EXECUTIVE OFFICER’S STATEMENT

The Executive Officer informed the SAB of the following:

Statewide School Facilities Bond Updates

In January, the Governor expressed intent to negotiate with the Legislature to reach agreement on an education facilities bond proposal to be considered in the November 2024 election. There are two bond bills pending in the Legislature. Assembly Bill (AB) 247 was withdrawn from the Senate Appropriations Committee and re-referred to the Committee on Rules.

- AB 247 – Education finance: school facilities: Transitional Kindergarten through Community College Public Education Facilities Bond Act of 2024 (Muratsuchi, Fong, Wilson, et al.)
- Senate Bill 28 – Education finance: school facilities: Public Preschool, K-12, and College Health and Safety Bond Act of 2024 (Glazer)

It was noted that the last day for a legislative measure to qualify for the November 5, 2024 General Election ballot would be June 27, 2024. However, Senate President Pro Tempore Mike McGuire was quoted in a news article indicating the deadline has some flexibility and the Legislature was working with the Secretary of State and Legislative Counsel on bond measures to be added to the November ballot by July 3, 2024. OPSC will continue to monitor and provide further updates.

State Allocation Board Meeting, September 25, 2024

STATEWIDE SCHOOL FACILITIES BOND UPDATES

Proposition 2 - Kindergarten Through Grade 12 Schools and Local Community College Public Education Facilities Modernization, Repair, and Safety Bond Act of 2024

On July 3, Assembly Bill 247 (Chapter 81, Statutes of 2024, Muratsuchi) was enrolled and subsequently signed by the Governor to place a statewide school facilities bond bill on the November 2024 general election ballot. The Secretary of State issued a [press release](#) assigning Proposition 2 to the November ballot measure.

If passed by voters, the Act would, in part:

1. Provide \$10 billion to construct and modernize education facilities, of which \$8.5 billion is set aside for elementary and secondary educational facilities.
2. Grandfather applications submitted on or before October 30, 2024.
3. Require submission of a five-year school facilities master plan as a condition of participating in the School Facility Program (SFP).
4. Establish a points-based determination and sliding scale for the required state and local match for SFP projects.
5. Authorize additional funding under the SFP for the replacement of school buildings that are at least 75 years old.
6. Provide assistance to small school districts and school facilities located on military installations.
7. Provide funding for the testing and remediation of lead in water fountains and faucets on school sites.
8. Establish several new supplemental grants and authorize the State Allocation Board (SAB) to provide interim housing assistance following specified natural disasters.
9. Increase the maximum level of bond capacity allowable for a school district to be eligible for financial hardship funding from \$5 million to \$15 million, and provide an annual inflation adjustment to this amount.

If the Act is passed by voters in the November election, staff will present an item at the December SAB meeting regarding initial implementation.

CALIFORNA PRESCHOOL, TRANSITIONAL KINDERGARTEN, AND FULL-DAY KINDERGARTEN FACILITIES GRANT PROGRAM

At its meeting on September 27, 2023, the SAB adopted proposed regulatory amendments, as well as amendments to three associated forms and the grant agreement master templates. The proposed amendments allow for extended fund release and project completion deadlines to be applied to applications Apportioned in the third funding round that were received from April 1, 2022 through April 30, 2022, and to applications Apportioned in the fourth funding round that were received from February 1, 2023 through March 2, 2023. These extended deadlines will apply to any future funding rounds.

The proposed regulations were approved by the Office of Administrative Law on June 3, 2024, and are effective October 1, 2024.

WHEREAS, Treasury Regulations Section 1.150-2 require the State (on whose behalf the Board is acting) to declare its reasonable intent to provide grant funding to school districts, in accordance with Board policy and law, for costs of the projects with proceeds of State bonds;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

1. This Resolution is adopted by the Board for the purposes of establishing compliance with Treasury Regulations Section 1.150-2, and this Resolution does not bind the Board to make any additional apportionment, or bind the State to incur any indebtedness.
2. The Board anticipates that some or all of the school districts listed on the list of "Projects" referred to in this Resolution will pay certain capital expenditures in connection with some or all of the project costs prior to the issuance of bonds by the State to pay for the grants for the projects. The reimbursement of such costs is consistent with the State's budgetary and financial circumstances, and in accordance with Board policy, as no other funds or accounts of the State have been budgeted or are available to pay the costs of the projects on either a short-term or a long-term basis.
3. The Board, acting on behalf of the State, hereby declares that it is the State's official intent to use proceeds of general obligation bonds and/or General Fund proceeds that may become available for such purpose, consistent with the requirements of law that are in effect at the time the funds are available, to provide grants, in accordance with applicable laws and regulations.
4. This Resolution shall be continuously available for inspection by the general public during normal business hours at the offices of the Board at 707 3rd Street, 4th Floor, West Sacramento, California, commencing within one week after the date of enactment of this Resolution.
5. Any eligibility determination does not constitute a commitment of future funding by the Board.

DESCRIPTION

DESCRIPTION OF HEALTH AND SAFETY THREAT

A report by KNA Structural Engineers, Inc., dated October 11, 2021 and with a revision date of May 26, 2022, identifies structural deficiencies in Building 500, Lecture Hall, on the Desert Learning Academy site. The report identified seismic deficiencies with the wall anchorage, discontinuities around the high roof and found potential deficiencies with the anchorage for the brick veneer, light gage lateral brace and rod braces that may be insufficient to resist seismic load, and straps for collector elements that are likely to lack sufficient strength to transfer seismic forces to the lateral force resisting elements. These insufficiencies as detailed in the reports render Building 500, Lecture Hall, at high risk of collapse in the event of seismic activity. The building qualifies for the SMP based on the qualifying criteria in Education Code Section 17075.10 and SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.2.

SCOPE OF PROJECT

The scope of this project includes the demolition of Building 500, Lecture Hall, and the construction of a new classroom and office building.

The plan set for this project includes work beyond the scope of this seismic application including alterations to Buildings 300 and 400 on the site, and installation of fencing and gates that is associated with SFP modernization application 57/67173-00-016. The project also includes an additional 878 square feet that will be funded solely by the District. Therefore, the grants provided in this application are limited to the replacement square footage eligible for SMP funding.

STATUS OF SCHOOL SITE

The District awarded the contract to replace Building 500 in October 2022. Completion of the project is expected by August 31, 2024.

QUALIFYING CRITERIA

GOVERNMENT/STATE LEVEL CONCURRENCE

Building 500 has been classified as a Most Vulnerable Category 2 Building type as defined in SFP regulations and has met qualifying criteria of the SMP. The Division of the State Architect (DSA) has approved the District for Phase One (Eligibility Evaluation) and Phase Two (Replacement Option Analysis and Design Criteria) as well as providing final plan approval. These approvals enabled the District to apply for funding from the Board.

Program eligibility is determined by the Division of the State Architect while determination of grant funding is determined by the Board based on the following criteria.

Notwithstanding Sections 1859.93 and 1859.93.1, all applications for the seismic mitigation of the Most Vulnerable Category 2 Buildings shall be funded in the order of receipt of an Approved Application for funding. Any grants provided for the purpose of this section shall be provided as a new construction project and allocated on a 50 percent state share basis.”

SFP Regulation Section 1859.82.2(a) states,

- (a) Seismic mitigation projects must meet all of the following requirements:
- (1) The construction contract was executed on or after May 20, 2006;
 - (2) The project funding provided shall be for the minimum work necessary to obtain DSA approval;
 - (3) The School Building is designed for occupancy by students and staff; and
 - (4) The DSA concurs with a report by a structural engineer, which identifies structural deficiencies that pose an unacceptable risk of injury to its occupants in a seismic event. The structural engineers report shall conform to the guidelines prepared by the DSA, in accordance with Education Code Section 17310.

If the unacceptable risk of injury is due to the presence of faulting, liquefaction or landslide, these hazards must be documented by a geological hazards report prepared by an engineering geologist in accordance with California Building Code, Part 2, Chapter 18, section 1803A and with concurrence of the California Geological Survey

DESCRIPTION

DESCRIPTION OF HEALTH AND SAFETY THREAT

A report by Beebe Water Systems (BWS) dated April 17, 2023, with a supplemental report dated June 19, 2023, notes that for the last several years local canal and flood irrigation on the Delphic Elementary school grounds has ceased and that as a result the school's only well has had declining yield and is no longer able to keep up with school demand. A letter from Enloe Drilling & Pumps, Inc. dated June 1, 2024 states that the well is "no longer deep enough to provide a viable, reliable water source," for the District, because the ground water table in the surrounding area has lowered due to prolonged drought and increased local demand for well water. The April 17, 2023 BWS report goes on to state that frequently there is no water available, which creates a health and safety threat as students cannot access drinking water or water to flush toilets and wash hands.

SCOPE OF PROJECT

The minimum work necessary to mitigate the health and safety threat includes decommissioning the existing non-functional well, drilling a new potable water well approximately 300 feet deep with a new pump and monitoring equipment as well as water treatment equipment, adding a potable water storage system to allow for peak usage, installing a distribution pumping system and a back-up generator. Additionally, a fire water storage tank will be required to meet firefighting needs.

STATUS OF SCHOOL SITE

Upon receipt of the design funds, the District will begin the design process for the project and obtain the necessary approvals to complete the project.

QUALIFYING CRITERIA

GOVERNMENT/STATE LEVEL OCCURENCE

The State Water Resources Control Board provided written concurrence that supports the industry specialists' findings and recommended work to mitigate the health and safety threat.

Projects solely to replace components that have reached the end of their useful life, perform routine maintenance or repair, issues resulting from the deferment of routine maintenance or repair, lack of current code compliance, or the addition of components that were not previously existing, do not meet the qualifying criteria of the program. Districts that qualify for Financial Hardship assistance may file an application for design funding, site funding, and determination of program eligibility in advance of construction funding.”

(5) The district is required to submit an Approved Application for funding and an updated Form SAB 58-01 for projects funded in accordance to 1859.82.1(c) or site development worksheet for projects funded in accordance to 1859.82.1(b), that reflects the final approved drawings for the project within:

DESCRIPTION

DESCRIPTION OF HEALTH AND SAFETY THREAT

A report by SHN Engineers and Geologists, dated January 18, 2018, describes the widespread failure of the approximately 1,500 foot storm drain system in the Cooper Gulch portion of the Eureka Senior High site. The report describes the system as follows:

The storm drain is a 30-inch diameter concrete pipe that begins at the south end of the football field where a small creek drainage enters the pipe and discharges just north of the center field of the baseball diamond, where the outfall drains back into the creek.

An environmental study prepared by SHN Engineers and Geologists in April of 2022 notes "Critical failure of the Cooper Creek storm drainpipe has resulted in sinkholes, posing a significant health and safety hazard and resulting in the closers of portion of the project site."

In addition to the challenges presented in repairing or replacing the 1,500 foot storm drain, the project requires extensive environmental mitigation work in compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and Section 404 of the federal Clean Water Act (CWA), and approval from multiple local, State and federal agencies including the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW), the North Coast Regional Water Quality Control Board (Regional Water Board) and the United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE).

SCOPE OF PROJECT

The scope of this project includes removal of the failed existing 30-inch diameter storm drain piping and its replacement with the new 42-inch mainline storm drain storm drain, construction of bioretention basins to manage and treat stormwater runoff, renovation of the existing football, baseball and softball fields, the existing track and field facilities, and the existing parking lot, all of which will be damaged in the process of replacing the storm drain. Construction of accessible paths of travel and a new accessible restroom will also be required to meet the requirements for plan approval from the Division of the State Architect (DSA).

Additionally, the construction of bioretention basins will require the District to create new wetlands space to replace wetlands that will be lost as part of the project and to mitigate the impact to wetland-dependent plants such as the small fruit bulrush.

Since the District submitted a complete funding application, the District advised OPSC that it is electing to reduce some scope from the DSA-approved plan set. The reduction in scope would not alter OPSC's approval or affect the funding being presented in this item. OPSC confirmed the minimum work in the current plan with DSA. DSA issued a letter on June 6, 2024 regarding the registered Revision of the plans. The District must submit the revised plan set upon receipt of DSA approval to OPSC for confirmation that the funding is still supported.

A construction contract was awarded for this project on May 3, 2024, with a notice to proceed dated May 16, 2024. Work commenced on May 20, 2024, and the District estimates that work will be complete on or around July 1, 2026.

DESCRIPTION

DESCRIPTION OF HEALTH AND SAFETY THREAT

A Wastewater System Report dated July 23, 2023, prepared by Robertson Erickson Civil Engineers and Surveyors, states that the wastewater system at Shaffer Elementary is failing and the main sewer drain line has backed up several times in the last couple of years. The report notes there is no grease trap within the drain system, and that the septic tank is pumped several times a year. The maintenance provider has described a consistent presence of fats, oils and grease (FOG) within the drain lines and septic tank, which can contribute to the failure of the septic system's leach fields. It goes on to state that school personnel have reported that sewage has overflowed the cleanout lids at least five times within the preceding 18 months and concludes that "Backups and effluent surfacing on the ground is not acceptable as it creates a very dangerous and unhealthy environment for students."

The report describes the minimum work to mitigate the hazard as the replacement of the existing septic system with a larger septic tank and leach field, including a grease trap and monitoring ports to make it easier to locate and monitor the performance of the system.

SCOPE OF PROJECT

This project consists of the replacement of the existing septic system, including the septic tank and leach fields, with the inclusion of a grease trap and monitoring ports.

DESCRIPTION

DESCRIPTION OF HEALTH AND SAFETY THREAT

In the course of excavating for a replacement building at Weed Elementary, contractors encountered an unknown petroleum plume. The new replacement building was being constructed as part of a separate state-funded application at the site for mold and structural issues that qualified the buildings to be replaced. The petroleum plume is a new, distinct, health and safety issue, therefore this application is being funded independently, but the scope of work is still part of the larger overall reconstruction project at Weed Elementary. In response to the petroleum plume issue, in an email dated April 6, 2023, the Siskiyou County Environmental Health Division advised the District that the contaminated soil was “off gassing volatile organic chemicals with could be a health risk to students and staff,” and recommended closing the school until any hazards could be mitigated.

Field staff and a Principal Engineering Geologist with GeoSolve, Inc., visited the site on April 13, 2023, to provide emergency environmental consulting services. Subsequent testing revealed elevated diesel levels in the contaminated soil and groundwater in the area of contamination, and in a report dated May 12, 2023, GeoSolve, Inc., recommended the removal and proper disposal of visibly contaminated soil and groundwater from the ongoing excavation site as the minimum work required for mitigation. In a supplemental memorandum dated February 26, 2024, GeoSolve, Inc. clarified that the inhalation of diesel vapors emanating from the contaminated soil posed an immediate threat to students and staff at the site.

SCOPE OF PROJECT

This project consists of the excavation of diesel-contaminated soil and pumping of contaminated ground water, proper disposal of the contaminated soil and water at an accepting Class II landfill, backfill of the excavation with concrete to approximately 10 feet below the ground surface, and backfill with clean imported fill to the ground surface.

The contaminated soil and ground water have been removed and disposed of at a Level II landfill, and the excavation has been backfilled with concrete to 10 feet below the surface and clean imported fill to the surface.

SCHOOL FACILITY PROGRAM ELIGIBILITY ADJUSTMENTS

PURPOSE OF REPORT

To adjust the baseline eligibility for new construction and modernization projects under the Leroy F. Greene School Facilities Act of 1998.

DESCRIPTION

The districts listed on Attachment A have received eligibility approval for new construction. There has been a change in their baseline in accordance with the California Code of Regulations relating to the Leroy F. Greene School Facilities Act of 1998, Section 1859.51.

The districts listed on Attachment B have received eligibility approval for modernization. There has been a change in their baseline in accordance with the California Code of Regulations relating to the Leroy F. Greene School Facilities Act of 1998, Section 1859.61.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Approve an adjustment to the new construction eligibility baseline determination as shown on Attachment A.
2. Approve an adjustment to the modernization eligibility baseline determination as shown on Attachment B.
3. Provide that this approval of adjusted eligibility determination does not constitute a commitment for future funding by the State Allocation Board.

SCHOOL FACILITY PROGRAM APPORTIONMENTS

PURPOSE OF REPORT

To present to the State Allocation Board (Board) a list of School Facility Program (SFP) applications for Apportionment.

DESCRIPTION

On September 21, 2022, the Board took action, due to the availability of General Fund proceeds, to return to making direct Apportionments while keeping the same benefits of the quick distribution of funds, as the priority funding system, by adopting proposed emergency regulations that revised the fund release deadlines from 18 months to either 180 calendar days for non-financial hardship school districts or 365 calendar days for school districts that qualify for financial hardship. The SFP new construction and modernization projects presented on the Attachment are in date order of a complete application being received by the Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) and are Ready for Apportionment. The list also includes health and safety facility hardship applications for funding that have been processed and are ready for approval regardless of received date.

AUTHORITY

SFP Regulation Section 1859.90 states:

“(a) With the exception of an apportionment made pursuant to Sections 1859.81.1(e) or 1859.81.2, apportionments provided through the Priority Funding Process and subject to 1859.90.2, or of an Inactive Apportionment subject to Section 1859.96, the OPSC will release State funds that the Board has apportioned to the district after submittal, by the district, of the Form SAB 50-05 and a Grant Agreement, pursuant to Section 1859.90.4.

(b) With the exception of an apportionment made for a Type II Joint-Use Project, not part of a qualifying SFP Modernization project, pursuant to Article 12 of these Regulations, a district must submit the Form SAB 50-05 and Grant Agreement, within 180 calendar days of the Apportionment of the SFP grant for the project or within 365 calendar days for Apportionments that include financial hardship assistance. If the district does not submit the Form SAB 50-05 and Grant Agreement within the above specified time, the entire New Construction Adjusted Grant, or Modernization Adjusted Grant or Type I or II, part of a qualifying SFP Modernization, or Joint-Use Project apportionment shall be rescinded without further Board action, and the pupils housed in the project, if applicable, will be

added back to the district’s baseline eligibility. The district may refile a new application for the project subject to district eligibility and available State funds at the time of resubmittal.

....“

BACKGROUND

As part of the Governor’s approved Budget Act for the 2022-2023 fiscal year, one-time General Fund dollars were appropriated to the Board in the amount of \$1.3 billion for new construction and modernization projects under the SFP, as well as \$1,960.5 million was appropriated from the Governor’s approved Budget Act for the 2023-2024 fiscal year. As a result of receiving funding for the SFP that is not contingent on bond sales, the Board was able to return to using an existing regulatory process that allows for Apportionments to be made on a flow basis outside the current Priority Funding process, which is designed to accommodate twice yearly bond sales. Making Apportionments on a flow basis will enable school districts to more quickly and efficiently access much needed cash for construction projects. In order to ensure that cash moves quickly once allocated to school districts, regulations were changed to shorten the deadlines for fund release from 18 months to either 180 calendar days or 365 calendar days for districts that qualify for financial hardship.

School districts must submit the Grant Agreement and a valid *Fund Release Authorization* (Form SAB 50-05) 180 calendar days from Board approval for non-financial hardship projects and 365 calendar days from Board approval for financial hardship projects.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Approve the SFP applications as presented on the Attachment.
2. Specify that the projects are subject to the fund release deadlines as outlined in SFP Regulation Section 1859.90.

PURPOSE OF REPORT

To present the District's request to approve a change in scope for a California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program (Program) application that received Retrofit funding at the King City Arts Magnet School.

DESCRIPTION

On September 27, 2023, the District received an apportionment in the amount of \$1,573,934.00 for a Program Retrofit project at the King City Arts Magnet School. The project as originally approved consisted of the retrofit of three transitional kindergarten and three full-day kindergarten classrooms.

In accordance with Program regulations, the District received an advance release of funds for Design in the amount of \$228,225 on January 3, 2024. However, in preparation for the design of the project, the District concluded that revising their project scope from Retrofit to New Construction would optimize the use of state and local funds to best serve their educational needs. The District has stated that the change in project scope was the optimal course of action to address the following factors: projected enrollment growth, cost efficiency, maximized resource utilization, and enhanced educational environment at the school site.

The District submitted a *School District Appeal Request* (Form SAB 189) on April 30, 2024 for State Allocation Board (Board) consideration of a scope change that differs from what was originally submitted by the District and approved by the Board. The project will now consist of the new construction of two transitional kindergarten classrooms, instead of the retrofitting of three transitional kindergarten and three full-day kindergarten classrooms.

The District has not requested an increase in funding for the change in scope, and the change in scope has no bearing on the original application's preference points and funding order.

BACKGROUND

District and Project History

The District is a K-8 school district located in King City in Monterey County. The District currently serves a student population of 2,552. Their Free and Reduced Price Meal Percentage for the 2022-2023 enrollment year used for this application was 88.5 percent, assigning them a total of 28 preference points for the purposes of Program funding order.

On March 2, 2023, the Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) received the District's Program application for Retrofit funding with a Design Advance for three school sites: Kings City Arts Magnet, Del Rey Elementary, and Santa Lucia Elementary. King City Arts Magnet was identified as the District's first priority project.

Pursuant to Program Regulation Section 1860.7(d), "A Retrofit Grant with an advance fund release for design may be requested with the submittal of the Form SAB 70-01." The Division of the State Architect (DSA) and California Department of Education (CDE) approvals are not required for advance funding requests. The majority of projects funded through the Program request advance funding. This allows many districts that would not otherwise have had the means to fund the design of their facilities projects prior to application submittal to obtain project approval and design funding from the Board.

At the September 27, 2023, Board meeting, King City Union's King City Arts Magnet application number 71/66050-00-001 received an apportionment of \$1,573,934.00 for the retrofit with a design advance of three transitional kindergarten and three full-day kindergarten classrooms (see Attachment B). Following apportionment, the District began the planning and preparation for the design of the project. During this process, the District determined that New Construction, rather than Retrofit, was the optimal course of action for the King City Arts Magnet site for several reasons: projected enrollment growth, cost efficiency, maximized resource utilization, and enhanced education environment.

Therefore, the District submitted a Form SAB 189 on April 30, 2024, requesting that the Board approve a change in project scope from the Retrofit of three transitional kindergarten and three full-day kindergarten classrooms to the New Construction of two transitional kindergarten classrooms, with no additional funds requested.

Status of the Project

The District is currently in the planning and design phase of the project. They have submitted plans to both CDE and DSA and are currently undergoing their preliminary reviews. The District intends to obtain all necessary final approvals and award construction contracts prior to their fund release deadline of March 27, 2025.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS

District Position

The District has stated that it is requesting approval of a change in scope for the following considerations:

...[N]ew construction will greatly improve our financial position to complete TK-K facilities, not only at King City Arts Magnet but, across all three of the District's elementary schools and enhance the educational environment for all our District's students.

The full text of the District's request is included as Attachment C.

Staff Position

The District requests to amend the originally approved scope of work of its Program Retrofit funding application (71/66050-00-001). The District is requesting to change the project scope from Retrofit of three transitional kindergarten and three full-day kindergarten classrooms to New Construction of two transitional kindergarten classrooms.

The Board's approval of the project funding is full and final and based on the requested classrooms and grants indicated on the District's *Application for Funding* (Form SAB 70-01). Flexibility is recognized as part of Program projects; however, a change in project scope which includes a change in project type from Retrofit to New Construction cannot be administratively processed. In this case, staff must present a school district's request for a scope change to the Board.

Staff reviewed the District's request and determined that the outcome of the scope change still meets all criteria to qualify for the Program. Additionally, the change in scope has no bearing on the original application's preference points and funding order. No additional funding has been requested by the District, and no discernable funding advantage would result from the Board's approval of the District's appeal.

During the processing of the appeal request for the changed scope, the District provided an updated Form SAB 70-01 that reflected classroom requests associated with the scope change. Staff reviewed this updated documentation and assigned a new application number of 70/66050-00-001 for the New Construction project. As the state's share for two transitional kindergarten classrooms exceeds the previously apportioned amount of \$1,573,934.00, a partial funding shell has been presented (Attachment D) and the District has been advised that approval of this appeal results in a full and final apportionment for the project.

Conclusion

Staff supports the District's request for a scope change revising the project scope from the Retrofit of three transitional kindergarten and three full-day kindergarten classrooms to the New Construction of two transitional kindergarten classrooms. If the change of scope is approved, the application would be renumbered to 70/66050-00-001 to accurately reflect the newly approved scope of the project.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS (cont.)

The changed project scope still meets all necessary criteria to qualify for Program funding.

The District remains eligible for the resulting amended request for classrooms and supplemental grants. The total number of classrooms has decreased from six to two and the scope change does not result in an increase in the funding amount of the previously approved Apportionment. However, the partial funding amount has been determined to be full and final. A funding item corresponding to the amended project scope is included as Attachment D.

Staff supports the District's appeal.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Approve the District's appeal request with the following additions:

1. 



On behalf of the King City Union School District (“District”), we respectfully request a conversion of our approved project application from retrofit to new construction. It is imperative to note that this request does not include any change in the awarded funding amount. Our District's aim is to optimize the utilization of State and local funds to best serve the educational needs of our students.

Background:

In compliance with the California Universal Prekindergarten Planning and Implementation Grant Program, our District developed a comprehensive plan in June 2022 identifying, based on enrollment projections, a pressing need for additional TK-K classrooms in the District. The District submitted California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten, and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program applications on March 2, 2023 for all three of the District's elementary schools with the intention of retrofitting existing facilities to accommodate the anticipated TK-K enrollment growth. Of the three applications, King City Arts Magnet School was granted an apportionment. Had the District initially submitted the application as new construction, it would have received the same amount of preference points and subsequently approved.

Rationale for Change:

Upon meticulous assessment of the UPK Plan and other planning in preparation of the design for the project, including a Facility Needs Assessment and a Facilities Master Plan, it became evident that transitioning to new construction, rather than retrofit, was the optimal course of action at King City Arts Magnet for several reasons:

- **Projected Enrollment Growth:** Anticipated increases in TK-K enrollment necessitate additional classroom facilities across multiple elementary schools within our District.
- **Cost-Efficiency:** Retrofitting existing classrooms for TK and kindergarten would incur excessive costs and result in redundant infrastructure.
- **Maximized Resource Utilization:** New construction allows for the creation of efficient, purpose-built facilities, eliminating the need for displacement and replacement of classrooms, thus maximizing both State and local bond dollars.

PURPOSE OF REPORT

To present Alisal Union Elementary School District's (District) request for an extension to the deadline to submit the *Fund Release Authorization* (Form SAB 70-02) for its California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program (Program) funding application.

DESCRIPTION

School Districts participating in the Program must submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 within 18 months of receiving an apportionment, pursuant to the Board's policy adopted on September 27, 2023, as amendments to Program Regulation Section 1860.16(f). In addition to the completed Form, applicants must also submit the required approvals from the California Department of Education (CDE) and Division of the State Architect (DSA) and comply with all other requirements listed on the Form instructions and certifications, including but not limited to, entering into a binding contract for at least 90 percent of the building construction activities of the project. This item requests an extension of seven months to this deadline for the District's new construction project, application number 70/65961-00-017.

AUTHORITY

As approved on September 27, 2023, Section 1860.16(f) of the Program Regulations read as follows:

For an Apportionment received pursuant to Section 1860.7(b) and 1860.7(d), where submittal of the necessary CDE plan approval and/or DSA-approved plans and specifications were not required at the time the Board granted an Apportionment, the School District has up to 18 months to submit the required approvals and a complete *Fund Release Request* (Form SAB 70-02) from the date of the first Apportionment. The School District may submit in writing other evidence satisfactory to the Board of circumstances beyond the control of the School District that precludes the School District from submitting the required CDE plan approval, DSA-approved plans and specifications, and a complete Form SAB 70-02 within 18 months from the date of the first Apportionment. If the required submittals or other evidence in writing are not received within 18 months of the first Apportionment, the Apportionment shall be rescinded and the Full- Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant will return to the Program for reallocation without further Board action.

- (1) School Districts submitting other evidence shall have up to three years from the date of the first Apportionment to submit the required approvals and a complete *Fund Release Authorization* (Form SAB 70-02). This shall not extend the deadline in Section 1860.18.

BACKGROUND

The Program provides funding to construct new school facilities and retrofit existing school facilities for the purpose of expanding existing programs or providing new programs for preschool, transitional kindergarten, and full-day kindergarten pupils. On September 27, 2023, the Board approved Staff's policy recommendations to modify funding deadlines and requirements for projects apportioned during the third and fourth funding rounds of the Program, as well as conforming regulatory amendments for future applications. The approval included an amendment to Program Regulation Section 1860.18 (f) that allows the School District to submit "in writing other evidence satisfactory to the Board of circumstances beyond the control of the School District that precludes the School District from submitting the required CDE plan approval, DSA-approved plans and specifications, and a complete Form SAB 70-02 within 18 months from the date of the first Apportionment." These regulatory amendments are currently proceeding through the regulatory process.

STAFF ANALYSIS/COMMENTS

The project will consist of four transitional kindergarten and two full day kindergarten classrooms. On May 28, 2024, OPSC received the District's request for an extension to submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 due to circumstances beyond its control. The project has been delayed due to challenges obtaining an approved modular building due to 2022 Building Code changes. Once modulars were available, the District submitted plans to DSA. The District anticipates receiving final plan approvals by July 2024 and commencing construction in the fall. The District plans to submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 by December 31, 2024.

