PUR LLC, a water purification company, noted that water from the school well had been near to or in excess of the Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) for nitrates and that the District "must identify a new groundwater source of supply that meets drinking water quality standards for the School," and recommended digging a "test well that could be converted into a water supply well" on the site. The report also noted "In the event an aquifer is not identified with potable water quality; then water quality treatment on the existing water supply system might be the next best course of action to comply with the DEH Order under a CAP. Most water treatment systems have difficulty with water that contains sand. A new well that is designed to have sand control may be needed if treatment is required."

The District moved forward with the recommended test well, which was completed in June of 2021. E-PUR LLC tested the well for its flow rate and water quality and found that the flow rate was good and the water was sand free, but the water still exceeded MCL of 10 mgs per liter, and that a water treatment system would be required in order to provide potable water.

A technical memorandum from Affinity Engineering dated October 18, 2021, described several available options for water treatment for the new well, including the capital outlay and ongoing maintenance and operations costs. The memorandum concludes that a system reliant on vessels containing Ion Exchange media, where the media would be replaced when it can no longer absorb nitrates, was the best option in terms of both functionality and the capital and ongoing maintenance and operations costs.

SCOPE OF PROJECT

Mitigation work includes the construction of the test well and the installation of a new water treatment system to remove the excessive nitrates from the water that supplies the school buildings.

STATUS OF SCHOOL SITE

The test well was completed in June 2021 and now supplies water for the site. Because the water from the new well is still not potable, the District continues to supply bottled water for drinking. The District is currently seeking Division of the State Architect (DSA) plan approval from the for the new well and a new Ion Exchange water treatment system, and intends to begin the construction contract award process once it has DSA plan approval and receives state funding for the project.

The Applicant qualifies for financial hardship pursuant to School Facility Program Regulation Section 1859.81(c)(3). The Applicant qualifies as a County Superintendent of Schools.

DESCRIPTION

DESCRIPTION OF HEALTH AND SAFETY THREAT

A report prepared by Response Structural Engineers dated April 21, 2023, based on a March 2, 2023, structural survey of the Greengate site of existing canopies found beam damage at the attached canopies as well as fascia and soffit rot at numerous locations throughout the campus. The report notes that the damage appears to be caused by sustained exposure to moisture. Furthermore, the report indicates that the original Division of the State Architect (DSA) approved plans from 1972 detail an open pergola-style canopy, and that at some point a gable roof was added to the canopy without DSA approval, and that this roof adds considerable weight that overstresses the main beams and adds lateral wind loads to connections that were not originally designed for the loading. Response Structural Engineers states that these conditions result in imminent health and safety hazards in many locations throughout the campus and recommends that the Yolo County Office of Education (COE) should consider isolating these areas until repairs are made, and that in many other areas, the conditions do not yet constitute immediate safety hazards but may cause further degradation if not remediated in a timely manner.

SCOPE OF PROJECT

This project consists of the re-roofing and structural repairs to the canopies and roof structures for all buildings on the site except for building F. The minimum work also includes DSA-required restroom upgrades in building A and E and for the site for accessibility.

STATUS OF SCHOOL SITE

At the recommendation of Response Structural Engineers, the COE added temporary shoring posts at several locations throughout the site in early 2023. The COE awarded a contract for the DSA approved minimum required mitigation work on March 11, 2024, and anticipates that the project will be substantially completed by August 7, 2024.

QUALIFYING CRITERIA

GOVERNMENT/STATE LEVEL CONCURRENCE

DSA has provided a letter concurring that the deficiencies for portions of the canopies and roof structures create a health and safety risk and must be corrected. The letter also states “DSA has reviewed and approved the attached plans and concurs that the work shown is the minimum work necessary to repair and mitigate the issues identified above.”

Staff Supports the District’s Request: Yes

SITE VISIT COMPLETED BY STAFF

Staff accepted a detailed report from an industry specialist in lieu of a site visit.

RECOMMENDATION

Approve the COE’s request for an Apportionment to re-roof and make structural repairs for all buildings on the site except for building F, plus DSA-required accessibility work, pursuant to SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.1, as shown on Attachment B.

AUTHORITY

Facility Hardship Program – Rehabilitation Projects (as of August 31, 2020)

Education Code (EC) Section 17075.10(a) states:

A school district may apply for hardship assistance in cases of extraordinary circumstances. Extraordinary circumstances may include, but are not limited to, the need to repair, reconstruct, or replace the most vulnerable school facilities that are identified as a Category 2 building, as defined in the report submitted pursuant to Section 17317, determined by the department to pose an unacceptable risk of injury to its occupants in the event of a seismic event.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.82 states, “A school district may apply for Facility Hardship, including Seismic Mitigation, Program assistance in cases of extraordinary circumstances that have caused an imminent health and safety threat.”

SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.1 states that “a district is eligible for Facility Hardship funding to repair, replace, or construct School Buildings or related required components that are currently causing a health and safety threat to the students and/or staff. Projects solely to replace components that have reached the end of their useful life, perform routine maintenance or repair, issues resulting from the deferment of routine maintenance or repair, lack of current code compliance, or the addition of components that were not previously existing, do not meet the qualifying criteria of the program. However, this work may be incorporated into a qualifying Facility Hardship application if it is required to be completed to gain DSA approval.”

SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.1(c) states,

Districts may qualify for funding to rehabilitate their School Buildings, components of School Buildings, or school site conditions. Factors to be considered by the Board may include (1) or (2) below:

- (1) School Buildings where the minimum cost to mitigate the health and safety threat and remain in the School Building is 50 percent or less of the Current Replacement Cost.
- (2) Components of the School Buildings or school sites conditions are causing a health and safety threat to students and/or staff.

The Board, acting on behalf of the State, hereby declares that it is the State’s official intent to use General Fund proceeds that are available for such purpose, consistent with the requirements of law that are in effect at the time the funds are available, to provide grants, in accordance with applicable laws and regulations.
3. This Resolution shall be continuously available for inspection by the general public during normal business hours at the office of the Board at 707 3rd Street, 4th Floor, West Sacramento, California, commencing within one week after the date of enactment of this Resolution.

PURPOSE OF REPORT

To present California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program (Program) Apportionments for the fourth funding cycle.

DESCRIPTION

The applications that are included on Attachment B underwent a thorough review process by the Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) and have been determined to meet all Program requirements.

This item requests the State Allocation Board (Board) approve five projects totaling \$14,793,051.00 for Apportionment for the Program grants as shown on Attachment B.

AUTHORITY

See Attachment A.

BACKGROUND

Assembly Bill (AB) 1808, added Article 1 (commencing with Education Code Section 17375) to Chapter 3 of Part 10.5 of Division 1 of Title 1 of the Education Code (EC) to create the Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program (FDKFGP). AB 1808 provided \$100 million for FDKFGP from the General Fund. FDKFGP allows school districts that lack the facilities to provide full-day kindergarten to apply for one-time grants to construct new school facilities or retrofit existing school facilities for the purpose of providing full-day kindergarten classrooms.

AB 130, Education Finance: Education Omnibus Trailer Bill, was approved by the Governor and Chaptered on July 9, 2021. This bill appropriated an additional \$490,000,000 from the General Fund for the 2021-2022 fiscal year to the Board to provide one-time grants to school districts to construct new school facilities or retrofit existing school facilities for the purpose of providing California preschool, transitional kindergarten and full-day kindergarten programs.

AB 181, Education Finance: Education Omnibus Trailer Bill, was approved by the Governor and Chaptered on June 30, 2022. For the 2022-23 fiscal year, this bill appropriated an additional \$100,000,000 from the General Fund of the 2021-22 fiscal year to the Board to provide one-time grants to school districts to construct new school facilities or retrofit existing school facilities for the purpose of providing California preschool, transitional kindergarten and full-day kindergarten programs.

The third funding round for the Program approved 72 projects for \$224,960,572.67 in 2022.

BACKGROUND (cont.)

The fourth funding round for the Program opened on February 1, 2023, and closed on March 2, 2023. OPSC received 446 applications, requesting \$1,467,165,743.00 in funding. At the September and December 2023 meetings, the Board apportioned funding for 94 projects with a combined total of \$375,344,087.08.

Following the approvals in September and December 2023, 24 applicants that received apportionments for Advance Design have opted to reduce their project scope or withdraw their applications entirely. Per Program Regulation 1860.4(c)(1), "Any funds that return on or before June 30, 2024, shall be returned to the California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program Account and may be used to provide additional Apportionments."

These funds must be apportioned prior to the Round 4 processing deadline of June 30, 2024, pursuant to Program Regulation 1860.6(d) which states, "Applications during this round will be retained until the earlier of June 30, 2024, or the next funding round. Applications that do not receive an Apportionment by June 30, 2024, will not be processed."

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS

Including application rescissions in this Agenda, the Program has a total of \$14,793,051.00 in available funds that may be apportioned. The districts listed on Attachment B have been determined as the next eligible projects in Program funding order.

Funding Order

In accordance with Program Regulation Section 1860.15, the applications were ranked by preference points. Approved Applications receive preference points based on the total of (a) and (b) up to a maximum of 80 points, as follows:

- (a) 40 points if a school district demonstrates it meets the requirements for financial hardship.
- (b) Up to 40 points based on the percentage of pupils in the school district who are eligible for Free and Reduced-Price School Meals, as identified in the most recent data on file at the California Department of Education (CDE).

Once the preference points were determined, all approved applications were prioritized based on the following order per Program regulations:

1. School districts will have their first priority projects funded in order based on total preference points until all school districts have had their first priority project funded.
2. School districts with the same total preference points will be funded in order of the higher Low Income percentage reported to one decimal place. The school district with the higher Low Income percentage will be funded first, as identified in the most recent Free and Reduced Price School Meals data on file at the CDE. If school districts have the same total preference points, and the same Low Income percentage reported to one decimal place, projects will then be placed into a lottery system to determine the school district funding order.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS (cont.)

3. The school district with the highest total preference points shall have their remaining projects funded in priority order until all of the school district's projects are funded, or until all funds are exhausted for that funding round, whichever comes first. Funding shall then be provided to the school district with the next highest total preference points.
4. A tie breaker will be used for school districts with the same total preference points by using the exact Low Income percentage to one decimal place. The school district with the higher Low Income percentage will be funded first.
5. If school districts with the same total preference points are still tied after the review of the Low Income percentages, projects will be placed into a lottery system to determine school district funding order. The highest remaining priority project for each school district participating in the lottery will be funded until all projects from each school district participating in the same lottery round have been funded, or until all funds are exhausted for that funding round, whichever comes first.

After accounting for the four projects that can be fully funded in this item, there is a remaining balance of \$1,906,069.00 available for the next project in line. Pursuant to Program Regulation Section 1860.15, if the Board does not have sufficient funding to fully apportion a school district's Approved Application, that school district may elect to either accept or decline to accept partial funding for the project. If partial funding is declined, the Board may offer partial funding to the next Approved Application, based on the funding order determined above.

On June 4, 2024, Staff conducted a lottery pursuant to regulation to determine the final funding order shown on Attachment B. A recording of the lottery is available here <https://youtu.be/C7P-nCUZRwk>. Ukiah Unified School District won the lottery. Therefore, Esparto Unified School District was offered the available remaining funds.

Due to the limited funds available, Esparto Unified School District has elected to reduce the scope of its original request in lieu of accepting a partial apportionment for the proposed project located at the Esparto Elementary School site. Esparto's decision to reduce the scope of its project following the results of the lottery on June 4, 2024, does not enable Staff enough time to process any further applications before the end of the current funding round on June 30, 2024. Thus, there is a remaining balance of \$273,664.

Receiving an Apportionment

Under current regulations, school districts who receive a Program Apportionment *without* an advance release of funds must submit a valid *Fund Release Authorization* (Form SAB 70-02) within 180 days of Apportionment. School districts who receive a Program Apportionment *with* an advance release of funds must submit a valid Form SAB 70-02 with all required approvals within 12 months of Apportionment. Failure to submit the Form SAB 70-02 and required approvals within the prescribed period will result in the rescission of the project without further Board action.

Under current regulations, a school district that has received funds in accordance with the Program must submit a valid *Expenditure Report* (Form SAB 70-03) within 12 months of the final fund release or at the completion of the project, whichever occurs first. A final savings report stating any use of savings shall be due 12 months after the first expenditure report. Any savings remaining at the end of the 12 months must be returned to the State.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS (cont.)

All school districts that receive a Board approval for an Apportionment must execute and submit a Grant Agreement prior to any release of funds. Cash proceeds are immediately available upon project Apportionment.

Approved Changes to Fund Release and Project Reporting Timelines

On September 27, 2023, the Board approved proposed regulation changes that would increase the timelines associated with the following requirements after receiving an Apportionment. In addition, the Board took action to apply these timelines to any projects Apportioned or submitted as part of the third or fourth Program funding round until such a time as the regulations would be in effect. The approved timelines are as follows:

- Program Apportionments for projects *without* an advance release of funds would have 18 months, rather than 180 days, to submit a valid Form SAB 70-02.
- Program Apportionments for projects *with* an advance release of funds would have 18 months, rather than 12 months, to obtain all project approvals and submit a valid Form SAB 70-02.
- A valid Form SAB 70-03 must be submitted within three years from the date of the first Apportionment, rather than one year from the date of the final fund release.

Staff anticipates that these regulatory amendments will be in effect later this year.

Summary

Staff recommends approval of the five Program projects on Attachment B for Apportionment. In accordance with Program Regulations, the remaining applications will be returned to the applicants. Applicants may resubmit in the future funding rounds that will follow.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Approve the Program projects in the amount of \$14,793,051.00 as shown on Attachment B for Apportionment.
2. For an Apportionment with request for an advance fund release for design, pursuant to the Board's action on September 27, 2023 to amend Regulation Section 1860.16(f), the school district must submit a valid *Fund Release Authorization* (Form SAB 70-02) within 18 months of the Apportionment.
3. For an Apportionment without a request for an advance fund release for design, pursuant to the Board's action on September 27, 2023 to amend Regulation Section 1860.16(e), the school district must submit a valid *Fund Release Authorization* (Form SAB 70-02) within 18 months of the Apportionment.

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17375.

(a) (1) The California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program is hereby established, under the administration of the State Allocation Board pursuant to the requirements of this section, to provide one-time grants to school districts to construct new school facilities or retrofit existing school facilities for the purpose of providing transitional kindergarten classrooms and full-day kindergarten classrooms pursuant to Section 8973, and for the construction of new preschool classrooms, the modernization of existing preschool classrooms, or the modernization of existing kindergarten and grade 1 to 12, inclusive, classrooms that would be converted to provide California state preschool programs operated by school districts on a public schoolsite, pursuant to this section.

(2) Moneys appropriated pursuant to this section shall be deposited in the California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten, and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Account, hereby created in the State Treasury, administered by the State Allocation Board.

(3) For the 2018–19 fiscal year, the sum of one hundred million dollars (\$100,000,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the State Allocation Board to provide one-time grants as specified in this section, as it read on December 31, 2020.

(4) (A) For the 2021–22 fiscal year, the sum of four hundred ninety million dollars (\$490,000,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the State Allocation Board to provide one-time grants as specified in this section. The funds appropriated in this subparagraph shall be available for encumbrance or expenditure by the State Allocation Board until June 30, 2027.

(B) For the 2022–23 fiscal year, the sum of one hundred million dollars (\$100,000,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund in the 2021–22 fiscal year to the State Allocation Board to provide one-time grants as specified in this section. The funds appropriated in this subparagraph shall be available for encumbrance or expenditure by the State Allocation Board until June 30, 2028.

(C) It is the intent of the Legislature to appropriate an additional five hundred fifty million dollars (\$550,000,000) in the 2024–25 fiscal year from the General Fund to the State Allocation Board to provide one-time grants as specified in this section. It is the intent of the Legislature that the funds intended to be appropriated in this subparagraph will be available for encumbrance or expenditure by the State Allocation Board until June 30, 2030.

(D) (i) Of the moneys allocated to a school district from the appropriation made pursuant to this paragraph, savings and interest achieved upon full completion of an approved project, and as a result of a school district's efficient and prudent expenditure of the moneys allocated, may be used for professional development or instructional materials to build capacity for the implementation of a California state preschool program, a transitional kindergarten program, a full-day kindergarten program, or high priority

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capital outlay purposes identified by the school district and in accordance with subdivision (f), associated regulations, and any accompanying grant agreement.

(ii) Notwithstanding any other law, for purposes of the funds appropriated in support of this paragraph only, a school district may retain and use savings and interest pursuant to clause (i) even if it receives financial hardship assistance pursuant to Section 17075.10.

(iii) Savings and interest retained by a school district shall be expended within one year of project completion or returned to the state as required by associated regulations and any accompanying grant agreement.

(5) New school facilities built pursuant to this section shall not be included in the eligibility determination used for purposes of the Leroy F. Greene School Facilities Act of 1998 (Chapter 12.5 (commencing with Section 17070.10) of Part 10).

(b) (1) The State Allocation Board shall award grants to school districts that lack the facilities to provide transitional kindergarten or full-day kindergarten as required for eligibility pursuant to Sections 17071.25 and 17072.10, that lack facilities that satisfy the design requirements required for new kindergarten classrooms as specified in paragraph (2) of subdivision (h) of Section 14030 of Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations, or that lack the facility capacity to increase California state preschool program services.

(2) Priority for grants shall be given to school districts that meet either of the following criteria:

(A) The school district is financially unable to contribute a portion of, or all of, the local matching share required pursuant to paragraph (3) for a project, and meets the requirements for financial hardship pursuant to Sections 17075.10 and 17075.15. For purposes of this section, paragraph (5) of subdivision (d) of Section 17075.15 shall not apply.

(B) (i) For school districts seeking a transitional kindergarten or full-day kindergarten facilities grant, the school district is located in an underserved community with a high population of pupils who are eligible for free or reduced-price meals pursuant to subdivision (a) of Section 42238.01.

(ii) For school districts seeking a preschool facilities grant, the school district is located in an underserved area, as defined in Section 8205, that is prioritized to receive funds for the California state preschool program according to the prioritization process described in Section 8210.

(3) Except for school districts that meet the requirements for financial hardship pursuant to Section 17075.10 and as specified in paragraph (4), a school district that applies for a grant pursuant to this section for new construction shall provide 50 percent of the cost of

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the project, and a school district that applies for a grant pursuant to this section for a retrofit project shall provide 40 percent of the cost of the project.

(4) Except for school districts that meet the requirements for financial hardship pursuant to Section 17075.10, a school district shall provide 25 percent of the cost of the project, whether the project is for new construction or retrofit, if the school district does either of the following:

(A) Converts a part-day kindergarten program to a full-day kindergarten program. A school district that was awarded a grant from funds appropriated pursuant to paragraph (3) of subdivision (a) and met the requirements of this paragraph shall have its grant amount adjusted from funds appropriated pursuant to paragraph (4) of subdivision (a) to reflect the requirements of this paragraph.

(B) Commencing with the 2021–22 fiscal year, offers, or expands enrollment in, a California state preschool program or transitional kindergarten program.