The District's initial apportionment was on November 28, 2022 with a current deadline to submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 by May 28, 2024. If the extension request is approved, the new deadline to submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 will be December 31, 2024.

Staff has reviewed the District's request, which is included as an Attachment, and determined that it provides satisfactory evidence to justify the requested extension. Staff supports the District's request for a seven-month extension to submit the Form SAB 70-02. However, the approval of this extension does not extend the three-year deadline to complete the project and submit a complete Expenditure Report (Form SAB 70-03) with final expenditures by November 28, 2025.

RECOMMENDATION

Approve the District's request for an extension to December 31, 2024. Require that the District submit the Form SAB 70-02 for application number 70/65961-00-017 by December 31, 2024, or the apportionment will be rescinded without further Board action.

The Alisa! Union Elementary School District is requesting an extension until **December 31, 2024** to submit the Fund Release documents for the **CPTKFDKFGP Project 70/65961-00-017**. The project was approved and received an Advance Design Apportionment at the November 28, 2022 State Allocation Board Meeting. The District's current Fund Release document deadline is May 28, 2024.

The District began the planning stages of the project and awarded an Architectural contract in June 2023, and a Lease-Leaseback agreement in September 2023. However, the project quickly stalled as it became apparent that there were no Title V-compliant, single-classroom modulars available.

As with many districts in the state, the District faced challenges with obtaining a PC-Approved modular building due to the 2022 Building Code change that impacted modular manufacturers.

Once the modular PC approvals were available, the District's architect finalized project plans and submitted them to DSA for review and approval in May 2024. The District anticipates receiving DSA approval of Increment #1 of the plan set by July 2024, and that of Increment #2 by September 2024.

Following DSA approval of Increment #1, the District will bring the LLB agreement to its Board for approval of the final cost and anticipates commencing construction of Increment # 1 by August 2024, that of Increment #2 once plans are approved by DSA, and project completion is estimated in early 2025. Therefore, the District is requesting an extension until December 31, 2024 to submit the required Fund Release documents.

PURPOSE OF REPORT

To present Ducor Union Elementary School District's (District) request for an extension to the deadline to submit the *Fund Release Authorization* (Form SAB 70-02) for its California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program (Program) funding application.

DESCRIPTION

School Districts participating in the Program must submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 within 18 months of receiving an apportionment, pursuant to the Board's policy adopted on September 27, 2023, as amendments to Program Regulation Section 1860.16(f). In addition to the completed Form, applicants must also submit the required approvals from the California Department of Education (CDE) and Division of the State Architect (DSA) and comply with all other requirements listed on the Form instructions and certifications, including but not limited to, entering into a binding contract for at least 90 percent of the building construction activities of the project. This item requests an extension of five months to this deadline for the District's new construction project, application number 70/71894-00-002.

AUTHORITY

As approved on September 27, 2023, Section 1860.16(f) of the Program Regulations read as follows:

For an Apportionment received pursuant to Section 1860.7(b) and 1860.7(d), where submittal of the necessary CDE plan approval and/or DSA-approved plans and specifications were not required at the time the Board granted an Apportionment, the School District has up to 18 months to submit the required approvals and a complete *Fund Release Request* (Form SAB 70-02) from the date of the first Apportionment. The School District may submit in writing other evidence satisfactory to the Board of circumstances beyond the control of the School District that precludes the School District from submitting the required CDE plan approval, DSA-approved plans and specifications, and a complete Form SAB 70-02 within 18 months from the date of the first Apportionment. If the required submittals or other evidence in writing are not received within 18 months of the first Apportionment, the Apportionment shall be rescinded and the Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant will return to the Program for reallocation without further Board action.

- (1) School Districts submitting other evidence shall have up to three years from the date of the first Apportionment to submit the required approvals and a complete *Fund Release Authorization* (Form SAB 70-02). This shall not extend the deadline in Section 1860.18.

BACKGROUND

The Program provides funding to construct new school facilities and retrofit existing school facilities for the purpose of expanding existing programs or providing new programs for preschool, transitional kindergarten, and full-day kindergarten pupils. On September 27, 2023, the Board approved Staff's policy recommendations to modify funding deadlines and requirements for projects apportioned during the third and fourth funding rounds of the Program, as well as conforming regulatory amendments for future applications. The approval included an amendment to Program Regulation Section 1860.18 (f) that allows the School District to submit "in writing other evidence satisfactory to the Board of circumstances beyond the control of the School District that precludes the School District from submitting the required CDE plan approval, DSA-approved plans and specifications, and a complete Form SAB 70-02 within 18 months from the date of the first Apportionment." These regulatory amendments are currently proceeding through the regulatory process.

STAFF ANALYSIS/COMMENTS

The project will consist of one transitional kindergarten classroom. On May 28, 2024, OPSC received the District's request for an extension to submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 due to circumstances beyond its control. The project has been delayed due to challenges obtaining a construction bid within budget. The District has already obtained final plan approvals from the Division of the State Architect and California Department of Education. The District plans to rebid the project and submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 by October 31, 2024.

The District's initial apportionment was on November 28, 2022 with a current deadline to submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 by October 31, 2024. If the extension request is approved, the new deadline to submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 will be October 31, 2024.

Staff has reviewed the District's request, which is included as an Attachment, and determined that it provides satisfactory evidence to justify the requested extension. Staff supports the District's request for a five-month extension to submit the Form SAB 70-02. However, the approval of this extension does not extend the three-year deadline to complete the project and submit a complete Expenditure Report (Form SAB 70-03) with final expenditures by November 28, 2025.

RECOMMENDATION

Approve the District's request for an extension to October 31, 2024. Require that the District submit the Form SAB 70-02 for application number 70/71894-00-002 by October 31, 2024, or the apportionment will be rescinded without further Board action.

Dear Friends at OPSC,

The Ducor Union Elementary School District is requesting an extension until October 31, 2024, to submit final release documents for the CPTKFDKFGP Project. The project was approved and received an Advanced Design Apportionment at the November 28, 2022, State Allocation Board Meeting. The District's fund release deadline is May 28, 2024.

The District is a Small Rural School District with one site and qualifies as a Financial Hardship District. Despite funding challenges and the lack of sufficient funding to complete this small school project due to isolation, the District has remained diligent in attempting to move forward. However, the current funding model does not provide sufficient funding to cover the projected costs. DUESD does not possess the liquid fluidity to backfill the nearly \$300,000.00 deficit. The district was identified as budgetarily qualified in the 2023-24 school year and is currently working to extract itself from this quagmire. The building is definitely needed, and the district would like more time to develop the options.

The District faces many challenges to meet the budget allocation, and sadly despite our best efforts to attract potential bidders, only one company responded, and this bid exceeded the allocation. We are currently in the process of searching for additional funding to complete the project, but this additional funding will need to be secured in the open market. We do have an architectural company under contract, and we just recently received approval for these plans. The date of the DSA counter approval and site, foundation, and utilities was May 10, 2024. The district went out to bid on May 14, 2024 and received one response that exceeded the allocation.

The District respectfully requests an extension for the above-referenced project. The Project has achieved both DSA and CDE approvals. The Project was bid on May 14, 2024. The District is requesting a time extension until October 31, 2024, to submit the

70-02. The time extension will allow the District time to either re-bid the Project, value engineer the Project or pursue other means or mechanisms to bring the Project within budget.

REQUEST FOR EXTENSION TO FUND RELEASE DEADLINE**

PURPOSE OF REPORT

To present Weed Union Elementary School District's (District) request for an extension to the deadline to submit the *Fund Release Authorization* (Form SAB 70-02) for its California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program (Program) funding application.

DESCRIPTION

School Districts participating in the Program must submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 within 18 months of receiving an apportionment, pursuant to the Board's policy adopted on September 27, 2023, as amendments to Program Regulation Section 1860.16(f). In addition to the completed Form, applicants must also submit the required approvals from the California Department of Education (CDE) and Division of the State Architect (DSA) and comply with all other requirements listed on the Form instructions and certifications, including but not limited to, entering into a binding contract for at least 90 percent of the building construction activities of the project. This item requests an extension of 90 days to this deadline for the District's new construction project, application number 70/70482-00-001.

AUTHORITY

As approved on September 27, 2023, Section 1860.16(f) of the Program Regulations read as follows:

For an Apportionment received pursuant to Section 1860.7(b) and 1860.7(d), where submittal of the necessary CDE plan approval and/or DSA-approved plans and specifications were not required at the time the Board granted an Apportionment, the School District has up to 18 months to submit the required approvals and a complete *Fund Release Request* (Form SAB 70-02) from the date of the first Apportionment. The School District may submit in writing other evidence satisfactory to the Board of circumstances beyond the control of the School District that precludes the School District from submitting the required CDE plan approval, DSA-approved plans and specifications, and a complete Form SAB 70-02 within 18 months from the date of the first Apportionment. If the required submittals or other evidence in writing are not received within 18 months of the first Apportionment, the Apportionment shall be rescinded and the Full- Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant will return to the Program for reallocation without further Board action.

- (1) School Districts submitting other evidence shall have up to three years from the date of the first Apportionment to submit the required approvals and a complete *Fund Release Authorization*

(Form SAB 70-02). This shall not extend the deadline in Section 1860.18.

BACKGROUND

The Program provides funding to construct new school facilities and retrofit existing school facilities for the purpose of expanding existing programs or providing new programs for preschool, transitional kindergarten, and full-day kindergarten pupils. On September 27, 2023, the Board approved Staff's policy recommendations to modify funding deadlines and requirements for projects apportioned during the third and fourth funding rounds of the Program, as well as conforming regulatory amendments for future applications. The approval included an amendment to Program Regulation Section 1860.18 (f) that allows the School District to submit "in writing other evidence satisfactory to the Board of circumstances beyond the control of the School District that precludes the School District from submitting the required CDE plan approval, DSA-approved plans and specifications, and a complete Form SAB 70-02 within 18 months from the date of the first Apportionment." These regulatory amendments are currently proceeding through the regulatory process.

STAFF ANALYSIS/COMMENTS

The project consists of two preschool classrooms. On May 28, 2024, OPSC received the District's request for an extension to submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 due to circumstances beyond its control. The District's initial apportionment was approved on November 28, 2022 with a deadline to submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 by May 28, 2024.

The District obtained the required plan approvals from both the Division of the State Architect and the California Department of Education prior to the May 2024 deadline. However, the project contract award was delayed due to tight budget constraints and multiple bids that were incompatible with the project budget. The District's extension request, which was received by OPSC on the due date of May 28, 2024, stated that it would secure and award acceptable contracts within 90 days of the original due date. The request stated that the District would submit a complete Form SAB 70-02 by August 28, 2024.

The District submitted a complete Form to OPSC on July 18, 2024, which was more than one month ahead of the original request.

Due to the timing of the request and the delay in Staff's opportunity to present this request to the Board for consideration, the request is now retroactive. The Board's consideration is necessary to acknowledge the time frame between the regulatory due date and the actual receipt date of the complete Form. Staff reviewed the District's request, which is included as an Attachment, and determined that it provided satisfactory evidence to justify the requested extension. Therefore, Staff supports the District's request for retroactive approval of an extension to submit the Form SAB 70-02.

However, the approval of this extension does not extend the three-year deadline to complete the project and submit a complete Expenditure Report (Form SAB 70-03) with final expenditures by November 28, 2025.

RECOMMENDATION

Approve the District's request for an extension to August 28, 2024. Require that the District submit the Form SAB 70-02 for application number 70/70482-00-001 by August 28, 2024, or the apportionment will be rescinded without further Board action.

Dear Ms. Rozvodovskyi:

The Weed Union Elementary School District is hereby requesting an extension of the time limit to submit the Fund Release for new construction funding for the Weed Elementary School under the California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten, and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program. The District received a New Construction Advance Design apportionment for project number 70/70482-00-001 at the November 28, 2022, State Allocation Board (SAB) meeting.

As you know, the fund release deadline was extended by the State Allocation Board in September 2023. As a result, the district has a deadline of May 28, 2024, to submit all necessary documentation for remaining fund release to the Office of Public School Construction (OPSC). Unfortunately, the district cannot certify to the requirement of the Form SAB 70-02 Fund Release Authorization that “the district has entered into binding contract(s) for the completion of the project”.

The two preschool classrooms included in application 70/70482-00-001 are not a stand-alone project but are instead included in a larger construction undertaking that will ultimately replace most facilities at the Weed Elementary School, in addition to providing new full-day preschool classrooms. The full-day preschool facilities cannot be bid separately.

The project at Weed Elementary is currently under construction and given that the district qualifies for financial hardship, the project is proceeding under very tight budget constraints. The district is using the Construction Management – Multi Prime method to deliver this project. In this approach individual trade or material packages are put out to bid and awarded separately. At the May 9, 2024, Board of Trustees meeting the Board rejected several bids which were incompatible with the project budget. As a result, the project is not under contract for 100% of the project at this time.

Therefore, the District is requesting a time extension of 90 days to secure and award acceptable contracts. The district and the construction manager are working diligently to rebid approximately five packages. Despite the bid climate, the intent is to bring new bids to the Board

for consideration. Out of caution, the district is requesting additional time beyond June in case further bids are required.

The district has obtained, and provided to OPSC, the necessary approvals from the Division of the Architect Plan and the California Department of Education, and is otherwise ready to submit the Form SAB 70-02.

PURPOSE OF REPORT

To present an amended rescission item for a California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten and Full Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program (Program) project.

DESCRIPTION

On June 26, 2024, the State Allocation Board (Board) approved a rescission for this project. In accordance with that item, the District submitted a completed *Expenditure Report* (Form SAB 70-03) which reported \$43.00 in interest.

In addition to the advance funds in the amount of \$34,800.00 that were previously released to the District, the District must also return the reported interest for a total return of \$34,843.00.

AUTHORITY

Program Regulation Section 1860.4(c)(1) states, in part, "Any funds that return on or before June 30, 2025, shall be returned to the California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program Account and may be used to provide additional Apportionments."

RECOMMENDATION

Require the District to return interest in the amount of \$43.00 for a total return of \$34,843.00.

EXEMPTION FOR INDEPENDENT STUDY FACILITIES

PURPOSE OF REPORT

To present the Leggett Valley Unified School District's (District) request, as shown on the Attachment, for an exemption from the definition of "school buildings" for certain facilities used for independent study.

DESCRIPTION

The District operates an independent study program at facilities that are not located at a regular school site and is requesting an exemption from the definition of "school building," as described in Education Code (EC) Section 17283, for the facility.

EC Section 17289 authorizes any school district or county office of education to request an exemption from the State Allocation Board (Board) for a building or structure or portion of a building or structure used for independent study from the definition of "school buildings." These buildings do not have to meet the Field Act requirements but must comply with local health and safety standards.

The District has certified that it has satisfied the legal requirements under EC Section 17289 for the exemption.

AUTHORITY

EC Section 17283 states: "School building" as used in this article means and includes any building used, or designed to be used, for elementary or secondary school purposes and constructed, reconstructed, altered, or added to, by the state or any city or city and county, or by any political subdivision or by any school district of any kind within the state, or by any regional occupational center or program created by or authorized to act by an agreement under joint exercise of power, or by the United States government, or any agency thereof."

EC Section 17289 states: "In order to provide alternative, community-based educational opportunities through independent study, any school district or county office of education may request an exemption from the State Allocation Board for a building or structure, or portion of a building or structure, from the definition of "school buildings" within the meaning of Section 17283. The exemptions may be granted for no longer than two years and exemptions are renewable. An exemption may only be granted if the school district or county office of education demonstrates to the satisfaction of the State Allocation Board all of the following:

- a) The building or structure, or portion of building or structure, satisfies all of the following:
 - i) It is not located on a regular school site.
 - ii) It complies with all applicable local building standards and all relevant local health and safety standards in the community in which it is located.
 - iii) It is used for independent study.

AUTHORITY (cont.)

- iv) It serves fewer than 25 pupils enrolled in kindergarten or any of the grades 1 to 12, inclusive, at any one time in the building or structure, or in a portion of a building or structure where the remainder of the building or structure is not used for instructional purposes.
- b) The use of the building or structure is critical to providing an effective alternative, community-based program.
- c) The use of other buildings or structures that would meet seismic safety standards for school facilities are not practical.”

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS

The District has provided certification that it has met the criteria as stated in EC Section 17289. An exemption has been requested for two years.

RECOMMENDATION

Approve the District’s request for an exemption from the definition of "school buildings" for the site listed on the Attachment from August 30, 2024 to August 29, 2026.








Proposition 51 Bond Authority - \$7.250 billion












School Facility Program Proposition 51 Apportionments by County







PURPOSE OF REPORT

To present the District's request that the State Allocation Board (Board) reinstate the District's apportionment and approve additional funding using all School Facility Program (SFP) Modernization eligibility available at the time the application was submitted.

DESCRIPTION

On October 8, 2019, the District submitted the full grant *Application for Funding* (Form SAB 50-04) for a modernization project at Rockford Elementary School. The District requested funding for 74 K-6 and 26 7-8 pupil grants. However, on February 26, 2014, and July 16, 2018, the District had submitted Modernization eligibility update requests that increased the District's total available Modernization eligibility to 285 K-6 pupil grants and 78 7-8 pupil grants. The Board approved an apportionment for the District based on grants requested for the full grant *Application for Funding* on August 23, 2023. On August 22, 2024, the project was rescinded for failure to resubmit a *Fund Release Authorization* (Form SAB 50-05) within 365 days of Apportionment.

The District submitted the *School District Appeal Request* (Form SAB 189) on February 27, 2024 to request the Board to allow the District to amend the Form SAB 50-04 to increase their original pupil grant request to the total amount that was available to the District when the full grant Form SAB 50-04 was submitted. Therefore, the District is requesting additional funding associated with the increase of 211 K-6 pupil grants and 52 7-8 pupil grants, as well as the impacted supplemental grants.

Approval of the District's increased pupil grants request at the 2023 grant amounts would provide \$1,645,333 in additional state funding to the District.

Staff does not support the District's request to use all eligibility available at the time the application was funded; however, staff supports reinstatement of the original apportionment and allowing the District 365 days to submit a valid Form SAB 50-05 to retain the funding previously approved.

BACKGROUND

District and Project History

Rockford Elementary School is an elementary school serving Kindergarten through Eighth Grade. This school is in Rockford Elementary School District, which is a one-school, school district located in Tulare County.

Therefore, the District is requesting additional funding associated with the increase of 211 K-6 pupil grants and 52 7-8 pupil grants, as well as the impacted supplemental grants.

Modernization Eligibility Overview

Establishing Modernization eligibility is the first step for school districts to receive SFP funds to renovate, modernize, or replace existing school buildings in like kind. Eligibility is in the form of pupil grants. Modernization pupil grants are used to provide funding for improvements to enhance and extend the useful life of school facilities, with state funds provided on a 60/40 basis. Examples of modernization projects include upgrades to certain building components such as air conditioning, plumbing, lighting, and electrical systems, or demolition and replacement of entire facilities. Modernization eligibility may only be used on eligible expenditures allowed under the SFP.

Modernization eligibility uses student enrollment and the ages and types of the buildings to determine the amount of funds each district site is eligible to receive. Each school site has its own Modernization eligibility. Permanent buildings that are 25 years old or older and portable buildings that are 20 years old or older can generate Modernization eligibility if enrollment at the site justifies the need to modernize the building. Districts establish an initial "baseline" eligibility that remains in place as the basis for all future site-based eligibility adjustments or funding applications. This baseline is updated over time to reflect increases in enrollment or other changes, such as new building becoming "of age." Districts use this eligibility to request funding from the state to assist in the modernization of school facilities.

An application for Modernization eligibility is not an application for funding. Modernization eligibility determines the maximum amount of pupil grant funding a school district is eligible to receive to modernize existing school facilities. Districts may use their Modernization eligibility either on an upcoming eligible project, or to reimburse a project that was already completed (the project must have been completed after the inception of the SFP in 1998). Districts have local control to decide where the funds are to be used on the same site that generates the eligibility. Districts are not required to use the Modernization funding on the same building that generated the eligibility.

Modernization Design and Construction Funding

School districts that meet the criteria for financial hardship funding and have fewer local funds than needed to cover 25 percent of the Modernization grant, may request an advance release of funding to assist with covering the design costs of the projects.

BACKGROUND (cont.)

Once the school district has construction plans approved by the California Department of Education (CDE) and the Division of the State Architect (DSA), the school district may submit a full grant application to request funding for the construction phase of the project. When the school district submits the construction phase funding application, the school district requests per pupil grant funding as well as any desired supplemental grants. Funding for the construction phase encompasses the school district's entire pupil grant request and any funds previously released are offset from the construction grant funding.

Status of the Project

Plans for the project were approved by DSA in June 2019 based on the full eligibility available to the District had it been requested at the time the full grant application for funding was submitted. The District is not yet under contract for construction of the project, as moving forward with the project is dependent on state funding. On August 22, 2024, the project apportionment was rescinded for failure to submit a *Fund Release Authorization* (Form SAB 50-05) within 365 days of Apportionment.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS

District Position

In its appeal request, the District states the following:

The District designed the project based on the full eligibility so if this request is denied we will need to make significant changes to the project to remove scope from the plans. We would then request a change of scope be approved [by the Board] to remain within our budget.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS (cont.)

The main goal of this project is to provide air conditioning for our staff and students. We have never had air conditioning so we will need to bring in additional electrical service to serve these new units. There is not enough money in the approved budget to do this let alone take care of our roofing. Most of our roofing is between 35 and 65 years old and in bad shape so we need to replace the worst ones to avoid further damage to our structures. We are a financial hardship district with no means [to] fund this project without State assistance.

The full text of the District's request is included as Attachment A.

Staff Position

Application for Funding Requests

Per SFP Regulations, school districts must submit a Form SAB 50-04 to request to use pupil grant eligibility, as well as any supplemental grant funding. Pupil grant funding is referred to as the "base grant" and is the basis for submitting an eligible funding application. A school district that does not have any pupil grant eligibility is ineligible for any SFP Modernization Program funding.

Districts may use their Modernization eligibility either on an upcoming eligible project, or to reimburse a project that was already completed (the project must have been completed after the inception of the SFP in 1998). Districts have local control to decide where the funds are to be used on the site that generates the eligibility. Districts are not required to use the Modernization funding on the same building that generated the eligibility.

Districts are not required to use all available Modernization eligibility at one time; however, regulations specify the minimum number of pupil grants that must be requested on a project. The eligibility baseline can be drawn down all at once, or, over the course of multiple projects. The Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) does not inquire about a school district's intent if the school district does not request all available pupil grants in a Form SAB 50-04, as it is allowable and common under the Modernization program for school districts to draw down from their pupil grant eligibility over the course of multiple projects.

Amending the Application for Funding During Processing

Once a request for a base grant is submitted, staff will process the application for funding if sufficient funding authority exists under the program. Through a "15-Day Letter" and "4-Day Letter" process, staff works with school district staff and the school district's consultants (if applicable) to correct any errors in the application for funding request. During this process, school districts are not permitted to increase the pupil grant request unless the current request is below the minimum specified in SFP Regulations. Currently, regulations require at least 52 Non-Severe grants, or 36 Severe grants, or 101 K-12 grants. School districts with less than the required minimum available must request all remaining eligibility at the site.

Program regulations require that the school district certify that 60 percent of the total approved project funding is for construction activities as part of its funding request. If the project is not 60 percent commensurate, the funding request must be decreased accordingly. Districts may decide to remove the optional supplemental grants from their funding request or reduce the pupil grant request, provided the final request still exceeds the required minimums. Staff verifies the 60 percent construction certification at the time the application is processed to ensure the total funding requested is allowable.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS (cont.)

Line Jumping

School districts are prohibited from increasing initial pupil grant requests unless their request was below the minimum specified in SFP Regulations, as it is considered “line jumping” and can provide an unfair advantage over other school districts. For example, a school district could submit an application for funding for the current pupils on its eligibility baseline for an intended project. However, during the interim years until OPSC processes the application, new work may be identified by the school district. By adding more pupils to the originally submitted project, the school district has added work that was not certified to on the original funding application. Had the school district waited until all work was CDE and DSA approved, the project would have been processed later in time, assuming authority for the project was available. School districts are allowed to add work to the project but must stay within the original funding request; additionally, the CDE and DSA approval must be obtained prior to the original submittal date of the application.

Status of Funds and Adjusted Grant Application for Funding

Adding more pupils to the original funding request results in more funding for the application, which in turn pushes additional applications further down, or even off the workload list. Following the June 26, 2024 Board meeting, the SFP has approximately \$916 million in funding remaining for New Construction and Modernization projects. Through May 31, 2024, OPSC received approximately \$3.5 billion in SFP New Construction and Modernization funding requests beyond the available program authority. It is currently unknown whether future funding will become available for the program, pending voter consideration of a statewide school facilities bond in the November 2024 election.

In the case of this project, on November 19, 2012, the District submitted the request for design funding Form SAB 50-04 that included the request of 74 K-6 pupil grants and 26 7-8 pupil grants, which was all of the eligibility the District was eligible for at the time. At this time, the Board was not processing applications and the application was placed on the Applications Received Beyond Bond Authority List. The next request to update eligibility was not submitted until February 26, 2014. Effectively, the design funding application submitted in November 2012 appears to have been a placeholder application in anticipation of future eligibility being made available by the time it was processed, which is only permissible if the increased eligibility is requested at the time the application is initially submitted and not during processing of the application.

Additional Considerations

In its appeal request, the District stated that had the eligibility adjustments been processed, the District would have requested the resulting additional eligibility in the full grant application. Currently, due to staffing limitations, OPSC only processes eligibility adjustments needed to support funding applications.

The District indicates the project plans were prepared based on their expected full eligibility with the eligibility adjustments. School districts are permitted to request all funding they believe they are eligible to request; however, it is the responsibility of the school district to complete the form with the desired request. It should be noted that in processing the District’s eligibility, staff determined that the District did not have all of the eligibility they thought was available. Once staff completed a review of all updates, the District’s eligibility request resulted in three K-6 and one 7-8 less pupil grants fewer.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS (cont.)

Minimum Pupil Grant Requests

Between the August 2023 Apportionment and February 2024 appeal request, staff was notified on January 4, 2024 that the two eligibility updates had not been processed. Upon initial review, staff determined that had the eligibility updates been processed, funding the application for 100 total pupil grants was incorrect and the application should have been required to increase the pupil grant request in the application to 101 grants, the minimum required by SFP regulations. However, the increase in one pupil grant of funding (\$6,436 at the 7-8 grade level) will be negated by a change in the District's supplemental grants, which would result in a net reduction of \$42,332. This is largely because the small size project grant would be reduced from 12 percent (for projects requesting 100 or fewer pupil grants) to four percent (for projects requesting 101 to 200 pupil grants).

As it was staff's error in not correcting the District's pupil grant request to the minimum required by SFP regulations, staff is not requesting the correction at this time.

Conclusion

Staff does not support the District's request to provide additional funding using additional pupil grant eligibility that was not part of the District's original application for funding, as doing so is considered to be line jumping and an unfair advantage to the District. Approval of the appeal would also result in less or even zero funding available to other projects currently being processed. However, staff supports reinstatement of the District's original apportionment and allowing the District 365 days to submit a valid Form SAB 50-05 to retain the funding previously approved.

The District has the option to submit a second application for SFP Modernization program funding for the remaining pupil grants, which would be processed and presented to the Board based on date order received. However, the SFP is currently oversubscribed, and the Board would be unable to provide funding for the project unless additional funding is provided to the SFP.

BOARD OPTIONS

Pursuant to the Rules and Procedures of the State Allocation Board, "Staff is providing the following option for the Board's consideration. A positive vote by six members is required for the Board to take action that is an alternative to Staff's administrative action. Absent a positive vote by six members of the Board, Staff's administrative action will stand, and the school district's appeal will be considered closed."

Option 1: Approve the reinstatement of the original Apportionment as approved by the Board on August 23, 2023. Require the District to submit a valid *Fund Release Authorization* (Form SAB 50-05) within 365 days of the reinstated Apportionment.

Option 2: Approve the District's appeal request.

RECOMMENDATION

Approve Option 1.

This Item (Option #1) was approved by the State Allocation Board on September 25, 2024.

Per your email and further discussion the time to have increased the grant request between design and final funding would have been with the initial 50-04 submitted for the final funding. The initial 50-04 submitted for the final funding, received on October 8, 2019, requested 74 K-6 and 26 7-8 pupil grants. This did not include the eligibility update requested in 2018.

In regards to the funding application, we can process an E&O to the SAB to increase the pupil grant request by one. This amended funding item would be funded under 2023 grant amounts. The original funding application requested 74 K-6 and 26 7-8 pupil grants, for a total grant request of 100 pupil grants. Should the modernization eligibility update result in more pupil grants being available (which appears to be the case), the District may increase the pupil grant request up to a total of 101 pupil grants per SFP Regulation Section 1859.79.3 by submitting a revised Form SAB 50-04. Increasing pupil grants to meet the requirements of SFP Regulation Section 1859.79.3 is the only circumstance in which our office allows Districts to increase the pupil grant request beyond what was originally requested without requiring a new application received date.

With this being the problem the District would have requested the additional eligibility for the final funding application if the State had processed the eligibility update at the proper time. With mistakes being made on both sides the District asks that the SAB make an exception and allow the full funding application be processed with the eligibility available at the time of the application.

AUTHORITY

Education Code (EC) Section 17070.35 states:

(a) In addition to all other powers and duties as are granted to the board by this chapter, other statutes, or the California Constitution, the board shall do all of the following:

(1) Adopt rules and regulations, pursuant to the rulemaking provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act, Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, for the administration of this chapter. However, the board shall have no authority to set the level of the fees of any architect, structural engineer, or other design professional on any project. The initial regulations adopted pursuant to this chapter shall be adopted as emergency regulations, and the circumstances related to the initial adoption are hereby deemed to constitute an emergency for this purpose. The initial regulations adopted pursuant to this chapter shall be adopted by November 4, 1998. If the initial regulations are not adopted by that date, the board shall report to the Legislature by that date, explaining the reasons for the delay.

(2) Establish and publish any procedures and policies in connection with the administration of this chapter as it deems necessary.

(3) Determine the eligibility of school districts to receive apportionments under this chapter.

(4) Apportion funds to eligible school districts under this chapter.

(b) The board shall review and amend its regulations as necessary to adjust its administration of this chapter to conform with the act that amended this section to add this subdivision. Regulations adopted pursuant to this subdivision shall be adopted by November 5, 2002, and shall be adopted as emergency regulations in accordance with the rulemaking provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code). The adoption of any emergency regulation pursuant to this subdivision filed with the Office of Administrative Law shall be deemed to be an emergency and necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, or general welfare. Notwithstanding subdivision (e) of Section 11346.1 of the Government Code, any emergency regulation adopted pursuant to this section shall remain in effect for no more than 365 days unless the board has complied with Sections 11346.2 to 11348, inclusive, of the Government Code.

EC Section 17073.10.

Each school district that desires to receive an apportionment for modernization under this chapter shall submit an application in a form, and in the number of copies, that the board may require.

EC Section 17073.15.

A school district is eligible to receive an apportionment for the modernization of a permanent school building that is more than 25 years old or a portable classroom that is at least 20 years old. A school district is eligible to receive an additional apportionment for the modernization of a permanent school building every 25 years after the date of the previous apportionment or a portable classroom every 20 years after the previous apportionment.

ATTACHMENT B

EC Section 17073.20.

Funding may be approved for the modernization of any permanent school building that is more than 25 years old, or any portable classroom that is more than 20 years old, as described in Section 17071.30.

School Facility Program (SFP) Regulation Section 1859.2 defines the following:

...

“Application” means a request pursuant to the Act to receive an eligibility determination and/or funding for a school project.

“Applications Received Beyond Bond Authority List” means an informational list of applications submitted to the Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) and presented to the Board. Funding applications placed on this list contain the preliminary grant amounts requested by a district. The OPSC has not determined that the Approved Application(s) are Ready for Apportionment.

“Approved Application(s)” means a district has submitted the application and all documents to the Office of Public School Construction that are required to be submitted with the application as identified in the General Information Section of Forms SAB 50-01; SAB 50-02; SAB 50-03; and SAB 50-04, as specified in Section 1859.2.

...

“Existing School Building Capacity” means the district’s total capacity to house pupils as calculated pursuant to Sections 1859.30 through 1859.33.

...

Form SAB 50-01” means the *Enrollment Certification/Projection*, Form SAB 50-01 (Revised 05/09), and, when utilizing HSAA residency reporting, the High School Attendance Area Residency Reporting Worksheet (New 06/08), which are incorporated by reference.

“Form SAB 50-02” means the *Existing School Building Capacity*, Form SAB 50-02 (Revised 12/10), which is incorporated by reference.

“Form SAB 50-03” means the *Eligibility Determination*, Form SAB 50-03 (Revised 12/10), which is incorporated by reference.

“Form SAB 50-04” means the *Application for Funding*, Form SAB 50-04 (Revised 05/20), which is incorporated by reference.

...

“Modernization” shall have the meaning set forth in Education Code Section 17070.15(f) for purposes of projects subject to Subgroup 5.5, Article 2, commencing with Section 1859 or Education Code Section 17021 under the Lease-Purchase Program.

“Modernization Adjusted Grant” means the Modernization Grant, plus any other funding provided by these Regulations.

“Modernization Grant” means the funding provided pursuant to Education Code Section 17074.10(a) and Sections 1859.78, 1859.78.3, 1859.78.6, and 1859.78.8.

“Modernization Eligibility” means the result of the calculation contained in either Option A or B of the Form SAB 50-03.

...

“New Construction Adjusted Grant” means the New Construction Grant, plus any other funding provided by these Regulations.

ATTACHMENT B

...

“New Construction Eligibility” means the result of the calculation determined in Education Code Section 17071.75.

“New Construction Grant” means the funding provided pursuant to Education Code Section 17072.10(a) and Sections 1859.71 and 1859.71.1.

...

“Pupil” means a student enrolled in any grade Kindergarten through grade twelve.

...

“School Building Capacity” shall have the meaning set forth in Education Code Section 17070.15(l).

...

SFP Regulation Section 1859.20

A School District seeking a determination of eligibility for a SFP project shall complete and file the following documents with the OPSC:

- (a) For new construction, either districtwide, HSAA, or Super HSAA, or for modernization projects, the Form SAB 50-03.
- (b) For new construction projects, either districtwide, HSAA or Super HSAA, the Form SAB 50-01.
- (c) For new construction projects, the Form SAB 50-02.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.21

A School District seeking funding for a modernization or new construction project shall complete and file with the OPSC, the Form SAB 50-04.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.60

The district shall calculate its modernization eligibility for each school site with the completion of the Form SAB 50-03. The eligibility determination may be made by either identifying all classrooms on the site pursuant to (a) or by the identification of all square footage on the site pursuant to (b), as follows:

- (a) Identify all classrooms at the school site that would have been included in the Gross Classroom Inventory pursuant to Section 1859.31 that are:
 - (1) Permanent and at least 25 years old.
 - (2) Portable and at least 20 years old.
 - (3) The remaining classrooms not reported in (1) or (2) above.
- (b) Identify all square footage at the school site that is:
 - (1) Permanent area and at least 25 years old.
 - (2) Portable classroom area and at least 20 years old.
 - (3) The remaining square footage on the site not reported in (1) or (2) above.

The age of the classroom or square footage shall begin 12 months after the plans for the building were approved by the DSA; or in the case of permanent or portable classrooms that were previously modernized with State funds or rehabilitated under the Charter School Facilities Program, the 25/20 year period shall begin on the date of its previous apportionment. For purposes of identifying square footage at a school site, include the total enclosed exterior square footage of the school buildings. For multilevel buildings, include the square footage at each level.

ATTACHMENT B

Enrollment at the school shall be the latest CBEDS report for K-6, 7-8 and 9-12 pupils. If the school is closed at the time of application for eligibility determination for modernization, and the district intends to reopen it and use it as a school for at least the next five years, the enrollment may be estimated based on district demographic data.

The calculated eligibility determined on the Form SAB 50-03, shall be referred to as the modernization baseline eligibility for the specific school site.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.70

(a) A district seeking New Construction or Modernization funding shall complete and file Form SAB 50-04, concurrently or after completing the applicable requirements in Sections 1859.20 and 1859.40. The Board shall only provide New Construction funding if the Approved Application was received by the OPSC prior to the date of Occupancy for any classrooms included in the construction contract. After the date of Occupancy of any classroom in the construction contract, a School District will be ineligible to seek New Construction funding and the classrooms will be reduced from the baseline eligibility pursuant to Section 1859.51(i) if not previously reduced.

(b) A district affected by a reorganization election on or after November 4, 1998 may file an application for New Construction funding after the notification of the reorganization election. The School District must submit a new calculation of the district's baseline eligibility as determined on the Form SAB 50-03 upon written notification, or certify that the reorganization election will not result in a loss of eligibility for the project for which the School District is requesting new construction grants. For all requests for funding received by the OPSC on or after June 6, 2017, the OPSC will notify the School District in writing that OPSC is scheduled to begin processing the School District's Form SAB 50-04. The School District must submit a completed Form SAB 50-03 within 90 calendar days of OPSC's notification. OPSC may return the Form SAB 50-04 to the School District for failure to submit the Form SAB 50-03 within 90 calendar days of OPSC's notification.

A School District that is newly created as a result of a reorganization election may file an application for funding after approval of the election has been made by the State Board of Education.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.79.3

(a) With the exception of Approved Applications that meet the requirements of Section 1859.107(a), districts seeking a Modernization Grant must submit Form SAB 50-04 for any one of the following:

- (1) at least 52 Non-Severe grants, or
- (2) at least 36 Severe grants, or
- (3) at least 101 grants, or
- (4) the remaining modernization eligibility at the school site if less than the grants in (1), (2), or (3).

(b) Form SAB 50-04 requesting Modernization Grant funds that do not meet the above criteria will not be accepted by the SAB.

ATTACHMENT B

SFP Regulation Section 1859.95.1

This Section shall not apply to Approved Application for Joint-Use Funding, Approved Application for Career Technical Education Facilities Project Funding, a Form SAB 50-04 submitted for Critically Overcrowded Schools Facilities funding, (commencing with Section 1859.140), Charter School Facilities Program funding (commencing with Section 1859.160), or for Overcrowding Relief Grants.

(a) When the Board has Insufficient Bond Authority to apportion the School District's funding request on the Form SAB 50-04, the following will apply:

(1) The Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) will receive and determine if the Form SAB 50-04 is an Approved Application. To be placed on the Applications Received Beyond Bond Authority List, the Approved Application for funding shall be accompanied by a school board resolution, as specified in paragraph (b) of this Section. The OPSC will not determine if the Approved Application is Ready for Apportionment.

(2) A School District seeking financial hardship funding will not be required to submit a financial hardship status preapproval request pursuant to Section 1859.81. The OPSC will not process requests for financial hardship status. The School District may continue to submit the Form SAB 50-04 pursuant to (a)(1).

(b) A resolution from the governing board of the school district shall be submitted with the Form SAB 50-04 prior to the Approved Application being placed on the Applications Received Beyond Bond Authority List, pursuant to paragraph (a) of this Regulation. A School District's governing board resolution shall include paragraphs (b)(1) through (b)(5) or, if applying for financial hardship funding, paragraphs (b)(1) through (b)(6).

(1) The school board acknowledges that the remaining School Facility Program bond authority is currently exhausted for the funds being requested on this application.

(2) The school board acknowledges that the State of California is not expected nor obligated to provide funding for the project and the acceptance of the application does not provide a guarantee of future State funding.

(3) The school board acknowledges that any potential future State bond measures for the School Facility Program may not provide funds for the application being submitted.

(4) The school board acknowledges that criteria (including, but not limited to, funding, qualifications, and eligibility) under a future State school facilities program may be substantially different than the current School Facility Program. The district's Approved Application may be returned.

(5) The school board acknowledges that they are electing to commence any pre-construction or construction activities at the district's discretion and that the State is not responsible for any pre-construction or construction activities.

(6) The school board acknowledges that, if bond authority becomes available for the Board to provide funding for the submitted application, the School District must apply for financial hardship status.

(c) The OPSC will continue to receive and determine if the Forms SAB 50-01, 50-02, and 50-03 are Approved Applications. The OPSC will not determine if the Approved Application is Ready for Apportionment. This Regulation Section does not constitute notification from the Board pursuant to Government Code Section 65995.5(b)(1).

PURPOSE OF REPORT

To present the District's request to reinstate the apportionment for a Career Technical Education Facilities Program (CTEFP) project at Rancho Buena Vista High School.

DESCRIPTION

The District has a CTEFP project at Rancho Buena Vista High School, application number 55/68452-00-005, that was approved by the State Allocation Board (Board) for placement on the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans) on September 30, 2020.

Most recently, the District received a Reservation of Funds Apportionment on October 26, 2022 and had until October 26, 2023 to submit the required California Department of Education (CDE) plan approval(s) and Division of the State Architect (DSA) approved plans and specifications to the Office of Public School Construction (OPSC). OPSC received the required CDE plan approval and DSA-approved plans and specifications on October 25, 2023; therefore, under the Priority Funding Process, the District had 90 days, until January 23, 2024, to submit a *Fund Release Authorization* (Form SAB 50-05).

The District did not submit required documentation by the deadline; therefore, this project was rescinded without further Board action, pursuant to School Facility Program (SFP) Regulation Section 1859.90.2(c).

The District is requesting that the Board reinstate the CTEFP project and provide it with an Apportionment in the amount of \$1,374,914.00.

BACKGROUND

District and Project History

Rancho Buena Vista High School is a high school serving 1,962 pupils in Ninth through Twelfth Grade. This school is in Vista Unified School District, located in San Diego County.

CTEFP Reservation of Funds Process

As stated in SFP Regulations, a school district that meets the eligibility criteria for a CTEFP application but does not yet have the required plan approvals from DSA and CDE at the time of Apportionment may receive a Reservation of Funds Apportionment. Per SFP Regulation Section 1859.193(d), the Board may apportion funds for such CTEFP projects and reserve the funds for "a period of up to 12 months."

BACKGROUND (cont.)

For projects that receive a Reservation of Funds Apportionment, SFP Regulation Section 1859.197(b) prescribes that an applicant with this type of project “has one year from the date of Apportionment to submit the CDE plan approval and DSA-approved plans and specifications, as required, to the OPSC” for the application. If the applicant does not submit these documents within the set timeframe, this section requires that “the Apportionment shall be rescinded without further Board action.”

To assist applicants in meeting this requirement, staff sends multiple reminder letters and emails to school districts outlining the required documents and the date the documentation must be submitted. Additional outreach by phone is conducted as needed.

The project was approved by the Board for placement on the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans) on September 30, 2020. Following the approval, on December 3, 2020, the District submitted a request for Apportionment during the Priority Funding Filing Round that opened in November 2020. This allowed the District to receive a Reservation of Funds Apportionment on April 28, 2021.

As a condition of approval for this CTEFP Reservation of Funds project, the District had 12 months from the date the Board approved the Reservation of Funds Apportionment to submit the required CDE plan approval and DSA approved plans and specifications to OPSC.

On April 26, 2022, the District submitted a letter requesting for the Apportionment be rescinded and for the application be returned to the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans). The District required additional time to obtain the required CDE and DSA plan approvals in order to proceed with the project. The Board approved the District’s request at the June 6, 2022 meeting and the project received one occurrence for non-participation in the priority funding process.

On May 26, 2022, the District submitted a second request for an Apportionment during the Priority Funding Filing Round that opened in May 2022. This allowed the District to receive another Reservation of Funds Apportionment on October 26, 2022. The District had until October 26, 2023 to submit the required CDE plan approval and DSA approved plans and specifications to OPSC.

OPSC received the required CDE plan approval and DSA approved plans and specifications on October 25, 2023; therefore, under the Priority Funding Process, the District had 90 days, until January 23, 2024, to submit a *Fund Release Authorization* (Form SAB 50-05).

The District did not submit the Form SAB 50-05 by the deadline; therefore, this project was rescinded without further Board action, pursuant to SFP Regulation Section 1859.90.2(c).

On April 5, 2024, the District submitted a *School District Appeal Request* (Form SAB 189) to request that the Board reinstate the CTEFP project and provide the District with an Apportionment in the amount of \$1,374,914.00.

BACKGROUND (cont.)

The application that is the subject of this appeal is a CTEFP new construction project that consisted of the demolition of five classrooms and the construction of a new 13,500 square foot multi-story building. The building was to include instructional and lab spaces, a collaboration area, restrooms, circulation space, and utility spaces. Spaces on the bottom level were to have floor to ceiling windows between classrooms and lab spaces to allow instructors to visually supervise at all times. An outside open workspace was planned to allow for larger projects to be completed. Locked storage was to be integrated into interior and exterior spaces. Working with a local industry partner, high output solar tubular daylighting devices were planned to be installed.

This CTEFP project for the Machining and Forming Technologies Pathway under the Manufacturing and Product Development Industry Sector was planned for occupation of the bottom floor with two classrooms, each with a corresponding lab. This project consisted of 1,119.69 square feet of lecture space and 1,119.69 square feet of lab space, giving the pathway a total of 2,239.38 square feet of learning space.

The project was redesigned after it became apparent that the project would be cost prohibitive due to the height requirements of the dust and fume removal systems. The larger building envelope would have required 15 to 20 feet of ceiling height. Instead, the new scope built the two classrooms in a new one-story building. The project is still in the Manufacturing and Product Development Industry Sector; however, the project will now serve the Welding and Materials Joining Pathway.

BACKGROUND (cont.)

Status of the Project

Construction commenced in the summer of 2022 and has since been completed. The District will file the Notice of Completion in the near future and the classrooms have already been occupied by enrolled students.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS

District Position

In its appeal request, the District states the following:

The change of scope in the CTEFP application resulted in a net increase to the available square footage for teaching and learning for the specified programs. This change involved moving from a six classroom two-story building for multiple programs to a dedicated two-classroom single story building. The dedicated facility represents a more ideal learning environment for the program the grant was written for.

The full text of the District's request is included as Attachment A.

Staff Position

Reinstatement of a Rescinded Funding Application

SFP Regulations do not provide a mechanism to reinstate a project once it has been rescinded. While school districts can submit new funding applications for eligible CTEFP projects, school districts may only do so during a scheduled CTEFP funding cycle. The last scheduled CTEFP funding cycle, Cycle 6, closed its submittal window on June 30, 2020. Currently, there is insufficient funding to support a new CTEFP funding cycle.

Because all remaining CTEFP bond authority is nearly exhausted, the establishment of future CTEFP funding cycles and the possibility for the District to re-submit this application, is subject to additional funds being made available to the CTEFP.

Scope Change Requests

Applications for funding are typically accompanied by CDE and DSA-approved plans for the construction of the project. The Board's approval of the project funding is full and final and based on the plans accompanying the project. In the case of CTEFP projects, the application is first reviewed and scored by CDE. Flexibility is recognized as part of SFP projects; however, the intent or project scope must be maintained. In some circumstances, staff may present a school district's request for a scope change to the Board.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS (cont.)

General guidelines for scope changes have been in place since 2005. A change of scope in certain situations may be permitted if the following conditions are met:

- CDE and DSA have approved the changes in the plans.
- For new construction and modernization projects, the amended project meets the 60 percent commensurate requirement.
- The original intent/purpose of the project is maintained.
- For CTEFP projects, the updated Career Technical Education (CTE) application score must not result in a lower score than the original scope of work.

Staff reviewed the District's request and determined that the scope change still meets all criteria to qualify for the CTEFP. The new project scope aligns with the intended scope of work included in the original application. Staff has analyzed the DSA-approved plans and determined that the change request will not require a change in funding. No additional funding has been requested by the District, and no discernable funding advantage would result from the Board's approval of the District's appeal.

DSA/CDE Approvals

This District obtained DSA and CDE approval and submitted them to OPSC by the October 26, 2023 deadline. Had the District submitted a *School District Appeal Request* (Form SAB 189) for the scope change prior to the deadline to request fund release on January 23, 2024, OPSC would not have rescinded the application pending the Board's approval/denial of the scope change request.

CTE Application Score

The CTEFP is a competitive program. Applications are scored by CDE and funded in filing rounds, with a minimum score requirement. The highest scoring applications are funded first. The District's project, as submitted, received a score of 118.5 out of 141 on January 24, 2019. OPSC has confirmed with CDE that the revised scope would have resulted in the same CTE application score.

School District Appeal Request Submittal

The District did not submit an appeal until April 5, 2024. Had the District submitted the appeal prior to the January 23, 2024 deadline, OPSC would not have rescinded the apportionment until the Board addressed the District's scope change request, which likely would have been presented in the Consent Agenda. The delays occurred on both the part of OPSC and the District.

During, and following, the submittal of DSA and CDE plan approvals to OPSC, staff noted the scope change and informed the District that further review and meetings with CDE would need to occur. OPSC met with CDE, and updated approval letters were provided. After receipt of the updated CDE plan approval letter on October 25, 2023, OPSC was delayed in providing additional next steps to the District until December 22, 2023.

At the time next steps were provided to the District, the District was closed for the holiday season. Upon return from the break, the District stated that its focus was on the Governor's budget news and that they were not aware of the December email until OPSC staff checked in on January 24, 2024.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS (cont.)

Conclusion

It is ultimately up to school districts to meet deadlines, and OPSC has always provided reminders prior to and during the holiday season that OPSC continues to process applications. Staff acknowledges that in this case, communication with the District could have been timelier prior to the holidays. However, staff does not have the administrative ability to approve the District's request and SFP Regulations do not provide a mechanism to reinstate the Apportionment.

Staff reviewed the District's request and determined that the outcome of the scope change still meets all criteria to qualify for the CTEFP. The new project scope aligns with the intended scope of work included in the original application and the CTE application score would have resulted in the same score.

Staff supports the District's appeal. If the Board approves the District's appeal, staff recommends the Board require the District to submit a valid Form SAB 50-05 within 90 days, by December 24, 2024.

BOARD OPTION

Pursuant to the Rules and Procedures of the State Allocation Board, "Staff is providing the following option for the Board's consideration. A positive vote by six members is required for the Board to take action that is an alternative to Staff's administrative action. Absent a positive vote by six members of the Board, Staff's administrative action will stand, and the school district's appeal will be considered closed."

Option: Approve the District's appeal request.

BOARD ACTION

In considering this Item, the Board approved the District's appeal request which reinstated the apportionment for a Career Technical Education Facilities Program project at Rancho Buena Vista High School.

Application 1213 outlines the District's intention to build learning spaces to support Manufacturing and Product Design (grant application title) pathways to support up to 30 students per period, in the equivalent of two (2) project classrooms, serving up to an annual number of 150 students, at construction cost of no less than \$2,749,828.00 (actual construction costs exceed this amount) for a State Funds Matching applicability of \$1,374,914.00. This now completed industrial arts building exceeds these requirements and meets all known intentions of the grant, pathway, industry sectors, and all applicable scoring elements of the grant. A change in construction strategy was utilized to only focus on the industrial arts section of these programs as outlined in the District application 1213. Industry sector and pathways elements of application 1213 was called out in the title of the grant with applicable square footage and pathways highlighted in grant application page 6, PART 5: Educational Specifications and Equipment/Space Requirements, with specific references to the industry sector and pathways called out in accordance with this section in Appendix E, page 67-68. In Appendix E, page 68, highlighted areas for construction include 2210.19 total square feet of instructional square feet. Actual construction square footage exceeds these requirements while supporting the applied for industry sector. Several factors influenced our decision to change pathways. The change from machining and forming technologies to welding and materials joining (Appendix A) represents the same industry sector with a similar number of high skill, high wage, jobs/careers available locally. According to the Centers for Excellence in Labor Market Research, the local median average salary for workers in welding and materials joining exceeds that of workers in machining and forming technologies by \$5,000 a year per graduate. In addition, after consultation with other local LEAs, we determined that the likelihood of finding a qualified appropriately credentialed instructor for welding and materials joining was higher than machining and forming technologies. As soon as the district decided to make this change, a formal scope of work request was submitted to the California Department of Education (CDE) which was officially approved on 5/4/23.

(c) The program shall be based on grant applications administered by the board.

- (d) Grants shall be allocated on a per-square-foot basis for the applicable type of construction proposed or deemed necessary by the board consistent with the approved application for the project.
- (e) New construction grants shall not exceed three million dollars (\$3,000,000) per project per schoolsite, inclusive of equipment, and shall only be allocated to comprehensive high schools that have an active Career Technical Advisory Committee pursuant to Section 8070, in either of the following methods:
- (1) For a stand-alone project on a per-square-foot basis for the applicable type of construction proposed, based on the criteria established pursuant to subdivision (b), consistent with the approved application for the project.
 - (2) For new school projects, as a supplement to the per pupil allocation pursuant to Section 17072.10. The supplement is intended to cover excess costs uniquely related to the facilities required to provide the career technical education program or programs.
- (f) Modernization grants shall not exceed one million five hundred thousand dollars (\$1,500,000) per project per schoolsite, inclusive of equipment and may be awarded to comprehensive high schools or joint power authorities currently operating career technical education programs that have an active Career Technical Advisory Committee pursuant to Section 8070 for the purpose of reconfiguration. For comprehensive high schools, the grant shall be supplemental to the per pupil allocation pursuant to Section 17074.10. The supplement is intended to cover excess costs uniquely related to the facilities required to provide the career technical education program or programs.
- (g)(1) A school district shall contribute from local resources a dollar amount that is equal to the amount of the grant of state funds awarded under subdivisions (d), (e), and (f). The required local contribution may be provided by private industry groups, the school district, or a joint powers authority.
- (2) A school district shall not be required to demonstrate that it has unhoused pupils or that a permanent school building is more than 25 years old in order to receive a grant under the program.
- (h) The program shall allow the required local contribution to be paid over time if sufficient local funds are not immediately available. The board may provide for a repayment schedule consistent with subparagraphs (C) and (D) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (a) of Section 17078.57. The board shall not waive the required local contribution on the basis of financial hardship or on any other basis.
- (i) Applications shall meet the criteria developed under subdivision (b) and shall require all of the following:
- (1) A clear and comprehensive career technical education plan for each course of study applicable to the instructional space.
 - (2) Projections of pupil enrollment.
 - (3) Identification of feeder schools, industry partners, and community colleges or other postsecondary schools participating in the development, articulation, and review of the educational program.
 - (4) Evidence of approval of the plan by the entities listed in paragraph (3).
 - (5) The method by which accountability for pupil enrollments and outcomes will be maintained. Outcomes shall include, but are not limited to, certificate completion, the successful entry of pupil to employment in the applicable industry, and successful transition to post-secondary institutions for work in the applicable industry or other areas of study.

6) Evidence of coordination with all feeder schools, middle schools, and high schools within the area to ensure that the project and programs complement career technical education offerings in the area.

(7) Evidence that upon completion of the project the local educational agency will meet all of its obligations under Section 51228 relating to career technical education.

(j) Applications shall give weight to the number of pupils expected to attend, the cost per pupil, financial participation by industry partners in the construction and equipping of the facility, commitment to accountability for outcomes and participation, the strength and relevance of the educational plans to the needs of industry for qualified technical employees applicable to the economic development needs of the region in which the project will be located, and coordination and articulation with feeder schools, other high schools, and community colleges.

(k) The Office of Public School Construction shall develop and the board shall approve regulations to implement this article on or before April 19, 2007, and the board may promulgate those regulations first on an emergency basis, which shall be effective for no more than 12 months, after which any permanent regulations shall be promulgated in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code).

(l) Notwithstanding paragraphs (e) and (f), a project approved pursuant to this section is also eligible for an incentive grant from the funds specified in paragraph (8) of subdivision (a) of Section 101012 if the project meets the criteria prescribed in that section.

E.C. 51224

The governing board of any school district maintaining a high school shall prescribe courses of study designed to provide the skills and knowledge required for adult life for pupils attending the schools within its school district. (a) A pupil shall complete all of the following while in grades 9 to 12, inclusive, in order to receive a diploma of graduation from high school:

(1) At least the following numbers of courses in the subjects specified, each course having a duration of one year, unless otherwise specified:

(A) Three courses in English.

(B) Two courses in mathematics. If the governing board of a school district requires more than two courses in mathematics for graduation, the governing board of the school district may award a pupil up to one mathematics course credit pursuant to Section 51225.35.

(C) Two courses in science, including biological and physical sciences.

(D) Three courses in social studies, including United States history and geography; world history, culture, and geography; a one-semester course in American government and civics; and a one-semester course in economics.

ATTACHMENT A

(E) One course in visual or performing arts or foreign language. For purposes of satisfying the requirement specified in this subparagraph, a course in American Sign Language shall be deemed a course in foreign language.

(F) Two courses in physical education, unless the pupil has been exempted pursuant to the provisions of this code.

(2) Other coursework requirements adopted by the governing board of the school district.

(b) The governing board, with the active involvement of parents, administrators, teachers, and pupils, shall adopt alternative means for pupils to complete the prescribed course of study that may include practical demonstration of skills and competencies, supervised work experience or other outside school experience, career technical education classes offered in high schools, courses offered by regional occupational centers or programs, interdisciplinary study, independent study, and credit earned at a postsecondary educational institution. Requirements for graduation and specified alternative modes for completing the prescribed course of study shall be made available to pupils, parents, and the public.

(c) If a pupil completed a career technical education course that met the requirements of subparagraph (E) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (a) of Section 51225.3, as amended by the act adding this section, before the inoperative date of that section, that course shall be deemed to fulfill the requirements of subparagraph (E) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (a) of this section.

(d) This section shall become operative upon the date that Section 51225.3, as amended by the act adding this section, becomes inoperative.