(5) (A) A school district seeking a transitional kindergarten or full-day kindergarten facilities grant from moneys in the California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten, and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Account shall provide the Office of Public School Construction with schoolsite enrollment data for the year in which its application is processed and the three immediately preceding years. The Office of Public School Construction shall use this data to verify the schoolsite's overall need for funding pursuant to this section based on the schoolsite's enrollment patterns. As part of this verification, the Office of Public School Construction, in consultation with the State Department of Education, shall determine if the schoolsite's need for funding shall be limited to retrofit projects.

(B) For a school district seeking a new construction grant for preschool classrooms from moneys in the California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten, and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Account, the school district shall demonstrate that its existing classrooms, including outdoor play areas and equipment, are insufficient to meet the needs of providing preschool, and that the school district's projected enrollment in the preschool program exceeds the current preschool program classroom capacity at the applicable schoolsite. A school district shall use both of the following to demonstrate enrollment for purposes of determining eligibility:

(i) The most recent childcare needs assessment conducted by its regional local planning council for preschool age children.

(ii) A current or future contract with the State Department of Education to operate a preschool program.

(6) A school district, county office of education, or community college district seeking a preschool facilities grant shall hold title to the real property where the facilities will be located.

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(c) The State Allocation Board shall disburse grant funds to school districts with approved applications for new construction or retrofit projects, to the extent funds are available for the state's applicable matching share, if the school district has provided its applicable local matching share, unless the school district meets the requirements for financial hardship pursuant to Section 17075.10, and upon certification by the school district that the school district has entered into a binding contract for completion of the approved project.

(d) The State Allocation Board shall allocate funds to school districts using the same maximum grant eligibility amounts that are used for purposes of the Leroy F. Greene School Facilities Act of 1998 (Chapter 12.5 (commencing with Section 17070.10) of Part 10), as set forth in Sections 17072.10 and 17072.11 for new construction, and as set forth in Section 17074.10 for retrofit projects.

(e) As a condition of receiving grant funds pursuant to this section, and before the release of those funds, the school district shall do all of the following:

(1) Execute and submit a grant agreement consistent with the applicable sections of the grant agreement specified in Section 1859.90.4 of Title 2 of the California Code of Regulations.

(2) For a school district applying for grant funds for a transitional kindergarten facilities project, pass a resolution at a public meeting of the governing board of the school district stating the school district's intent to offer, or expand enrollment in, a transitional kindergarten program.

(3) For a school district applying for grant funds for a California state preschool program facilities project, pass a resolution at a public meeting of the governing board of the school district stating the school district's intent to expand enrollment in a preschool program and apply for expanded program service funding, and certify that the school district has or will apply for a contract to operate a preschool program before occupying the to-be-constructed or retrofitted facility.

(f) (1) A school district may use grant funds awarded for new construction on costs necessary to adequately house preschool, transitional kindergarten, and kindergarten pupils in an approved project, which shall include only the following:

(A) The costs of design, engineering, testing, inspections, plan checking, construction management, site acquisition and development, evaluation and response action costs relating to hazardous substances at a new or existing schoolsite, demolition, construction, landscaping, necessary utility costs, utility connections and other related fees, equipment including telecommunication equipment to increase school security, furnishings, the upgrading of electrical systems, and the wiring or cabling of classrooms in order to accommodate educational technology.

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(B) The costs of acquiring an existing government-owned or privately owned building, or a privately financed school building, and the necessary costs of converting the government-owned or privately owned building for public school use.

(2) (A) A school district may use grant funds awarded for a retrofit project to retrofit an existing school facility to adequately house preschool, transitional kindergarten, and kindergarten pupils, which shall only include the costs of design, engineering, testing, inspection, plan checking, construction management, demolition, construction, necessary utility costs, utility connection and other related fees, the purchase and installation of air-conditioning equipment and insulation materials and related costs, furniture and equipment, including telecommunication equipment to increase school security, fire safety improvements, playground safety improvements, the identification, assessment, or abatement of hazardous asbestos, seismic safety improvements, the upgrading of electrical systems, and the wiring or cabling of classrooms in order to accommodate educational technology.

(B) Grant funds awarded for a retrofit project shall not be used for costs associated with acquisition and development of real property or for routine maintenance and repair.

(3) A school district shall not use funds to purchase or install portable classrooms. For purposes of this article, "portable classroom" means a classroom building of one or more stories that is designed and constructed to be relocatable and transportable over public streets, and for a single-story portable classroom, is designed and constructed for relocation without the separation of the roof or floor from the building and when measured at the most exterior walls, has a floor area that does not exceed 2,000 square feet.

(g) For a modernization grant pursuant to this article to retrofit an existing preschool classroom, including outdoor play areas and installed equipment, the applicable classroom shall comply with all of the following:

(1) The Field Act, as set forth in Article 3 (commencing with Section 17280) and Article 6 (commencing with Section 17365).

(2) The California Building Standards Code, as set forth in Title 24 of the California Code of Regulations.

(3) The regulations for early learning and care programs as set forth in Chapter 19 (commencing with Section 18000) of Division 1 of Title 5 of, and Chapter 1 (commencing with Section 101151) of Division 12 of Title 22 of, the California Code of Regulations, as applicable.

(4) Written approval from the State Department of Education that the building plans comply with the standards set forth in Subchapter 1 (commencing with Section 14001) of Chapter 13 of Division 1 of Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations.

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(h) The State Allocation Board may adopt regulations to implement this section. Any regulations adopted pursuant to this section may be adopted as emergency regulations in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of the Title 2 of the Government Code). The adoption of these regulations shall be deemed to be an emergency and necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, or general welfare.

(i) Notwithstanding any other law, a school district shall be subject, with regard to this section, to an audit conducted pursuant to Section 41024.

(j) The Office of Public School Construction shall report to the Director of Finance, and shall post on its internet website, information regarding the use of grant funds that have been made available to school districts during each fiscal year grant funds are disbursed pursuant to this section. A final report shall also be issued after projects have been audited pursuant to Section 41024 and any savings have been spent or returned to the state.

(k) The Department of General Services may charge its administrative costs against the California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten, and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Account, which shall be subject to the approval of the Department of Finance and which shall not exceed 2.5 percent of the account. These administrative funds shall be subject to the encumbrance or expenditure availability for the appropriations described in paragraph (4) of subdivision (a).

(l) Funds made available to school districts pursuant to this article shall supplement, not supplant, existing funds available for school facilities construction.

(m) For purposes of this section, the following definitions apply:

(1) "Kindergarten" includes transitional kindergarten, as defined in Section 48000.

(2) "Preschool classroom" means a preschool classroom used or proposed to be used for instructional purposes in a California state preschool program.

(3) "Preschool program" means a full-day California state preschool program pursuant to Article 2 (commencing with Section 8207) of Chapter 2 of Part 6.

(4) "Schoolsite" or "site" means the project site for which the school district is applying for grants under this article.

(5) "School district" means as follows:

(A) For transitional kindergarten and full-day kindergarten facilities grants, "school district" means a school district.

(B) For preschool facilities grants, "school district" means a school district, county office of education, or a community college district that operates a preschool program on behalf of, or in lieu of, a school district or county office of education. *(Amended by Stats. 2023, Ch. 48, Sec. 15. (SB 114) Effective July 10, 2023.)*

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EC Section 8973.

Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the kindergarten schoolday in an early primary program conducted pursuant to Section 8972 may exceed four hours, exclusive of recesses, provided that both of the following conditions are met:

(a) The governing board of a school district declares that the extended-day kindergarten program does not exceed the length of the primary schoolday.

(b) The extended-day kindergarten program takes into account ample opportunity for both active and quiet activities within an integrated, experiential, and developmentally appropriate educational program.

EC Section 8974.

School districts with early primary programs shall provide educational continuity from preschool through kindergarten and grades 1 to 3, inclusive, by accomplishing the following:

(a) Establish connections with public preschool programs, including state preschool, state child development, and federal Head Start programs, to establish a more effective transition of children from preschool to kindergarten.

(b) Promote connections among early primary programs that provide before- and after-school services.

(c) Promote joint activities for teachers and administrators of public preschool programs, including state preschool, state child development, and federal Head Start, and kindergarten and grades 1 to 3, inclusive, in areas such as program planning and staff development training related to developmentally appropriate curriculum and assessment practices for young children.

EC Section 8207.

(a) The Superintendent shall administer all California state preschool programs. Those programs shall include, but not be limited to, part-day and full-day age and developmentally appropriate programs, offered through childcare centers and family childcare home education networks, that are designed to facilitate the transition to kindergarten for three- and four-year-old children in educational development, health services, social services, nutritional services, parent education and parent participation, evaluation, and staff development. Preschool programs for which federal reimbursement is not available shall be funded as prescribed by the Legislature in the Budget Act, and unless otherwise specified by the Legislature, shall not use federal funds made available through Title XX of the federal Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. Sec. 1397).

(b) A part-day California state preschool program shall operate for a minimum of (1) three hours per day, excluding time for home-to-school transportation, and (2) a

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minimum of 175 days per year, unless the contract specifies a lower number of days of operation.

(c) A full-day California state preschool program shall operate for a minimum of 246 days per year, unless the contract specifies a lower number of days of operation.

(d) Any agency described in subdivision (a) of Section 8205 as an “applicant or contracting agency” is eligible to contract to operate a California state preschool program.

(e) Public funds shall not be paid directly or indirectly to an agency that does not pay at least the minimum wage to each of its employees.

(f) Federal Head Start funds used to provide services to families receiving California state preschool services shall be deemed nonrestricted funds.

(g) School districts and charter schools that administer a California state preschool program may place four-year-old children in a transitional kindergarten program classroom in accordance with subdivisions (h) to (j), inclusive, of Section 48000.

(h) California state preschool programs shall include all of the following:

(1) Age- and developmentally appropriate activities for children.

(2) Supervision.

(3) Parenting education and parent engagement.

(4) Social services that include, but are not limited to, identification of child and family needs and referral to appropriate agencies.

(5) Health services.

(6) Nutrition.

(7) Training and career ladder opportunities, documentation of which shall be provided to the department.

(i) The Superintendent shall adopt rules and regulations related to the administration of this chapter, including rules and regulations related to eligibility, enrollment, and priority of services. Regulations shall also include the recommendations of the State Department of Health Care Services relative to health care screening and the provision of health care services. The Superintendent shall seek the advice and assistance of these health authorities in situations where service under this chapter includes or requires care of children who are ill or have exceptional needs.

EC Section 1596.7925.

(a) On or before July 1, 2019, the State Department of Education shall adopt new health and safety regulations under Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations that apply to California state preschool programs that meet the conditions specified in subdivision (o) of Section 1596.792. The regulations shall require those programs to have all of the following:

(1) Outdoor shade that is safe and in good repair.

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- (2) Drinking water that is accessible and readily available throughout the day.
 - (3) Safe and sanitary restroom facilities with one toilet and handwashing fixture for every 15 children.
 - (4) Restroom facilities that are only available for preschoolers and kindergartners.
 - (5) Visual supervision of children at all times.
 - (6) Indoor and outdoor space that is properly contained or fenced and provides sufficient space for the number of children using the space at any given time. Playground equipment must be safe, in good repair, and age appropriate.
- (b) The State Department of Education may adopt emergency regulations pursuant to Section 11346.1 of the Government Code to satisfy the requirements of this section. The adoption of emergency regulations shall be deemed an emergency and necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, safety, or general welfare.
- (c) A violation of regulations adopted pursuant to subdivision (a) or (b) shall not be subject to Section 1596.890.

5 CCR § 18140

§ 18140. General Provisions.

- (a) The regulations in article 4 apply only to Local Educational Agencies (LEAs) operating part-day or full-day California State Preschool Programs (CSPPs) that choose to be exempt from title 22 of California Code of Regulations (22 CCR) pursuant to Health and Safety Code section 1596.792(o).
- (b) LEAs operating part-day or full-day CSPP classrooms may choose for any or all classrooms to be exempt from 22 CCR licensing requirements as long as they continue to meet all legal and contractual requirements of the CSPP, which includes adequate standards of Program Quality, pursuant to subchapter 12 of chapter 19, of this division, as well as meet the following conditions:
- (1) The LEA has a contract to perform CSPP services and performs those services directly, and not through a subcontractor;
 - (2) The LEA is performing such services in a school building, as defined by Education Code section 17283, and the school building in which the services are performed has been determined to be compliant with the provisions of the Field Act, pursuant to title 1, division 1, part 10.5, chapter 3, articles 3 and 6 of the Education Code, according to the Division of the State Architect;
 - (3) The school building in which services are performed is maintained in good repair as defined by Education Code section 17002 and is subject to a yearly facility inspection pursuant to Education Code section 1240 and the information is included on the LEA's School Accountability Report Card.

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(4) The LEA facility meets the requirements for kindergarten classrooms in accordance with chapter 13 (commencing with section 14000) of division 1 of title 5 of the California Code of Regulations (5 CCR).

(c) Any LEA operating a CSPP classroom pursuant to this article may only serve four-year-old children as defined in Education Code section 8208 in the exempted classrooms. CSPP classrooms with any child younger than four years of age shall meet 22 CCR licensing requirements.

(d) The California Department of Education (CDE) shall make a determination whether an LEA meets the requirements of this article at the time of initial funding and thereafter yearly as part of the continued funding process. At any time, the CDE may make a finding that an LEA does not meet the requirements for license exemption and shall notify the LEA of such finding. The LEA may appeal this finding pursuant to 5 CCR section 18308.

(e) The CDE shall immediately notify the California Department of Social Services, Community Care Licensing Division, regarding any change in the licensing status of an LEA and/or if a determination is made that an LEA does not meet the requirements of Health and Safety Code section 1596.792(o) and this article and should be subject to licensing.

PURPOSE OF REPORT

To present Banning Unified School District's (District) request for an extension to the deadline to submit the *Fund Release Authorization* (Form SAB 70-02) for its California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program (Program) funding application.

DESCRIPTION

School Districts participating in the Program must submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 within 18 months of receiving an apportionment, pursuant to the Board's policy adopted on September 27, 2023, as amendments to Program Regulation Section 1860.16(f). In addition to the completed Form, applicants must also submit the required approvals from the California Department of Education (CDE) and Division of the State Architect (DSA) and comply with all other requirements listed on the Form instructions and certifications, including but not limited to, entering into a binding contract for at least 90 percent of the building construction activities of the project. This item requests an extension of six months to this deadline for the District's new construction project, application number(s) 70/66985-00-002.

AUTHORITY

As approved on September 27, 2023, Section 1860.16(f) of the Program Regulations read as follows:

For an Apportionment received pursuant to Section 1860.7(b) and 1860.7(d), where submittal of the necessary CDE plan approval and/or DSA-approved plans and specifications were not required at the time the Board granted an Apportionment, the School District has up to 18 months to submit the required approvals and a complete *Fund Release Request* (Form SAB 70-02) from the date of the first Apportionment. The School District may submit in writing other evidence satisfactory to the Board of circumstances beyond the control of the School District that precludes the School District from submitting the required CDE plan approval, DSA-approved plans and specifications, and a complete Form SAB 70-02 within 18 months from the date of the first Apportionment. If the required submittals or other evidence in writing are not received within 18 months of the first Apportionment, the Apportionment shall be rescinded and the Full- Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant will return to the Program for reallocation without further Board action.

- (1) School Districts submitting other evidence shall have up to three years from the date of the first Apportionment to submit the required approvals and a complete *Fund Release Authorization* (Form SAB 70-02). This shall not extend the deadline in Section 1860.18.

BACKGROUND

The Program provides funding to construct new school facilities and retrofit existing school facilities for the purpose of expanding existing programs or providing new programs for preschool, transitional kindergarten, and full-day kindergarten pupils. At the September 27, 2023 meeting, the Board approved Staff's policy recommendations to modify funding deadlines and requirements for projects apportioned during the third and fourth funding rounds of the Program, as well as conforming regulatory amendments for future applications. The approval included an amendment to Program Regulation Section 1860.18 (f) that allows the School District to submit "in writing other evidence satisfactory to the Board of circumstances beyond the control of the School District that precludes the School District from submitting the required CDE plan approval, DSA-approved plans and specifications, and a complete Form SAB 70-02 within 18 months from the date of the first Apportionment." These regulatory amendments are currently proceeding through the regulatory process.

STAFF ANALYSIS/COMMENTS

The approved project consists of three preschool and four transitional kindergarten classrooms. On April 26, 2024, OPSC received the District's request for an extension to submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 due to circumstances beyond its control. The project has been delayed due to the District submitting CDE approval and DSA approved plans for only six classrooms instead of the seven classrooms originally apportioned by SAB. After various meetings with OPSC and the District, it was determined that the District procured the facilities using an incorrect grant estimate, which resulted in being over budget for the project. The District is requesting additional time to help work through a resolution to fulfill its contractual obligation to continue with the project. The District plans to submit a complete Form SAB 70-02.

The District's initial apportionment was on October 26, 2022 with a current deadline to submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 by April 26, 2024. If the extension request is approved, the new deadline to submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 will be October 26, 2024.

Staff has reviewed the District's request, which is included as an Attachment, and determined that it provides satisfactory evidence to justify the requested extension. Staff supports the District's request for a 6 month extension to submit the Form SAB 70-02. However, the approval of this extension does not extend the three-year deadline to complete the project and submit a complete Expenditure Report (Form SAB 70-03) with final expenditures by April 26, 2025.

RECOMMENDATION

Approve the District's request for an extension to October 26, 2024. Require that the District submit the Form SAB 70-02 for application number 70/66985-00-002 by October 26, 2024, or the apportionment will be rescinded without further Board action.

It was determined the District procured the facilities project utilizing an incorrect grant document provided on the OPSC website (attached for your reference) listing the total grant amount of \$9,890,037.50 for two (2) kindergarten and four (4) transitional kindergarten classrooms. The additional time requested will help OPSC and District work through a resolution.

- *August 2024: (6) classrooms completed and student occupancy (tentative)*

PURPOSE OF REPORT

To present Briggs Elementary School District's (District) request for an extension to the deadline to submit the *Fund Release Authorization* (Form SAB 70-02) for its California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program (Program) funding application.

DESCRIPTION

School Districts participating in the Program must submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 within 18 months of receiving an apportionment, pursuant to the Board's policy adopted on September 27, 2023, as amendments to Program Regulation Section 1860.16(f). In addition to the completed Form, applicants must also submit the required approvals from the California Department of Education (CDE) and Division of the State Architect (DSA) and comply with all other requirements listed on the Form instructions and certifications, including but not limited to, entering into a binding contract for at least 90 percent of the building construction activities of the project. This item requests an extension of eight months to this deadline for the District's new construction project, application number 70/72447-00-001.