E.C. 51228

(a) Each school district maintaining any of grades 7 to 12, inclusive, shall offer to all otherwise qualified pupils in those grades a course of study fulfilling the requirements and prerequisites for admission to the California public institutions of postsecondary education and shall provide a timely opportunity to each of those pupils to enroll within a four-year period in each course necessary to fulfill those requirements and prerequisites prior to graduation from high school.

b) Each school district maintaining any of grades 7 to 12, inclusive, shall offer to all otherwise qualified pupils in those grades a course of study that provides an opportunity for those pupils to attain entry-level employment skills in business or industry upon graduation from high school. Districts are encouraged to provide all pupils with a rigorous academic curriculum that integrates academic and career skills, incorporates applied learning in all disciplines, and prepares all pupils for high school graduation and career entry.

(c) A school district that adopts a required curriculum that meets or exceeds the model standards developed and adopted by the state board pursuant to Section 51226 shall be deemed to have fulfilled its responsibilities pursuant to subdivision (b).

d) A school district that adopts a required curriculum pursuant to subdivision (c) that meets or exceeds the model standards developed by the state board pursuant to Section 51226, or that adopts alternative means for pupils to complete the prescribed course of study pursuant to subdivision (b) of Section 51225.3, may substitute pupil demonstration of competence in the prescribed subjects through a practical demonstration of these skills in a regional occupational center or program, work experience, interdisciplinary study, independent study, credit earned at a postsecondary institution, or other outside school experience, as prescribed by Section 51225.3.



ISSUE/BACKGROUND:

Proposition 51 was passed by the voters on November 8, 2016. As outlined in the proposition, the use of the funds were to provide K-12 and Community College facilities funds for new construction, modernization, career technical education (CTE) facilities, and charter school facilities.

The CTE coordinator, Kelly McKinney, has been working with Rancho Buena Vista High and Vista High schools to submit applications to support pathways at each of the sites. Vista High school is planning on submitting for VHS Agriculture. Rancho Buena Vista is looking at six (6) pathways for the following areas: Patient Care-Dental Hygienist, Health Care Administrative Services, Marketing, Engineer Design, Machining and Forming Technologies, and Residential and Commercial Constructions. Applications are due in October prior to the board meeting. District staff will work together and submit applications that will allow the District to maximize resources.

There is a required match that will be provided by the District which some of it would be funded from the Career Technical Education Grant, but the majority would need to come from other sources such as bond funds if the voters agree. There is no commitment on the District's part until such time as the award is made in December.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE

There is no cost to submit the applications. If approved, the District will have to identify a funding source for the matching-funds.

Administrative Content

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Abstract

Rancho Buena Vista High School (RBV) is a comprehensive high school within the Vista Unified School District (VUSD) which is located in North San Diego County. In 2017, RBV adopted areas of focus for the school with one of the three pillars being Career and Technical Education. The site embraced CTE and worked with counselors, staff and the district to expand the programs offered by allowing more students into the classes currently offered. However, there was still a high demand for CTE and the facilities needed to be modernized to meet the increasing demand. For the 2017-18 school year, RBV CTE programs have the highest enrollment in the district with the fewest pathways offered. Additionally, the number of underrepresented students in CTE courses continued to grow over the past three years exhibiting the commitment for access to all students at the school.

Creating an environment that allows students hands-on experience is the core of this proposal. RBV is 30 years old and has had little improvements over that time. Portable classrooms are small and dominate the footprint of the campus. This 21st century building would replace those portables and create a state of the art facility unlike anything in the area.

Rancho Buena Vista is located within 2 miles of the Vista Business Park. Why this is important to note is because 22,000-23,000 employees at 800-900 businesses go to work every day in the park. It covers 14 million square feet of industrial space where manufacturing company's employee the largest number of people. When we worked with the Vista Chamber of Commerce and industry partners located in the Business Park, they stressed the need for individuals who could be trained after high school. The owner Solartube, the largest employer in the Business Park, said he would hire anyone who had any knowledge of manufacturing and train them. The continued by stressing the need for soft skills, that are inherent with CTE courses. A building like the one in this application mirrors that facilities in the Business Park and from the street view looks more like a business than a school site.

Because this is a new pathway, the equipment requested is very limited. The district has committed to providing equipment needed in the Engineering pathway once the full course is developed.

Students in this pathway will have courses that are created with the UCCI curriculum as a guide, will be submitted for UC approval and articulation. We have worked closely with our feeder middle schools and Palomar College to create a 10-year plan for students.

This would be the first CTE building in our area. We believe that "if you build it, they will come" and a state of the art, 21st century learning Career and Technical Education facility will make our dream come true. VUSD and RBV are committed to preparing today's students for tomorrow's workplace and approval of this application is the next step in that commitment to our community.

Vista Unified School District-Manufacturing and Product Development

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PART 1: Career Technical Education Plan

Rancho Buena Vista High School is proposing an expansion in their CTE programs with the addition of a Machining and Product Development Pathway in the Manufacturing and Product Development Industry Sector.

VUSD has always maintained the importance of high-quality teachers across all disciplines and all current CTE teachers at RBV are credentialed high-quality. With new pathways, the district will recruit and hire only teachers with the necessary CTE credentials or who are eligible to receive the proper credential. The process for recruiting and hiring will involve current RBV CTE teachers, industry partners, and the local community college. Because of the specificity of the proposed pathways, industry experience will be the highest priority for potential candidates.

Manufacturing is a high demand sector in the San Diego. It is considered by the San Diego Workforce Partnership to be one of the seven priority sectors in the area with a five-year growth rate of 5.7%. In a recent report by the Community College Center for Excellence, there are 18 middle-skill occupations in Manufacturing with a labor demand of 5,061 annual openings and only 688 program certificates (labor market supply) creating a supply gap of 4373 potential trained employees. A state-of-the-art manufacturing pathway at RBV would create a pipeline to Palomar college that currently does not exist and help fill this gap. Furthermore, the EDD states that there is an increase in employment in the 2017-18 fiscal year continued projected growth. Specifically in Vista, industry leaders indicated that they have openings that go unfilled because there simply are not enough potential employees in the area.

The rationale for the construction of a new building, with multiple CTE classrooms, is based on input from the community, industry, and lack of proper facilities for CTE programs. In the spring of 2018, the VUSD surveyed the community as part of fact-finding to determine if a school bond would be feasible on the November ballot. The overwhelming response from the community was the need for more CTE courses with hands-on focus and career ready skills in safe environments. Industry echoed this need during pathway development advisory meetings. Additionally, RBV was constructed over 30 years ago. The school quickly outgrew the footprint and portable classrooms were added. These classrooms are not only deteriorating, but cannot meet the needs of a high quality CTE program. This new six pathway building would replace old portables and construct a state of the art building that would meet the needs of all students.

The VUSD LCAP is committed to increase student achievement to support and maintain high-quality, flexible, standards based core curriculum that is principally purposed to the needs of English Learners, Foster Youth/Homeless, Low Income, and Students with Disabilities. RBV is committed to fair and equal access to all students in the CTE programs by providing accessibility to all CTE programs to all students. RBV has a non-discrimination policy stating that it does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, disability, gender identity or expression or any other basis prohibited by California state and federal nondiscrimination laws respectively.

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RBV has many supports in place to give students the needed resources to be successful. The site has a strong AVID program and requires all freshmen to take either an AVID or Freshman Seminar course when they enter the school. These courses provide career education, expanded support in English and Math, and CTE exposure. Beginning with the class of 2021, the graduation requirements were changed which aligned the district and the state mandated courses and allowed students more flexibility in which classes they could take. Counselors meet one on one with the students to create four-year plans and career pathways are now integrated into those conversations. The master schedule now takes into consideration the need for students to complete pathways with the development of the College and Career Indicator Dashboard and schedules courses with this in mind.

With the expansion of CTE programs at RBV brings the need for in-depth professional development for teachers. A building with state-of-the-art equipment will require teachers to be trained in the use and care of the equipment. The collaborative and open teaching area will require training for teachers to use the personalized learning environment. In addition to training the teachers to facilitate certifications for students, industry will be a vital tour in working with the teachers to develop curriculum and understand the use of new equipment. RBV will encourage teachers to attend industry specific conferences to expand their depth of knowledge. Local professional development will also be offered so that all teachers insure they meet the minimum suggested four professional development activities per year of a high-quality CTE program.

Current and proposed CTE pathways at RBV are grounded in the CTE anchor standards and model curriculum standards. The anchor standards are consistent across all industry sectors and the pathway standards allow for specific learning to take place. Students will have the opportunity to expand their learning in three course pathways that are rigorous meeting the UC standards, focus on communication, understand career planning, and use current technology in the classroom. Through industry certifications, the students will learn to problem solve and understand health and safety requirements seen in industry. As student leaders in the classroom, they will learn responsibility, teamwork and how to operate in a legal and ethical manner. They will also be able to demonstrate their technical knowledge and application in a variety of means.

RBV will become active members in SkillsUSA where students will have a foundation in leadership development in addition to the opportunity to compete in regional events. Participating in school based clubs, in addition to CTSOs, RBV CTE students will model their achievement in the curriculum standards preparing them for the workplace or secondary education. In a new building, students will have an opportunity to learn in an environment that mirrors local industry and post-secondary partners.

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We consulted with industry professionals in regard to certifications that would be valuable for students in the Manufacturing Industry to receive before graduation. It was overwhelmingly recommended that students complete the OSHA ten-hour certification. This will provide students safety training during high school that can be transferred to the workplace. Additionally, students will be certified in First Aid and CPR.

The proposed project is a new pathway to RBV. Currently, programs are funded through the Career Technical Education Incentive Grant, Perkins and LCAP. As we move into a new funding model for CTEIG and Perkins, careful planning will need to be done in order to fiscally support the growth of this program. Also, Strong Workforce will be applied for to help the pathway since they are directly connected to a high demand pathway in the region according to the community colleges. Regardless of grant funding, VUSD is committed to expand the CTE programs with general fund unrestricted dollars, private grants and industry support to assist in the costs of staffing, materials and training for teachers.

More options are needed at RBV to give students choice in their post-secondary path. The proposed program not only leads to college but students could directly enter the workplace in a high demand career. As the demographics at RBV changed over the past 15 years, the courses that were offered did not reflect the school. A new building will allow for the expansion of high demand, hands-on courses that are so desperately needed in the area.

The VUSD Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP) as outlined in the Blueprint for Educational Excellence and Innovation for 2018-19 allocates funding that will support the development of a new building, additional technology and continued support of CTE. Strategy II focuses on 21st century facilities and resources to create and implement on-going technology and facilities that provide all students and staff with optional learning environments. While the plan does not allow for new construction, which this grant would provide, Strategy II, Action and Services 1, Step 3 provides for the ongoing support of the computer technology needed. It also implements a technology replacement plan for software and infrastructure needed. Strategy II, Action and Services 3 ensures facilities will be maintained in good repair and establishes scheduled short and long term maintenance. Strategy II, Action and Services 4 calls for a master plan including a plan for portable structures which this project would replace. Strategy II, Action and Services 6, Action Plan Step 4 maintains equity allocations for technology needs. Currently, there are inequities across the district in regard to technology and a new building that would house state-of-the-art technology is one step to resolve some of these inequities. Finally, in Strategy II, Action and Services 4, Action Plan Step 7, the LCAP supports furniture replacements for school sites would assist in creating collaborative classrooms.

Strategy IV, Action and Services 3 the focus is on providing high quality, flexible core curriculum, teaching, learning, and assessment systems to ensure the actualization of the graduate profile for every student. The graduate profile says that all students graduating from VUSD will exhibit self-efficacy, collaboration and problem-solving skills.

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In Strategy IV, Action and Services 1, Action Plan Step 19 provides support for CTE directly in developing student internships and community partnerships in addition to student certifications. Strategy IV, Action and Services 3, Action Plan Step 12 funds are allocated to provide professional development for teachers. CTE is supported in Strategy IV through UC development, curriculum writing and other sections that promote high quality instruction for all students.

With the funding of a new building through this grant, the district will add additional actions and steps necessary to support the project. Since the LCAP is reviewed annually, the year following the grant award will be redefined to include the necessary funding to support the technology, furniture, maintenance, and supplies required of the new facility.

PART 2: Projections of Student Enrollment

Total enrollment for the 2018-19 school year at RBV is 2140. RBV uses a cohort retention and past enrollment trend model to project enrollment. Furthermore, data is derived from student populations at the elementary and middle schools.

The construction of a new facility will add capacity, allowing more students to access CTE programs by developing six new pathways. At full enrollment, RBV would offer five periods per day of each pathway. Additionally, dual enrollment options are being explored which would allow for after-hours courses to be taught and expand the programs. In order to see the full potential of the facility the following student enrollment projection is used to illustrate the building at full capacity.

VUSD board goals stress the need to prepare students for college and career. The district graduation requirements align with these goals and support the ability for students to focus on a CTE pathways. All CTE courses in VUSD are currently UC a-g approved and new pathways will be submitted for approval which will allow students the ability to meet a-g requirements and complete CTE pathways. RBV students receive in-depth college and career guidance in AVID and Freshmen Seminar. This preparation helps students plan for high school and beyond. Students have the ability to begin pathways in the 9th grade, allowing them to complete the sequence of courses.

The counseling staff is committed to CTE and pathway completion. This year, all CTE courses were aligned to ensure that pathways could be completed. For example, level one courses were predesignated for grades 9-10, level two grades 10-11 and level three

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grades 11-12. Counseling staff at the middle and high schools have been give professional development on pathways and how to counsel students regarding the series of courses. Parent nights are held at both levels to explain to parents what CTE is and how pathways can prepare students for life beyond high school. The interns in the TV/Film program works with the counselors to create PSAs and RBVTV highlights CTE programs during their broadcast. Palomar College and CSUSM host college tours for counselors, administrators, and students to show the options available in post-secondary. A CTE counselor on special assignment has been used to do one-on-one counseling with students and presentation to CTE classes. Pathway clubs on campus participate in activities to promote the program. All of these strategies will continue and be expanded upon with the construction of a new CTE facility.

PART 3: Identification of Feeder Schools and Partners

Appendix B contains detailed a detailed list of partners in this project. In addition to CTE advisory meeting, VUSD worked diligently to develop partnerships that would support the proposed project. Students in VUSD have a choice of which high school they which to attend, hence the support of all five middle schools, with a total enrollment of 4420, was critical in the development of pathways that create a pipeline from middle-to high school to post-secondary options or the workplace. The pathways that were selected for the new building were determined by the high priority sectors of the Strong Workforce in the San Diego area after collaboration with Palomar and Mira Costa Colleges.

In the geographic proximity of RBV, there are no Manufacturing and Product Development sector pathways. According to WestEd research, there are only 20 courses in San Diego and Imperial Counties that offer courses representing only 2% of the CTE courses in the region. The closed program to RBV would be in San Diego Unified, which is not feasible for students. The proposed pathway will enhance many of the other programs recommended in this overall project. The students will work directly with Engineering to bring drawings to life. Marketing will assist with promoting the program and items created. Students will work together to get First Aid and CPR certifications with the Medical Pathways. Cross-curricular, the Manufacturing pathway has a need for strong Math skills so collaboration with this department will be essential. This pathway will bring together aspects across sectors and disciplines to form a model learning environment.

PART 4: The Accountability Plan

Because this a new pathway, the accountability plan is based on the current CTE programs and the information provided here is represented of current progress and projections based on those programs.

In all courses where a certificate is offered, currently over 85% of the students complete the certification. Because these are typically only offered in the capstone course, the

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average number of students completing a certificate is between 25-30. We project that number to be the same success rate in this pathway.

Tracking of students who enter employment has been a challenge for the current pathways. A more aggressive approach needs to be taken to gather this information. Overall as a school, RBV sees students entering the workforce and the military after high school. Over 70% of all students at RBV from the class of 2018 attended a two or four-year school. Students in the current CTE programs mirrored these percentages and boosted a high graduation rate than the district average.

Informing CDE, parents, school board and industry partners is a key factor in the growth of the program. RBV will continue to collect Perkins E-2 data and share that information with all stakeholders. Annual school board presentations and Friday letters will be used to share information with the members of administration and the community. CTE students will be asked to complete an end of the year survey and a follow-up survey will be sent at the end of the first year after graduation. The National Student Clearing House will be used to collect data for six years past graduation for students who continue to a two or four-year school. The California Department of Education will remain informed of the progress of the program through regular communication by the CTE administrator.

The proposed CTE project will expand the school's efforts to meet and exceed its publications pursuant to EC Section 51228. RBV offers a variety of core academic courses, as well as AP, IB, and CTE courses, that provide students with opportunities to attain entry level employment and post-secondary options. Students in the CTE programs currently and proposed have good oral and written skills, personal responsibility, technical knowledge and emerging math skills. The proposed program will all for RBV to engage more students in career and technical courses that will expand student learning and prepare more job-ready citizen for the work place.

PART 5: Educational Specifications and Equipment/Space Requirements

This project involves the demolition of five relocatable classrooms and the construction of a new 13,500 square foot multi-story building. The building will include instructional and lab spaces, a collaboration area, restrooms, circulation space, and utility spaces. Spaces on the bottom level will have floor to ceiling windows between classrooms and lab spaces to allow instructors to visual supervision at all times. An outside open work space will allow for larger projects to be completed. Locked storage will be integrated into interior and exterior spaces. Working with a local industry partner, high output solar tubular daylighting devises will be installed.

On the bottom floor, where the Manufacturing pathway will be located, there will be two classrooms with corresponding labs for each classroom. Additionally, there will be restrooms, storage and utility spaces. On the top floor, there will be a collaboration space and 3 classrooms in addition to restrooms and storage. The building will be ADA compliment.

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Appendix D contains a site plan that depicts the location of the project relative to the RBV campus. Appendix E contains schematic drawings of the facility, including a floor plan of the new facility with labels and square footage for each space and an equipment/furniture plan including location and arrangement of requested items.

Because these are new pathways, not all equipment needs have been determined or requested in this grant application, however, adequate space has been allocated for the equipment that will be required as the pathway develops. Locking storage and student workstations is included in this first phase of the project.

In order to fully support all six pathways in the purposed building, all of the requested facility space and equipment will be needed. The project description and the schematic drawings are included in Appendix E and outline the instructional, lab and support spaces that are included.

VUSD has been working on long-range planning to improve student safety and eliminate old portable building. Included in this planning is the need for CTE classrooms that meet industry standards. In order to plan the building properly, industry partners were involved in the planning of the building and equipment needs. Based on feedback from industry, the bottom floor was redesigned to include two classrooms and two lab spaces with clear visual between the rooms.

The new facility would provide opportunities for students at RBV and in VUSD the would not be possible without this funding. Students will be able to perform lab activities that require state-of-the-art equipment. The facility will allow students to work and learn in a 21st century space that mirrors college lab classrooms and industry workrooms. The building has the appearance of leading industry partners located a few miles away in the Vista business park. Since a facility does not exist on the RBV campus, this building will open doors to students that have never been available in the past.

It is expected that 150 students per year will be enrolled in the Manufacturing and Product Development pathway. There will be a total of five sections taught in this pathway and 25 sections in the building in the course of a day. A total of 780 students are projected to participate in pathways in this building in a year. Each section will have 30 students, which is lower than the district contract number, but will provide for a richer learning experience for students in CTE.

For the Manufacturing and Product Development pathway, a 1119.69 square foot lecture space and 11190.69 square foot lab space have been allocated giving the pathways 2239.38 square feet of learning space. All furniture is 21st century industry inspired and the lecture area is flexible allowing for easy reconfiguration of the room as needed. Locking storage and student workstations are included in the lab area. Additional equipment and storage will be determined and purchased by VUSD.

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Part 6: Budget Justification/Detail Sheet

The proposed CTE facility at RBV will have an estimated useful life of 50 years. As stated previously, an estimated 150 students per year will participate in this program that will be housed in this building. In order to determine the cost per student, we divided the total cost of the building by the number of spaces the program would occupy. Therefore, the overall estimated cost per student for the pathway in this facility is $\$356.20 (\$9,377,140 / 7 / 7500 \times 2)$. The cost takes into consideration that there are two instructional spaces allocated for this program over the useful life of the building.

The proposed furniture and storage for the Construction program will have an estimated life of at least ten years. Over the 10-year period, an estimated 150 students per year will participate in the pathway for a total of 1500 students (150 x 10). Therefore, the estimated cost per student for the furniture is $\$47.09 (\$70,645 / 1500)$ per student per year. Appendix F contains Form B and includes a projected description and estimated general costs for construction and equipment.

Business, Industry and post-secondary support a new CTE building and the six pathways. This support includes hosting industry tours, providing guest speakers and professional development for teachers, offering industry advise for curriculum, serving on advisory committees as the programs are developed. This application is for new programs at RBV, therefore the amount of in-kind donations cannot be determined at this time. As the facility is built and the programs are developed, the RBV CTE team understands the need to seek financial support and expand their industry partners.

Developing a new building and creating new pathways could not have been done without the support of business and industry partners in addition to community college input. These partnerships provided assistance in the building design, furniture selection and equipment determination so that we were creating a space where students would be prepared for future careers or post-secondary options. Along with district personal, business and industry partners were provided the opportunity to review, offer suggestions and ultimately approve the final schematic plans and furniture/equipment lists provided in this application.

The "best value" method was used to choose the specific equipment or furniture being requested after consulting with local industry partners. Many factors were considered when selecting equipment or furniture in this building including: quality of product, warranty, use in the industry and classroom, and local industry advice. NCEPC bids were used whenever possible for the equipment and furniture. Special attention was also considered when selecting items that would create a 21st century learning environment, the multi-function of the space and the need for a safe place for students to learn. The competitive bid process will be used for the demolition of the portables and construction of the new building.

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As a new program at RBV, support from local business and industry is needed to provide technical assistance after the grant is received. Maintenance of the new building will be supported by the district and LCAP. Perkins, CTEIG and Strong Workforce dollars will be sought to offset costs as allowed by the funding. The VUSD Board of Trustees has a district-wide strategic plan which will support routine repair and maintenance of the facilities and equipment along with appropriate deferred maintenance. RBV is committed to ensuring the equipment and facilities procured through this grant will be well maintained independent of the grant funding beyond the 10-year useful life of the equipment and useful life of the facilities beyond 40 years.

Part 7: Unique Conditions

The construction of a state-of-the-art CTE building at Rancho Buena Vista High School would address a few unique conditions. First, the school has aging portables that cannot support the growth of needed CTE programs at the school. There is a need for high quality CTE programs at the school and the current facilities are not equipped to support these courses. Second, there is a district focus on 21st century industry-standard facilities. However, this need is districtwide and cannot be achieved without funding from multiple sources.

In 2017, RBV worked to create a unique identity. The school adopted a world school approach where the school focus became four areas; International Baccalaureate (IB), Advanced Placement (AP), the Arts and CTE. With CTE as a foundation of the school, there is a need for more pathways for students. This rebranding by the school, which includes internships, community engagement and dual enrollment goals creates a learning environment that echoes CTE. In order to meet the diverse needs of the RBV students and create a learning environment that supports the school vision, the district goals and the industry needs a new building to house six pathways will need to be constructed.





1 OVERALL SITE PLAN - RANCHO BUENA VISTA HIGH SCHOOL




1 FIRST FLOOR PLAN




1 SECOND FLOOR PLAN




1 EXTERIOR ELEVATION



AUTHORITY

Education Code (EC) Section 17070.35 states:

(a) In addition to all other powers and duties as are granted to the board by this chapter, other statutes, or the California Constitution, the board shall do all of the following:

(1) Adopt rules and regulations, pursuant to the rulemaking provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act, Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, for the administration of this chapter. However, the board shall have no authority to set the level of the fees of any architect, structural engineer, or other design professional on any project. The initial regulations adopted pursuant to this chapter shall be adopted as emergency regulations, and the circumstances related to the initial adoption are hereby deemed to constitute an emergency for this purpose. The initial regulations adopted pursuant to this chapter shall be adopted by November 4, 1998. If the initial regulations are not adopted by that date, the board shall report to the Legislature by that date, explaining the reasons for the delay.

(2) Establish and publish any procedures and policies in connection with the administration of this chapter as it deems necessary.

(3) Determine the eligibility of school districts to receive apportionments under this chapter.

(4) Apportion funds to eligible school districts under this chapter.

(b) The board shall review and amend its regulations as necessary to adjust its administration of this chapter to conform with the act that amended this section to add this subdivision. Regulations adopted pursuant to this subdivision shall be adopted by November 5, 2002, and shall be adopted as emergency regulations in accordance with the rulemaking provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code). The adoption of any emergency regulation pursuant to this subdivision filed with the Office of Administrative Law shall be deemed to be an emergency and necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, or general welfare. Notwithstanding subdivision (e) of Section 11346.1 of the Government Code, any emergency regulation adopted pursuant to this section shall remain in effect for no more than 365 days unless the board has complied with Sections 11346.2 to 11348, inclusive, of the Government Code.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.90.2: Priority Funding Process

The priority funding process allows the Board to distribute available funds to districts or charter schools that request, pursuant to (a) or (b) below, as applicable, an Apportionment or an advance release of funds from a Preliminary Apportionment or Preliminary Charter School Apportionment, during specific 30-calendar day filing periods beginning with July 27, 2011 and continuing with the 2nd Wednesday of January and the 2nd Wednesday of July of 2012. Requests submitted during the filing periods described above are valid until the next filing period begins. The specific 30-calendar day filing periods subsequent to 2012 begin with January 9, 2013 and continue with the 2nd Wednesday of May and the 2nd Wednesday of November, each calendar year. Requests submitted during the filing period beginning with January 9, 2013 are valid until June 30, 2013. Requests submitted during a filing period beginning with the 2nd

Wednesday of May are valid from July 1 until December 31 of that year. Requests submitted during a filing period beginning with the 2nd Wednesday in November are valid from January 1 until June 30 of the following year. Requests must be physically received by the OPSC by the 30th calendar day of each filing period to be considered valid.

(a) In order to be considered for an Apportionment, approved advance release of design funds from a Preliminary Charter School Apportionment, or approved advance release of environmental hardship site acquisition funds from a Preliminary Apportionment, the district or charter school must provide a priority funding request in the form of a written statement signed by an authorized representative that includes each of the project Application numbers, and the type of Apportionment request (e.g., Apportionment, separate Apportionment for design or site acquisition), within the 30-calendar day filing period, and shall contain the following:

- (1) Statement that the request is to convert the unfunded approval to an Apportionment or to receive an approved advance release of funds; and
 - (2) Acknowledgement that a valid, original signature Form SAB 50-05 must be submitted and physically received by the OPSC within 90 calendar days of Apportionment or approved advance release of funds request, except for a Career Technical Education Facilities Project in (a)(5), and that failure to do so will result in the rescission of the Apportionment or approved advance release of funds request without further Board action; and
 - (3) Acknowledgement that a Grant Agreement must be submitted pursuant to Section 1859.90.4 and physically received by the OPSC prior to, or concurrently with, the Form SAB 50-05 referenced in (a)(2); and
 - (4) Acknowledgement that, if the district submits the Form SAB 50-05 on or after July 1, 2013 and is required to submit an LCP third party report, pursuant to Section 1859.97(b), the report will be submitted to the OPSC and the DIR at least 60 days prior to submitting the Form SAB 50-05; and
 - (5) For those receiving an Apportionment, acknowledgement that by participating in the priority funding process, the district or charter school is waiving its right to the timeline for fund release submittal described in Section 1859.90.
 - (6) For a Career Technical Education Facilities Project that was granted an unfunded approval without the required CDE plan approval and/or required DSA-approved plans and specifications, the applicant's request must include:
 - (A) Acknowledgement that the applicant must submit the required approval(s) to the OPSC within 12 months from the date of the Apportionment. If the required submittal(s) is not received within 12 months, the Apportionment shall be rescinded without further Board action pursuant to Section 1859.197(c)(1); and
 - (B) Acknowledgement that a valid, original signature Form SAB 50-05 must be submitted and physically received by the OPSC within 90 calendar days of the submittal described in (6)(A) and that failure to do so will result in the rescission of the Apportionment without further Board action; and
 - (C) Acknowledgement that a Grant Agreement must be submitted pursuant to Section 1859.90.4 and physically received by the OPSC prior to, or concurrently with, the Form SAB 50-05 referenced in (a)(6)(B).
- (b) In order to be considered for an approved advance release of site acquisition funds from a Preliminary Charter School Apportionment, the district or charter school must provide a priority funding request in the form of a written statement

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signed by an authorized representative within the 30-calendar day filing period, and shall contain all of the following:

- (1) Statement that the request is to convert the advance release of funds to an approved advance release of funds request; and,
- (2) Acknowledgement that a valid, original signature Form SAB 50-05 must be submitted and physically received by the OPSC within 180 calendar days of the approved advance release of funds request and that failure to do so will result in the rescission of the approved advance release of funds request without further Board action; and
- (3) Acknowledgement that a Grant Agreement must be submitted pursuant to Section 1859.90.4 and physically received by the OPSC prior to, or concurrently with, the Form SAB 50-05 referenced in (b)(2); and
- (4) Acknowledgement that it must provide evidence that it has entered into the Charter School Agreements within 90 calendar days of approval of the advance release of funds request and that failure to do so will result in the rescission of the approval without further Board action.