AUTHORITY

As approved on September 27, 2023, Section 1860.16(f) of the Program Regulations read as follows:

For an Apportionment received pursuant to Section 1860.7(b) and 1860.7(d), where submittal of the necessary CDE plan approval and/or DSA-approved plans and specifications were not required at the time the Board granted an Apportionment, the School District has up to 18 months to submit the required approvals and a complete *Fund Release Request* (Form SAB 70-02) from the date of the first Apportionment. The School District may submit in writing other evidence satisfactory to the Board of circumstances beyond the control of the School District that precludes the School District from submitting the required CDE plan approval, DSA-approved plans and specifications, and a complete Form SAB 70-02 within 18 months from the date of the first Apportionment. 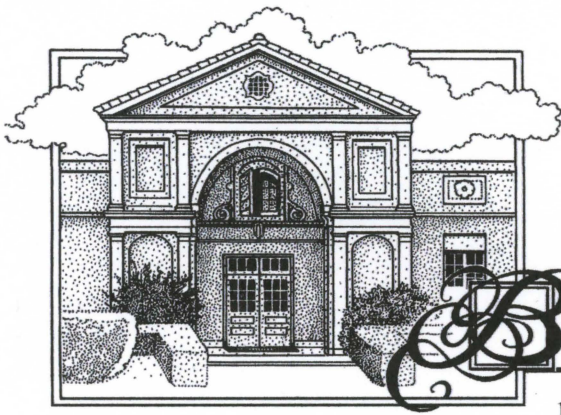
The project will consist of two transitional kindergarten classrooms. On May 15, 2024, OPSC received the District's request for an extension to submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 due to circumstances beyond its control. The project has been delayed due to the departure of the District's former superintendent. The District's new administration was not aware of the awarded apportionment until September 2023 and has been working diligently to complete the Program requirements since. The District has been in contact with DSA, performed preliminary site reviews, and contracted services with architects and engineers. The District plans to award contracts for modular buildings in June and anticipates submitting final plans to DSA in July. Accounting for four months of review at DSA, the District plans to advertise for site construction in late Fall of 2024. The District plans to submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 by January 31, 2025.

The District's initial apportionment was on November 28, 2022 with a current deadline to submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 by May 28, 2022. If the extension request is approved, the new deadline to submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 will be January 31, 2025.

Staff has reviewed the District's request, which is included as an Attachment, and determined that it provides satisfactory evidence to justify the requested extension. Staff supports the District's request for an eight-month extension to submit the Form SAB 70-02. However, the approval of this extension does not extend the three-year deadline to complete the project and submit a complete Expenditure Report (Form SAB 70-03) with final expenditures by November 28, 2025.

RECOMMENDATION

Approve the District's request for an extension to January 31, 2025. Require that the District submit the Form SAB 70-02 for application number 70/72447-00-001 by January 31, 2025, or the apportionment will be rescinded without further Board action.



The District anticipates having both approval letters by September 2024 and then be able to bid the project in October/November. The District plans to submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 by March 1, 2025.

The District's initial apportionment was on November 28, 2022 with a current deadline to submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 by May 28, 2024. If the extension request is approved, the new deadline to submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 will be March 1, 2025.

Staff has reviewed the District's request, which is included as an Attachment, and determined that it provides satisfactory evidence to justify the requested extension. The Greenfield Union School District is requesting an extension until March 1, 2025 to submit for Fund Release for the Palla Elementary School CPTKFDKFGP Project 70/63503-00-013. The project was approved and received an Advance Design Apportionment at the November 28, 2022 State Allocation Board Meeting. The District's Fund Release document deadline is May 28, 2024.

The project approval is for 4 Preschool Classrooms, 4 Transitional Kindergarten Classrooms and 1 Full Day Kindergarten Classroom.

As with many District's in the State, the District faced challenges with obtaining a PC Approved modular building due to the 2022 Building Code Change that impacted modular manufactures. The District worked with the OPSC, meeting on several occasions, but ultimately the appeal did not need to move forward as the OPSC took amended regulations to the SAB for approval.

The District has continued to work diligently to meet the new deadlines for the project and awarded a modular contract on November 30, 2023. The project was submitted to CDE on April 11, 2024 and to DSA on March 28, 2024. The District hopes to receive CDE approval in the next 60 days.

The purpose of this letter is to request and extension to OPSC application 70/65243-00-001 (DSA Application 02-121587). This project is designed to construct 4 new TK and 2 new FDK classrooms at Lincoln ES using the Design/Bid/Build method.

Please note the pertinent dates below regarding this project's history:

New Construction Apportionment: November 28, 2022
Submitted to DSA: October 19, 2023
Obtained CDE Approval: April 9, 2024

Constructing new UTK classroom buildings onto the Lincoln ES campus is part of a larger project that Madera USD is undertaking. Madera USD will construct identical buildings on three other elementary school sites to meet the growing enrollment demand created by the new UTK statewide program.

Over the course of 12 months, from October 2022, when the District onboarded PBK Architects as the architect of record, through October 2023, PBK Architects lost three key staff who had each been assigned to lead the design of this project. With each new departure the project would experience a rebooting of sorts. During this same time period, our District's facilities department also experienced a staffing vacancy of our own which adversely affected the schedule.

Our Vision: Madera Unified will set the standard for hard work, creativity and resiliency with a fearless drive to continuously improve.

Once we gained some sustained traction with our new staff member and the new design team members, we expedited the Lincoln ES project to meet the grant funding deadline.

The project bid May 14, 2024, however no qualified bids were received. The Waukena Joint Union Elementary School District is requesting an extension until September 30, 2024 to submit the Fund Release documents for the CPTKFDKFGP Project 70/72264-00-001. The project was approved and received an Advance Design Apportionment at the October 26, 2022 State Allocation Board Meeting. The District's Fund Release document deadline is April 26, 2024.

The District is a Small School District with one site and qualifies as a Financial Hardship District. As such, resources are more challenging than for a larger District, yet the District has remained diligent in attempting to move the project forward.

The District began the planning stages of the project and reached out for assistance with the architectural RFQ process in early December 2022. However, the project quickly stalled as it became apparent that there were not any Title V compliant single classroom modulars available.

As with many District's in the State, the District faced challenges with obtaining a PC Approved modular building due to the 2022 Building Code Change that impacted modular manufactures.

However, the District continued to move forward and awarded an Architectural contract on April 10, 2023 and a Construction Management contract on February 28, 2024.

Once the modular PC approvals were available, the District went out to bid and awarded a contract for the modular on April 23, 2024. The District has a DSA

appointment scheduled on June 26, 2024 for an over the counter approval of the full plan set.

Assuming the DSA Approval date listed above, the District anticipates being out to bid in July and under contract by August 2024, with the project complete in mid 2025. Therefore, the District is requesting an extension until September 30, 2024 to submit the required fund release documents.

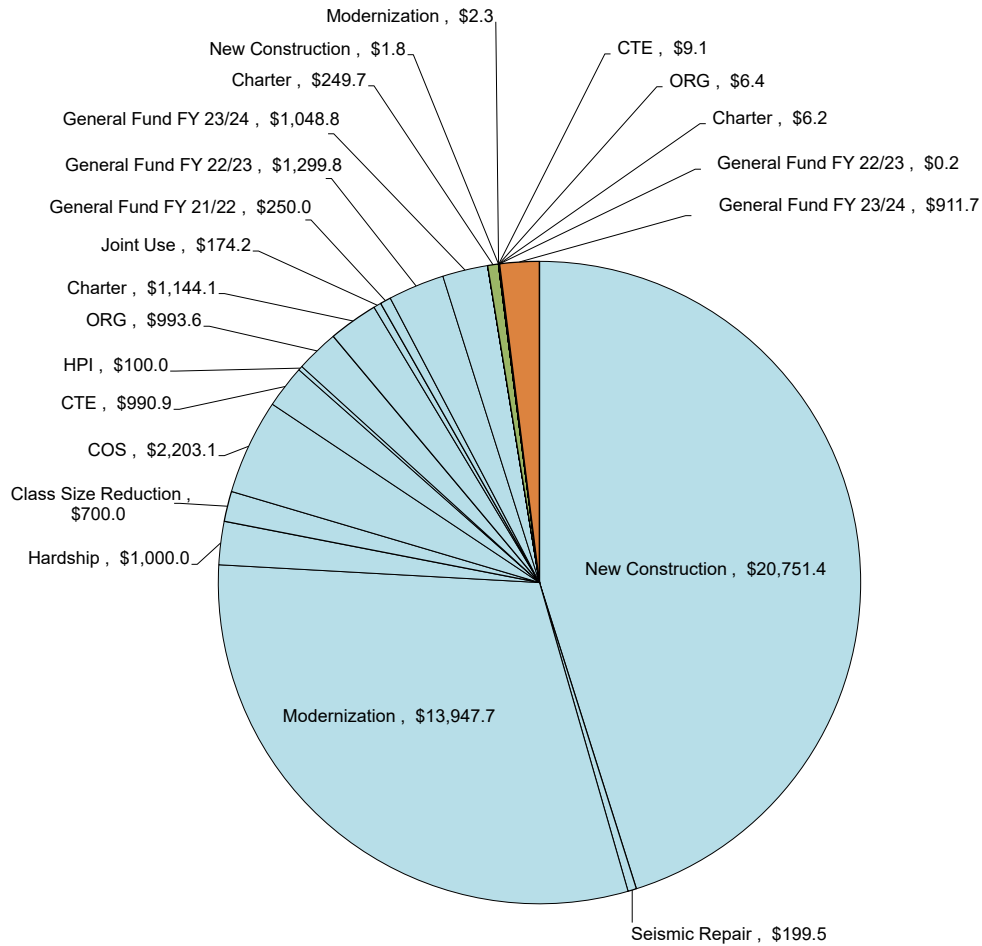

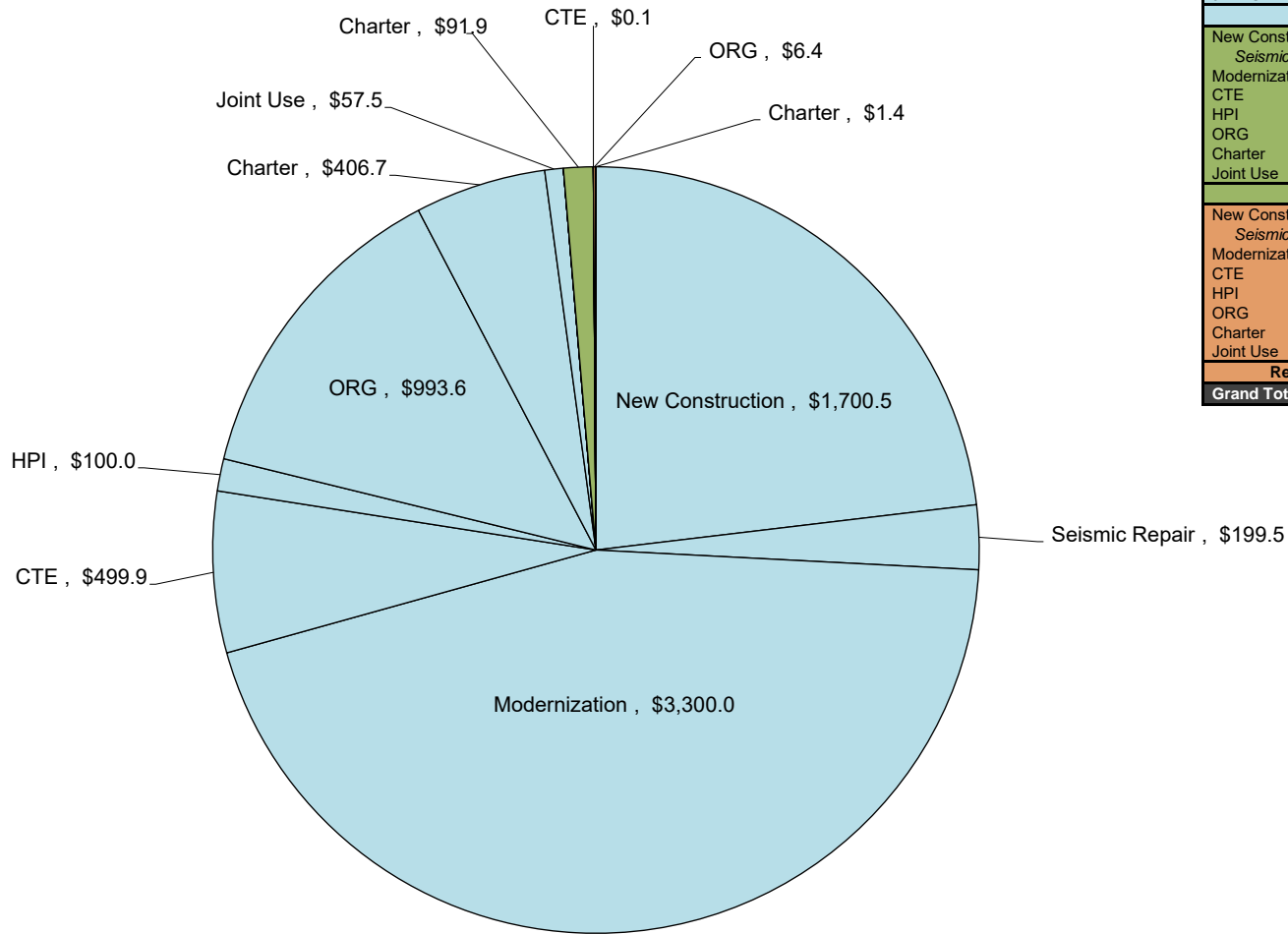
Proposition 51 Bond Authority - \$7.250 billion

Proposition 1D Bond Authority - \$7.358 billion (in millions of dollars)

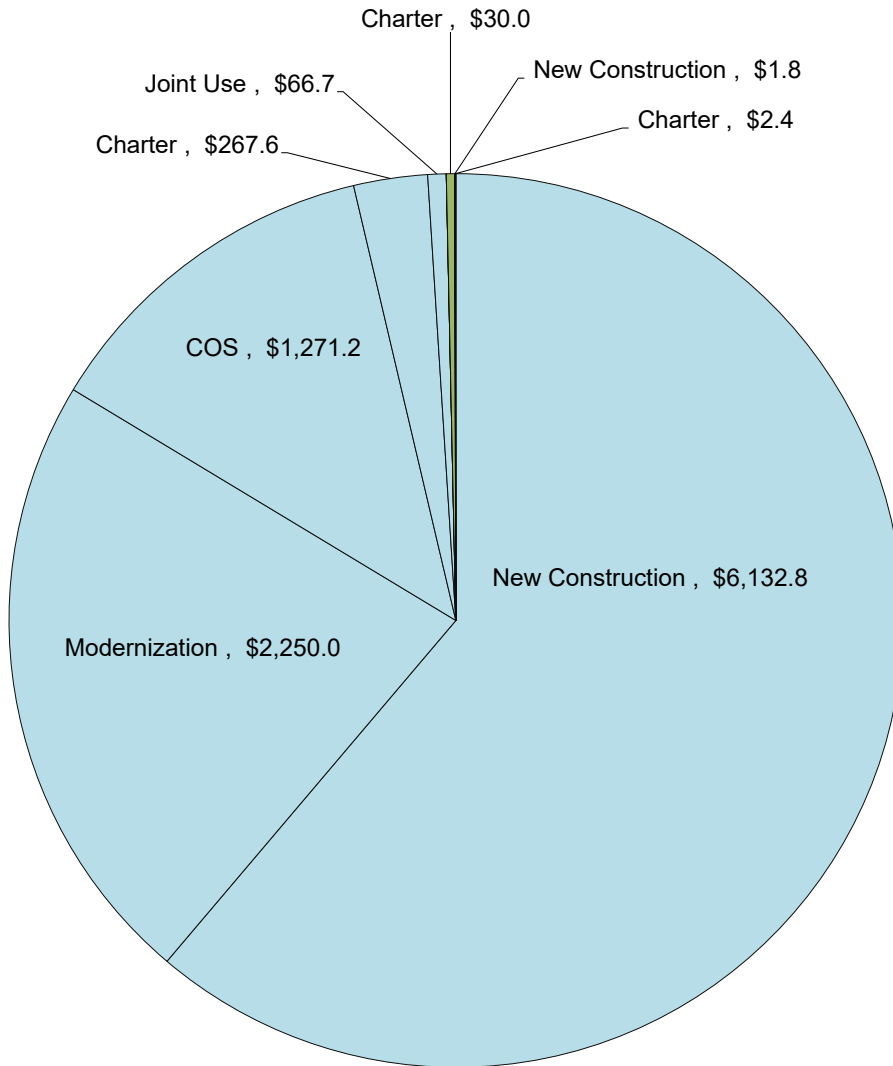

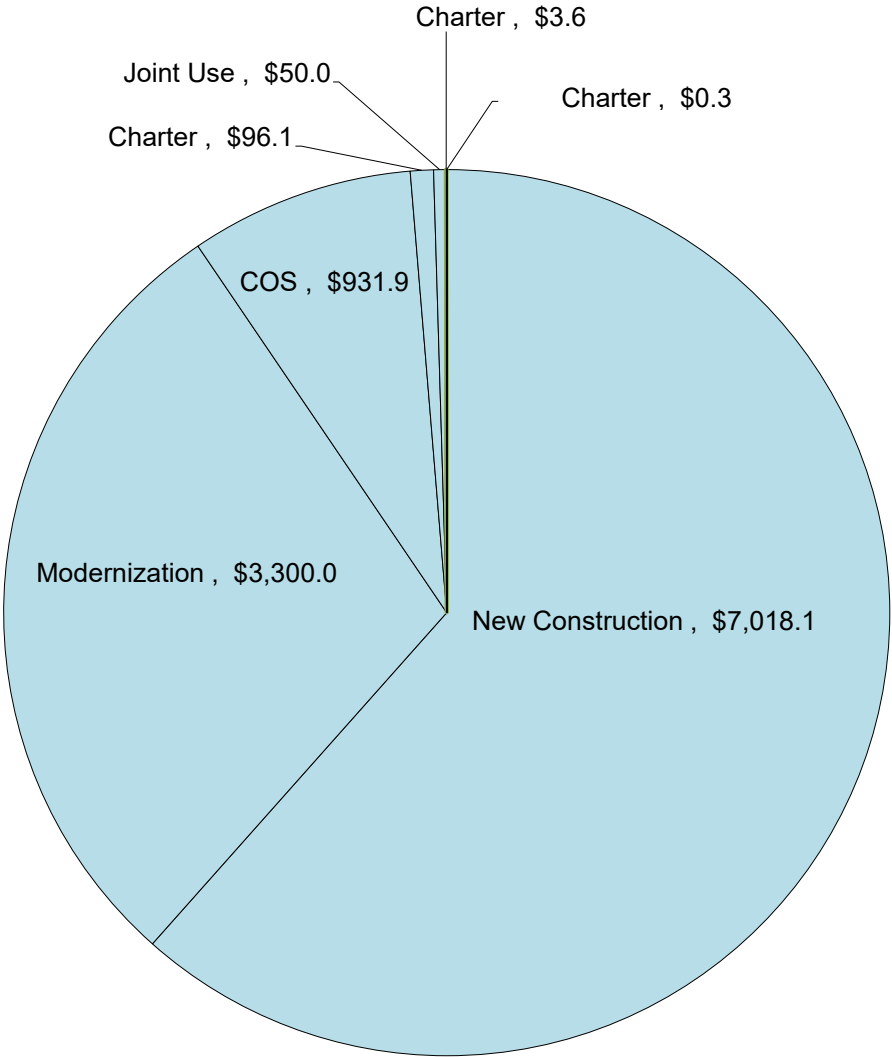

Bond Authority - \$11.400 billion

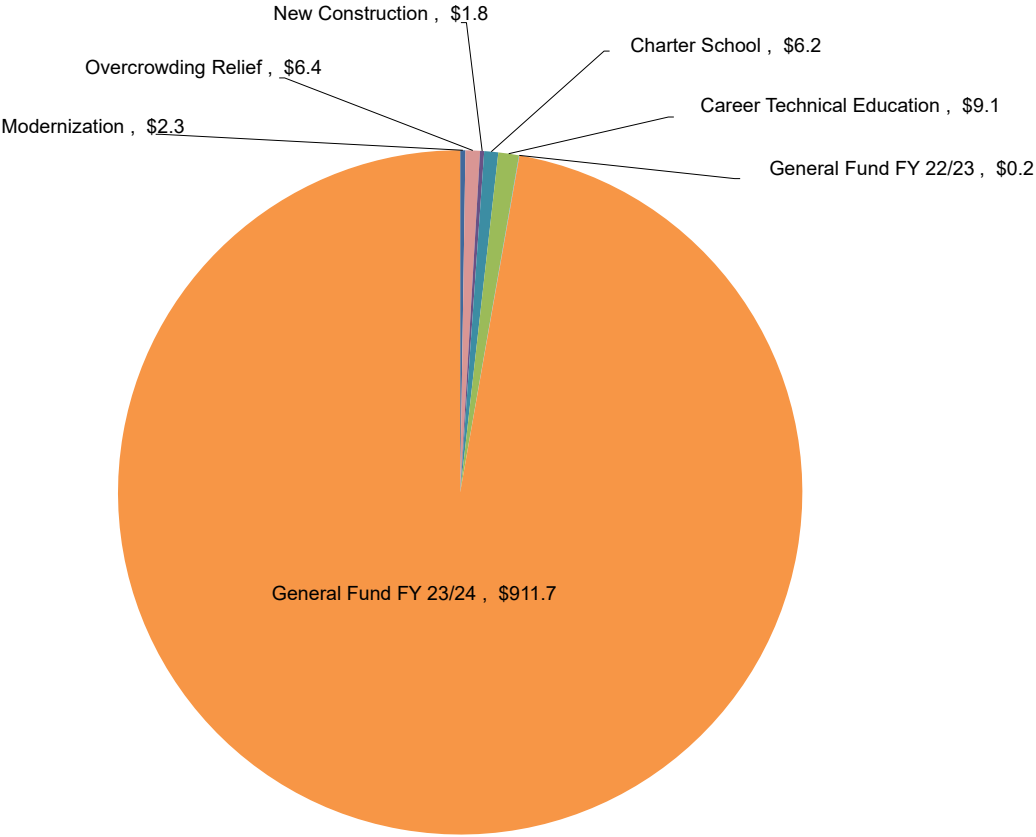

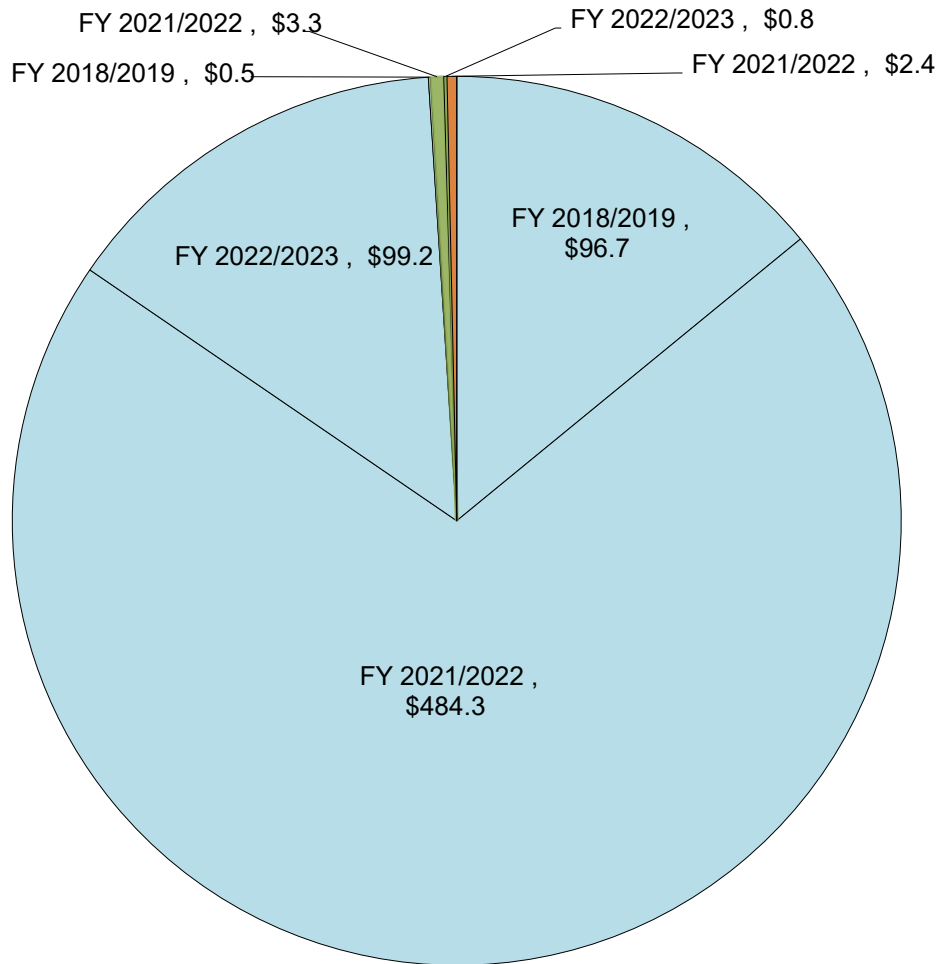

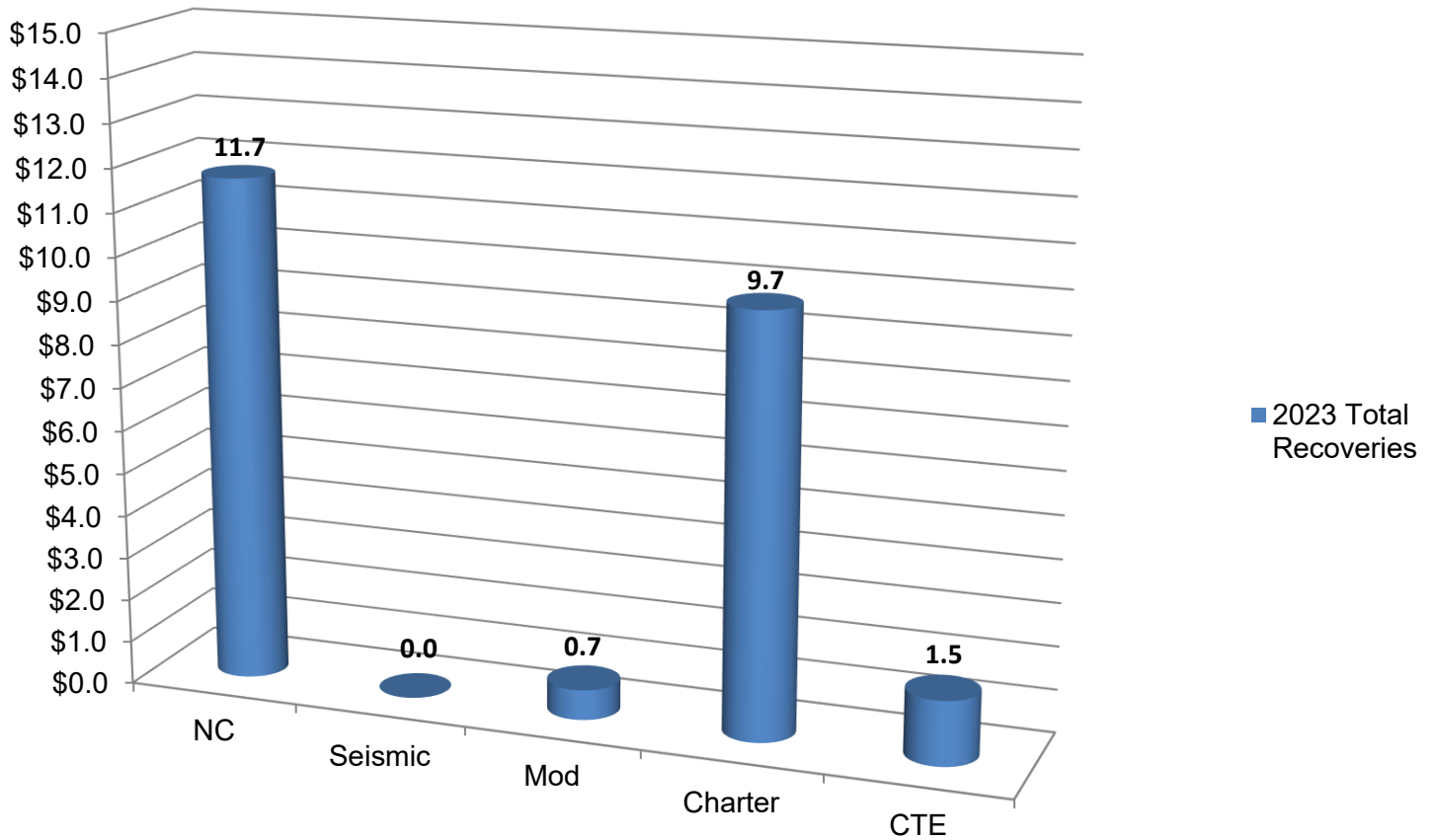

2023 Total Recoveries



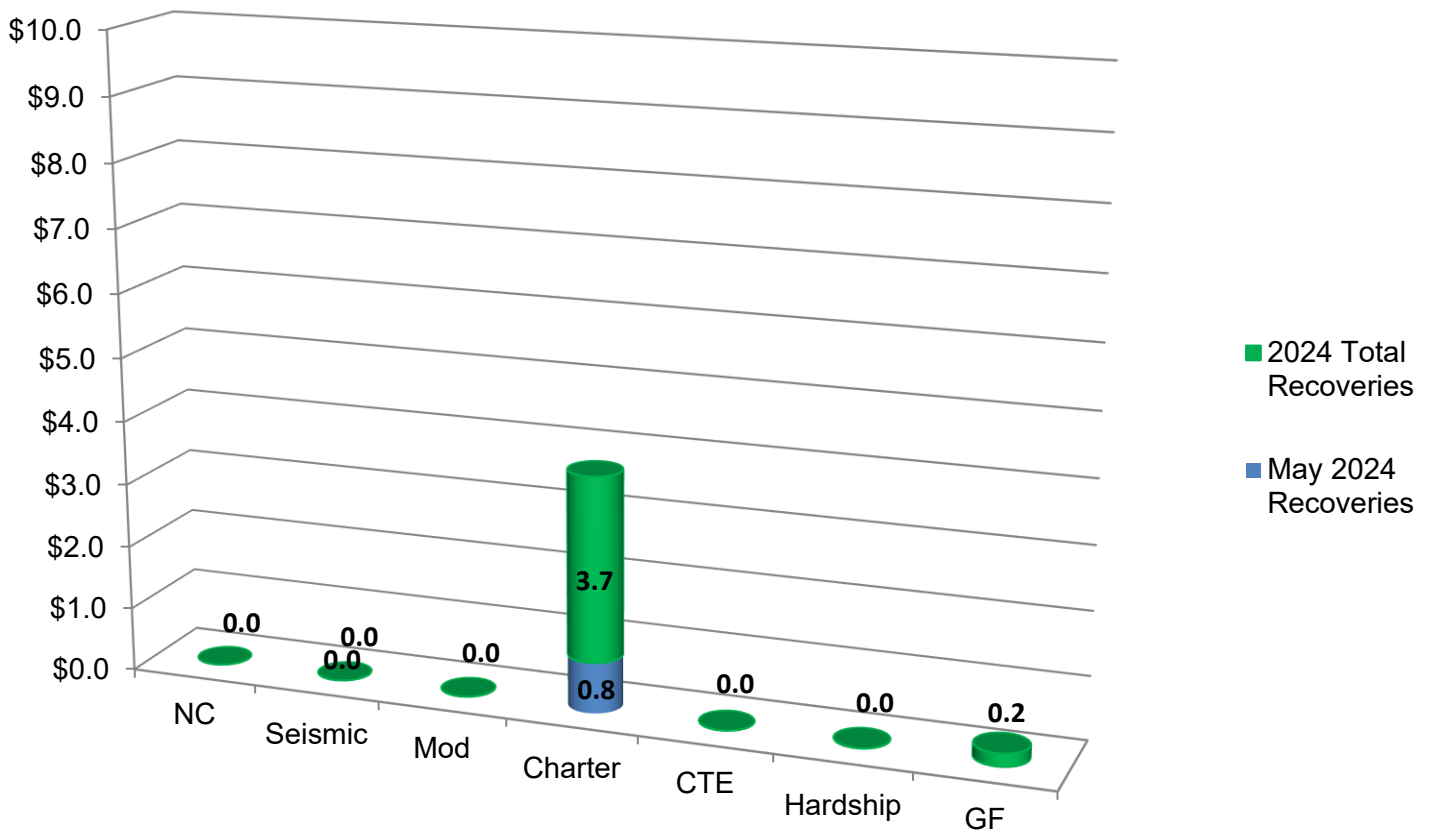

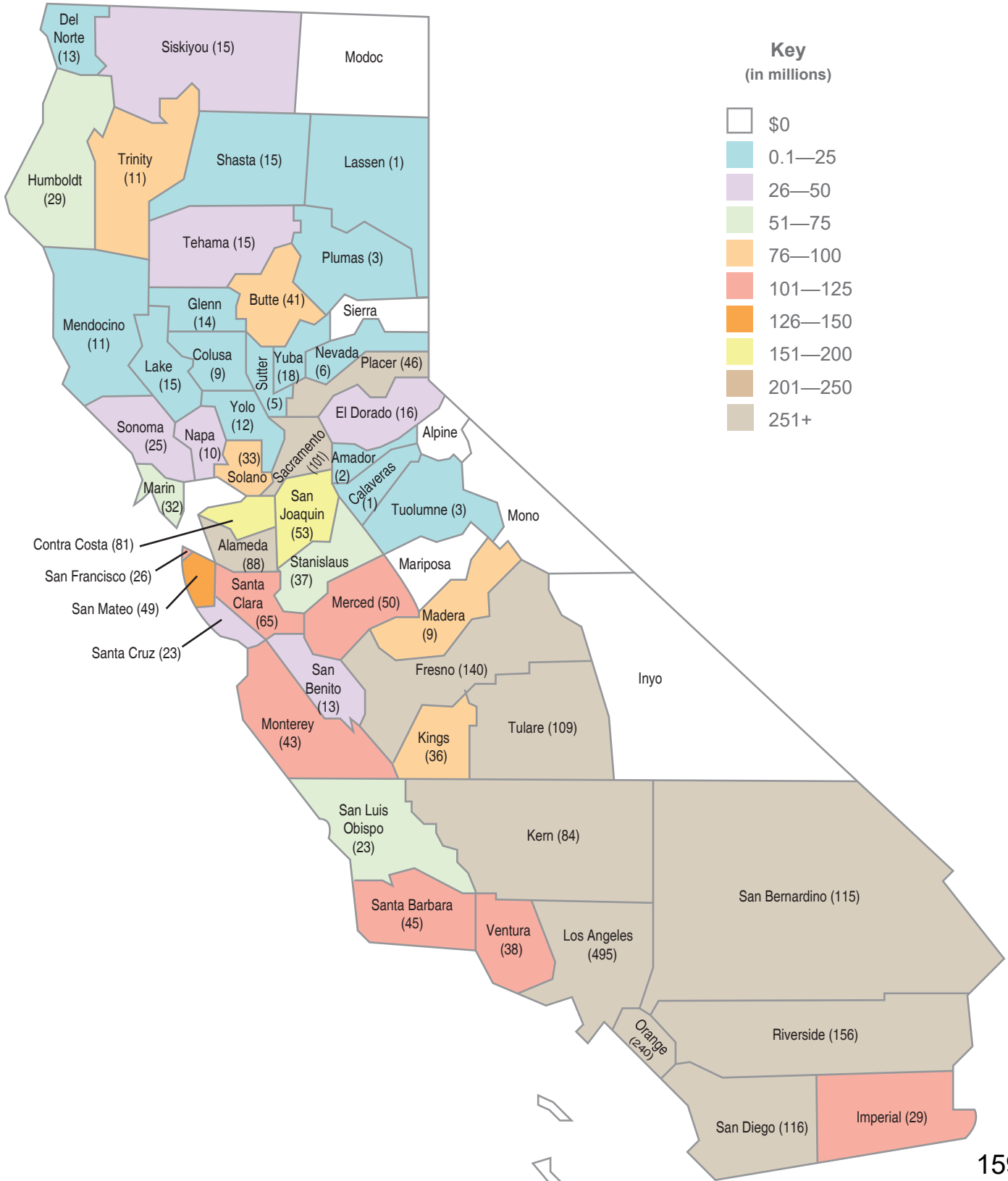

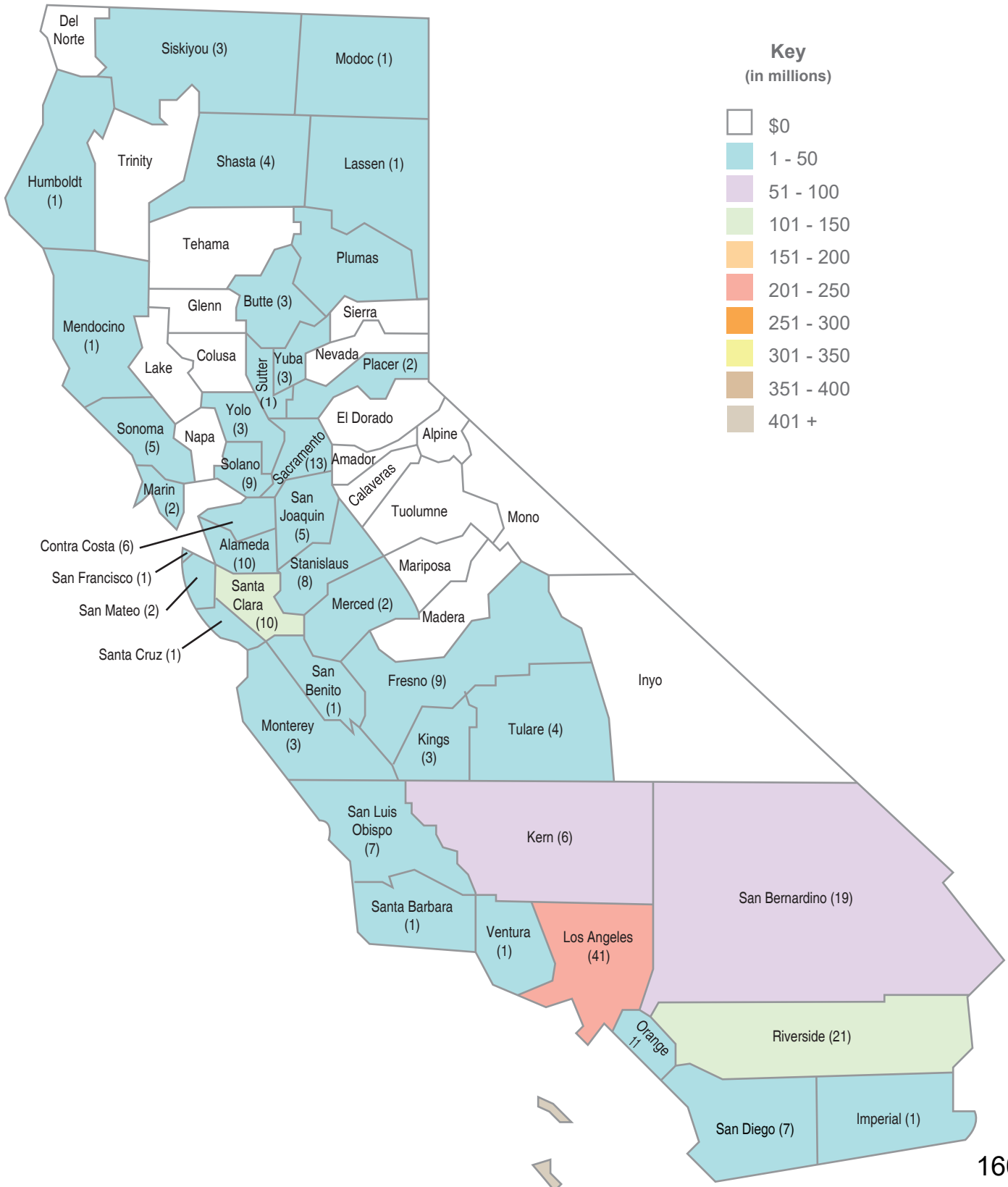
School Facility Program Proposition 51 Apportionments by County