(c) If a district or charter school receives an Apportionment or approved advance release of funds request through the priority funding process, the OPSC must receive a valid, original signature copy of the Form SAB 50-05 within the specified time period, pursuant to (a)(2), (a)(6) or (b)(2), as applicable, and a Grant Agreement, pursuant to (a)(3),(a)(6)(C), or (b)(3), as applicable. Upon submittal of the original signature copy of the Form SAB 50-05, if OPSC determines that the Form SAB 50-05 is not valid, the district will have ten business days to amend the Form SAB 50-05 in order to make the Form SAB 50-05 valid. If the OPSC does not receive a valid, original signature copy of the Form SAB 50-05 within the time period:

- (1) The priority funding Apportionment or approved advance release of funds request shall be rescinded without further Board action, and
- (2) If the Application is not subject to rescission pursuant to Section 1859.90.3(c) as defined in Section 1859.90.3(d), the Application shall return to the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans) with a new unfunded approval date that is 90 calendar days from the date of Apportionment or approval of the advance release of funds request.

(d) In the event that the amount of requests received during a specific 30-calendar day filing period exceeds the funds available, the Board shall apportion based on the unfunded approval date and the Application received date up to the available cash from each bond source. Projects that have requested to participate in the priority funding process for which an Apportionment cannot be provided shall retain their date order position on the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans). Requests not converted to Apportionments will not be returned to the district or kept by the OPSC.

(e) In the event that unexpected cash proceeds from sources other than bond funds become available for use for priority funding Apportionments, at a public meeting the Board may, based on considerations relevant to the amount of time available to effect a distribution of funds, waive the 30-calendar day filing provision specified in this section for impacted school districts to provide funds more rapidly.

- (1) OPSC shall identify and invite impacted school districts to submit a priority funding request that meets all other criteria in (a) above.

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(2) Requests submitted under this provision shall be valid from the date the priority funding request is submitted until the end of the regularly scheduled filing period specified above.

(3) Requests submitted under this provision must comply with all other requirements of the priority funding process in this Section and Section 1859.90.3.

(4) Districts may decline to submit a request outside the normal 30-calendar day filing period without consequence. If the option to submit a request is declined, the requirements to participate in the standard 30-calendar day filing periods specified in (a) above remain in effect.

(5) Unexpected cash proceeds from sources other than bond funds include, but are not limited to, the \$250 million appropriated from the General Fund to the 2016 State School Facilities Fund as a result of the enactment of Statutes of 2021, Chapter 44, Section 163 (Assembly Bill 130).

(f) For purposes of this section “rescinded” or “rescission” shall mean that the Apportionment or approved advance release of funds request returns to unfunded approval status with a new unfunded approval date, except for (a)(5)(A). The new unfunded approval date will be 90 calendar days from the Apportionment date. The district or charter school will not be required to re-submit the Application and no further Application review will be required.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.90.3: Participation in the Priority Funding Process

This section applies to Applications for funding for new construction, modernization, Overcrowding Relief Grant, Career Technical Education Facilities Program, Facility Hardship pursuant to Sections 1859.82.1 and 1859.82.2, and Charter School Facilities Program, excluding advance release of design and/or site acquisition funds from a Preliminary Charter School Apportionment.

(a) For each Application on the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans) for new construction, modernization, Facility Hardship pursuant to Sections 1859.82.1 or 1859.82.2, the occurrences of (1) or (2) below shall be limited after the effective date of this regulation section [March 25, 2013]. For each Application on the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans) for Overcrowding Relief Grant, Career Technical Education Facilities Program, and Charter School Facilities Program, excluding advance release of design and/or site acquisition funds from a Preliminary Charter School Apportionment, the occurrences of (1) or (2) below shall be limited after the effective date of this regulation section [October 1, 2014]:

(1) The district abstains from participating in a priority funding 30-calendar day filing period described in Section 1859.90.2 for the Application on the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans).

(2) The Application receives a priority funding Apportionment pursuant to Section 1859.90.2(a), and the district fails to meet the fund release requirements pursuant to Section 1859.90.2(c).

(b) The first occurrence of (a)(1) or (a)(2) shall result in the following, as applicable:

(1) If (a)(1) occurs, the Application shall retain its place on the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans).

(2) If (a)(2) occurs, the priority funding Apportionment shall be rescinded and the Application shall be returned to the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans) pursuant to Section 1859.90.2(c)(2).

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(c) If subsection (b) has occurred, a subsequent occurrence of either (a)(1) or (a)(2) shall result in the rescission of the Application's Apportionment and/or unfunded approval, as applicable, and the removal of the Application from the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans) without further Board action. The Application shall be returned to the applicant.

(d) For purposes of subsection (c), "rescinded" or "rescission" of an unfunded approval shall mean that the bond authority associated with the Apportionment or unfunded approval, as applicable, returns to the appropriate School Facility Program bond authority source for reallocation. If applicable, the pupils housed in the project will be added back to the district's baseline eligibility pursuant to Sections 1859.51(d) for new construction or 1859.61(d) for modernization.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.193: Career Technical Education Facilities Grant Determination.

A Career Technical Education Facilities Project may construct a new facility or modernize or Reconfigure an existing school building. The Application for Career Technical Education Facility funding may accompany an Application for new construction funding pursuant to Section 1859.70 or may be submitted independently.

The applicant must identify square footage of the Career Technical Education Facility being constructed, modernized, reconfigured or equipped, on the funding Application. Equipment purchased under the Career Technical Education Facilities Program must have an average useful life expectancy of at least ten years pursuant to Education Code 17078.72(a). An Application for a Career Technical Education Facilities Project may consist entirely of equipment. All equipment must be purchased on or after May 20, 2006, unless the Career Technical Education Facilities Project is combined with a qualifying SFP new construction project pursuant to Section 1859.193.1.

(a) For new construction of a Career Technical Education Facilities Project included in a qualifying New Construction Grant, the Career Technical Education Facilities grant amount shall be the lesser of either (1) or (2):

(1) The sum of the costs uniquely related to facilities required to provide Career Technical Education as determined below:

(A) 50 percent of the cost of construction of the Career Technical Education Facilities Project, as determined by the project architect, subject to OPSC review and approval.

(B) 50 percent of the cost to equip the Career Technical Education Facilities Project with necessary equipment.

(C) For public works projects awarded on January 1, 2012 through June 19, 2014, the prevailing wage monitoring and enforcement costs as prescribed in Section 1859.71.4(c), if required by the Labor Code.

(D) Minus an allowance for New Construction Grants provided for Career Technical Education classrooms, determined by:

1. Multiplying 960 square feet by the number of classrooms in the Career Technical Education Facilities Project that were included in the New Construction project.

2. Multiplying the amount determined in (a)(1)(D)1 by 50 percent of the Current Replacement Cost for non-Toilet Facilities.

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(2) \$3 million per Career Technical Education Facilities Project.

(3) Site development work is not allowed as part of a Career Technical Education Facilities Project included in a New Construction Grant. Site development work necessary pursuant to Section 1859.76, may be requested by the district under the qualifying SFP New Construction.

(4) Pursuant to Labor Code Section 1771.3 in effect on January 1, 2012 through June 19, 2014, any public works project paid in whole or in part from public funds that are derived from bonds issued by the State and for which the construction contract is awarded on January 1, 2012 through June 19, 2014, is subject to DIR monitoring and enforcement of compliance with applicable prevailing wage requirements, unless the project is exempt from this requirement pursuant to Labor Code Section 1771.3(b) in effect on January 1, 2012 through June 19, 2014.

(5) Any school district failing to meet the requirements of (a)(4) shall return to the State any State funding for the project, including interest, at the rate paid on moneys in the Pooled Money Investment Account or at the highest rate of interest for the most recent issue of State general obligation bonds as established pursuant to the Chapter 4 (commencing with Section 16720), of Part 3 of Division 4 of Title 2 of the Government Code, whichever is greater. Interest to be returned shall be calculated from the date at which funds were received by the school district until the date of the Board's finding.

(6) If the DIR revokes the district's internal LCP's approval and the district fails to provide appropriate prevailing wage monitoring through the DIR or other exemptions as specified in Labor Code Section 1771.3 in effect on January 1, 2012 through June 19, 2014, the school district shall return to the State any State funding received for the project, including interest, as calculated in subsection (a)(5) above, for any construction projects for which the violations occurred.

(b) For stand-alone new construction of a Career Technical Education Facilities Project, the grant amount shall be the lesser of either (1) or (2):

(1) The sum of the costs uniquely related to facilities required to provide Career Technical Education as determined below:

(A) 50 percent of the cost of construction of the Career Technical Education Facilities Project, as determined by the project architect, subject to OPSC review and approval.

(B) 50 percent of the cost to equip the Career Technical Education Facilities Project with necessary equipment.

(C) 50 percent of site development work that meets the following criteria:

1. It is necessary and applicable to the Career Technical Education Facilities Project.

2. It meets the requirements for site development costs as outlined in Section 1859.76.

(D) For public works projects awarded on January 1, 2012 through June 19, 2014, the prevailing wage monitoring and enforcement costs as prescribed in Section 1859.71.4(c), if required by the Labor Code.

(2) \$3 million per Career Technical Education Facilities Project.

(3) If the district is requesting funding for site development work applicable to the Career Technical Education Facilities Project, the district must submit a detailed cost estimate and appropriate DSA approved plans with the Form SAB 50-10. The cost estimate must include appropriate justification documents that indicate

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the work is necessary to complete the Career Technical Education Facilities Project and conform to the requirements in Section 1859.76.

(4) Utility service(s) cost shall be prorated, if necessary, for any excess capacity not needed to service the Career Technical Education Facilities Project.

(5) Pursuant to Labor Code Section 1771.3 in effect on January 1, 2012 through June 19, 2014, any public works project paid in whole or in part from public funds that are derived from bonds issued by the State and for which the construction contract is awarded on January 1, 2012 through June 19, 2014, is subject to DIR monitoring and enforcement of compliance with applicable prevailing wage requirements, unless the project is exempt from this requirement pursuant to Labor Code Section 1771.3(b) in effect on January 1, 2012 through June 19, 2014.

(6) Any school district failing to meet the requirements of (b)(5) shall return to the State any State funding for the project, including interest, at the rate paid on moneys in the Pooled Money Investment Account or at the highest rate of interest for the most recent issue of State general obligation bonds as established pursuant to the Chapter 4 (commencing with Section 16720), of Part 3 of Division 4 of Title 2 of the Government Code, whichever is greater. Interest to be returned shall be calculated from the date at which funds were received by the school district until the date of the Board's finding.

(7) If the DIR revokes the district's internal LCP's approval and the district fails to provide appropriate prevailing wage monitoring through the DIR or other exemptions as specified in Labor Code Section 1771.3 in effect on January 1, 2012 through June 19, 2014, the school district shall return to the State any State funding received for the project, including interest, as calculated in subsection (b)(6) above, for any construction projects for which the violations occurred.

(c) For Modernization of a Career Technical Education Facilities Project, the grant amount shall be the lesser of either (1) or (2):

(1) The sum of the costs uniquely related to facilities required to provide Career Technical Education Facilities Project as determined below:

(A) 50 percent of the cost to modernize or Reconfigure the Career Technical Education Facilities, as determined by the project architect, subject to OPSC review and approval.

(B) 50 percent of the cost to equip the Career Technical Education Facilities with necessary equipment.

(C) For public works projects awarded on or after January 1, 2012, the prevailing wage monitoring and enforcement costs as prescribed in Section 1859.71.4(c), if required by the Labor Code.

(2) \$1.5 million per Career Technical Education Facilities Project.

(3) Reconfiguring an existing school building must not displace a minimum essential facility. In any case involving the replacement of a minimum essential facility due to the reconfiguration of an existing building, the replacement must be part of the plans submitted in support of the Career Technical Education Facilities Application, must occur concurrently, and cannot be part of a SFP Application for new construction.

(4) Utility service(s) cost shall be prorated, if necessary, for any excess capacity not needed to service the Career Technical Education Facilities Project.

(5) Pursuant to Labor Code Section 1771.3 in effect on January 1, 2012 through June 19, 2014, any public works project paid in whole or in part from public funds that are derived from bonds issued by the State and for which the construction

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contract is awarded on January 1, 2012 through June 19, 2014, is subject to DIR monitoring and enforcement of compliance with applicable prevailing wage requirements, unless the project is exempt from this requirement pursuant to Labor Code Section 1771.3(b) in effect on January 1, 2012 through June 19, 2014.

(6) Any school district failing to meet the requirements of subsection (c)(5) above, shall return to the State any State funding for the project, including interest, at the rate paid on moneys in the Pooled Money Investment Account or at the highest rate of interest for the most recent issue of State general obligation bonds as established pursuant to the Chapter 4 (commencing with Section 16720), of Part 3 of Division 4 of Title 2 of the Government Code, whichever is greater. Interest to be returned shall be calculated from the date at which funds were received by the school district until the date of the Board's finding.

(7) If the DIR revokes the district's internal LCP's approval and the district fails to provide appropriate prevailing wage monitoring through the DIR or other exemptions as specified in Labor Code Section 1771.3 in effect on January 1, 2012 through June 19, 2014, the school district shall return to the State any State funding received for the project, including interest, as calculated in subsection (c)(6) above, for any construction projects for which the violations occurred.

(d) If an applicant meets the eligibility criteria in Section 1859.192, but does not have the necessary approvals from the DSA and/or the CDE at the time of Apportionment, the Board may apportion funds for the Career Technical Education Facilities Project and reserve them for a period of up to 12 months. The grant amount to be reserved for the project will be the maximum funding as determined above in (a), (b), or (c).

(e) Funding provided as prescribed in Section 1859.71.6 and Section 1859.77.4 shall not be affected by the maximum funding determinations listed above.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.197: Fund Release Process

The OPSC will release State funds that have been apportioned by the Board pursuant to Sections 1859.195 and 1859.196 after submittal by the applicant of the Form SAB 50-05.

(a) If an Apportionment was made for a Career Technical Education Facilities Project, the applicant must submit a Form SAB 50-05 within 18 months of the Apportionment as outlined in Education Code Section 17076.10 or the Apportionment shall be rescinded without further Board action.

(b) If Career Technical Education Facilities funds were reserved for the applicant pursuant to Section 1859.193(d) of these Regulations, the applicant:

(1) Has one year from the date of Apportionment to submit the CDE plan approval and DSA-approved plans and specifications, as required, to the OPSC for the Career Technical Education Facilities Project, otherwise the Apportionment shall be rescinded without further Board action.

(2) Has 18 months from the date the CDE plan approval and DSA-approved plans and specifications, as needed, are submitted to the OPSC to submit a completed Form SAB 50-05 or the Apportionment shall be rescinded without further Board action. If the district is requesting an Apportionment pursuant to Section 1859.90.1 or 1859.90.2, the Board will require that this time limit be reduced to no more than 90 days from the date of the Apportionment.

(c) For an Apportionment received pursuant to Section 1859.90.2 where submittal of the necessary CDE plan approval and/or DSA-approved plans and

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specifications were not required at the time the Board granted an unfunded approval, then the applicant:

(1) Has up to 12 months to submit the required approvals from the date of Apportionment. If the required submittal(s) is not received within 12 months, the Apportionment shall be rescinded without further Board action and the Career Technical Education Facilities bond authority will return to the program for reallocation.

(2) The submittal date in (c)(1) shall start the 90-calendar-day fund release process in Section 1859.90.2.

(d) If the applicant requires a loan for the entire matching share requirement pursuant to Section 1859.194(b) of these Regulations:

(1) Subject to the availability of financing provided by the Pooled Money Investment Board for bond-funded projects, the OPSC will release ten percent of the Career Technical Education Facilities grant to the applicant within 30 calendar days of the Apportionment.

(2) The applicant has one year from the date of Apportionment to submit the CDE plan approval and DSA-approved plans and specifications, as required, to the OPSC for the Career Technical Education Facilities Project, otherwise the Apportionment shall be rescinded without further Board action.

(3) The applicant has 18 months from the date in (d)(2) to submit a completed Form SAB 50-05 or the Apportionment shall be rescinded without further Board action.

(e) If the district is requesting an Apportionment pursuant to Section 1859.90.1 or 1859.90.2 and if the district is requesting funding as prescribed in Section 1859.71.6 or Section 1859.77.4, as applicable, then the district must submit the necessary approvals from the DSA and/or the CDE, as applicable, at least 90 days prior to requesting an Apportionment.

(f) If the district receives an Apportionment pursuant to (a) or (b) and if the district is requesting funding as prescribed in Section 1859.71.6 or Section 1859.77.4, as applicable, then the district must submit the necessary approvals from the DSA and/or the CDE, as applicable, at least 90 days prior to receiving an Apportionment.

(g) The applicant is subject to substantial progress time limit on the Apportionment as outlined in Education Code Section 17076.10(b).

(h) In the event the Board determines there is a fiscal emergency or crisis on the part of the State of California, the Board may grant an extension not to exceed 12 months to the time limit prescribed in (b)(1) and (d)(2) above and Section 1859.193(d). Regulation Section 1859.197(h) shall become inoperative January 1, 2010.

*Funding for the projects that are the subject of the appeal will free up local resources to provide the matching funds for federally funded projects for these other school sites on military installations.

DESCRIPTION

Since 2012, the Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) has actively worked with school districts throughout California to obtain funding from the Board to provide the local match towards federally funded school construction and modernization projects on military installations.

The school districts included in this appeal are currently in various stages of proposals, awards, and construction for their school projects on military installations.

The Board's approval of the school districts' requests would provide approximately \$24.9 million in state funding that will be used towards the districts' local match in obtaining approximately \$336.6 million in federal funding.

AUTHORITY

See Attachment A.

BACKGROUND

Public Schools on Military Installations Program

In 2010, the Department of Defense (DOD) established the Public Schools on Military Installations (PSMI) grant program to administer a federal appropriation designated for the construction, renovation, repair, or expansion of elementary and secondary public schools on military installations to address capacity needs or facility condition deficiencies.

The DOD assessed the condition and capacity of public schools on military installations as part of the PSMI grant program. Based on the findings of the physical assessment, the DOD developed a priority list of public schools on military installations with the most serious condition and/or capacity deficiencies, which receive priority consideration under the PSMI. The PSMI program provides federal reimbursement of up to 80 percent of project costs to school districts, provided the school district matches federal funding with 20 percent of the project cost.

At the April 2012 meeting, the Board established the Department of Defense Subcommittee. The purpose of the Board's subcommittee was to consider funding options to assist all California school districts with DOD schools in meeting their 20-percent matching share requirement. At the June 2012 DOD subcommittee meeting, OPSC presented an analysis of the potential School Facility Program (SFP) funding options that school districts could pursue to meet the 20-percent match requirement. The recommendations of the subcommittee were presented to the Board at the August 2012 meeting. These recommendations included consideration of SFP Regulation changes for DOD projects to provide preliminary apportionments and recommending to the Legislature that future bond funds be made available specifically for DOD schools. In considering the recommendations, the Board elected to recommend that the State Legislature provide funding for military base schools in California in the next bond proposal to cover the total need for these types of projects.

In 2018, the DOD continued an ongoing assessment of the condition and capacity of schools on military installations. Based on the findings of the physical assessment, the DOD developed an updated priority list. As federal funds have been appropriated for the PSMI, the Office of Local Defense Community Cooperation (OLDCC), which administers the grant funds, has invited the school districts in this appeal to participate in the PSMI grant program. These schools are now considered among the highest priority PSMI sites in the nation.

School districts must submit verification to the OLDCC that local matching funds are available to leverage and receive final approval for federal funding. As in the past, the SFP funding for each of these school districts is a significant supporting component in each school district's proposal to access this federal funding opportunity.

BACKGROUND (cont.)

Status of the Projects

The status of each school district's PSMI project follows.

Central Union Elementary School District

The District is requesting expedited processing and an Apportionment for a modernization project at Neutra Elementary School. In September 2022, the Board approved the District's request for financial hardship status under other evidence, reinstated the processing of the Design funding for the project, and approved the District's financial hardship status for the future full grant application. The District has received plan approval from the California Department of Education (CDE) and submitted the plans to the Division of the State Architect (DSA). The District anticipates approval from DSA in the coming weeks and will submit the application for construction funding around October 1. As a financial hardship school district, upon approval of the Apportionment, the District will have 365 days to submit the *Fund Release Authorization* (Form SAB 50-05).

Approval of the appeal request will allow the District to commit the funding towards their local match for the PSMI project at Neutra Elementary School on Lemoore Naval Air Station in Lemoore, CA.

The PSMI project will renovate, modernize, and expand Neutra Elementary School to address the federal Facility Condition Assessment Report's findings. The project will add 13 new classrooms, add a new food services and cafeteria dining area, repurpose the existing multipurpose room, renovate existing classrooms, recondition and enhance the parking lot for traffic flow, recondition the hardcourt and flatwork around campus, and address and enhance the general systems which have reached the end of life utilization.

The full text of the District's request is on Attachment B.

Oceanside Unified School District

The District is requesting expedited processing and Apportionments for two modernization projects at Pablo Tac Elementary School, which is currently under construction. The modernization projects were intended to be completely funded using local funding; however, with the invitation to participate in the PSMI program for the North Terrace Elementary School site, the reimbursement of the state share of funding for eligible SFP modernization projects will free up local resources that will be applied towards the local match required for the PSMI project at North Terrace Elementary School on Marine Corp Base Camp Pendleton in Oceanside, CA. With approval of the Apportionment, the District will have 180 days to submit the Forms SAB 50-05.

BACKGROUND (cont.)

The PSMI project will address Facility Condition Assessment Report findings to resolve capacity deficiencies, provide a controlled single point of entry, and provide a modern campus that is responsive to the Marine Base student population needs.

The full text of the District's request is on Attachment C.

San Diego Unified School District

The District is requesting expedited processing and Apportionments for modernization projects at Hancock Elementary School and Miller Elementary School. The modernization projects were PSMI projects with the required local match completely funded using local funding; however, with the invitation to participate in the PSMI program for the Chesterton Elementary School site, the reimbursement of the state share of funding for the eligible SFP modernization projects will free up local resources that will be applied towards the local match required for the PSMI project at Chesterton Elementary School on San Diego Naval Base in San Diego, CA. With approval of the Apportionment, the District will have 180 days to submit the Forms SAB 50-05.

The PSMI project will demolish all permanent and portable classrooms, construct five new buildings (a new administration building, a multi-purpose/food service building, and three new classroom buildings consisting of 25 classrooms to serve a student capacity of over 600 pupils). Additionally, all existing play structures, landscaping, flatwork, and utilities will be replaced in addition to installation of new fencing, parking, and drop-off areas.

The full text of the District's request is on Attachment D.

Sierra Sands Unified School District

The District is requesting expedited processing and an Apportionment for a modernization project at Richmond Elementary School. Additionally, the District requests permission to use the SFP modernization funding generated at the original school site location at the new location where the school is being relocated. The modernization project is a PSMI project currently underway for which the local match was planned to be completely funded using local funding; however, with the invitation to participate in the PSMI program for the Pierce Elementary School site, the reimbursement of the state share of funding for the eligible SFP modernization project will free up local resources that will be applied towards the local match required for the PSMI project at Pierce Elementary School on China Lake Naval Air Weapons Station in Ridgecrest, CA. With approval of the Apportionment, the District will have 180 days to submit the Form SAB 50-05.

The PSMI project will address the federal Facilities Condition Assessment Report's findings. The full scope of the project is still being determined.

BACKGROUND (cont.)

The full text of the District's request is on Attachment E.

Travis Unified School District

The District is requesting expedited processing and an Apportionment for a modernization project at Scandia Elementary School. The modernization project was a PSMI project with the required local match provided by local funding; however, with the invitation to participate in the PSMI program for the Travis Elementary School site, the reimbursement of the state share of funding for the eligible SFP modernization project will free up local resources that will be applied towards the local match required for the PSMI project at Travis Elementary School on Travis Air Force Base in Fairfield, CA.

The PSMI project will relocate Travis Elementary School, which is currently in a military operations area. The project involves the demolition of all permanent buildings and classrooms. An entirely new school will be built in a different location in the military housing area of the base to allow safer routes to school and closer proximity to the base's Youth Center and Development Center.

Staff's Position

Past Precedent

Since 2012, staff and the Board have provided support to school districts invited to participate in the PSMI program. To date, Board approvals have provided approximately \$78.9 million in state funding for 19 projects on 10 school sites, which has led to over \$365 million in federal funding for these projects across the state.

Previous Board support for PSMI projects has been in the form of expedited processing, financial hardship approvals under "other evidence," and expedited apportionments.

Status of Funds and Adjusted Grant Application for Funding

Following the June 26, 2024 Board meeting, the SFP has approximately \$916 million in funding remaining for new construction and modernization projects. Through August 31, 2024, the SFP has received nearly \$3.9 billion in new construction and modernization funding requests beyond the available program authority. It is currently unknown whether future funding will become available for the program, pending voter consideration of a statewide school facilities bond in the November 2024 election.

Approval of these appeal requests would expedite processing and apportionments for seven PSMI projects in five school districts. Expediting processing and apportionments for these projects would accelerate their funding ahead of other projects already received, but also facilitates the future receipt of nearly \$336.6 million in federal funding.

Conclusion

Due to the unique circumstances associated with the limited timeframe to provide DOD with proof of matching funds, staff supports all of the school districts' requests for approval of expedited processing and apportionments.

Approval of the appeals would commit funding to the projects and would assist the school districts in meeting their matching obligations for the DOD projects. Approval of the appeals would also be consistent with the Board's longstanding support for projects on military installations. To date, prior Board approvals for financial hardship

status under “other evidence” criteria, use of funding at alternate locations, and outside the priority funding process, have provided approximately \$78.9 million in state funding for 19 projects on 10 school sites, which has led to over \$365 million in federal funding across the state.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Approve all of the school districts’ requests for expedited processing and Apportionments for the projects that are identified in these appeals.
2. Approve the Apportionments for the six projects shown on Attachments G through L.

ATTACHMENT A

AUTHORITY

Education Code (EC) Section 17070.35: General Provisions

(a) In addition to all other powers and duties as are granted to the board by this chapter, other statutes, or the California Constitution, the board shall do all of the following:

(1) Adopt rules and regulations, pursuant to the rulemaking provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act, Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, for the administration of this chapter. However, the board shall have no authority to set the level of the fees of any architect, structural engineer, or other design professional on any project. The initial regulations adopted pursuant to this chapter shall be adopted as emergency regulations, and the circumstances related to the initial adoption are hereby deemed to constitute an emergency for this purpose. The initial regulations adopted pursuant to this chapter shall be adopted by November 4, 1998. If the initial regulations are not adopted by that date, the board shall report to the Legislature by that date, explaining the reasons for the delay.

(2) Establish and publish any procedures and policies in connection with the administration of this chapter as it deems necessary.

(3) Determine the eligibility of school districts to receive apportionments under this chapter.

(4) Apportion funds to eligible school districts under this chapter.

(b) The board shall review and amend its regulations as necessary to adjust its administration of this chapter to conform with the act that amended this section to add this subdivision. Regulations adopted pursuant to this subdivision shall be adopted by November 5, 2002, and shall be adopted as emergency regulations in accordance with the rulemaking provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code). The adoption of any emergency regulation pursuant to this subdivision filed with the Office of Administrative Law shall be deemed to be an emergency and necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, or general welfare. Notwithstanding subdivision (e) of Section 11346.1 of the Government Code, any emergency regulation adopted pursuant to this section shall remain in effect for no more than 365 days unless the board has complied with Sections 11346.2 to 11348, inclusive, of the Government Code.

EC Section 17076.10: Program Accountability

(a) A school district that receives any funds pursuant to this chapter shall submit a summary report of expenditure of state funds and of school district matching funds annually until all state funds and school district matching funds are expended, and shall then submit a final report to the board. The board may require an audit of these reports or other school district records to ensure that all funds received pursuant to this chapter are expended in accordance with program requirements.

(b) If the board finds that a participating school district has not made substantial progress towards increasing its pupil capacity or modernizing its facilities within 18 months of receiving any funding pursuant to this chapter, the board shall rescind the apportionment in an amount equal to the unexpended funds.