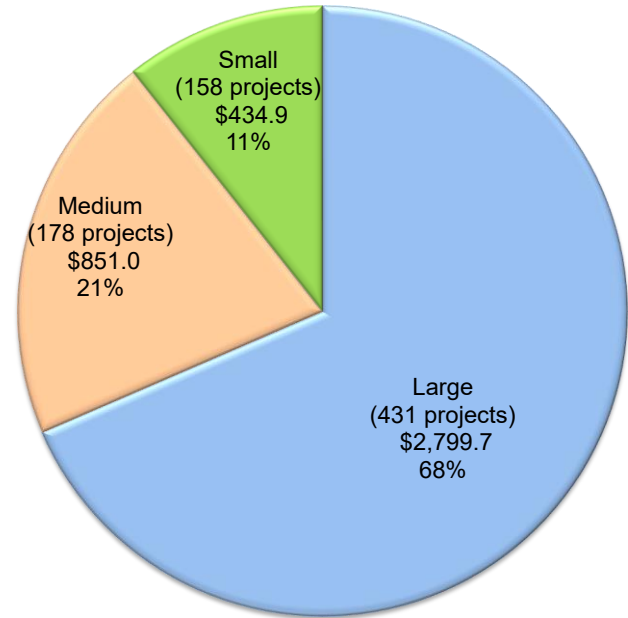

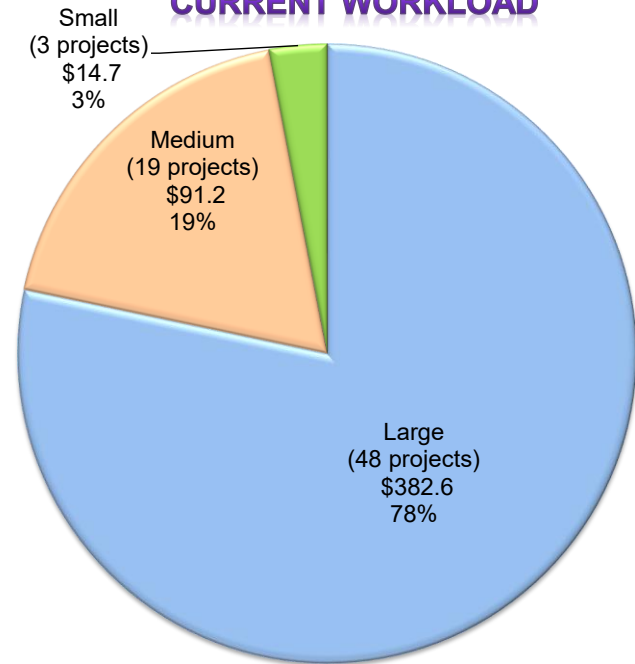

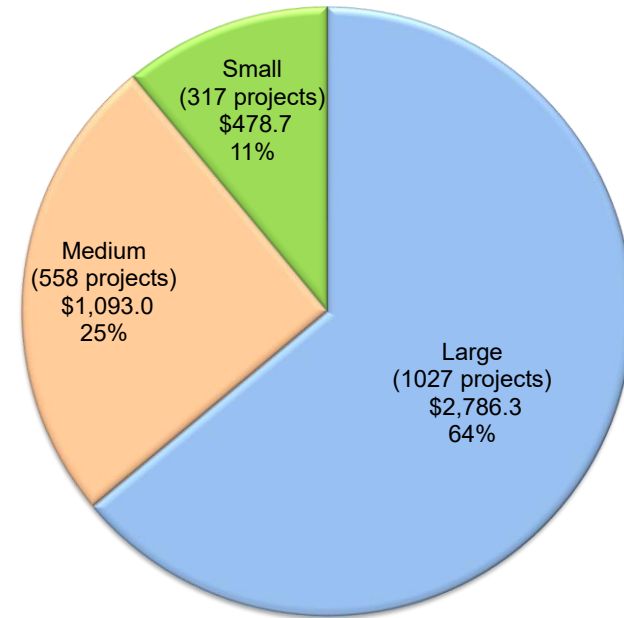

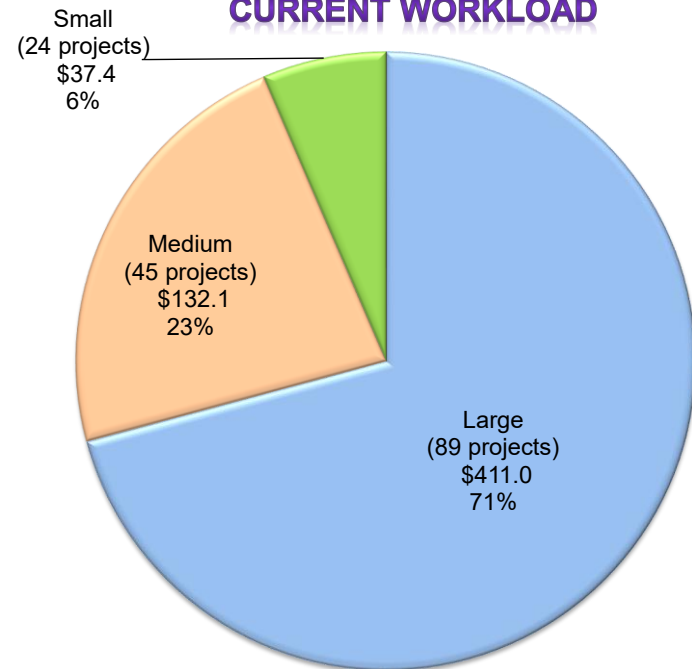

PURPOSE OF REPORT

To present the District's request that the State Allocation Board (Board) reinstate funding and approve an additional extension to the substantial progress deadlines for a School Facility Program (SFP) New Construction project.

DESCRIPTION

On June 2, 2016, the District submitted an *Application for Funding* (Form SAB 50-04) for Advanced Site and Design funding for a New Construction project for the new S'Brana Elementary School. At the August 28, 2019 meeting, the Board provided an unfunded approval and the project was subsequently funded for the Advanced Site and Design at the May 27, 2020 meeting. Funds were released to the District on October 8, 2020.

On March 18, 2022, the District requested the Board approve a time extension to demonstrate substantial progress on the project. The Board approved the District's request at the June 6, 2022 meeting and required the following by December 6, 2023:

1. Obtain the final appraisal of the site.
2. Complete all California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) requirements.
3. Obtain final approval of the site by the California Department of Education (CDE).
4. Obtain final escrow instructions or evidence the district has filed condemnation proceedings and intends to request an order of possession of the site.

The District failed to meet the deadline to complete the required items and staff notified the District on December 20, 2023 that the project would be reduced to costs incurred. On January 19, 2024, the District submitted a *School District Appeal Request* (Form SAB 189) to request that the Board reinstate funding and approve an additional extension to the substantial progress deadlines for the project.

Approval of the District's request would allow the District to retain \$4,304,630 in state funding, of which \$1,440,895 was provided for financial hardship funding.

BACKGROUND

District and Project History

S'Brana Elementary School is a proposed elementary school serving Kindergarten through Sixth Grade. This school is in the Santa Rita Union School District, which has six schools in Monterey County.

BACKGROUND (cont.)

Substantial Progress Requirements

Education Code (EC) section 17076.10(b) requires a school district to make substantial progress on all SFP projects within 18 months of receiving any funding. If the Board finds that the school district has not made substantial progress, the Board is required to rescind the apportionment in an amount equal to the unexpended funds.

The SFP regulations require that Districts which receive a site grant approval must demonstrate substantial progress has been made on the project within 18 months of receiving the fund release. Acceptable evidence of substantial progress shall be considered met when the District has completed all the following:

1. Obtains the final appraisal of the site.
2. Completes all CEQA requirements.
3. Obtains final approval of the site by CDE.
4. Obtains final escrow instructions or evidence the district has filed condemnation proceedings and intends to request an order of possession of the site.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.105(b)(5) allows school districts to provide other evidence satisfactory to the Board detailing the reason(s) and circumstance(s) beyond the control of the district that precludes substantial progress being made. If the Board determines that substantial progress has been made pursuant to EC section 17076.10(b), regulations require the Board to condition its finding of substantial progress upon the district's commitment to complete and submit satisfactory evidence that the district meets the provisions of Section 1859.105(b)(1) through (b)(4) within the period not to exceed 18 months from the date of the Board's determination of substantial progress.

Project History

On June 2, 2016, the District submitted an *Application for Funding* (Form SAB 50-04) for Advanced Site and Design funding for a New Construction project for the new S'Brana Elementary School. At the August 28, 2019 meeting the Board provided an unfunded approval and the project was subsequently funded for Advanced Site and Design at the May 27, 2020 meeting. Funds were released to the District on October 8, 2020.

On March 18, 2022, the District requested the Board approve a time extension to demonstrate substantial progress on the project. The Board approved the District's request at the June 6, 2022 meeting and required the following by December 6, 2023:

1. Obtain the final appraisal of the site.
2. Complete all CEQA requirements.
3. Obtain final approval of the site by CDE.
4. Obtain final escrow instructions or evidence the district has filed condemnation proceedings and intends to request an order of possession of the site.

The District stated the following as reasons to support the March 2022 request for a substantial progress time extension:

The District received site acquisition and design funding at the height of the COVID-19 Pandemic and has experienced significant delays in executing the steps necessary to achieve the required Substantial Progress Milestones.

BACKGROUND (cont.)

The District's resources were, and continue to be, stretched thin, addressing the requirements for mitigating the Pandemic, including accommodating remote learning for the 2020/21 school year, and preparing the District's sites for the possible return to in person instruction in early 2021 (including all of the additional student and staff safety equipment and procedures required to provide as safe a learning environment as possible under the threat of COVID-19).

In addition to the District's internal resources being overwhelmed with the extra responsibilities brought about by the Pandemic, the District has also been delayed by the impacts of COVID-19 on other parties that are requisite in obtaining documents, tests, etc. necessary to meet substantial progress and acquire the site. Working remotely with appraisers, environmental consultants, site owners, and prolonged negotiations with developers to access and purchase the site further delayed the process.

As a result, the District lost a significant portion of the 18 months allotted for obtaining the required State agency approvals.

The overall result is that due to the time lost to pandemic related delays and impediments the District has been unable to accomplish the complex and critical tasks necessary to ensure that this new campus meets all safety and design requirements.

The District failed to meet the deadline to complete the required items and staff notified the District on December 20, 2023 that the project would be reduced to costs incurred.

On January 19, 2024, the District submitted a *School District Appeal Request* (Form SAB 189) to request that the Board reinstate funding and approve an additional extension to the substantial progress deadlines for the project.

BACKGROUND (cont.)

Status of the Project

On April 24, 2024, the District's school board approved a Purchase and Sale Agreement to acquire the property after deciding the need for the property was too great to expect the seller to suffer any further delay and the risk of losing the property. The school board's approval included OPSC staff's recommended language to indicate the school district is temporarily borrowing from their General Fund for the site purchase as bridge financing, pending the State Allocation Board's approval of the appeal to retain project funding.

To date, the District has expended \$1,577,835.85 on the project.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS

District Position

In its appeal request, the District states the following:

The District requests that SAB reinstate the design and site acquisition funding for the Project, and to allow the District 12 additional months to complete the conditions of the Extension. The District should be allowed additional time to complete the Extension conditions because its failure to do so arose out of extraordinary circumstances over which the District had no control.... Reducing the design and site acquisition funding to costs incurred at this juncture would cause profound challenges for the District, creating even more financial hardship for the District when the District is within 12 months of satisfying the requisite conditions.

The full text of the District's explanation for the project delays, the project status, and their request is included as Attachment A. The District provided 200 pages of exhibits to support their statements in the appeal; due to the quantity of pages, staff has not attached them to this item, but they are available upon request.

Staff Position

Substantial Progress Requirements

The SFP requires school districts to demonstrate substantial progress towards completion of the project. For projects that already have plans approved by CDE and DSA, this is demonstrated by completing a portion of construction activities on the site. For financial hardship school districts that receive advance site and design funding to acquire a site and commence design of the project, substantial progress is demonstrated under different milestones.

EC section 17076.10(b) states that "if the board finds that a participating school district has not made substantial progress towards increasing its pupil capacity or modernizing its facilities within 18 months of receiving any funding pursuant to this chapter, the board shall rescind the apportionment in an amount equal to the unexpended funds."

To make the finding of substantial progress for projects receiving advance site and design funding, the Board established SFP Regulation Section 1859.105(b) that outlines the Board's criteria for making the finding. Acceptable evidence of substantial progress shall be considered met when the District has completed all the following:

1. Obtained the final appraisal of the site.
2. Completed all CEQA requirements.
3. Obtained final approval of the site by CDE.
4. Obtained final escrow instructions or evidence the district has filed condemnation proceedings and intends to request an order of possession of the site.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS (cont.)

Exceptions to the Substantial Progress Deadline

The regulations only provide one exception to the above requirements. School districts may provide other evidence satisfactory to the Board detailing the reason(s) and circumstance(s) beyond the control of the district that precludes substantial progress being made pursuant to EC section 17076.10(b). If the Board determines that substantial progress has been made pursuant to EC section 17076.10(b), the Board shall condition its finding of substantial progress upon a district's commitment to complete and submit satisfactory evidence that the district meets the provisions of Section 1859.105(b)(1) through (b)(4) within a period not to exceed 18 months from the date of the Board's determination of substantial progress. In providing the extension request, the Board has not made a finding under EC Section 17076.10(b) that the school district has not made substantial progress and is not required to rescind the project.

Considerations

Additional Substantial Progress Time Extensions

SFP Regulations do not address extraordinary circumstances, such as in the case of this District, and do not provide a mechanism to provide an additional time extension to the Board's conditional substantial progress findings. In its appeal request, the District has outlined its progress and plans to meet the original time extension requirements set by the Board. These are summarized below.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS (cont.)

Status of Funds and Adjusted Grant Application for Funding

Following the June 26, 2024 Board meeting, the SFP has approximately \$916 million in funding remaining for New Construction and Modernization projects. Through May 31, 2024, the SFP is has received \$3.5 billion in New Construction and Modernization funding requests beyond the available program authority. As of the May 2024 meeting, it is unknown if future funding will be available for the program.

If the Board approves the District's appeal, the District will reimburse their General Fund and continue with design of the project in order to obtain CDE and DSA plan approvals. In discussion of the appeal with the District, staff expressed concern that the program is currently oversubscribed and because the District is a financial hardship district, state funds would be used to purchase a site and design a school project, without any guarantee the project would progress beyond that point.

To address staff's concerns, the District provide the updated appeal request as shown on Attachment A. The District has stated the following and additionally outlined their considerations in the viability of these potential funding sources:

The District recognizes that completion of the Project is predicated on the District's ability to fund the Project. As of the date of this letter [May 8, 2024], the total cost of construction is \$33.6 million, which the District intends to fund using a mixture of funding sources including Developer Fees, establishment of a Mello-Roos Community Facilities District, Certificates of Participation (COPs), and, if available, New Construction state matching funds.

New Construction Eligibility

The ability for the District to obtain future state funding for the project is not only dependent on the availability of future SFP funding.

Upon passage of Proposition 51, the Board endeavored to ensure that new bond funds were provided only for New Construction projects with current unhoused pupil needs at the time the applications were processed. At the June 5, 2017 meeting, the Board took action to move all projects from the Applications Received Beyond Bond Authority (ARBBA) list to OPSC's active workload list while also requiring districts to update New Construction eligibility for the enrollment year in which the application is processed by OPSC in order to demonstrate a current need for additional classrooms.

In accordance with the Board's action, districts are required to submit an *Enrollment Certification/Projection* (Form SAB 50-01) to update their eligibility within 90 days of receiving notification from OPSC that an application will be processed.

To determine New Construction eligibility, a district must demonstrate that existing seating capacity within the district is insufficient to house the anticipated future enrollment generated by the enrollment projection on the Form SAB 50-01 using the Cohort Survival Enrollment Projection (Cohort) method. Through this requirement, districts are afforded an opportunity to demonstrate continued district-wide unhoused pupil need for additional classroom capacity, and the requirement also ensures continued district compliance with the intent and spirit of the statute and supporting regulations.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS (cont.)

The Cohort is the mathematical means used to determine a district’s enrollment projection. It estimates what a district’s enrollment will be in five or 10 years by observing the trend of enrollment (increasing or decreasing) between grade levels, projecting that the same trend will continue for five or 10 years, and allows districts to plan future construction activities accordingly. If a district is experiencing a declining enrollment trend, any enrollment projections submitted during the period of decline would likely result in a downward projection of the district’s future eligibility. Conversely, if district-wide enrollment is trending upwards, it is likely that a district’s eligibility would also increase to account for the projected number of additional pupils.