ATTACHMENT A

- (c) (1) If the board, after the review of expenditures or audit has been conducted pursuant to subdivision (a), determines that a school district failed to expend funds in accordance with this chapter, the department shall notify the school district of the amount that must be repaid to the 1998 State School Facilities Fund, the 2002 State School Facilities Fund, the 2004 State School Facilities Fund, the 2006 State School Facilities Fund, or the 2016 State School Facilities Fund, as the case may be, within 60 days. If the school district fails to make the required payment within 60 days, the department shall notify the Controller and the school district in writing, and the Controller shall deduct an amount equal to the amount to be repaid by the school district under this subdivision, from the school district's next principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds to the school district, other than basic aid apportionments required by Section 6 of Article IX of the California Constitution. Any amounts obtained by the Controller shall be deposited into the 1998 State School Facilities Fund, the 2002 State School Facilities Fund, the 2004 State School Facilities Fund, the 2006 State School Facilities Fund, or the 2016 State School Facilities Fund, as appropriate.
- (2) Notwithstanding paragraph (1), if the board determines that repayment of the full liability within 60 days after the board action would constitute a severe financial hardship, as defined by the board, for the school district, the board shall approve a plan of equal annual payments over a period of up to 20 years. The plan shall include interest on each year's outstanding balance at the rate earned on the state's Pooled Money Investment Account during that year. The Controller shall withhold amounts, other than basic aid apportionments required by Section 6 of Article IX of the California Constitution, pursuant to the plan.
- (d) If a school district receives an apportionment, but has not met the criteria to have funds released pursuant to Section 17072.32 or 17074.15 within a period established by the board, but not to exceed 18 months, the board shall rescind the apportionment and deny the district's application.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.90: Fund Release Process

- (a) With the exception of an apportionment made pursuant to Sections 1859.81.1(e) or 1859.81.2, apportionments provided through the Priority Funding Process and subject to 1859.90.2, or of an Inactive Apportionment subject to Section 1859.96, the OPSC will release State funds that the Board has apportioned to the district after submittal, by the district, of the Form SAB 50-05 and a Grant Agreement, pursuant to Section 1859.90.4.
- (b) With the exception of an apportionment made for a Type II Joint-Use Project, not part of a qualifying SFP Modernization project, pursuant to Article 12 of these Regulations, a district must submit the Form SAB 50-05 and Grant Agreement, within 180 calendar days of the Apportionment of the SFP grant for the project or within 365 calendar days for Apportionments that include financial hardship assistance. If the district does not submit the Form SAB 50-05 and Grant Agreement within the above specified time, the entire New Construction Adjusted Grant, or Modernization Adjusted Grant or Type I or II, part of a qualifying SFP Modernization project, or Joint-Use Project apportionment shall be rescinded without further Board action, and the pupils housed in the project, if applicable, will be added back to the district's baseline eligibility. The district may refile a new application for the project subject to district eligibility and available State funds at the time of resubmittal.

ATTACHMENT A

(c) If the Apportionment was made for a Type II Joint-Use Project, not part of a qualifying SFP Modernization project, pursuant to Article 12 of these Regulations, the district must submit Form SAB 50-05 and a Grant Agreement within 18 months of the date the plans and specifications for the Joint-Use Project that have been approved by the DSA and the CDE are submitted to the OPSC or the Apportionment shall be rescinded without further Board action.

(d) OPSC will release State funds that have been apportioned by the Board pursuant to Section 1859.81.1(e) to the district within 30 calendar days of the following, whichever occurs last: an Apportionment or upon submittal by the district of a Grant Agreement pursuant to Section 1859.90.4. Submittal of the Grant Agreement must occur within 365 days of the Apportionment. If the district received an Apportionment pursuant to 1859.90.2, the Grant Agreement must be submitted within the specified time period in 1859.90.2.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.90.2: Priority Funding Process

The priority funding process allows the Board to distribute available funds to districts or charter schools that request, pursuant to (a) or (b) below, as applicable, an Apportionment or an advance release of funds from a Preliminary Apportionment or Preliminary Charter School Apportionment, during specific 30-calendar day filing periods beginning with July 27, 2011 and continuing with the 2nd Wednesday of January and the 2nd Wednesday of July of 2012. Requests submitted during the filing periods described above are valid until the next filing period begins. The specific 30-calendar day filing periods subsequent to 2012 begin with January 9, 2013 and continue with the 2nd Wednesday of May and the 2nd Wednesday of November, each calendar year. Requests submitted during the filing period beginning with January 9, 2013 are valid until June 30, 2013. Requests submitted during a filing period beginning with the 2nd Wednesday of May are valid from July 1 until December 31 of that year. Requests submitted during a filing period beginning with the 2nd Wednesday in November are valid from January 1 until June 30 of the following year. Requests must be physically received by the OPSC by the 30th calendar day of each filing period to be considered valid.

(a) In order to be considered for an Apportionment, approved advance release of design funds from a Preliminary Charter School Apportionment, or approved advance release of environmental hardship site acquisition funds from a Preliminary Apportionment, the district or charter school must provide a priority funding request in the form of a written statement signed by an authorized representative that includes each of the project Application numbers, and the type of Apportionment request (e.g., Apportionment, separate Apportionment for design or site acquisition), within the 30-calendar day filing period, and shall contain the following:

- (1) Statement that the request is to convert the unfunded approval to an Apportionment or to receive an approved advance release of funds; and
- (2) Acknowledgement that a valid, original signature Form SAB 50-05 must be submitted and physically received by the OPSC within 90 calendar days of Apportionment or approved advance release of funds request, except for a Career Technical Education Facilities Project in (a)(5), and that failure to do so will result in the rescission of the Apportionment or approved advance release of funds request without further Board action; and

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- (3) Acknowledgement that a Grant Agreement must be submitted pursuant to Section 1859.90.4 and physically received by the OPSC prior to, or concurrently with, the Form SAB 50-05 referenced in (a)(2); and
 - (4) Acknowledgement that, if the district submits the Form SAB 50-05 on or after July 1, 2013 and is required to submit an LCP third party report, pursuant to Section 1859.97(b), the report will be submitted to the OPSC and the DIR at least 60 days prior to submitting the Form SAB 50-05; and
 - (5) For those receiving an Apportionment, acknowledgement that by participating in the priority funding process, the district or charter school is waiving its right to the timeline for fund release submittal described in Section 1859.90.
 - (6) For a Career Technical Education Facilities Project that was granted an unfunded approval without the required CDE plan approval and/or required DSA-approved plans and specifications, the applicant's request must include:
 - (A) Acknowledgement that the applicant must submit the required approval(s) to the OPSC within 12 months from the date of the Apportionment. If the required submittal(s) is not received within 12 months, the Apportionment shall be rescinded without further Board action pursuant to Section 1859.197(c)(1); and
 - (B) Acknowledgement that a valid, original signature Form SAB 50-05 must be submitted and physically received by the OPSC within 90 calendar days of the submittal described in (6)(A) and that failure to do so will result in the rescission of the Apportionment without further Board action; and
 - (C) Acknowledgement that a Grant Agreement must be submitted pursuant to Section 1859.90.4 and physically received by the OPSC prior to, or concurrently with, the Form SAB 50-05 referenced in (a)(6)(B).
- (b) In order to be considered for an approved advance release of site acquisition funds from a Preliminary Charter School Apportionment, the district or charter school must provide a priority funding request in the form of a written statement signed by an authorized representative within the 30-calendar day filing period, and shall contain all of the following:
- (1) Statement that the request is to convert the advance release of funds to an approved advance release of funds request; and,
 - (2) Acknowledgement that a valid, original signature Form SAB 50-05 must be submitted and physically received by the OPSC within 180 calendar days of the approved advance release of funds request and that failure to do so will result in the rescission of the approved advance release of funds request without further Board action; and
 - (3) Acknowledgement that a Grant Agreement must be submitted pursuant to Section 1859.90.4 and physically received by the OPSC prior to, or concurrently with, the Form SAB 50-05 referenced in (b)(2); and
 - (4) Acknowledgement that it must provide evidence that it has entered into the Charter School Agreements within 90 calendar days of approval of the advance release of funds request and that failure to do so will result in the rescission of the approval without further Board action.
- (c) If a district or charter school receives an Apportionment or approved advance release of funds request through the priority funding process, the OPSC must receive a valid, original signature copy of the Form SAB 50-05 within the specified time period, pursuant to (a)(2), (a)(6) or (b)(2), as applicable, and a Grant Agreement, pursuant to (a)(3), (a)(6)(C), or (b)(3), as applicable. Upon submittal of the original signature copy of the Form SAB 50-05, if OPSC determines that the Form SAB 50-05 is not valid, the district will have ten

business days to amend the Form SAB 50-05 in order to make the Form SAB 50-05 valid. If the OPSC does not receive a valid, original signature copy of the Form SAB 50-05 within the time period:

(1) The priority funding Apportionment or approved advance release of funds request shall be rescinded without further Board action, and

(2) If the Application is not subject to rescission pursuant to Section 1859.90.3(c) as defined in Section 1859.90.3(d), the Application shall return to the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans) with a new unfunded approval date that is 90 calendar days from the date of Apportionment or approval of the advance release of funds request.

(d) In the event that the amount of requests received during a specific 30-calendar day filing period exceeds the funds available, the Board shall apportion based on the unfunded approval date and the Application received date up to the available cash from each bond source. Projects that have requested to participate in the priority funding process for which an Apportionment cannot be provided shall retain their date order position on the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans). Requests not converted to Apportionments will not be returned to the district or kept by the OPSC.

(e) In the event that unexpected cash proceeds from sources other than bond funds become available for use for priority funding Apportionments, at a public meeting the Board may, based on considerations relevant to the amount of time available to effect a distribution of funds, waive the 30-calendar day filing provision specified in this section for impacted school districts to provide funds more rapidly.

(1) OPSC shall identify and invite impacted school districts to submit a priority funding request that meets all other criteria in (a) above.

(2) Requests submitted under this provision shall be valid from the date the priority funding request is submitted until the end of the regularly scheduled filing period specified above.

(3) Requests submitted under this provision must comply with all other requirements of the priority funding process in this Section and Section 1859.90.3.

(4) Districts may decline to submit a request outside the normal 30-calendar day filing period without consequence. If the option to submit a request is declined, the requirements to participate in the standard 30-calendar day filing periods specified in (a) above remain in effect.

(5) Unexpected cash proceeds from sources other than bond funds include, but are not limited to, the \$250 million appropriated from the General Fund to the 2016 State School Facilities Fund as a result of the enactment of Statutes of 2021, Chapter 44, Section 163 (Assembly Bill 130).

(f) For purposes of this section “rescinded” or “rescission” shall mean that the Apportionment or approved advance release of funds request returns to unfunded approval status with a new unfunded approval date, except for (a)(5)(A). The new unfunded approval date will be 90 calendar days from the Apportionment date. The district or charter school will not be required to re-submit the Application and no further Application review will be required.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.90.3: Participation in the Priority Funding Process

This section applies to Applications for funding for new construction, modernization, Overcrowding Relief Grant, Career Technical Education Facilities

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Program, Facility Hardship pursuant to Sections 1859.82.1 and 1859.82.2, and Charter School Facilities Program, excluding advance release of design and/or site acquisition funds from a Preliminary Charter School Apportionment.

(a) For each Application on the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans) for new construction, modernization, Facility Hardship pursuant to Sections 1859.82.1 or 1859.82.2, the occurrences of (1) or (2) below shall be limited after the effective date of this regulation section [March 25, 2013]. For each Application on the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans) for Overcrowding Relief Grant, Career Technical Education Facilities Program, and Charter School Facilities Program, excluding advance release of design and/or site acquisition funds from a Preliminary Charter School Apportionment, the occurrences of (1) or (2) below shall be limited after the effective date of this regulation section [October 1, 2014]:

(1) The district abstains from participating in a priority funding 30-calendar day filing period described in Section 1859.90.2 for the Application on the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans).

(2) The Application receives a priority funding Apportionment pursuant to Section 1859.90.2(a), and the district fails to meet the fund release requirements pursuant to Section 1859.90.2(c).

(b) The first occurrence of (a)(1) or (a)(2) shall result in the following, as applicable:

(1) If (a)(1) occurs, the Application shall retain its place on the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans).

(2) If (a)(2) occurs, the priority funding Apportionment shall be rescinded and the Application shall be returned to the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans) pursuant to Section 1859.90.2(c)(2).

(c) If subsection (b) has occurred, a subsequent occurrence of either (a)(1) or (a)(2) shall result in the rescission of the Application's Apportionment and/or unfunded approval, as applicable, and the removal of the Application from the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans) without further Board action. The Application shall be returned to the applicant.

(d) For purposes of subsection (c), "rescinded" or "rescission" of an unfunded approval shall mean that the bond authority associated with the Apportionment or unfunded approval, as applicable, returns to the appropriate School Facility Program bond authority source for reallocation. If applicable, the pupils housed in the project will be added back to the district's baseline eligibility pursuant to Sections 1859.51(d) for new construction or 1859.61(d) for modernization.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.90.5: Local Bond Reimbursement Fund Releases

When a school district uses local bond funds to make eligible project expenditures authorized in the Leroy F. Greene Act and state school bonds funds are made available to reimburse the state's share of those eligible project expenditures, the reimbursement funds shall be used as follows:

(a) Toward retiring the local bonds; and/or

(b) Toward uses permitted by the local bond, or

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General Overview

Central Union Elementary School District was invited to apply for a grant under the Public Schools on Military Installation (PSMI) in April 2020. This invitation was in response to the Facility Condition Assessment report completed for schools on installations (Exhibit #1). The Office of Local Defense Community Cooperation (OLDCC) prioritizes schools with the most severe capacity or facility condition deficiencies, as the Secretary of Defense determined on April 15, 2019, Public Schools on the Military Installations Priority List.

Most recently, the District was awarded the total grant allocation (both design and construction) of \$36,599,078 from the Office of Local Defense Community Cooperation (OLDCC) (Exhibit #2). The PSMI federal grant program represents a critical funding stream for the R.J. Neutra project recognized by OLDCC for the District. A distinctive feature of the PSMI program is its requirement for a 20% local or state match contribution from participating school districts. This requirement emphasizes the importance of local and state commitment to improving educational facilities for military-connected students. While federal funding provides a significant portion of the resources needed for these projects, the local or state match ensures a shared investment as the program requires.

Thus, the basis for this appeal request to hold and advance the funding apportionment as referenced in correspondence from OPSC dated July 13, 2023 (Exhibit #3)

District Background –

Central Union Elementary School District is located in Lemoore, California. The District is in Kings County in the heart of the San Joaquin Valley. The rich agricultural land of Central California surrounds the area. Kings County is also home to NAS Lemoore, one of the U.S. Navy's largest master jet air station bases. The population of Lemoore is approximately 24,500, according to the latest US Census. The population of the entire Kings County area is roughly 152,000. NASL is the premier installation for West Coast Naval Air operations and houses the West Coast F-35C facilities, simulation devices, and on-site support personnel.

Central Union is comprised of four elementary schools. The District serves Transitional Kindergarten through Eighth Grade and maintains an enrollment of approximately 1650 students. The District employs 260 staff members, comprising administrators, teachers, secretaries, cafeteria staff, maintenance staff, and instructional support staff.

Two federal facilities are within the District. Besides the Lemoore Naval Air Station, the Tachi-Yokut tribe resides on the Santa Rosa Rancheria, which is also within the boundaries of the Central Union District. The Federal presence in Central Union is significant. Of the District's student enrollment numbers, 88% of our children live on the installation or the reservation.

Site Background Information - R. J. Neutra Elementary School - NAS Lemoore

On the NASL installation, Central Union maintains two schools, R.J. Neutra Elementary School and Admiral Akers Elementary School. R. J. Neutra is a Transitional Kindergarten through Fifth-grade campus serving roughly 480 students, and Akers Elementary School serves a population of approximately 640 students, covering Preschool through Eighth Grade.

The R.J. Neutra campus was constructed in 1960 at Naval Air Station Lemoore. The architect, Richard James Neutra, provided a unique design and was innovative in using open space and flexible options for classroom spacing. The district is sensitive to the unique nature and design of the existing structure. The District is conscious of integrating new construction on the site, which enhances and compliments its work on the existing structures.

Project Scope

The ultimate objective of this project is the renovation, modernization, and expansion of R. J. Neutra Elementary School, which is responsive to and complies with the Facility Condition Assessment Report issued on April 4, 2018. The Facility Condition Assessment Report rated the R.J. Neutra Elementary School as Condition Q-3 (yellow) and Capacity C-4 (red). The “Renovation, Modernization, and Expansion R.J. Neutra Elementary School Project” will include thirteen (13) new classrooms, a new food service and cafeteria dining area, repurposing the existing multipurpose room, renovating the existing classrooms, reconditioning and enhancing the parking lot for traffic flow, reconditioning hardcourt and flatwork around the campus, and addressing and enhancing the general systems which have reached the end of life utilization.

Status to Date

The District was awarded financial hardship status at the September 2022 SAB hearing. Design funding from OPSC was released in December 2022, with an allocation of \$533,777 to the District for Advanced Design funding, and the District provided a local match of \$177,883.

Upon notification of the State award, the District immediately secured the services of a construction management group, VANIR, to assist as this project advances. Working with VANIR and with ongoing consultation of OLDCC, the District has pursued a Progressive Design-Build delivery system, which ultimately will provide a quality project at a competitive cost in a shorter time frame than traditional design-bid-build.

In progressive design-build (PDB), the design and construction phases overlap to some extent. This overlapping allows for greater flexibility and collaboration, resulting in a more optimized final design. However, this iterative process can lead to more time spent in the design stage as decisions may need to be revisited and adjusted throughout the design

process. Additionally, the collaborative nature of progressive design-build may require more time upfront to ensure alignment between the owner, designer, and builder.

The process began early in February 2023 by developing a Request for Qualification (RFQ) to determine a shortlist of the most qualified PDB entities based on various criteria. Following the RFQ process, the District presented the 'shortlist' teams with an RFP for the R.J. Neutra. The District interviewed DBE teams, secured a team for the design-build in April 2023, and has been actively working with this DB team (Bush+DLR) to refine the design and scope of the overall project.

With Vanir's support, the District has carefully reviewed architectural programming, conducting assessments to fine-tune facility requirements and operational flows. They also utilized advanced Building Information Modeling (BIM) techniques for better project visualization and decision-making.

In parallel, the District led the selection process for additional consultants crucial to project success, such as geotechnical and environmental experts, ensuring a well-rounded approach to planning.

Overall, the District's efforts, supported by Vanir's expertise, have laid a strong foundation for project success, paving the way for future design and construction phases.

Progress milestones achieved:

Preliminary & Schematic Design Completion:

The preliminary design phase has been completed, with designs vetted and selected by the District. This phase laid the groundwork for subsequent schematic design activities, and schematic design plans have been provided, refining the project's design elements.

Design Team Collaborations:

Design team meetings have been instrumental in addressing key considerations, such as safety enhancements for drop-off areas and coordination with photovoltaic consultants to meet solar requirements.

Budget Review and Optimization:

Challenges related to schematic design cost estimates exceeding expectations have been acknowledged, prompting proactive measures to optimize budget allocations. Budget review meetings and in-person school tours have informed decisions to align design solutions with actual needs and fiscal constraints. Cost management remains a priority, with the District closely monitoring projected expenses and conducting cost estimates at critical stages of this design.

Engagement with Regulatory Agencies:

Constructing and modernizing a school on a military base requires significant consultation with installation staff and ongoing conversations with the Federal Team (OLDCC) to ensure compliance with Federal Standards. Engagements with regulatory bodies, including the Navy's Public Works and the OLDCC Federal compliance under the OLDCC Protection, have provided valuable insights and guidance to ensure compliance and facilitate approval processes. Over the prior months, the District, Bush+DLR, and Vanir have had multiple conversations during the design process to address the NEPA and Anti-terrorism Force Protection (ATFP) requirements.

Commissioning activities were seamlessly integrated into the project, ensuring top-notch performance of building systems. Vanir's professionals collaborated closely with the District to oversee this process, guaranteeing adherence to quality standards.

The District has been in active Design-Build discussions since entering the contractual agreement with Bush+DLR. To date, schematic designs are complete, and the District anticipates Design Development to be completed in early May 2024. Most recently, on April 5, 2024, the District, VANIR, and Bush+DLR held a preliminary DSA application review to clarify all necessary items and timelines for the pending DSA application. The construction design documents are scheduled for submission to DSA no later than July 31, 2024

Essential to the PDB approach is strict schedule management, guided by Vanir's expertise in creating tailored schedules for construction projects. As addressed earlier, the regular design review meetings align with project objectives and schedules. To date, the proposed schedule from the Bush+DLR team has kept pace with the original (Exhibit #4) with no slippage.

Concluding Comment

In conclusion, the District is seeking advance authority to retain funds at the state level for the Neutra project due to the critical importance of securing funding for the renovation, modernization, and expansion of R.J. Neutra Elementary School. This project aligns with the priorities set forth by OLDCC and addresses significant capacity and facility condition deficiencies identified in the Facility Condition Assessment Report. The federal grant awarded to the District requires a local or state match contribution, emphasizing the shared commitment to improving educational facilities for military-connected students. The appeal request to hold and advance the funding apportionment is essential to ensure timely progress and successful completion of this vital project, benefiting the students, families, and community served by Central Union Elementary School District.

The Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) has prepared the following information at the request of the Office of Local Defense Community Cooperation (OLDDC) to document the actual and potential funding from the State Allocation Board's (SAB) School Facility Program (SFP) and California Preschool, Transitional Kindergarten, and Full-Day Kindergarten Facilities Grant Program (FDKFGP) that may be applied as local match towards the District's Public Schools on Military Installations (PSMI) Grant Program project at Neutra Elementary School.

FDKFGP Application Number – 70/63883-00-001 – Neutra Elementary

- The District received full state funding for the project with no local match required. In total, the District received \$3,311,110.00 and funds were approved for release to the District on February 25, 2021.

SFP Application Number – 57/63883-00-002 - Neutra Elementary

- At the September 21, 2022 SAB meeting, the SAB approved the District's appeal request for Financial Hardship status for Design funding, as well as for the future full adjusted construction grant (attached). This status is the Board's approval that the District qualifies to receive state funding to cover the District's required match for the project (less any local funding available).
- To date, OPSC has released \$533,777.00 to the District for Advanced Design funding for which the District also provided a local match of \$177,883.00.
- The District has 18 months from the Advanced Design fund release, until June 9, 2024, to demonstrate substantial progress and submit the [Substantial Progress Checklist](#). Substantial Progress is demonstrated by one of the following:
 - Submittal of the full adjusted grant funding application, or
 - Submittal of final building plans to the Division of the State Architect (DSA) with acceptance of the submittal by DSA, or
 - Submittal of other evidence satisfactory to the SAB detailing the reason(s) that plans have not yet been completed and accepted by DSA.

- Upon receipt of approved construction plans from the DSA and the California Department of Education (CDE), the district can remit an *Application for Funding* (Form SAB 50-04), and *School District Appeal* Request (Form SAB 189).
 - OPSC will process concurrently the application and appeal request. Presentation for approval of the appeal to the SAB occurs approximately 90-120 days after receipt.
 - As discussed, this appeal is to request the District's Modernization application be processed immediately, ahead of all other projects on OPSC's Workload List and Applications Received Beyond Bond Authority List.
 - As explained below under "Status of SFP Program Authority", the program is oversubscribed. To ensure program authority will be available to the District's project, the Form SAB 50-04 and Form SAB 189 should be submitted **by October 2024** for the SAB's consideration before March 2025.

- Because the District received Financial Hardship status by the SAB that carries over to their construction grant, OPSC would have to review and determine if the District has capital facility funds that could be applied to their project. If OPSC identifies unencumbered capital facility funds available or zero funds available, that would be offset against the total approved project cost (~\$5,517,119.62).
 - To date, the SAB has been supportive of all school district appeals for projects participating in the PSMI grant program.

- Assuming no additional District contribution, the District will have 365 days from the date the project is approved by the SAB to enter construction contracts for at least 50 percent of the work in the approved plans and to submit a Grant Agreement and *Fund Release Authorization* (Form SAB 50-05) to OPSC. The estimated fund release is approximately \$4,805,459.62 based on 2023 grant amounts. OPSC generally releases funds within 30 days of receiving a valid *Fund Release Authorization*.
 - To release \$4,805,459.62 the District would need DSA Approved Plans for eligible Modernization work and binding construction contracts for \$1,655,135.89.
 - (Total Project Funding = \$5,517,119.62, 60% construction commensurate = \$3,310,271.77, 50% of \$3,310,271.77 = \$1,665,135.89)
 - See attached for full project funding estimates.
 - In January 2024, it is generally expected that the grant amounts will be increase by the SAB. Likewise, it is also generally expected that the grants will be increased in January 2025. Historical changes in the SFP grant amounts can be found [here](#).

Status of SFP Program Authority

- As of May 31, 2023, the SFP is oversubscribed by approximately \$3.93 billion.

- As of June 27, 2023, the Legislature has submitted Senate Bill (SB) 114 (Education finance: education omnibus budget trailer bill) to the Governor for approval.
 - SB 114 provides \$1,960,500,000 in General Fund proceeds to the SFP in 2023/2024. OPSC processes approximately \$1.5 billion per year; therefore, this funding is estimated to last until March 2025.
 - SB 114 proposes \$875 million in General Fund proceeds to the SFP in 2024/2025. If approved, this funding is estimated to last until October 2025.

- Assembly Bill (AB) 247 (Muratsuchi) and SB 28 (Glazer) – OPSC is currently monitoring two legislative bills that propose a statewide school facilities bond be presented to the voters of California at an unspecified election date and the March 5, 2024 statewide primary election, respectively. Both bills could provide billions to the SFP if approved by voters.

Given the uncertainty at this time for 2024/2025 General Fund monies, or the two legislative bills subject to voter approval, OPSC recommends that the District submits DSA/CDE approved construction plans and a *School District Appeal Request* on or before October 2024.

OPSC will be able to provide a new update on timelines upon approval of a statewide bond initiative or the 2024/2025 State Budget in ~June/July 2024. If the additional \$875 million is approved by the Legislature and Governor, the October 2024 recommendation can be pushed out ~six to nine more months; however, it is too early to make assumptions on either occurring.

Oceanside Unified School District Appeal Request

General Overview

**Appeal Request: Application Nos: 57/73569-00-016 & 57/73569-00-017
Pablo Tac School of Arts (aka San Luis Rey)**

Oceanside Unified School District applied for a federal grant under the Public Schools on Military Installation (PSMI) program in August 2023 for North Terrace TK-8 School located on Camp Pendleton Marine Base to remedy deficiencies as identified by:

- The Department of Defense's (DoD) priority list
- The Facility Condition Assessment Report (FCAR) (Exhibit M)
- Facility Assessment Report by Bureau Veritas (Exhibit N)

The Office of Local Defense Community Cooperation (OLDCC) prioritizes schools with the most severe capacity or facility condition deficiencies, as the Secretary of Defense determined on April 15, 2019, Public Schools on the Military Installations Priority List placed North Terrace TK-8 Campus as No. 56.

The North Terrace K-8 School Facility Condition Assessment Report (FCAR) lists a deficiency at North Terrace of 151 percent over capacity with reliance on modular buildings to cover the capacity shortfall. However, this report failed to recognize that existing Buildings B through H are also of modular construction.

At an "Introduction Meeting" in Arlington, Virginia on June 6, 2022, OUSD presented the DoD with a pertinent campus history and condition, District standards, and project expectations. At this meeting, the DoD informed the LEA that the permanently placed modular buildings shall not be considered for capacity calculations. Subsequently, adjusted student capacity drops from 357 as indicated in the FCAR to 78 housed in kinder building K. This significantly increases the capacity deficiency previously indicated.

The PSMI federal grant program represents a critical funding stream for the North Terrace TK-8 School project for the District. A distinctive feature of the PSMI program is its requirement for a 20% local or state match contribution from participating school districts. This requirement emphasizes the importance of local and state commitment to improving educational facilities for military-connected students. While federal funding provides a significant portion of the resources needed for these projects, the local or state match ensures a shared investment as the program requires.

Thus, the basis for this appeal request to advance the funding apportionment for the Pablo Tac School of Arts would relieve local funding needed for the North Terrace TK-8 project.

District Background

Oceanside Unified School District (OUSD) serves the coastal city of Oceanside in San Diego County, California. The District covers approximately sixty-six square miles. It is bordered on the west along the Pacific Ocean, south on Vista Way, east on College Boulevard, and along the north at Marine Corps Base Camp Pendleton.

The District provides educational facilities servicing approximately 15,855 students in transitional kindergarten (TK) through twelfth grades. There are (21) schools in the district, including, (11) K-5 schools, (3) K-8 schools, (4) middle schools, (2) comprehensive high schools, and (1) alternative high school.

The District's student population includes nearly 2,000 students from Marine Corps Base Camp Pendleton. OUSD has an Unduplicated Pupil Percentage (UPP) of 68.8%. These are students who are identified as English Learners, Low Income, or Foster Youth/Homeless. The District's three largest student populations include Hispanic or Latino students (59.9%), White students (22%), and students who identify as Two or More Races (6.4%)

Once serving more than 20,000 students, OUSD has been experiencing declining enrollment for more than a decade. OUSD loses approximately 410 students per year across the district. We have had a steady decline in student enrollment over the past 10 years. Reasons for the decline in enrollment centers around the increased property values and young families no longer being able to afford homes. In addition, community members are remaining in their homes and their children are growing up and aging out of the school district. Lastly, the overall birthrate in California has been steadily declining since 2007. However, the enrollment at the district's three base schools remains higher than many of our schools located throughout the city. This is due in part to the multiple grade levels offered at each of the K-8 schools and military families choosing to live on base due to the expensive costs associated with living off base in a coastal community.

Site Background Information – North Terrace TK-8 School

North Terrace TK-8 school is located on the southern edge of Marine Corps Base Camp Pendleton near the intersection of the San Diego Freeway and Highway 76. The school was built in 1956 on a 13.3-acre site and served Kindergarten through fifth-grade students from both military and civilian families at that time. The campus was renovated in 2010-2011 when temporary modular classrooms were added to house middle school students. This renovation and subsequent projects provided the addition of temporary modular classrooms to house the added grade levels. Sixth and seventh grades were added in 2012 and eighth-grade students were added the following year. It is important to recognize that when the campus was converted to a TK-8 campus, support facilities were not enlarged or provided to accommodate middle school students.

Approximately 20% of the student population attending North Terrace Elementary (K-8) is made up of students who qualify for special education services. These services include Speech and Language Therapy, Specialized Academic Instruction (SAI) for students participating in mild/moderate programs, Occupational Therapy, Physical Therapy, Adaptive PE, counseling and/or social-emotional support services provided by the School Psychologist, and Special Education Preschool for students ages three-five.

Expected Benefits:

Improvements at North Terrace school at Camp Pendleton will benefit the student community by resolving capacity deficiencies, providing a controlled single point of entry, and providing a modern campus that is responsive to the Marine Base student population needs, the CDE recommendations, and the findings of the 2018 DODEA evaluation.

The primary goal is to provide adequate capacity for the student population with durable permanent spaces while remedying base access and security weaknesses. A secondary goal is to bring the quality of instructional spaces up to the expected level of statewide schools. The completed project will provide learning environments that meet the minimum recommendations of the CDE for 21st century schools and provide a strong educational foundation to empower students to reach higher goals.

NEED FOR ASSISTANCE

OUSD is a Transitional Kindergarten (TK) through 12th grade school district serving the Oceanside community and a portion of the Camp Pendleton Marine Base community. Although OUSD is in a beautiful coastal community, the District continues to lose revenue each year due to declining student enrollment. Because of the rising cost of real estate, families are no longer able to rent or purchase homes in the district and are moving to more affordable areas. As a result, the district includes an annual projected loss of 410 students to ensure accurate budgeting. For the 2022-2023 school, this estimated loss in revenue is more than \$5.2 million dollars.

Fortunately, the OUSD community has repeatedly put the needs of the students first and has passed multiple general obligations bonds to fund the modernization of existing buildings and the construction of new buildings and school sites. On June 3, 2008, Oceanside voters approved bond measure H authorizing the Oceanside Unified School District to issue up to \$195 million in general obligation bonds for school facility improvements. This enabled the district to complete the repairs and modernization effort established under the previous Proposition G bond construction program approved in June 2000 to provide high quality facilities for all Oceanside students.

OUSD utilized Prop H dollars to make significant modernization improvements to the North Terrace campus in 2010. This action caused concern in the community because the use of general obligations bonds funded by the Oceanside community is an unfair burden when the beneficiaries are primarily military personnel. Because the majority of the campus consists of permanent modulars nearly halfway through their lifespan, or

relocatable portables which are considered equipment, there is a great financial need for assistance due to the almost complete replacement of the school.

On November 3, 2020, Oceanside voters approved Measure W general obligation bond funds authorizing the Oceanside Unified School District to issue up to \$160 million in general obligation bonds for school facility and grounds improvements, enabling the district to repair and upgrade additional school facilities.

After being notified of the DoD grant opportunity, the OUSD School Board voted to approve the use of Measure W general obligation bond funds up to \$15 million dollars to support the rebuilding and modernization of North Terrace. Because the need to improve aging facilities across the district is so great, additional Measure W funds cannot be allocated for this project at this time. The District intends to seek funding from the state for any additional funds needed to fulfill the 20% contribution.

Project Scope

The District is proposing two options for the reconstruction of the North Terrace K-8 site. The design and phasing plans for the two options are the same. Construction budgets for each option are shown in Exhibit F.

Option One consists of the demolition of the entire site and the construction of an entirely new campus. Construction includes new classroom buildings with support spaces, library, and a dual use multi-purpose / gymnasium building with locker rooms. Administration and food service facilities are also included in the new construction. All playground and field spaces will be reconstructed. The Estimated Total Project Cost is \$90 million dollars.

Option two consists of the construction of new classroom buildings with support spaces, library, and a dual use multi-purpose / gymnasium building with locker rooms and food service facility. The existing administration will be expanded and modernized to facilitate a single point of entry. The three existing kindergarten classrooms will be modernized to meet the current accessibility code. The Estimated Total Project Cost is \$84.5 million dollars.

Site improvements for both options include a new parking lot, lunch court shade structure, site support buildings, playgrounds, and play field. The entire school will be fenced off from the civilian and base residential neighborhoods.

The campus will be fully operational during the construction of the new facilities. Minimal temporary housing will be used during construction. The goal for the project is to construct the new buildings while limiting the impact to the existing campus. Most of the new construction will occur on the existing play fields.

Concluding Comment

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In conclusion, due to the critical importance of securing federal funding for the renovation and expansion of North Terrace TK-8 School the District is seeking advance funding of Pablo Tac School of Arts Modernization Applications to relieve local funding to meet matching share requirements. This project aligns with the priorities set forth by OLDCC and addresses significant capacity and facility condition deficiencies identified in the Facility Condition Assessment Report. The federal grant awarded to the District requires a local or state match contribution, emphasizing the shared commitment to improving educational facilities for military-connected students. The appeal request is essential to ensure timely progress and successful completion of this vital project, benefiting the students of our military families.

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1. INTRODUCTION/BACKGROUND

The Local Educational Agency (LEA), Oceanside Unified School District (OUSD) is a public school district serving the coastal city of Oceanside in San Diego County, California. The District is one of forty-two public school districts in San Diego County and is located approximately forty miles north of the city of San Diego. The District covers approximately sixty-six square miles. It is bordered on the west along the Pacific Ocean, south on Vista Way, east on College Boulevard, and along the north at Marine Corps Base Camp Pendleton.

The District provides educational facilities servicing approximately 15,855 students in transitional kindergarten (TK) through twelfth grades. There are (21) schools in the district, including, (11) K-5 schools, (3) K-8 schools, (4) middle schools, (2) comprehensive high schools, and (1) alternative high school.

OUSD is made up of a diverse community and is committed to ensuring all students graduate college and career ready, prepared to be responsible global citizens and ambitious future leaders. The district's Values include.

- Students First: Our students are our highest priority. Every decision is made to maximize our students' well-being.
- Educational Equity: Every student receives the academic, social, and emotional support needed to thrive. Resources are allocated to address achievement and opportunity gaps.
- Diversity: Our learning community's diverse cultural experiences and intellectual variance drives our collective and individual success.
- Collaborative Relationships: We foster learning environments where meaningful collaboration occurs. Members of our learning community forge respectful relationships based on integrity, empathy, and dignity. Our community school's initiative and the support to military-affiliated students are just a couple of ways OUSD continues showing up for everyone in the district.

The District's student population includes nearly 2,000 students from Marine Corps Base Camp Pendleton. OUSD has an Unduplicated Pupil Percentage (UPP) of 68.8%. These are students who are identified as English Learners, Low Income, or Foster Youth/Homeless. The District's three largest student populations include Hispanic or Latino students (59.9%), White students (22%), and students who identify as Two or More Races (6.4%). The District employs the firm Davis Demographics on a yearly basis to update the student population. The table below provides additional details regarding district student demographics:

HISTORY

The first school in what is now Oceanside opened in 1880, eight years prior to the incorporation of the city. Although not much is known, it is reported to have housed high school-aged students and was named Oceanside High School.

The grammar school was built around 1888 on the corner of Topeka and Horne and was originally called Oceanside Grammar School but came to be known as Horne Street School. Available records indicate that it may have been the first permanent school structure in Oceanside. Oceanside Grammar School was a two-story frame structure with 100 students among nine grade levels housed in three rooms.

In 1906, a high school district was formed to make up the Oceanside-Carlsbad Union High School District; they included South Oceanside, Oceanside, Carlsbad, San Luis Rey, Libby, Calavera, River, Vista, Delpy, and Encinitas. High school was taught on the second floor of the schoolhouse, with elementary classes taught below. The first Oceanside-Carlsbad Union High School District graduation took place in 1909 and was held at the Mildred Opera House.

A bond issue was passed in 1913 and provided funds to build a separate high school building. The cornerstone was laid on May 3, 1913, and the building was completed by September. Fifty-five students and a staff of four began the school year in the new high school which contained four classrooms, a study hall, and an office. In 1920, a science building was added to the campus at the cost of \$17,500.

In 1940, there were just over 600 students enrolled in Oceanside schools. That number nearly doubled by 1946 and continued to grow steadily throughout the early 2000s. Once serving more than 20,000 students, OUSD has been experiencing

declining enrollment for more than a decade. OUSD loses approximately 410 students per year across the district. We have had a steady decline in student enrollment over the past 10 years. Reasons for the decline in enrollment centers around the increased property values and young families no longer being able to afford homes. In addition, community members are remaining in their homes and their children are growing up and aging out of the school district. Lastly, the overall birthrate in California has been steadily declining since 2007. However, the enrollment at the district's three base schools remains higher than many of our schools located throughout the city. This is due in part to the multiple grade levels offered at each of the K-8 schools and military families choosing to live on base due to the expensive costs associated with living off base in a coastal community.

North Terrace TK-8 School History

As can be seen in the attached aerial site plan (**Exhibit A**), North Terrace TK-8 school is located on the southern edge of Marine Corps Base Camp Pendleton near the intersection of the San Diego Freeway and Highway 76. The school was built in 1956 on a 13.3-acre site and served Kindergarten through fifth-grade students from both military and civilian families at that time. The campus was renovated in 2010-2011 when temporary modular classrooms were added to house middle school students. This renovation and subsequent projects provided the addition of temporary modular classrooms to house the added grade levels. Sixth and seventh grades were added in 2012 and eighth-grade students were added the following year. It is important to recognize that when the campus was converted to a TK-8 campus, support facilities were not enlarged or provided to accommodate middle school students.

The District selected temporary modular construction as a cost-saving delivery of classrooms buildings in a relatively short time frame. Modulares are pre-approved by the permitting agency (Division of the State Architect) and are procured and set on site faster than conventional construction. The District uses temporary modulares to quickly address student population growth with the intent of constructing permanent construction at a future date.

Transitional kindergarten (TK) has been available to four-year-old elementary students with birthdays that fall between September and December since 2012. TK was established when kindergarten was limited to only those students who turned five by September third. Previously, four-year-olds could enroll in kindergarten in the fall if they turned by December 3rd. Transitional kindergarten was added to the North Terrace campus in 2021.

Approximately 20% of the student population attending North Terrace Elementary (K-8) is made up of students who qualify for special education services. These services include

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Speech and Language Therapy, Specialized Academic Instruction (SAI) for students participating in mild/moderate programs, Occupational Therapy, Physical Therapy, Adaptive PE, counseling and/or social-emotional support services provided by the School Psychologist, and Special Education Preschool for students ages three-five.

This project will include two classrooms that will house the Intensive Behavioral Needs Special Education Preschool program and two and a half classrooms for the TK-8 mild/moderate program. One classroom will be dedicated to Speech and Language Therapy and an office will be provided for the School Psychologist. Due to a significant number of students with mobility impairments (i.e., wheelchairs, walkers), enough space is required either in or near the health office for a changing bed and/or lift to assist these students with toileting needs. An expanded playground structure and outdoor space will also be constructed to accommodate preschool through kindergarten-age students.

The entire facility will be designed to meet the accessibility requirements set forth by the California Building Code. The California and Federal regulations provide a comprehensive set of standards covering almost all important areas of accessibility for persons with physical and sensory disabilities. The project's construction documents will show compliance with these standards and will be reviewed and approved by the permitting authority, California's Division of the State Architect (DSA).

The table below provides a summary of North Terrace's student demographics for all students, including Preschool (-2), TK (-1), Kindergarten (0), and grades 1-8.

Located on the base perimeter, North Terrace School provides access from both the base and from the local civilian community. This condition is of extreme concern to base security due to the shared site access. Approximately eight-two percent of the student

population are housed on the base with the remainder from the civilian community, thus the current campus has two main points of entry.

OUSD has extended its lease with the Marine Corps Base (**Exhibit K**). The new lease is scheduled to end on August 30, 2053. Additionally, the attached “Letter of Support from the Host Installation” (**Exhibit I**) indicates that this process has begun.

The Secretary of Defense’s Public Schools on Military Installations (PMSI) Priority List placed North Terrace TK-8 Campus as No. 56. The North Terrace K-8 School Facility Condition Assessment Report (FCAR) (**Exhibit M**) lists a deficiency at North Terrace of 151 percent over capacity with reliance on modular buildings to cover the capacity shortfall. However, this report failed to recognize that existing Buildings B through H are also of modular construction. As indicated in the Facility Condition Assessment Report prepared by Bureau Veritas June 2021 (**Exhibit N**), the campus currently consists of the following buildings:

At the “Introduction Meeting” in Arlington, Virginia on June 6, 2022, OUSD presented the DoD with a pertinent campus history and condition, District standards, and project expectations (**Exhibit L**). At this meeting, the DoD informed the LEA that the permanently placed modular buildings listed above shall not be considered for capacity calculations.

Subsequently, adjusted student capacity drops from 357 as indicated in the FCAR to 78 housed in kinder building K. This significantly increases the capacity deficiency previously indicated.

In addition, the capacity evaluation addressed insufficient support facilities based on DoDEA Ed Specs. California Department of Education (CDE) also recommends sizes for support facilities. These support facilities consist of locker and band rooms for

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middle schools; and adequately sized Multi-Media Library, Multi-Purpose Room, and Administration spaces for TK-8 campuses.

The California Department of Education (CDE) identifies support spaces in TK-8 campuses per the following chart.

For the North Terrace TK-8 campus with a design load of 931 students, CDE recommends support spaces with the following sizes:

- Multi-purpose Room (931 x 5.3) 4,934 square feet
- Gymnasium/Locker Rooms (931 x 12.9) 12,010 square feet
- Library (931 x 2.3) + 600 2,741 square feet

Campus Master Plan Proposal

Considering current conditions, proximities, and security issues, it became apparent that most classroom buildings would require replacement to address the capacity issues. The new master plan included in this proposal / application seeks to provide a comprehensive solution providing improved adjacencies, intelligent use and/or re-use of existing facilities, and rectify base security concerns. This warrants that the design solution is predicated on providing a single point of entry for the campus, and that shared facilities are adequately sized and equipped to serve all grade levels to provide a cohesive and cost-effective solution.

The proposal includes two options for the campus master plan. Option 1 proposes a complete demolition and construction of the K-8 campus. Option 2 incorporates the re-use of two existing buildings with new construction for the remaining facilities and site. Both options require multiple construction phases to maintain operation of the school during construction. Construction phasing also minimizes the need for interim housing which is expected to reduce overall project costs and maximize grant funds. The design solution as can be seen in attached (**Exhibit D**) is therefore centered on the Administration building as the cornerstone of the project. To address the base security concerns, the Administration Building will become the new defensible single entry for the campus.

2. NEED FOR ASSISTANCE

OUSD is a Transitional Kindergarten (TK) through 12th grade school district serving the Oceanside community and a portion of the Camp Pendleton Marine Base community. Although OUSD is in a beautiful coastal community, the District continues to lose revenue each year due to declining student enrollment. Because of the rising cost of real estate, families are no longer able to rent or purchase homes in the district and are moving to more affordable areas. As a result, the district includes an annual projected loss of 410 students to ensure accurate budgeting. For the 2022-2023 school, this estimated loss in revenue is more than \$5.2 million dollars.

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After being notified of the DoD grant opportunity, the OUSD School Board voted to approve the use of Measure W general obligation bond funds up to \$15 million dollars to support the rebuilding and modernization of North Terrace. Because the need to improve aging facilities across the district is so great, additional Measure W funds cannot be allocated for this project at this time. The District intends to seek funding from the state for any additional funds needed to fulfill the 20% contribution.

Prior to 2022-2023, OUSD submitted a “Qualified” budget to the San Diego County Office of Education (SDCOE) for the previous five years because we were not able to meet our financial obligations for the current school year and two additional out years. Due to increases in State LCFF funding and ongoing efforts to decrease deficit spending, OUSD has certified a “Positive” budget for the 2022-2023 and 2023-2024 school years, demonstrating the District is able to successfully meet its financial responsibilities.

The State of California does not fully fund school facility needs. North Terrace has participated in the limited state modernization funding in the past, which provided funds for modernization of existing buildings and new construction funds for the addition of the existing temporary modular buildings. These buildings which received modernization funding are ineligible for new modernization funds for 25 years past the date of the previous upgrades in 2011.

A unique situation for public schools on military installations is the inequity for the tax paying public who receives little to no benefit related to bond sales for school facility upgrades. This fact creates difficulty for school districts to earmark substantial funds for reconstruction of school facilities on base. The optics are difficult to overcome when bond measures are being advertised to voters. For these reasons, the LEA appreciates the opportunity to participate in the PSMI program to upgrade this campus, as this project would be near impossible for the District to fund independently.

The early estimated overall project costs for Options 1 and 2 are \$90.2 million and \$84.5 Million respectively (**Exhibit F**). The District has committed to the full match of 20% but is continuing to explore additional funds from state and local organizations to bolster their contribution. The following are current options being sought.

Universal Prekindergarten Planning & Implementation (UPK P&I) Grant:

This program is a state early learning planning and capacity building initiative with the goal of expanding access for preschool-age students to Prekindergarten (Pre-K) programs at local educational agencies (LEAs). Grant funds can be applied to costs associated with creating or expanding California State Preschool and Transitional Kindergarten (TK) programs or establish or strengthen partnerships with other providers of Pre-K education with the LEA, including Head Start programs. This grant can provide as much as \$100,000.00 for LEAs with more than 100 pupils, \$50K for 24-99 pupils.

Kitchen Equipment Grant: This program provides funding for the procurement of new energy efficient kitchen equipment for schools. The kitchen equipment for a TK-8 school recently bid at just over \$370,000.00. It is expected that the grant amount could be \$120K.

Renewable Energy Improvements Grant: This program provides funding for the renewable energy improvements for schools. The campus is planning to install steel shade structures with roof top solar panels in the parking areas. Approximately 30,000 SF of solar panels would be necessary to achieve the school's electrical needs. It is estimated that the grant amount needed to achieve this would be \$1.5 M.

In addition to the above, the District will proactively seek out other, yet to be identified sources of funding for this project to meet any possible shortfall.

3. GRANT ABSTRACT

The Oceanside Unified School District (OUSD) is applying for grant funding from the DoD PSMI program to remedy deficiencies at this school as identified by:

- The Department of Defense's (DoD) priority list
- The Facility Condition Assessment Report (FCAR) (**Exhibit M**)
- Facility Assessment Report by Bureau Veritas (**Exhibit N**)
- Information provided to the District by DoD at introduction meeting (**Exhibit L**)

Furthermore, the District goal is to meet the California Department of Education (CDE) guidelines. The CDE oversees public education in the state. The department has specific guidelines for classroom, support facility and play area size and function. Adhering to these guidelines is required to obtain state funding. Designing the project to these guidelines will allow the school to obtain additional funding in the event new funding becomes available. OUSD has considered multiple options to resolve the identified deficiencies and examined them based on educational goals, facility condition, comparable educational facilities, construction costs, and future maintenance and operating expenses.

The design solution resolves DoD single point of entry concerns and current facility limitations by combining modernization and new construction. The construction, mostly all new buildings, resolves the significant capacity issues that cannot be addressed by modernization. Per the initial introduction meeting with the DoD, both the temporary placed modular buildings identified in the FCAR and the permanently placed modular buildings (not identified in the FCAR) are considered inadequate buildings. The existing Administration building, and a kindergarten classroom building are not of modular construction and are considered acceptable for capacity. The Multi-Purpose Building is not of modular construction, but it was built to serve the campus when it was a K-5 campus and is undersized based on comparable facilities.

The District proposes to construct this project in three phases. The first phase would include constructing pre-school, transitional kindergarten, and additional kindergarten classrooms; first through fifth grade classrooms; a new library; and interim housing for middle school grades. The second phase would include demolition of existing modular buildings and construction of middle school classrooms, MPR, locker rooms, lunch shelter, and vehicular access/parking. The third construction phase would include demolition of the existing MPR, removal of interim housing, and construction of play areas.

4. RESULTS OR EXPECTED BENEFITS

Grant funds awarded to the North Terrace school at Camp Pendleton will benefit the student community by resolving capacity deficiencies, providing a controlled single point of entry, and providing a modern campus that is responsive to the Marine Base student population needs, the CDE recommendations, and the findings of the 2018 DODEA evaluation.

The primary goal is to provide adequate capacity for the student population with durable permanent spaces while remedying base access and security weaknesses. A secondary goal is to bring the quality of instructional spaces up to the expected level of statewide schools. The grant funds will help the District to provide learning

environments that meet the minimum recommendations of the CDE for 21st century schools and provide a strong educational foundation to empower students to reach higher goals.

5. APPROACH AND TIMELINE

Design Approach

Due to the quantity of both temporary and permanent modular buildings on the site and the inadequate size of the MPR, the District has limited options in addressing the DoD's capacity deficiencies. Since all but three buildings are of modular construction, most all classroom buildings will be newly constructed.

The original approach focused on maintaining the existing Administration and Kinder buildings and considered enlarging the MPR in its current location. The MPR, being undersized, is a difficult building type to enlarge being that the main space, the stage platform, and the food service areas all require enlargement. Ultimately, considering the location of the MPR and the challenges related to enlargement; it became obvious that the MPR had limited value in its current location.

The main factors considered in the design approach are:

- Base security concerns
 - Access control
 - Vehicle control
- Limiting project cost
- Limiting disruption of school operations
- Separation of grade levels
- Adjacencies to shared facilities.
- Compliance with District Education Specifications
- Compliance with State requirements
- Equity with other TK-8 schools
 - On military installations
 - Within the state
- Supervision sightlines

Timeline

The District's architect, PBK, created a project schedule (**Exhibit E**), listing estimates for document creation, review and approvals, bidding, and construction categories. The schedule takes into consideration the extended review time for the approving permitting agency, DSA, as well as current lead times for critical path construction items. Construction phasing was included in the schedule to allow for the continuous operation

of the school campus during construction. Their design and construction schedule for Options 1 and 2 are the same.

Contractual Activity

The District has and will continue to solicit design and construction professionals by issuing Requests for Proposal and interviewing acceptable applicants as is required by the state of California contractual requirements. All RFPs will include selection criteria and cost will be considered a major factor in contractor selection.

The District has already let contracts for pre-design Architectural and Construction Management Services for the creation of this proposal. It is the District's intent to execute the project utilizing a CM-Multi-Prime contracting approach. The CM will be responsible for contract general conditions and oversight of the project prime contractors during all phases of construction. The advantage to this approach is that it encourages smaller contractors to bid the project and improves the competitive bidding process. All construction will be competitively bid using the Construction Management/Multiple Prime contractor method.

The following are contracts that the District has entered into:

- Architectural Design Services
- Construction Management (CM) Services
- Environmental professional for EIR and CEQA submittal
- Geotechnical Engineering services for soils reports
- Surveyor services for topographical study
- Hazardous Materials Survey
- Underground Utility Survey

6. SCOPE OF WORK

Description of the Project

The District is proposing two options for the reconstruction of the North Terrace K-8 site. The design and phasing plans for the two options are the same. Construction budgets for each option is included in the proposal.

Option One consists of the demolition of the entire site and the construction of an entirely new campus. Construction includes new classroom buildings with support spaces, library, and a dual use multi-purpose / gymnasium building with locker rooms.

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Administration and food service facilities are also included in the new construction. All playground and field spaces will be reconstructed.

Option two consists of the construction of new classroom buildings with support spaces, library, and a dual use multi-purpose / gymnasium building with locker rooms and food service facility. The existing administration will be expanded and modernized to facilitate a single point of entry. The three existing kindergarten classrooms will be modernized to meet the current accessibility code.

The school has been designed as three separate zoned areas for kindergarten and younger students, elementary students and middle students (**Exhibit D**). The kindergarten, TK and pre school special education classrooms will be clustered into their own compound providing the students within a secure fenced play area. The 1st through 5th graders will be housed in a separate two-story building and will have access to their own age-appropriate playgrounds. The middle school students will also be housed in their own two-story building across campus and will have their own identity.

The administration building will serve as the single point of entrance to the school. The facility will include offices and administration spaces, conference rooms and nurses' office.

Each kindergarten, TK and Preschool classroom will include student toilet facilities, teachers work room and storage. Modular furniture and partitions will be employed to create flexible and private play spaces within the classroom space. TK classroom learning environments are designed to foster learning through play. Throughout the classroom are different areas or zones designated for specific play-based skill acquisition. Teachers determine which areas will be used during the instructional day to best support the standards being taught. All TK classrooms will receive new age-appropriate furniture that is mobile and can be easily relocated around the room. Teachers can place furniture in strategic ways so that the students' learning activities do not interfere with one another.

The gymnasium will serve as a multi-functional facility that will be used for athletic events, food service, band, drama, and school presentations. The gym will be sized to serve multiple competitive sports programs. A music room will be part of the facility and can accommodate their school band. The school invites student from the other two base middle schools to form a larger band for competitions. The gym will allow them a proper sized indoor area to practice. A full-service cooking kitchen will be located in the facility. The larger kitchen and outdoor shade structure will reduce the number of lunch periods required.

The proposed library is located in the center of the campus and will serve all students. The library will include book stacks, individual reading areas, small group instruction, librarian desk and office and a workroom. The counseling office will also be part of the library facility. The library will also be equipped with multimedia equipment.

The school will have several support facilities for each age group. Individual classrooms spaces will be used as flex spaces which are primarily used to support interdisciplinary exploration by providing a space for “messy” project creation, low intensity science labs (grades 1st through 5th), experimental learning needing specific equipment or access to water and tools. Five smaller classrooms are included for the Resource Special Program (RSP) to support children with learning disabilities. The middle school will include two dedicated science labs.

Site improvements for both options include a new parking lot, lunch court shade structure, site support buildings, playgrounds, and play field. The entire school will be fenced off from the civilian and base residential neighborhoods. Secondary fencing within the school will secure the kindergarten, TK and pre-school classrooms and playgrounds from the rest of the school. There will be no access from the campus to the surrounding neighborhood except through the monitored single point of entry. In the event of an emergency the children will be escorted to a safe dispersal zone on campus (**Exhibit D**).

The campus will be fully operational during the construction of the new facilities. Minimal temporary housing will be used during construction. The goal for the project is to construct the new buildings while limiting the impact to the existing campus. Most of the new construction will occur on the existing play fields. Construction will occur in three phases as described below and in (**Exhibit D**).

Scope of Construction Phase One

Phase one will consist of the demolition of a portion of the existing play fields, playgrounds, and three existing classrooms to allow for the construction of the new classroom buildings.

Construction will consist of a new two-story, 18 classroom elementary school building with support spaces. New one-story kindergartens (2), transitional kindergartens (3), preschool (1) and special educational (2) classrooms will be constructed adjacent to the existing kindergarten building and play area. A new library will be constructed east of the elementary school buildings. The new two-story 8 classroom middle school building with support spaces is planned to be constructed where the existing TK and special education classrooms are located. Two science labs will be included in this building. Three temporary classroom portables and play area will be placed on the north side of the campus to house the displaced TK and special ed classes until the new facilities are completed in this phase.

Upon the completion of phase one all TK, kindergarten, special education, elementary and middle school students will re-locate into the newly completed classroom buildings.

Scope of Construction Phase Two

Phase two will consist of the removal of the temporary classrooms and play areas from the site. Demolition will occur for all existing temporary and permanent modular structures.

Construction will consist of a new multi-purpose/gym building, locker rooms and food service kitchen. Exterior improvements will include a lunch court shade structure and playgrounds. A lobby addition to the existing administration building and new parking lot accessed from the public way will be constructed to facilitate a single point of entry to the campus.

Scope of Construction Phase Three

Phase three will consist of the demolition of the existing multi-purpose building, kitchen, and remaining playgrounds.

Construction will consist of additions to the play field and playgrounds. A light modernization of the existing administration building, and kindergartens will occur.

Special Education Requirements and Classroom Loading

Oceanside Unified School District has developed their Educational Specifications based upon the State Department of Education's recommendations and standards to support a design capacity of 900 TK through eighth grade students. The primary function of educational specifications is to communicate the educational vision of the District and to define the physical attributes that will best support and enhance that vision. This document will provide an outline of the primary components for each campus based on a specific grade configuration. Special Education requirements are defined in the Educational Specifications including non-severe special education classrooms, resource specialist, speech therapist, and psychologist offices to serve all grade levels. "Form follows function" perfectly describes the relationship between the educational specifications and a high performing educational environment. A 21st century school facility must respond to the educational, technical, and environmental demands of the end users. Both teachers and students will be better equipped to teach and learn in spaces that are light, comfortable, and functional. A bridge between the curriculum and the functional utility of the school facility is the purpose for the educational specifications.

State Requirements:

- a. California Code of Regulations, Title 5 14001 (a) and 14030 (a) require by law that educational specifications be prepared for new facilities.

- b. CSBA Board Policy 7100 - The Superintendent of each LEA “Oversees the preparation of school construction and modernization plans from the developed educational specifications.”

The educational specifications will serve as a district standard which will serve as a guide during the design and construction document phase for the proposed Oceanside USD TK-8 School Facility. They also help the District qualify for state funding when site conditions require deviation from California Department of Education (CDE) school construction guidelines.

Space Requirements

Today’s classrooms look quite different from those of the past. Students do not necessarily sit in rows of desks; teachers are as often working alongside students as lecturing in front of them. In many schools, students enjoy the luxury of a laptop for every learner. Learning environments today need to embrace the variety of places, ideas, and people that the modern world demands and reflect a flexibility of space, time, people, and technology.

21st century learning environments center on the ideas of flexibility, transparency, and function. Physical learning environments need to sustain and promote multiple modes of student learning, supporting both individual and group work, providing space for presentation and exploration, promoting interaction and a sense of community, and fostering both formal and informal learning. Technology can help seamlessly support the 21st century learning environment by blending physical and digital arrangements. OUSD supports the implementation of these ideas in all spaces whether they are classrooms or support spaces.

Please refer to the attached Educational Specifications (**Exhibit G**) providing detailed loading standards and area requirements for each grade level. It is important to note that while recommended student loading standards suggested by CDE are typically utilized in determining OPSC funding eligibility and grants, most Districts utilize different numbers that relate more to their individual needs, teacher contracts, and other factors. The student loading standards incorporated into the OUSD TK-8 School Facility educational specifications are as follows:

It is difficult to provide the proper number of electives and specialty programs for middle school students at a school with a middle school population of 221 students. The Oceanside USD’s middle school have approximately 1,000 students which can support additional science, and sport programs. Fortunately, there is an overlap of programmatic requirements between the elementary school and middle school students. The District standard for an elementary school includes a multi-purpose room with food service and music rooms. The additional middle school students require this buildings floor area to be increased allowing for a gymnasium with locker room function to be included in the design with minimal additional cost. Separate science classrooms are included in the middle school building.

Deficiencies

Capacity

The PSMI Priority List identifies the deficiency at North Terrace TK-8 campus as being 151 percent over capacity due to the twenty-two temporary modular buildings. There are an additional nineteen modular classrooms, a library, and counselling/support space placed on permanent foundations between 1955 and 1957 when the campus was initially constructed. These twenty-two permanently placed modular buildings have exceeded their design life, and it is our understanding that the DoD would not classify these buildings as providing capacity.

The three kinder classrooms in Building K, constructed in 2010, do provide capacity (per OUSD’s loading) for 78 kinder students. The corrected total capacity for this campus is, therefore, 78 or over 1000 percent over capacity. Since the DoD loads classrooms at nineteen students and the state requires classrooms of 960 s.f. minimum; the area deficiency for classrooms at this campus is **41,280 square feet**.

In addition to instructional spaces, the FCAR lists the following deficiencies for support spaces.

- Gymnasium / Multi-purpose 12,796 s.f. needed.
- Cafeteria 3,348 s.f. needed.
- Food Service 4,069 s.f. needed.
- Information Center 4,238 s.f. needed.
- Pre-Kindergarten 305 s.f. needed.

While not included in the FCAR, the campus has a need for two science classrooms for the seventh and eighth grade students based on the District's educational specifications. Science instruction is currently housed in standard classrooms and District Ed Specs require 50% larger spaces.

- Science 1,100 s.f. needed.

Considering classrooms and the support space values identified above would suggest that total area deficiency (not including acceptable space) is **67,136 square feet**.

The multipurpose room and kitchen were constructed in 1956 and were sized to meet the K through 5 student population for the original school. In 2012 the school went through a whole site modernization that included adding temporary modular classrooms for middle school students. The multi-purpose room and kitchen were not expanded for this additional student population. As a result, breakfast and lunch food service are separated into a staggered schedule over a two-hour time period. The multipurpose room is too small to shelter the students in inclement weather and there is no outdoor shade/rain shelter on site.

The District standards for middle school students include a gymnasium sized to hold a middle school basketball court. The gymnasium also serves as cafeteria space in inclement weather and for school wide band, drama, and parent meetings. The existing multipurpose room is too small to accommodate any of these programs. The lack of gymnasium facilities also does not allow the school to offer any competitive sports programs.

Condition

The 2018 FCAR lists a Q-1 rating (97%) for the existing permanent buildings on the campus. This report does identify that interior and exterior wall finishes will be beyond the useful service life for all buildings by the year 2023.

While the campus has been well maintained, there does exist some waste pipe clogging noted at Buildings E, F, and G and some asphalt cracking at play areas per the Bureau Veritas report. It bears noting that this 66-year-old campus has an underground utility

infrastructure of that same age thus exceeding its useful life. It would be logical to expect that many of these underground systems would need replacement.

Hazardous Materials

The latest Asbestos and Lead-based Paint Survey was prepared for the site in 2005. The report was produced in advance of the subsequent 2012 modernization of the site. Findings include asbestos contained in 9x9 floor tile and mastic, a small amount of window putty, duct tape and “vibration” cloth, heat shield insulation and select areas of roofing. The floor tile was encapsulated under new carpet and the putty was removed during the replacement of the windows. The other items would have been remediated if the new work disturbed these items.

Lead paint was found in small quantities at two classroom buildings, the TK and special education classrooms, and the multipurpose building.

A new Asbestos and Lead-based Paint Survey will be contracted prior to new work on this campus.

Anti-Terrorism Force Protection (ATFP)

The North Terrace campus, constructed in 1956, predated the creation of the ATFP requirements. The Marine Corp Base Camp Pendleton has provided the current requirements for minimum ATFP and Oceanside USD commits to incorporate the requirements into the project.

Design Standards

Schools built in the state of California are expected to comply with the California Department of Education recommendations. These recommendations have been compiled to provide school districts with guidelines for school facilities. These guidelines are based on a district’s educational goals and have been created to provide reciprocity among other school districts in the state. Programs in this proposal strive to bring this school facility in line with the facilities in the surrounding communities. The nearest of these schools can be found at the San Onofre School District which has facilities at their schools that include physical education locker rooms, science classrooms, MPR, Library, and other specialty classrooms. Technology is a necessity in bringing school facilities into the twenty-first century and is part of the recommendations from the CDE.

As a federally funded project, each phase of construction will be designed to meet a LEED Silver equivalent. California Building Code (CBC) is considered progressive and already includes many of LEED’s efficiency requirements including commissioning. The

District's Architect has numerous employees who are LEED certified and can provide documentation and design service to verify the validity of the design.

The project target will be designed to exceed net zero energy consumption. Solar collectors, natural daylighting, ventilation, energy efficient architectural features, and other energy savings/generating measures will be included in the project and will be used as teaching features within the school architecture.

Site Recommendations

The California Department of Education provides a list of standard educational recommendations for site size; based on these recommendations the proposed site is adequate for the school. It is important to note that the state does not provide any additional size determination for ATFP requirements, and the physical education program is the most influential factor in determining site size. The new proposed site will encompass 13.3 acres which is in line with California Department of Education (CDE) recommendations.

Permits and Approvals

The approval process will include the following jurisdictions:

Camp Pendleton Base Fire Department

A fire flow test will be required for fire protection system design and the report will be submitted with an overall site plan for Local Fire Authority review and approval.

Oceanside Fire Department

A fire flow test will be required for fire protection system design and the design shall conform to all code requirements. Per California Building Code, should there be any deficient water supply or drive access capacity, the site plan will be submitted for Local Fire Approval.

Division of the State Architect (DSA)

The approval of construction documents, drawings, and specifications will be required by the Access Compliance, Fire/Life Safety, and Structural Safety departments at DSA. The project will be permitted under the latest version of the

California Building Code. This code has been amended from the International Building Code to address the considerable seismic and fire safety issues unique to California. In addition, the code places further requirements on California schools. San Diego is located in seismic zone 4, the highest seismic zone in the state. These upgraded safety features allow school sites to be used as hubs during natural disasters.

A geotechnical engineering report will need to be submitted to the Department of Geologic Survey (DGS) for review and approval of the professional conclusions and recommendations.

During construction, a full-time project inspector approved by DSA will be required to provide continuous oversight, and a DSA field engineer will make routine trips to the site to be apprised of construction progress and/or issues. There will be continuous reports and updates made to an internet storage site called the "DSA Box," and any changes to the project will require additional approvals from DSA. All involved parties will require final reporting so that DSA will certify that the project has been constructed as indicated in the construction documents.

Camp Pendleton Base Planning / Public Works: The design will be reviewed with Base Planning for ATRP and security aspects and to coordinate color choices and design aesthetics.

San Diego Health Department

All modernization and new construction that includes food services like cafeterias, MPR buildings, and concession spaces will require review and approval by the county health department.

California Department of Education (CDE): CDE will be the point of contact for project review for any potential state funding. It is not expected at this time that this review will be required, but we hope to meet with state officials to determine any potential funding options.

NEPA/CEQA

The LEA has contracted with PlaceWorks, a qualified professional to evaluate the site. The proposed construction of the North Terrace K-8 Reconstruction Project will trigger requirements for environmental review under both the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). The Department of Defense (DOD) will be responsible for completing the NEPA process and PlaceWorks

will prepare the CEQA document and take responsibility for coordinating the process. Based on our preliminary review, we expect the project to qualify for a categorical exemption under a Class 2, Replacement and Reconstruction and Class 12, Minor Additions to School (CEQA Guidelines 15302 and 15314, respectively).

Camp Pendleton MCB will be conducting an environmental assessment for the entire site and preparing a NEPA analysis and making a finding/determination.

Both processes will take place during the design phase and will need to be completed prior to DSA approval of construction documents. Both reports will be submitted to the Office of Economic Adjustment (OLDCC) for review. As the federal funding agency, OLDCC will make the final NEPA determination. Once that determination is made, the special condition will be lifted.

The District recognizes that the NEPA requirements have not been satisfied at the time of the application and recognizes that the grant will include special conditions that will prohibit the start of construction until the environmental requirements have been satisfied.

Match Sources (Known and TBD)

The Oceanside Unified School District Board has met and approved the use of \$15 million of capital funds as a match for the project, which was the original assumed amount needed. The construction estimates for the two options are \$90,253,000 and \$84,548,000. The 20% match required, based on those options, would require an additional \$3,050,600 or \$1,909,600 respectively. The district is confident that the extra funding can be found for the added requirement through the potential grant funding listed below or use of the local bond measure. All of these options would require board approval prior to use.

While it is the hope that these funds will be adequate to fulfill the LEA's match, it is expected that approximately \$100K can be added via an Energy Efficient Kitchen Equipment Grant.

The OUSD has met with the Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) to review additional state funding due to the state-mandated expansion of the TK program. OPSC is also investigating whether the District is eligible for hardship grant funding.

Beyond state options, the District will pursue grants from the private sector. These might include educational partnerships, energy efficiency grants, and programs yet to be determined.

Feasibility/Decision of New Construction vs. Modernization

As discussed previously, the DoD does not consider modular construction as providing capacity, therefore the comparison study will be limited to Building A (Administration), Building K (kinder classrooms), and Building M (Multi-purpose building).

Both Buildings A and K were constructed in 2010 and are viable buildings for remodeling/addition based on condition and location. Building K would require minimal remodeling, while Building A will require an addition to provide added security at a new single point of entry lobby and space for a missing conference room.

Building M was considered for modernization, but a cost analysis was not provided. The complexity of enlarging the three main spaces in its current location would not have provided a solution providing a cohesive and efficient campus design. Utilizing the newest buildings, A and K, as the linchpin for the campus, the MPR would have adjacency and accessibility issues that could not be overcome at its current location. Modernizing this 66-year-old MPR building in its current location would also require temporary specialty facilities during construction. The prudent solution based on cost and design solution is to replace the Multi-purpose building in its entirety.

The thought process, informed by the “Design Approach” above, was developed during a charrette on September 13, 2022, with participants from Base Security, District Staff, Facilities Staff, School Staff, and PBK staff.

None of the facilities noted above are operated by the Oceanside USD

Please note that the fourth entry above was bid prior to the Covid pandemic. Costs have escalated significantly as can be seen by the remaining entries above. We estimate that the costs have increased up to 40% from when Mary Fay TK-8 was bid.

Comparison data for renovation costs have not been provided since the capacity deficiencies cannot be rectified via the modernization of the existing structures. The

design solution utilizes modernization where available to limit costs, thus a modernization feasibility study does not seem warranted.

FEMA Special Flood Zone Statement

The site has been operated for several decades and though it does have some surface drainage issues, it is not in an active flood zone as can be seen on attached (**Exhibit J**). However, the design will address localized surface drainage issues throughout the site during rain events. A storm drain retention basin will be designed to hold much of the water on site with any overflow connecting to the existing storm drainage systems.

Letter of Support from the Host Installation

A letter from the base commander in support of the project has been attached as (**Exhibit I**).

7. BUDGET TAB

The District's architect, PBK, created two cost estimates (**Exhibit F**) for the total project cost for this campus. Option one is for a complete reconstruction of the campus. Option 2 consists of the replacement of a majority of the structures and site work. Two existing buildings will be modernized and have been assigned a lower SF cost. The total project cost includes both hard construction costs and soft costs. The estimates are based on current construction costs and include an assumed escalation to the mid-point of construction of 9%.

I. INTRODUCTION

North Terrace K-8 School is located at Camp Pendleton, California. This school services 895 students in grades Pre-Kindergarten through Eighth.

This report provides a summary of findings for the physical condition and functional adequacy assessment of buildings at this school.

The physical condition assessment includes a general description of typical building systems found on campus and includes current (FY2018) conditions and forecast (FY2023) conditions. When multiple types of a system are present, the predominant system is shown.

Following Office of the Secretary of Defense (OSD) Facility Sustainment Model guidelines, and consistent with Department of Defense Education Activity (DoDEA) practice, this assessment uses Condition Index (CI) and Quality Ratings (Q-Ratings) as a standard of measure to assess the condition of all public schools located on Department of Defense installations. The CI and associated Q-Ratings are calculated as the ratio of maintenance and repair needs (requirements) to plant replacement value. The resulting percentages are then aligned against the OSD Q-Rating guidance to determine the overall rating of the facility. Q-Ratings will be developed for Permanent (Perm) and Semi-Permanent (Semi)

types of construction only. Q-Ratings will not be developed for Temporary (Temp) and Relocatable (Relo) types of construction. Definitions for types of construction are: a) Permanent – expected to be used for more than 25 years; b) Semi-permanent – expected to be used 5 to 25 years; c) Temporary – expected to be used less than 5 years; and d) Relocatable – designed for specific purpose of being readily moved, erected, disassembled, stored, and reused without structural damage and a minimum of refurbishment.

The functional adequacy assessment includes two parts: spatial adequacy and capacity. Spatial adequacy examines the size of core spaces within the facility compared to the adopted educational specification and how these spaces affect the school's capacity and learning environment. School capacity calculations consider the instructional spaces and sizes of the cafeteria and kitchen.

Note: Details of the standards and processes used are presented in Appendix A, Facility Condition Assessment Standards and Processes.

II. SCHOOL PHYSICAL DESCRIPTION

- a. **STRUCTURAL/EXTERIOR ENCLOSURE:** The building exterior is primarily stucco. The predominant roofing system is multi-ply rolled roofing or polymer modified bitumen. Exterior doors are predominantly steel with glazing. Window systems are double pane glass mounted on steel frames.
- b. **INTERIORS:** Flooring systems used include resilient tile and carpet. Walls are generally painted surfaces. Ceilings are predominantly acoustical lay-in.
- c. **MECHANICAL:** Campus facilities have heating typically provided electric packaged heating units located in the mechanical room. All campus facilities except restroom buildings have air conditioning typically provided by split systems using outside condensers and indoor evaporator coils located above an air handler unit in the mechanical rooms. Individual classrooms have a separate unit with individual controls. The campus does not have elevators.
- d. **ELECTRICAL:** Major electrical upgrades have not been made. The IT infrastructure is sufficiently advanced to support a very efficient wireless network in support of all classroom learning requirements. Most lighting is recessed fixtures with fluorescent lamps. Ground-fault circuit interrupter (GFCI) receptacles appear to be present in required locations. The campus has an intercom system. In addition, the campus has a security system.
- e. **PLUMBING:** Plumbing fixtures are original and piping is original. Domestic hot water is typically provided by electrical water heaters.

III. ASSESSMENT FINDINGS

The current Q-Rating for North Terrace K-8 School is Q-1; enrollment at the time of the site visit was 895; and the calculated capacity using DoDEA standards is 357.

The school was found to be well maintained and it provided a good learning environment. As a result of interviews with head custodian and visual observations, no building systems were found to be beyond useful service life. A summary of all systems and their useful service life will be contained in the final report.

IV. QUALITY / CONDITION RATINGS

Table 1 shows building-specific information to include type of construction, year built, gross area, Condition Index (CI) and Q-Rating. Table 2 contains requirements and plant replacement values, which are used to calculate CI and Q-Ratings shown in Table 1.

V. SUMMARY OF EXPIRED SYSTEMS (FY2018)

Table 2 reflects building systems that are beyond service life and that should be replaced now. Please note requirements and plant replacement values are used to calculate CI and Q-Ratings in Table 1.

The PRV and maintenance and repair requirements should be considered a representative value and should not be used for any other purpose than to calculate CI. Actual construction costs may deviate from the current published dollar values due to local market fluctuations and any unique building specifications. In the event a facility is to be replaced or renovated, a more detailed cost estimate must be completed to validate funding.

The requirement dollars reflect the estimated cost of necessary maintenance and repairs generated from the cost models established for each building assessed. See Appendix A for additional detail. Maintenance and repair requirements consist of the work necessary to ensure the asset is restored to a condition substantially equivalent to the originally intended and designed capacity, efficiency or capability.

The Plant Replacement Value (PRV) is calculated using industry and DoD standard methodology. According to DoD Pricing Guide, PRV represents the cost to design and construct a notional facility to current standards to replace an existing facility at the same

location. The PRV represents the sum of the current estimated values of the building components.

VII. FUNCTIONAL ADEQUACY SUMMARY

The Functional Adequacy study for this facility includes school capacity and spatial analysis. The findings are summarized and deficiencies, where identified, are assigned a cost. Representative photos of interior spaces are provided at the end of the summary.

a. SCHOOL CAPACITY ANALYSIS

As part of the functional adequacy study, a student capacity was computed for this facility using the data collected by the field observers. Capacity calculations were based on the methodology discussed in the section called Facility Condition Assessment Standards and Processes. Capacities for the existing classroom count and kitchen serving line follow:

There are twenty-two classes in relocatable buildings; there are no classroom sized spaces that are being used for instruction that contribute to permanent capacity. The school capacity calculation versus enrollment indicates that the facility needs twenty-nine additional classrooms to support the school's programs. The cost for additional classroom space is shown in Table 5 under the grade designation of 'ACN'.

Based on the information provided, the serving line appears to be adequate for the number of students participating. Lunch is served in the Cafeteria/ Multipurpose Room and the number and length of lunch periods appears to affect its use for other activities. The school does not have a separate gymnasium. Corrective action for food service areas are summarized in Table 5: Functional Adequacy Opinion of Probable Cost.

b. SPATIAL ADEQUACY ANALYSIS

The space types studied and listed below in Table 4 were observed, measured on-site and compared with the sizes from the adopted educational specifications of the Department of Defense Education Activity.

The results of the spatial adequacy analysis indicate deficiencies in space at the school, according to the size standards provided in the DoDEA Educational Specifications. The school does not have the Gymnasium/Multipurpose Room that is required for a school its size based on enrollment. The food service area, including the kitchen and serving line, is too small per DoDEA standards. Spaces that are far below the DoDEA size standard include Cafeteria/Cafetorium, Information Center and Food Service. The grades shown directly correlate to costs shown in Table 5. Spaces receiving grades of 'D' or 'F' are existing but too small. Spaces with a grade of 'R' are not provided but are required.

FACILITY CONDITION ASSESSMENT STANDARDS AND PROCESSES

The following provides a summary of the standards and processes used for this project.

1.0 STANDARDS

Applied in varying degrees of rigor as defined in the scope of work, the following standards are the basis for the assessment and data analyses processes. The OSD Quality Rating (Q-Rating) for the physical condition of buildings and other guidance listed below set forth the standards for measurement of facility physical conditions.

Life safety building codes:

- International Building Code (IBC)
- National Electric Code (NEC)
- National Fire Protection Association (NFPA)

OSD Facilities Physical Q-Rating Guidance

OSD Facilities Sustainment Model (FSM)

DoD Facilities Pricing Guide for FY 2018 (UFC-3-701-01, Change 13, July 2017)

DoDEA Education Facilities Specifications (Ed Specs)

Q-Ratings and Facilities Sustainment Model (FSM)

Following FSM guidelines, and consistent with DoDEA practice this assessment uses Condition Index (CI) and Quality Ratings (Q-Ratings) as a standard of measure to assess the condition of all public schools located on Department of Defense installations. The CI, and associated Q-Ratings are calculated as the ratio of maintenance and repair needs (requirements) to Plant Replacement Value. The resulting percentages are then aligned against the OSD Q-Rating guidance to determine the overall rating of the facility. DoDEA has been an active participant in the Q-Rating working group since its formation and has contracted independent Architectural and Engineering (A/E) firms to assess school facilities since 2002.

2.0 PROCESSES

One of the ways DoDEA headquarters supports its organizations is by providing consistent tools and metrics of performance to assist them in their management of facility assets. The facility assessment processes used in this project follow basic procedures used to determine system level current and forecast physical conditions, and functional space-capacity adequacy. A functional adequacy assessment is useful in comparing instructional and support spaces in a school with a recognized standard, to evaluate the impact on capacity and learning environment.

FACILITY CONDITION ASSESSMENT STANDARDS AND PROCESSES

2.1 PHYSICAL FACILITY CONDITION ASSESSMENTS (FCA)

Physical FCAs are conducted in unison with Functional Adequacy (FA) FCAs.

The physical FCA provides engineers and facility planners with the data needed to help make informed decisions on facility sustainment. It is designed to support programming and budgeting for current and future capital renewal costs quickly and accurately. The physical FCA provides a mathematical-parametric model, confirmed by site survey, of a facility's component building systems to determine its current and predicted conditions based on its components' planned life cycles. It is a strategic tool for programming and budgeting capital renewal costs - a macro view of facility status. Capital renewal is the future, systematic replacement of building component and utility systems to extend their useful life - for example; a roof system will age to its planned life in 15 years and will need replacement. The physical FCA records information related to these systems, so that facility engineers are aware of the remaining useful life of the various components, and of the costs associated with capital renewal.

The physical FCAs are generally conducted at three levels of detail - Level 1, Level 2 and Level 3. The 'Level' relates to the amount of detail describing conditions, and corrections. Longer term (> 18 months) facility project planning requires less detail (Level 1) than details needed to support project definition for immediate correction (L2 and L3; within 6 to 18 months).

2.1.1 LEVEL 1 ASSESSMENT

Level 1 assessments are physical condition assessments in which deficiencies are categorized into two groups; architectural and mechanical, electrical and plumbing (MEP). Results include rough order of magnitude (ROM) cost estimates to replace systems and/or sub-systems that are currently beyond expected useful service life, and future renewal requirements for systems and/or sub-systems with remaining service life. A district engineer and facility planners can use this information to identify projects that may include repair or replacement of expired systems and sub-systems. In the case of currently expired systems, engineers and planners may use the ROM correction estimate for preliminary budgeting. The district engineer should then confirm the system or sub-systems are beyond are expired and no longer functioning adequately, and conduct a Level 3 assessment to determine specific scope and budget requirements for the project.

A Level 1 assessment predicts facility component life expirations using statistical guidelines developed by Building Owners and Managers Association (BOMA) and endorsed by national facility management organizations such as the Council for Educational Facility Planners International and the Association for Higher Education Facility Officers (AHEFO). Also used is R.S. Means, a nationally recognized reference for cost data, to model component building systems' costs. Deficiency and renewal cost estimates are adjusted using DoD local area cost factors (UFC-3-701-01, July 2017 UNIFIED FACILITIES CRITERIA (UFC) DoD FACILITIES PRICING GUIDE FOR FY 2017).

FACILITY CONDITION ASSESSMENT STANDARDS AND PROCESSES

The Level 1 physical FCA generally consists of:

Build Cost Models

Developing and updating cost models of the buildings to be studied by reviewing existing documents and interviewing maintenance staffs to determine types, age, and components of buildings, and the last renewal of each component. Each building component is then assigned a useful life according to BOMA standards, or local experience, and estimated replacement cost using cost per square foot data provided by DoD and R.S. Means. However, a system's actual life can vary significantly from BOMA standards under existing conditions - lack of routine maintenance, environmental conditions, inappropriate design, or poor installation shortens system and building useful lives. System life cycles are adjusted to fit a facility manager's actual experience.

For example, BOMA uses five years to estimate the useful life of exterior painting. If a facility manager's standards are to repaint every three years in lieu of the BOMA recommended five years, adjustment to the model's life cycle criteria for painting is added.

As another example, a four-ply built-up roof may have a current renewal value of \$2.09 per SF and a life expectancy of 25 years. If we find through records review or interviews that the existing roof is 30 years old in the example above, we know the roof is five years beyond its expected life. The result is an immediate need for capital renewal for the roof system using an area cost factor adjusted budget of \$2.09 per SF plus the renewal premiums to complete the replacement. Renewal-replacement premiums may include cost for items such as installing a new built-up roof on an existing building that requires removing the old roof-premium costs for demolition, dumpster charges, replacement difficulty, special requirements, and other anticipated costs are added to complete the roof replacement cost projection.

When restoration of a system requires substantial demolition and disposal costs, percent renewed is greater than the cost of new construction (Percent renewed is greater than 100 percent). Confirm Cost Models

In this step, the contractor confirms the cost modeling developed in the preceding step. This is necessary because facilities upgrades and repairs are frequently not documented, and actual remaining life in a component may vary from manufacturers' guidelines. To confirm the cost model, the contractor surveys appropriate facility areas after developing the cost models to validate the data in the cost models. As an example, a component's record shows it to be expired, but a field survey may find that it was already replaced and not documented. Cost models are changed to reflect actual conditions and records observed on site. They are then able to identify obvious deficiencies that are out of sequence with the component's useful life (i.e., roof leaks in a new roof, failed window gaskets, under - or over - conditioned air in building). Data collected includes digital photographs of each building to help record the facility condition. Photographs are linked to individual building reports within the cost modeling software and are a part of the overall database.

2.1.2 FCA DATA ANALYSES

In multiple building portfolios and especially with widespread geographic portfolios, it is important to know how building conditions compare. The Condition Index (CI) and Quality Ratings (Q-Ratings) are determined for each building assessed using guidelines shown below, which are taken directly from the DoD Facility Quality-Rating guidance dated 5 September 2007.

Condition Index (CI) – A measure of the constructed asset's condition at a specific point in time with respect to physical condition and ability to support the current occupant or mission. CI is calculated as the ratio of estimated cost of maintenance and repair requirements to Plant Replacement Value (PRV). Maintenance and repair requirements consist of that work necessary to ensure that a constructed asset is restored to a condition substantially equivalent to the originally intended and designed capacity, efficiency or capability.

Facility Physical Quality Rating – Real Property Inventory data field that captures the CI rating.

Plant Replacement Value – Cost of replacing the existing constructed asset at today's standards, adjusted for location (Area Cost Factor, ACF), overhead costs such as planning and design (P&D), supervision, inspection and overhead factor (SIOF), and other construction overhead costs (reference United Facilities Criteria (UFC) 3-701-10, para 3-2.2) The formula for PRV is:

$Plant\ Replacement\ Value = Facility\ Quantity \times Replacement\ Unit\ Cost \times Area\ Cost\ Factor^1 \times Historical\ Records\ Adjustment^2 \times Planning\ and\ Design\ Factor^3 \times Supervision\ Inspection\ and\ Overhead\ Factor^4 \times Contingency\ Factor^5$

¹ A geographic location adjustment for costs of labor, material, and equipment, published in Chapter 4.
² An adjustment to account for increased costs for replacement of historical facilities or for construction in a historic district; the current value of the factor is 1.05.
³ A factor to account for the planning and design of a facility; the current value of this factor is 1.09 for all but medical facilities and 1.13 for medical facilities.
⁴ A factor to account for the supervision, inspection, and overhead activities associated with the management of a construction project; the current value of the factor is 1.057 for facilities in the continental US (CONUS) and 1.065 for facilities outside the continental US (CONUS).
⁵ A factor to account for construction contingencies; the current value of the factor is 1.05.

Rated Asset – Per Federal Real Property Council (FRPC) 2007 Guidance for Real Inventory Reporting, all buildings and structures are to be rated.

Requirements (for CI/Q-Rating Calculations) – Per FRPC, “repair needs” (numerator in the calculation) is “the amount necessary to ensure that a facility is restored to a condition substantially equivalent to the originally intended and designed capacity, efficiency, or capability.” (FRPC 2007 Guidance for Real Inventory Reporting, page 10, paragraph 11) DOD Q-Rating calculations equate to work required to correct existing facility deficiencies through sustainment, restoration, and modernization, or replacement to achieve a serviceable condition fully able to support the current mission or function of the facility. The table below provides a quick reference for work to be “included” in the condition assessment formula numerator for computing Q-Ratings for existing assets. Also shown is work “excluded” from condition assessments for calculating Q-Ratings. Work is excluded when it is specifically required to convert a facility to another use; or when the result is new footprint construction (regardless of fund source, e.g. O&M, NAF, MILCON, etc.).

Q-Rating