New Construction eligibility is determined by calculating the average rate of change for each grade level, based on weighting mechanisms. In the standard calculation, the most recent year is weighted the heaviest. Therefore, the prior year’s kindergarten enrollment has the largest impact on the enrollment projection and, depending how much it has increased or decreased from the prior year, could determine if the if the district’s enrollment projection results in a positive or negative outcome. The following is a summary of the District’s enrollment over the last seven years.

At the time the Design application was processed in 2019, the District demonstrated a need for 325 K-6 pupil grants. Per program regulations, when the District submits the adjusted grant application, they will need to be able to rejustify at least 163 K-6 pupil grants (50 percent of the original request) to qualify for an eligible New Construction project.

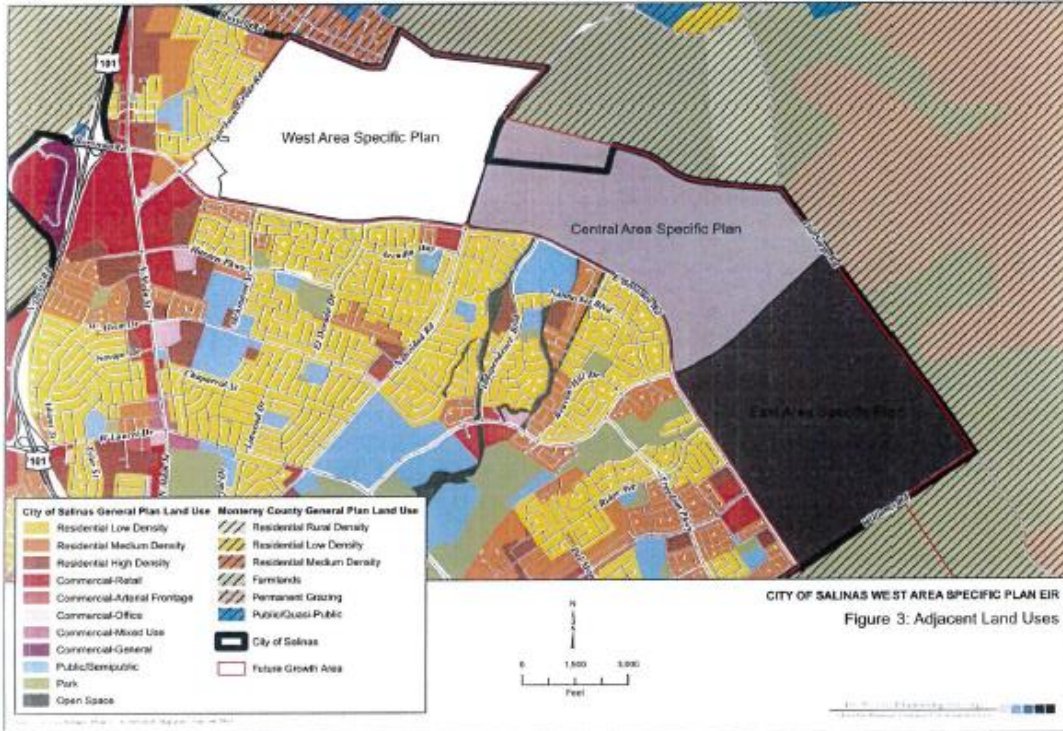
As part of the appeal, staff look at today’s enrollment projections as of the 2023/2024 enrollment year. Based on the enrollment projection, the District would have 241 K-6 pupil grants. This would result in less funding than the District may have anticipated; however, if the full grant application were processed today, they would be eligible for funding.

Staff also reviewed two hypothetical scenarios as well. In the first scenario, the District assumes 343 new dwelling units with a District Student Yield Factor of 0.5. If the District had approved tract maps to support those units, the District would have 310 K-6 pupil grants. Under the second scenario, the District proposed 2,211 dwelling units with a District Student Yield Factor of 0.5. If the District had approved tract maps to support those units, the District would have 887 K-6 pupil grants.

As shown above, the inclusion of potential dwelling units is a large factor in the amount of potential state funding for the District. The District intends to submit a request to update eligibility in October 2024 to include allowable dwelling units. Staff’s research of the location of the school site, and the City of Salinas’ planned West Area Specific Plan, appear to reflect significant future growth in the District and appear to support the District’s need for New Construction funding.

Conclusion

In discussion with the District, purchasing the site now, prior to the infill of development, is logical. For this project, the District appears to have experienced considerable delays and provided a demonstrable need to retain the project funding; however, with the uncertainty of the project being able to move forward without state and/or local funding guaranteed, approval of the appeal may only result in the purchase of the school site and the creation of construction plans.

If the District is unable to use the site within five years of acquisition, the District would be subject to annual unused site fees in the amount of one percent of the value of the site until it is used for school purposes.

Staff is unable to administratively approve the District's request. Additionally, under the SFP regulations, there is not a mechanism for the Board to provide a second time extension request, to extend the Board's original conditional finding of substantial progress. It is unlikely the Board considered the extended length of time in this District's unique circumstances when the SFP regulations were adopted, so the Board could find this District's issues to be a unique circumstance.

BOARD OPTION

Pursuant to the Rules and Procedures of the State Allocation Board, "Staff is providing the following option for the Board's consideration. A positive vote by six members is required for the Board to take action that is an alternative to Staff's administrative action. Absent a positive vote by six members of the Board, Staff's administrative action will stand, and the school district's appeal will be considered closed."

Option: Approve the District's appeal request.

BOARD ACTION

In considering this Item, the Board approved the District's request to reinstate funding and approved an additional extension to the substantial progress deadlines for an SFP New Construction project.

The Santa Rita Union School District (“District”) submits this letter in support of the District’s appeal to the State Allocation Board (“SAB”) in connection with application number 50/66191-00-009 regarding factual and legal issues relevant to its appeal.

The District appeals the Office of Public School Construction’s (“OPSC”) decision set forth in its letter dated December 20, 2023 (“Letter”), to reduce the District’s financial hardship design and site acquisition funding for the S’brana Elementary School Project under Application No. 50/66191-00-009 (the “Project”) to costs incurred. Following OPSC’s decision, OPSC requested that the District submit a Final Expenditure Report (SAB Form 50-06) within thirty (30) calendar days. Enclosed with this letter is the District’s Form 50-06 which it submits under protest but not as acceptance of, or agreement with, OPSC’s decision. The District requests OPSC to hold its review of the Form 50-06 until this appeal is evaluated and a final decision is reached.

At issue in this appeal is the funding for design and acquisition of a new elementary school site, currently referred to as S’brana Elementary School, an approximate 10-acre parcel located within the City of Salinas, California (“Site”). The District requests that SAB reinstate the design and site acquisition funding for the Project, and to allow the District 12 additional months to complete the conditions of the Extension. The District should be allowed additional time to complete the Extension conditions because its failure to do so arose out of extraordinary circumstances over which the District had no control, as more thoroughly set forth below. Reducing the design and site acquisition funding to costs incurred at this juncture would cause profound challenges for the District, creating even more financial hardship for the District when the District is within 12 months of satisfying the requisite conditions.

Throughout its planning process related to the West Area Specific Plan (“WASP”) and, specifically, the Project, the District’s main concern has always been ensuring the children of the District’s community have safe and adequate neighborhood schools in which to grow and pursue their education. And it was this concern that compelled the District

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to take on and defend the interests of the community, over the last five years, plodding through a litigation process in an attempt to engage the City of Salinas (“City”) in a thoughtful and legally sufficient planning and environmental review process that would support much needed new school facilities, including the Project. It is why the District has continued to tirelessly attempt to engage the WASP developers in helping problem-solve for school facilities. Now, as the WASP development is primed to move forward, the District respectfully requests SAB reinstate the design and site acquisition funding for the Project, and grant the District additional time to complete the tasks at hand to satisfy SAB’s funding conditions.

The WASP has been approved. The City of Salinas represents that the WASP is underway; the County of Monterey represents that the WASP is underway; and the developer represents that the WASP is underway. The City is currently processing a preliminary review application for a tentative map covering 343 residential lots located within the WASP.

In consideration of the timetable inherent in school facility development, the arrival of new students is imminent. Moreover, since the District initiated this appeal in January 2024, the District faced increasing pressure from the seller to execute the Purchase and Sale Agreement and acquire the Site. The District could not risk the seller backing out of the deal and selling the Site out from under the District. With no reasonable alternative school sites available, the District would not have been able to timely accommodate the housing needs for new students flowing from the WASP.

Therefore, with all these pressures bearing down upon it, on April 24, 2024, the District’s Governing Board (“Board”) approved the Purchase and Sale Agreement. Simultaneously, the Board found the District’s acquisition of the Site was exempt from CEQA, while committing to a full environmental review for the construction of the Project, which review is currently underway. Since the site acquisition funds previously released to the District were under contention at close of escrow, the District was forced to borrow \$2,250,000 from its General Fund reserve to cover the purchase price of the Site, employing SAB’s Bridge Financing/Interfund Borrowing Policy. Consistent with the Bridge Financing/Interfund Borrowing Policy, if the SAB approves the District’s appeal, the District will reimburse its General Fund reserves with the site acquisition funds.

The District has not gone to such extraordinary methods to acquire the Site simply to bank it for a potential future need. Indeed, the District acted to meet the future needs of the 677 unhoused K-6 students expected to enroll with the District within the next five years by acquiring the Site, proceeding with the design of the Site, and planning for financing the construction of the Project.

The District submitted plans for the Project to both the California Department of Education (“CDE”) and Division of the State Architect (“DSA”) for review. Once plans are approved, the District has the means to develop the Site and construct the school, but the District’s current construction plan relies upon the design and site acquisition funding already approved by the SAB, and New Construction Funding from the State, if available.

The grave need for this Project necessitates that the District be in a position to implement a combination of long-term and interim *alternative* and *supplemental* funding sources to complete the Project, in the event State funding is not available. Specifically, the District has developed contingency plans employing debt financing vehicles, including Mello-Roos Community Facilities District special tax bonds and Certificates of Participation, the debt service on which would deplete the District’s expected Developer Fee receipts. To be clear, if the District is forced to rely on such other funding sources to complete the Project, its financial position will not change in the long term, except for the worse. Indeed, the District will merely be shifting its financial hardship to a point down the path, creating impediments to funding subsequent projects needed to address the impacts of the sizeable increase in students expected to enroll with the District as a result of WASP.

BACKGROUND

A. APPLICATION FOR FUNDING AND NATURE OF APPEAL.

The District applied to OPSC for funding for a site acquisition and design grant for the Project, and a supplemental request for financial hardship under Application No. 50/66191-00-009 (“Site Acquisition and Design Funding”).

On May 27, 2020, SAB approved the Site Acquisition and Design Funding for the Project.

On April 7, 2022, the District submitted a Substantial Progress Time Extension Request (“Extension”). In the Extension, the District explained its difficulties in meeting the Substantial Progress milestones due to the impacts of the Covid 19 Pandemic on District resources and difficulties working with the developers to access and purchase the Site.

On June 6, 2022, the SAB approved the Extension, subject to the conditions set forth in Title 2 of the California Code of Regulations, section 1859.105 (b)(1) through (b)(4), and required these conditions be met within 18 months of the SAB’s approval – December 6, 2023.

On December 20, 2023, OPSC sent the District notice informing the District of OPSC’s decision to reduce the funding of the Project to costs incurred, for failure to meet the conditions of the June 6, 2022 Extension, and directing the District to submit a Final Expenditure Report within thirty (30) days of the date of the Letter.

B. THE WASP AND THE DISTRICT’S PROJECT.

The Project is located within the WASP in the City of Salinas. During the initial Site Acquisition and Design Funding Application period and Extension, the WASP was the subject of litigation between the City and the District. The timing of the litigation has direct bearing on the District’s ability to meet the conditions of the Extension, as explained below. For context, the District provides factual background on this matter.

On October 15, 2015, the City circulated an Initial Study for the WASP, proposing to develop 4,340 residential units at build-out, generating as many as 1,623 new elementary and middle school students within the District’s boundaries. School facilities in the WASP are to be built “based on the projections of the need for those facilities” in a phased approach.¹ The Specific Plan estimates that full buildout of WASP will take approximately 20-30 years.²

The Initial Study indicated that the WASP would cause a need for three elementary schools and one middle school within the WASP. Currently, there is one elementary school in operation. On January 29, 2016, the District sent a comment letter to the City expressing its concerns that the estimated student generation by WASP would fill three elementary schools and one middle school; that neither the one school currently within the WASP nor the other existing District schools had room to accommodate the WASP. In addition, the District informed the City that the statutory developer fees would be inadequate to defray the costs of impacts on existing infrastructure, let alone construction of additional schools.

Despite the District’s concerns, the City proceeded with its CEQA review, failing – in the District’s view – to adequately address the impacts of WASP on school facilities. On February 22, 2019, the City filed a Notice of

Availability of the Draft EIR (“DEIR”). The DEIR contemplated the construction of two elementary schools. One of the new school sites identified in the DEIR is the proposed S’brana Elementary School site.

Between February 22, 2019, and December 17, 2019, before the City ultimately certified the Final EIR, the District submitted a series of comment letters to the City explaining the City’s flawed analysis and describing the anticipated environmental impacts on schools and the school community. The City failed to address the District’s concerns.

On January 16, 2020, the District filed a Petition for Peremptory Writ of Mandate and Complaint for Declaratory and Injunctive Relief (“Petition”) against the City, which among other things, alleged the City violated CEQA with respect to the FEIR. On June 23, 2021, the Superior Court ruled in favor of the District, finding that the City’s FEIR was insufficient because it failed to discuss the potential off-site environmental impacts on schools from the WASP. Subsequent to the Superior Court’s ruling and, for several months, the District engaged the WASP Developers in good faith, to amicably resolve the matter. Recalcitrant as they were, the Court ultimately issued a Peremptory Writ of Mandate commanding the City to comply with CEQA with respect to the FEIR. The City confirmed its compliance with the Writ, but the Developers appealed the Superior Court’s ruling.

The Sixth Appellate District Court of Appeals directed the parties to brief the appeal in 2022³ and set hearing for June 2023. The Court of Appeal reversed the trial’s court’s decision, and after a failed petition for review to the California Supreme Court, the Superior Court ultimately vacated its prior order granting the Writ on **November 30, 2023**, six days prior to the last day of the Extension.⁴ When the Superior Court vacated its prior order, only then was the City’s environmental review of the WASP final.

C. ACTIONS TAKEN BY THE DISTRICT SINCE THE COMMENCEMENT OF THE EXTENSION PERIOD.

During the Extension period, and to the extent not precluded by circumstances beyond the District’s control such as the WASP litigation, the District worked diligently towards meeting the following four requirements set forth by the SAB: (1) obtaining a final appraisal of the site; (2) completing all California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) requirements; (3) obtaining final site approval by the California Department of Education; and (4) obtaining final escrow instructions. Simultaneously, the District completed its initial design of the Project and submitted its plans to the CDE and DSA for preliminary review.

On March 15, 2022, before the District’s initial Extension request, the District submitted Plan Summary Form 4.07 along with its plans to CDE for preliminary review.

On May 9, 2022, the District completed the Phase I Environmental Site Assessment (“Phase I ESA”), satisfying the requirements of Education Code sections 17201(g) and 17213.1(a)(1) through (4), and California Code of Regulations, title 22, section 69100.⁵

On September 6, 2022, CDE sent the District its Preliminary Plan Review, identifying changes the District must make to its plans to ensure Title 5 compliance.

On March 27, 2023, the District's environmental consultants prepared a Preliminary Endangerment Assessment ("PEA").

On July 3, 2023, the District received a final appraisal for the Site, which was since revised on March 6, 2024.⁶

In August 2023, after a year of negotiating, the District and owner agreed to general terms for the District to purchase the Site. The District submitted a draft Purchase and Sale Agreement to the owner.

On September 6, 2023, the District and DTSC entered into an Environmental Oversight Agreement for DTSC oversight of the preparation of the PEA.⁷

From September 19, 2023, through October 19, 2023, the District's environmental consultants circulated the PEA for public comment.

After the public comment period, on November 11, 2023, the District submitted its PEA to DTSC for Review. DTSC provided comments and feedback to the District on November 27, 2023.

The District reviewed and incorporated DTSC's comments and submitted a revised Preliminary Endangerment Assessment on December 7, 2023. On December 14, 2023, the District received DTSC's findings of "No Further Action."

In December 2023, the District submitted its plans to DSA for approval. Also during that time, the District and Site owner reached an agreement in-principal, encompassing all material terms of the Purchase and Sale Agreement. After receiving OPSC's December 20 letter voiding the District's site acquisition and design funding, uncertainty surrounded the District's ability to fulfill the terms of the Purchase and Sale Agreement given the standard thirty-five-day escrow period. Out of an abundance of caution, the District returned to the Seller to see if they would accept a longer escrow period to give the District time to hear SAB's decision on the District's appeal. Attempts to renegotiate the agreement to accommodate a longer escrow failed as the seller made clear they desired to execute the Purchase and Sale Agreement and open escrow immediately.

On February 22, 2024, the District retained Rincon Consultants, Inc. ("Rincon") to conduct the environmental review of the construction project. Rincon initiated the environmental review process in February 2024 and the process remains ongoing. Rincon anticipates a draft of the Initial Study will be ready for the District's review by the first week of June 2024, and estimates that the entire CEQA process will be complete by September or October 2024. on or around .

On April 24, 2024, after deciding the need for property was too great to expect the seller to suffer any further delay and risk losing the property, the District's Board approved the Purchase and Sale Agreement, and the District acquired the Site.

ARGUMENT

I. IN SPITE OF SIGNIFICANT CHALLENGES BEYOND THE DISTRICT’S CONTROL, THE DISTRICT HAS MADE ALL POSSIBLE PROGRESS DURING THE EXTENSION PERIOD TOWARD MEETING EXTENSION CONDITIONS.

The Leroy F. Greene School Facilities Act of 1998 (Ed. Code, § 17070 et seq., the “School Facility Program” or “SFP”) provides a mechanism for State funding of grants to school districts for critical facilities infrastructure needs. SAB is tasked with administering the SFP and is vested with general rulemaking authority.⁸ Pursuant to SAB’s rulemaking authority and Education Code section 17076.10(b), SAB promulgated regulation section 1859.105, which requires the SAB to conduct a review to ensure school districts are making substantial progress in completing a project. Specifically, subdivision (b) provides that acceptable evidence of substantial progress includes:

Other evidence satisfactory to the Board detailing the reason(s) and circumstance(s) beyond the control of the district that precludes substantial progress being made. If the Board determines that substantial progress has been made pursuant to Education Code Section 17076.10(b), the Board shall condition its finding of substantial progress upon the district’s commitment to complete and submit satisfactory evidence that the district meets the provisions of Section 1859.105(b)(1) through (b)(4) within a period not to exceed 18 months from the date of the Board’s determination of substantial progress.⁹

The District does not deny that it failed to meet the conditions of the Extension within the time allotted. The District acknowledges that it could not meet the conditions. As with the grounds for the first extension, extraordinary circumstances beyond the District’s control have pursued and plagued it. The District does not request a waiver of these conditions but seeks a limited extension of twelve (12) months to fulfill the conditions. During and after the Extension period the District made and continues to make substantial progress towards the conditions, notwithstanding significant hurdles and impediments, but requires additional time.

Of the few remaining tasks, each is predicated on another as on a critical path, in that the District is prevented from undertaking one condition before it satisfies another. To illustrate, the District must complete CEQA for the use and construction of the Site before it can obtain final CDE site approval, and the District must obtain final CDE approval to demonstrate substantial progress.¹⁰

In a showing of good faith and diligent work toward completing the conditions, the District outlines below each condition and the District’s related progress.

A. Condition #1: Obtain Final Appraisal.

The first condition of the Extension was to obtain a final appraisal for the Site. On July 3, 2023, the District completed the first condition by receiving a revised and final appraisal.¹¹ However, the District anticipated the July 3, 2023 appraisal would grow stale by the time of this Appeal and directed the appraiser to submit a revised report, which the District received March 6, 2024. You will note that the July 3, 2023, appraisal describes the site and value as

“hypothetical,” and the revised final appraisal also describes the site and value as “hypothetical.” The Appraiser, Brigantino & Davis, explains that appraisal standards require an appraisal identify as “hypothetical” an identified parcel that is open and non-developed, and that has not been subdivided and assigned its own Assessor Parcel Number.

B. Condition #2: Complete All CEQA Requirements.

The second condition of the Extension was to complete all CEQA requirements. The Project involves two components – site acquisition and construction; each component is a “project” under CEQA. On April 24, 2024, the District’s Board adopted Resolution 20.04.06 (the “Resolution”), which in addition to approving the Purchase and Sale Agreement for the Site, found the acquisition of the property exempt under CEQA, while committing to do a full environmental review on the use of the site prior to commencing construction and using it as a school. The following day, on April 25, 2024, the District filed a Notice of Exemption with the Monterey County Clerk’s Office and the Office of Planning and Research.

Until recently, the District’s environmental review of the Project has been delayed by the pendency of the WASP CEQA litigation. In short, because the District’s site-specific Project-level CEQA review must follow WASP Program-level review, the District could not properly complete – or even commence – CEQA review until the Program-level review was complete.

As explained above, the Project is within the WASP, which was subject to Program-level environmental review. In challenging the City’s environmental review of the WASP, the District alleged the City failed to consider, analyze, and mitigate the environmental impacts of the WASP related to schools, including significant off-site impacts. In particular, the outcome of the litigation determined whether the WASP EIR is legally adequate or alternatively, whether the City would be required to make significant substantive changes to the manner in which the environmental impact of the WASP on schools is analyzed.

School district microplanning for school site construction is heavily influenced and dependent upon the macroplanning conducted by local public agencies with land use authority. The District’s own Project-level environmental analysis is reliant on the Program-level WASP EIR.

Specifically, “with the construction of new schools, there would be site-specific environmental review conducted by the responsible school district for impacts not yet known.”¹² Further, “the generally identified potential indirect and off-site impacts related to existing school facilities were impacts that might flow and could be identified only from later decisions by the Districts themselves, which impacts may call for later Project-level environmental review by the Districts, not the City.” (*Id.* at 349.) In other words, the District’s completion of Project-level environmental review was not possible until Program-level environmental review of the specific plan was final.

The adequacy of the Program-level level EIR was precisely the subject of the litigation that delayed its finality and, by extension, reliability. Until the Superior Court vacated its order on November 30, 2023, six days prior to the end of the Extension period, the Program-level EIR was not final, and the District could not rely on it in order to commence its own Project-level environmental review. While the District anticipated the matter would be resolved during the Extension period and worked diligently to both move the litigation matter along and attempt to negotiate a settlement with the Developers, the pace and path of litigation is defined by the direction of the court; the District has no control over court schedules or briefing timelines.

Without a Program-level EIR, the District was precluded from completing its Project-level environmental analysis. Now at long last, with the conclusion of the litigation, the District has retained Rincon to perform all necessary environmental analysis work and commenced with Project-level review.

It has undertaken the following steps in doing so:

- Provided for and reviewed the 2008 Geographical and Hazards Report prepared for the Site by Padre Associates, Inc.
- Completed Phase I Environmental Site Analysis.
- Completed the Preliminary Endangerment Assessment.
- Received a “No Further Action” determination from DTSC.
- Commenced and currently engaged in all necessary environmental analysis work of the use and construction component of the Project.

C. Condition #3: Final Site Approval by CDE.

In order to receive final site approval, the District must demonstrate the Site meets the CDE’s site selection criteria. Education Code section 17211 requires the District’s Board to evaluate the Site using the site selection standards set forth in California Code of Regulations (CCR), Title 5, Section 14010 (the “Standards”). The Standards require the District to make certain environmental findings, which the District was not able to complete before the Extension expired. When the District received the “No Further Action” determination on December 14, 2023, the District completed all site selection requirements requiring DTSC review and approval. By filing the Notice of Exemption for the acquisition of the Site, the District was able to make the remaining environmental findings required by the Standards. Accordingly, on April 24, 2024, the District’s Board found that the Site adhered to the Standards.

Now, all that remains for the District to submit to CDE for final approval is CEQA review of the use and construction of the Project and the District’s adoption of a proposed attendance boundary map. The WASP litigation was not the only impediment to initiating CEQA. Initial Site access issues contributed to the District’s delay. Although the District worked diligently to obtain Site access and complete testing on the Site, the Site’s current use for strawberry farming presented certain challenges during the soils testing process as detailed below. In 2022, after significant and protracted negotiation with the Site owner, the Parties agreed to protocols and procedures for site access as needed for site assessment and testing (“Site Access Agreement”). Thereafter, the District worked with the Site owner and tenant farmer to schedule access to conduct necessary geological and environmental testing due to the current active agricultural use of the property. The Site Access Agreement required the District to request each instance of entry and obtain the Owner’s permission at least 24 hours in advance. Entry was limited to normal business hours and required all District representatives accessing the property to be accompanied by the Tenant’s representative. The Site Access Agreement also prohibited the District from making any changes to the property. Importantly, the District had to accommodate the tenants growing season so as not to disturb the crops, and combat bad weather conditions including severe flooding, which delayed the District’s ability to perform essential testing.

The District's environmental consultants completed the Phase I Environmental Site Assessment ("Phase I ESA"), on May 9, 2022, satisfying the requirements of Education Code sections 17201(g) and 17213.1(a)(1) through (4), and California Code of Regulations, title 22, section 69100.¹³

The Phase I ESA concluded the DTSC would likely require a Preliminary Endangerment Assessment (PEA) due to the "Recognized Environmental Conditions" of the property. Subsequently, on September 6, 2023, the DTSC returned a fully executed Environmental Oversight Agreement for DTSC oversight of the preparation of the PEA.¹⁴

A draft PEA Equivalency Report was prepared and submitted for public review and comment from September 19, 2023, to October 19, 2023. On December 7, 2023, the District submitted the PEA Equivalency to DTSC. The PEA Equivalency Report had been previously submitted on November 11, 2023, and revised based on DTSC's comments provided on November 27, 2023. DTSC then confirmed in a letter to the District on December 14, 2023, of its "No Further Action" determination.¹⁵

On April 16, 2024, the District met with CDE to discuss the status of the District's final site approval submittal package. During that meeting, the District informed CDE of the District's imminent need to acquire the Site. The District also informed CDE that it was in the process of doing a full environmental review of the construction project and requested an expedited review once it submits its final site approval package after completing CEQA, which it expects to complete in 7-8 months.

D. Condition #4: Obtain Final Escrow Instructions.

Throughout the Extension period the District worked diligently to enter into a Purchase and Sale Agreement with the landowner and obtain final escrow instructions.

The District began negotiations with the developer and owner, together, to acquire the Site in 2020. With no success in these negotiations, the District conducted due diligence and identified a point of contact for the Site owner separate from the WASP developers. In 2022, the District began negotiating, in earnest, to acquire the Site from its owner, directly.

In August 2023, the Site owner and District agreed to general terms and the District presented a draft agreement to the Site owner. During the Fall of 2023, the parties exchanged drafts and, as of December 2023, agreed to all material terms. Although all material terms were resolved to the satisfaction of the representatives of the parties, the Site was owned by a trust, the beneficial interests of which were also held in trust. This complicated ownership structure caused delays for the owner and title to determine whom had valid authority to sign the agreement and convey the property.¹⁶ This non substantive issue was not resolved to the parties' satisfaction until after the District received the Letter from OPSC. Only then were the parties in a position to execute the Purchase and Sale Agreement and open escrow.

After the District received the Letter from OPSC, the District attempted to renegotiate an escrow period longer than the thirty-five-day industry standard with the seller that would grant the District additional time to hear the outcome of its appeal. The seller rejected the District's efforts, and instead grew adamant about concluding negotiations and moving forward with the sale of the property.

In late March 2024, the seller made it abundantly clear that after finally identifying and locating the proper signatories for the agreement, it would suffer no further delay to execute the Purchase and Sale Agreement. For that reason, despite the uncertainty of SAB's decision looming in the background, the District proceeded with purchasing the Site. The District's demonstrable *need* to acquire the Site and construct the school outweighed the District's *want* to delay acquiring the Site until SAB made a decision on the District's appeal.

Notwithstanding, by acquiring the Site the District can submit final escrow instructions and satisfy the fourth Extension condition. The District continues to work diligently and only two Extension conditions remain.

II. FUTURE RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENT CREATES AN IMMINENT NEED FOR THE PROJECT.

Development within the WASP progresses. The City of Salinas, County of Monterey, and the WASP developers all represent development is underway. Existing facility capacity cannot accommodate the influx of students generated from WASP. As a result, the need for the Project is not a matter of "if" but "when." The imminent need requires the District to remain proactive in seeing the Project come to fruition. The District is presently engaged in the design phase of the Project and currently working with CDE and DSA for all necessary plan approvals. Furthermore, the District developed various funding scenarios for the construction of the Site, in the hopes that the SAB approves the Appeal, and the District's anticipated construction timeline remains relatively unaffected.

A. Projected Unhoused Students.

Past enrollment rates of the District do not accurately reflect the District's need for the Project. Existing District facilities have 227 seats of excess pupil capacity available for K-6 students. However, the total projected number of unhoused students generated by future development, including WASP, far exceed the District's existing capacity. The City planning department and County of Monterey planning department represented that within the next five years, approximately 1,301 single family detached units, 460 single family attached units, and 450 multi-family units will be built within the District's boundaries.¹⁷

Applying the District's student generation rate to the estimated number of units developed reveals that future development will generate 904 K-6 grade students and 260 grade 7-8 students. This leaves 677 unhoused K-6 grade students and 182 7-8 grade students within the next five years.¹⁸

While development generally can be unpredictable and driven by a series of dynamic factors such as the economy and the housing market, development within WASP is progressing. The City already received a preliminary tentative map application for 343 residential lots. If all the lots are developed as single family attached units, then the preliminary application represents approximately 26 percent of all single family detached units expected to be built within the next five years.

By the time construction of the school site is complete, the District's enrollment will far exceed its existing site capacity. The school site is designed to house 638 pupils, all of which will derive from the WASP development. Throughout construction, the District anticipates utilizing all existing capacity across all of its school sites to absorb students generated by the WASP development, but existing sites can, at best, absorb only 300 new students. Once open, the District estimates the school site will be at capacity within three to four years.

The WASP development causes a real and imminent need for the District to complete the Project now.

B. Site Design and Construction Progress.

The District has actively anticipated the need of the Project by working with its architect to complete the design and plans for the Project. On March 15, 2022, the District submitted its plans to the CDE for preliminary review and received comments from CDE in a Preliminary Plan Review letter dated September 6, 2022. After incorporating CDE's comments, the District submitted the first increment to DSA for approval. The District is addressing CDE's comments and expects to resubmit to CDE for final plan approval in the Spring of 2024. The District also expects to receive DSA approval for the first increment at that time.

Once the District receives approval from DSA for its first increment, it will then submit its second increment, followed by its third increment. The District's architect estimates that the second increment will be submitted on or about May 2024 and the third increment submitted on or about June 2024, with each approval taking four months from the date of submittal.

Once the District receives all approvals, it intends to move forward with the next phase of the construction process. Based on current assumptions, the District anticipates starting construction of the school site in 2026, and estimates that construction will be completed in 24 months.

C. Project Funding Scenarios.

The District recognizes that completion of the Project is predicated on the District's ability to fund the Project. As of the date of this letter, the estimated total cost of construction is \$33.6 million, which the District intends to fund using a mixture of funding sources including Developer Fees, establishment of a Mello-Roos Community Facilities District, Certificates of Participation (COPs), and, if available, New Construction state matching funds.

1. Developer Fees.

Based on the findings and analysis of the School Facilities Needs Analysis ("SFNA"), the District meets the criteria to assess Level II and, if triggered, Level III Developer fees. WASP developers, the City, and the Monterey County planning department have indicated that the average square footage for single-family detached unit, single-family attached units and multi-family units are 2,000 square feet, 1,400 square feet and 1,000 square feet respectively, which produces an estimated total square footage of 3,696,000 square feet. At a Level II fee of \$5.64 per square foot, Developer Fees levied on new development within WASP over the next five years amount to \$20,847,034.00.

2. Mello-Roos Community Facilities District.

The Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982 authorizes certain public agencies to form community facilities districts ("CFDs") and levy special taxes within those districts in order to finance specified facilities or repay bonds that were issued to finance the same. Mello-Roos bonds are secured by a pledge of special taxes imposed on all taxable property within the CFD and are payable from those same special taxes. The District intends to form a CFD to assist with financing the construction of the Site, an election on the formation of which is planned to be placed in front of registered voters in May 2025. If successful, proceeds of the CFD bonds will contribute to the funding of the Project.

3. State Matching Funds.

In addition to the other funding sources above, the District intends to apply for State New Construction Funding. The District is eligible for New Construction Funding now based on its current fifth-year enrollment projections, without factoring in students generated by future development. In October 2024, the District intends to submit a new SAB 50-01 form to OPSC demonstrating its eligibility. By the time the District's application for funding is submitted and processed, the District will be able to further augment its enrollment projections.

Although SAB is no longer approving apportionments for New Construction Funding, the District remains hopeful that a new state bond funding the School Facilities Program ("Program") will pass and approvals will resume. On the other hand, if the Program remains unfunded or if SAB rejects the District's Appeal or subsequent funding application, the District has no option but to employ other non-restricted sources and financing vehicles to support construction of the Project. However, employing such other sources to the extent that will be necessary in the absence of the District's Site Acquisition and Design Funding grant will impede the District's plans to construct the *second* elementary school site within the WASP once S'brana quickly reaches capacity.

4. Certificates of Participation.

Certificates of Participation (COPs) may be used as a method of interim financing or bridge financing in anticipation of receipt of future developer fees or state aid funding. In the event the above funding sources fail to materialize, the District may be required to access general fund and other eligible sources of funds or designate all future Developer Fees collected from WASP for COPs repayment.

III. REDUCING THE PROJECT TO COSTS INCURRED WOULD YIELD OUTSIZED NEGATIVE CONSEQUENCES.

The District's application for financial hardship funding demonstrates the District's financial position and inability to raise its proportionate share of the local match required under the School Facilities Program for new construction. If OPSC reduces the Site Acquisition and Design Funding to costs incurred, the District will have an even greater financial burden, one which the District would make a concerted effort to overcome by the time new students arrive and must be housed, but is dubious of its ability to fill the financial gap if it had to cover all costs associated with the acquisition, design and construction of the Site without contribution from the State. Due to prevailing uncertainty over SAB's funding of new construction grants, reducing the Site Acquisition and Design Funding to costs incurred does more than strip the funding from District's hands, but creates a ripple effect for the future.

First, the instant action at the basis of this appeal already delayed the purchase of the Site in that it called into question the District's ability to meet the terms of the Purchase and Sale Agreement. Second, the District's imminent need for the school site does not allow for further delay in constructing the new elementary school, a delay which might be further exacerbated by the need to identify alternative funding. The District intended to begin construction in 2026 in order to timely account for the increased student enrollment expected from WASP developments. Finally, reducing the project to costs incurred will require the District to resubmit for State funding, ushering the District to the back of the line, with no guarantee if or when funding will be available.

CONCLUSION

With this appeal, the District is not seeking approval for new funding or a finding regarding an authorized expenditure, but rather seeks the ability to continue to use the Site Acquisition and Design Funding for design and acquisition costs that the SAB has already set aside and released to the District. When the District received the Extension, it had every intention to meet the conditions by December 6, 2023, as required by the SAB. However, satisfying the conditions became impossible or impracticable as a result of the WASP litigation, and as a result of the need to rely on and cooperate with parties who are not within the District's control. Reducing the Site Acquisition and Design Funding to costs incurred after the District has made significant progress towards meeting the conditions after receiving the Extension, would yield an inequitable result threatening the District's ability to house its student population and impact the District's existing facilities already at capacity, all while in a speculative environment where State funding may not be available in the future.

ATTACHMENT B

AUTHORITY

Education Code (EC) Section 17070.35

a) In addition to all other powers and duties as are granted to the board by this chapter, other statutes, or the California Constitution, the board shall do all of the following:

(1) Adopt rules and regulations, pursuant to the rulemaking provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act, Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, for the administration of this chapter. However, the board shall have no authority to set the level of the fees of any architect, structural engineer, or other design professional on any project. The initial regulations adopted pursuant to this chapter shall be adopted as emergency regulations, and the circumstances related to the initial adoption are hereby deemed to constitute an emergency for this purpose. The initial regulations adopted pursuant to this chapter shall be adopted by November 4, 1998. If the initial regulations are not adopted by that date, the board shall report to the Legislature by that date, explaining the reasons for the delay.

(2) Establish and publish any procedures and policies in connection with the administration of this chapter as it deems necessary.

(3) Determine the eligibility of school districts to receive apportionments under this chapter.

(4) Apportion funds to eligible school districts under this chapter.

Education Code Section 17076.10

(a) A school district that receives any funds pursuant to this chapter shall submit a summary report of expenditure of state funds and of school district matching funds annually until all state funds and school district matching funds are expended, and shall then submit a final report to the board. The board may require an audit of these reports or other school district records to ensure that all funds received pursuant to this chapter are expended in accordance with program requirements.

(b) If the board finds that a participating school district has not made substantial progress towards increasing its pupil capacity or modernizing its facilities within 18 months of receiving any funding pursuant to this chapter, the board shall rescind the apportionment in an amount equal to the unexpended funds.

(c) (1) If the board, after the review of expenditures or audit has been conducted pursuant to subdivision (a), determines that a school district failed to expend funds in accordance with this chapter, the department shall notify the school district of the amount that must be repaid to the 1998 State School Facilities Fund, the 2002 State School Facilities Fund, the 2004 State School Facilities Fund, the 2006 State School Facilities Fund, or the 2016 State School Facilities Fund, as the case may be, within 60 days. If the school district fails to make the required payment within 60 days, the department shall notify the Controller and the school district in writing, and the Controller shall deduct an amount equal to the amount to be repaid by the school district under this subdivision, from the school district's next principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds to the school district, other than basic aid apportionments required by Section 6 of Article IX of the California Constitution. Any amounts obtained by the Controller shall be deposited into the 1998 State School Facilities Fund, the 2002

State School Facilities Fund, the 2004 State School Facilities Fund, the 2006 State School Facilities Fund, or the 2016 State School Facilities Fund, as appropriate.

(2) Notwithstanding paragraph (1), if the board determines that repayment of the full liability within 60 days after the board action would constitute a severe financial hardship, as defined by the board, for the school district, the board shall approve a plan of equal annual payments over a period of up to 20 years. The plan shall include interest on each year's outstanding balance at the rate earned on the state's Pooled Money Investment Account during that year. The Controller shall withhold amounts, other than basic aid apportionments required by Section 6 of Article IX of the California Constitution, pursuant to the plan.

(d) If a school district receives an apportionment, but has not met the criteria to have funds released pursuant to Section 17072.32 or 17074.15 within a period established by the board, but not to exceed 18 months, the board shall rescind the apportionment and deny the district's application.

School Facility Program (SFP) Regulation Section 1859.105

(a) When the district has received funds for a SFP project, the Board shall conduct a review to assure the district has made substantial progress in the completion of the project pursuant to Education Code Section 17076.10(b). The review shall consist of an analysis of the district's progress report in accordance with Section 1859.104(b).

Sufficient evidence of substantial progress shall be any of the following:

(1) At least 75 percent of all site development work that is necessary prior to building construction activity is complete.

(2) At least 90 percent of the building construction activities are under contract, unless the building construction activities are delayed as a result of necessary site development work.

(3) All construction activities are at least 50 percent complete.

(4) Other evidence satisfactory to the Board of circumstances beyond the control of the district that precludes substantial progress being made.

(b) When the district has received funds pursuant to Section 1859.81.1(a), the Board shall conduct a review to assure the district has made substantial progress in the completion of the project. The audit shall consist of a review and analysis of the district's progress report in accordance with Section 1859.104(b). Acceptable evidence of substantial progress shall be when the district has completed all of the following:

(1) Obtained the final appraisal of the site; and,

(2) Completed all California Environmental Quality Act requirements; and,

(3) Obtained final approval of the site by the CDE; and,

(4) Provided final escrow instructions or evidence the district has filed condemnation proceedings and intends to request an order of possession of the site; or,

(5) Other evidence satisfactory to the Board detailing the reason(s) and circumstance(s) beyond the control of the district that precludes substantial progress being made. If the Board determines that substantial progress has been made pursuant to Education Code Section 17076.10(b), the Board shall condition its finding of substantial progress upon the district's commitment to complete and submit satisfactory evidence that the district meets the provisions of Section 1859.105(b)(1) through (b)(4) within a period not to exceed 18 months from the date of the Board's determination of substantial progress.

(c) When the district has received funds pursuant to Section 1859.81.1(e), the Board shall conduct a review to assure the district has made substantial progress in the

completion of the project. Sufficient evidence of substantial progress shall be any of the following:

- (1) An Approved New Construction or Modernization Adjusted Grant Application; or
- (2) A school district certification that the final building plans for the project have been submitted to and accepted by the DSA for review and approval; or
- (3) An approved separate site funding application pursuant to Section 1859.81.1(a) or an approved environmental hardship funding application pursuant to Section 1859.75.1 or an approved Preliminary Apportionment pursuant to Section 1859.140, that met the criteria of Section 1859.142(b); or
- (4) Other evidence satisfactory to the Board detailing the reason(s) that plans have not been completed and accepted by the DSA. If the Board determines that substantial progress has been made pursuant to Education Code Section 17076.10(b), the Board shall condition its finding of substantial progress upon the district's commitment to complete and submit an Approved New Construction or Modernization Adjusted Grant Application within a period not to exceed 18 months from the date of the Board's determination of substantial progress.

After the Board has received the progress report required in Section 1859.104(b) for items (a), (b), and (c) above, a review and analysis of the report by the OPSC will be made for compliance with this Section within 60 days of the submittal of the report by the district. The OPSC must notify the district within 60 days of the submittal of the report if it intends to recommend to the Board that no substantial progress has been made on the project. If the OPSC does not respond to the district within 60 days of submittal of the report, the OPSC concurs with the district that substantial progress has been made.

Should the OPSC respond within 60 days of submittal of the progress report by the district that no substantial progress has been made or the district fails to submit the progress report within the timelines in Section 1859.104 (b) for items (a), (b), and (c) above or the district has not filed an Approved Application for funds received pursuant to Section 1859.81.1(b), the district must report the final expenditures on the project on the Form SAB 50-06 to the OPSC within 60 days of the OPSC notification. After receipt of the expenditure report, the OPSC will recommend to the Board that a finding be made that no substantial progress on the project has been made and that the apportionment be reduced, after accounting for the district's matching share, by any funds not yet committed by a contract for the project and any interest earned on State funds for the project. The recommendation will be made at the next regularly scheduled Board meeting. If the expenditure report is not received within the 60 day period, the OPSC will recommend that the apportionment be rescinded and any interest earned on State funds be returned to the State.

If the apportionment is reduced or rescinded as a result of a finding by the Board that no substantial progress has been made on the project, the pupils assigned to the project will be added to the district's baseline eligibility. If the apportionment was reduced, the adjustment to the baseline eligibility shall reflect any funding retained by the district based on the New Construction or Modernization Adjusted Grant funding provided for the project. The district may refile a new application for the project subject to district eligibility and priority funding at the time of resubmittal.

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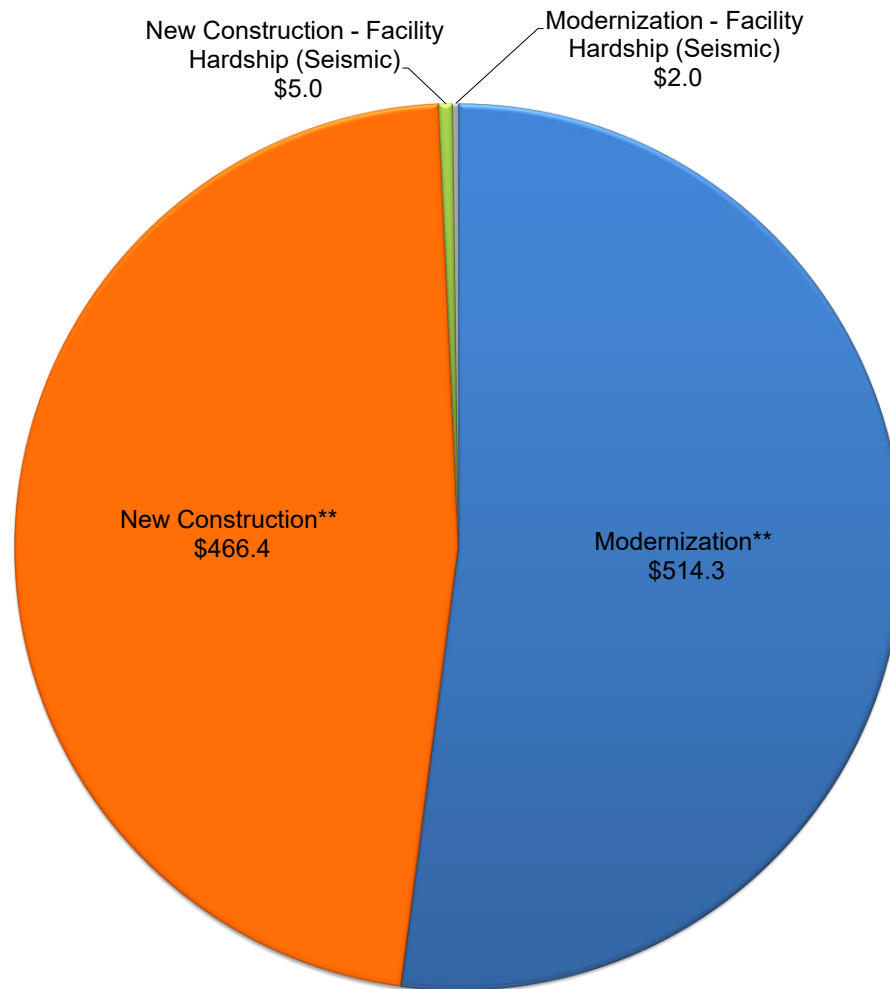

Section 1859.81. Financial Hardship.

Except for Joint-Use Projects and Career Technical Education Facilities Projects, a district is eligible for financial hardship to fund all or a portion of its matching share requirement after demonstrating the requirements of (a), (c), and (d) below:

(a) The district is financially unable to provide all necessary matching funds for an eligible project. To determine this, an analysis shall be made of the district's financial records by the OPSC including data and records maintained by the CDE and the County Office of Education. The analysis shall consist of a review of the district's latest Independent Audit regarding funds available from all capital facility accounts, including, but not limited to, developer fees, funds generated from capital facility certificates of participation, federal grants, redevelopment funds, sale proceeds from surplus property, the appraised value of facilities approved for replacement pursuant to Section 1859.82, bond funds either encumbered, unencumbered or authorized but unsold, and savings from other SFP projects. All funds thus identified that have not been expended or encumbered by a contractual agreement for a specific capital outlay purpose prior to the initial request for financial hardship status shall be deemed available as a matching contribution.

After the initial request for financial hardship status is granted, no further encumbrances will be approved by the OPSC and all prospective revenue made available to the district's capital facility accounts shall be deemed available as matching contribution on the subsequent financial hardship review, with the exception of:

- (1) Approved interim housing expenditures.
- (2) Funding to pay for previously recognized multi-year encumbrances approved at the initial financial hardship approval.
- (3) Funding that is transferred into a Special Reserve Fund and is used for the express purpose of the Federal Renovation Program when the amount expended out of that fund does not exceed the maximum Federal Renovation Grant amount.
- (4) Funding that is transferred into a Special Reserve Fund and is used for the express purpose of the School Facilities Needs Assessment Grant Program or Emergency Repair Program when the amount expended out of that fund does not exceed the maximum grant amount apportioned.
- (5) Funding that is transferred into a Special Reserve Fund and is used for the express purpose of the Career Technical Education Facilities Program when the amount expended out of that fund does not exceed the applicant's share of the maximum grant amount apportioned.
- (6) Funding that is transferred into a Special Reserve Fund and used for the express purpose of the Overcrowding Relief Grant when the amount expended out of that fund does not exceed the amount of the site acquisition and design costs of the project and the district has submitted an approved Form SAB 50-11.
- (7) Funding that is used for the express purpose of reimbursing the State a proportionate share of financial hardship received when there has been a transfer of a special education program and title to the facility. In addition, the funding was used within five years of the title transfer.
- (8) Funding to pay for obtaining a structural report pursuant to Section 1859.82.2 for an approvable and funded seismic mitigation project.
- (9) All other capital facility funding for a period of three years when no subsequent financial hardship request is made during this period, with the exception of the funding identified in (6). The three-year period begins with the date of the most recent financial hardship new construction or modernization adjusted grant funding apportionment.

When Overcrowding Relief Grant funding is set aside pursuant to (6) and the School District has not submitted, or the OPSC has not accepted, a Form SAB 50-04 for an Overcrowding Relief Grant within three years from the date of deposit into the Special Reserve Fund, or the School District has not met the requirements in Sections 1859.90 or 1859.105, remaining funds plus interest accrued at the Pooled Money Investment Board rate at that time period shall be deemed available as matching contribution on a subsequent financial hardship project or be captured through an audit adjustment pursuant to Section 1859.106.

The financial hardship analysis is subject to approval by the Board.

(b) From the funds deemed available as a matching contribution, the district may retain \$19,776 per classroom in each enrollment reporting period for the cost to provide interim housing for the currently unhoused pupils of the district. The amount shown shall be adjusted annually in the manner prescribed in Section 1859.71. The number of classrooms needed for interim housing for the currently unhoused pupils shall be the sum of the positive numbers determined in (b)(7) as follows:

(1) Determine the current enrollment of the district by grade level as shown on the latest Form SAB 50-01.

(2) Determine the New Construction Grants apportioned by grade level for all SFP projects and LPP funded under the provisions of Sections 1859.12 or 1859.13 where the district has submitted Form SAB 50-06 indicating that the project is 100 percent complete.

(3) Subtract (b)(2) from (b)(1).

(4) Determine the number of classrooms by grade level reported in Part 1, Line 8 on Form SAB 50-02.

(5) Multiply the classrooms determined in (b)(4) by 25 for K-6, 27 for 7-12, 13 for Non-Severe and 9 for Severe.

(6) Subtract the product determined in (b)(5) from the difference determined in (b)(3) by grade level.

(7) Divide the difference by grade level determined in (b)(6) by 25 for K-6, 27 for 7-12, 13 for Non-Severe and 9 for Severe and round up to the nearest whole number.

From the funds deemed available as a matching contribution, the district may also retain \$19,776 per portable toilet unit in each reporting period for the cost to provide necessary interim toilet facilities for the currently unhoused pupils of the district. The amount shown shall be adjusted annually in the manner prescribed in Section 1859.71. The number of toilet facilities needed for interim housing shall be the sum of the positive numbers determined in (b)(7) divided by eight rounded up to the nearest whole number.

From the funds deemed available as a matching contribution, the district may also retain \$19,776 per classroom in each reporting period for the cost to provide necessary interim housing for the currently unhoused pupils displaced as a result of a SAB approved seismic mitigation project pursuant to Section 1859.82.2. The amount shown shall be adjusted annually in the manner prescribed in Section 1859.71. The number of classrooms needed for interim housing shall be the quotient of the displaced pupils by 25 for K-6, 27 for 7-12, 13 for Non-Severe and 9 for Severe and round up to the nearest whole number.

If the district's available funds, as determined by the OPSC analysis less costs for interim housing, is less than its matching share, the district will be deemed to have met the requirements of this Subsection.

(c) The district has made all reasonable efforts to fund its matching share of the project by demonstrating it is levying the developer fee justified under law or an alternative revenue source equal to or greater than the developer fee otherwise justified under law at the time of request for hardship and the district meets at least one of the following:

(1) The current outstanding bonded indebtedness of the district issued for the purpose of constructing school facilities in accordance with Education Code Section 17072.35 or 17074.25 as appropriate, at the time of request for financial hardship status, is at least 60 percent of the district's total bonding capacity. Outstanding bonded indebtedness includes that part of general obligation bonds, Mello-Roos Bonds, School Facility Improvement District Bonds and certificates of participation which the district is paying a debt service that was issued for capital outlay school facility purposes.

(2) The district had a successful registered voter bond election for at least the maximum amount allowed under Proposition 39 within the previous two years from the date of request for financial hardship status. The proceeds from the bond election that represent the maximum amount allowed under the provisions of Proposition 39 must be used to fund the district's matching share requirement for SFP project(s).

(3) It is a County Superintendent of Schools.

(4) The district's total bonding capacity at the time of the request for financial hardship status is \$5 million or less.

(5) Other evidence of reasonable effort as approved by the SAB.

If the district's request for financial hardship status is denied by the Board, the district may be deemed eligible for rental payments of \$2,000 per year per classroom under the Emergency School Classroom Law of 1979 for a two year period when relocatable classroom buildings are available and the district provides financial documentation that it is unable to afford the full rental amount and any other information satisfactory to the Board that the rental reduction is necessary. The number of classrooms eligible for the \$2,000 rental payments shall be the sum of the numbers determined in (c)(5)(B) as follows:

(A) Determine the number of pupils by grade level that the district requested a New Construction Grant on the Form SAB 50-04 that were denied financial hardship status.

(B) Divide the number by grade level determined in (c)(5)(A) by 25 for K-6, 27 for 7-12, 13 for Non-Severe and 9 for Severe and round up to the nearest whole number.

(d) The district has not signed a contract for acquisition or construction of classrooms that replace existing facility(ies), which were included in the determination of the district's new construction eligibility pursuant to Education Code Section 17071.75, in a locally funded project during the five-year period immediately preceding the district's application for financial hardship assistance. This restriction may be lifted if the Board finds that unforeseen and extenuating circumstances existed that required the district to use local funds to replace the facility(ies).

(e) If the district meets the financial hardship requirements in this Section, the amount of financial hardship is equal to the district's matching share less funds deemed available in (a).

(1) Once a district has been notified by OPSC that it meets the requirements of financial hardship in this Section, the district may file Form SAB 50-04 under the

provisions of financial hardship anytime within a period of 180 calendar days from the date of the OPSC notification.

(2) If the district does not submit Form SAB 50-04 under the provisions of financial hardship within 180 calendar days of the OPSC notification of approval of financial hardship status, the district must re-qualify for financial hardship status under the provisions of this Section by submittal of a new request for financial hardship status.

(3) If the project(s) has been included on an unfunded list for more than 180 calendar days, a review of the district's funds pursuant to (a) will be made to determine if additional district funds are available to fund the district's matching share of the project(s).

Financial hardship approval status by the OPSC for a separate design and/or site apportionment does not apply to any subsequent funding for the project(s).

(f) If the district submits Form SAB 50-04 within 180 calendar days of the OPSC notification of approval of financial hardship and the project(s) has been included on the "Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans)" for more than 180 calendar days as a result of the State of California's inability to provide interim financing from the Pooled Money Investment Account (AB 55 loans), the Board may suspend the unfunded review requirement as defined in Regulation Section 1859.81(e). Projects added to any other unfunded list shall be subject to the review detailed in Regulation Section 1859.81(e). Regulation Section 1859.81(f) shall become inoperative July 1, 2011.

(g) A project added to an unfunded list on or after July 1, 2011 will be subject to the review detailed in section (e)(3). For projects added to an unfunded list between February 25, 2009 and June 30, 2011, only the district's financial records on or after July 1, 2011 will be considered in calculating any adjustment to the district's matching share.

(h) On or after September 22, 2017, a district may submit a request for funding in advance of obtaining a determination of Financial Hardship.

(1) To be considered for Financial Hardship, the district must check the box on the Form SAB 50-04 requesting Financial Hardship pursuant to this subsection when submitting a request for funding.

(2) Prior to processing an application OPSC will notify the district in writing to submit the necessary documentation for a Financial Hardship analysis pursuant to (a), (b), (c) and (d). OPSC will not accept any documents for a Financial Hardship analysis in advance of the notification. Failure to submit the requested documentation within 60 calendar days of OPSC's notification will result in either a. or b.:

a. District may amend their Form SAB 50-04 to exclude the request for Financial Hardship determination.

b. OPSC will return the request for funding and related materials to the district.

(3) Upon notification of Financial Hardship approval, any Form SAB 50-04 processed within 180 calendar days of the approval date will be included in the approval.

(4) For any Form SAB 50-04 processed more than 180 calendar days after the date of the Financial Hardship approval the district shall re-qualify for Financial Hardship status.
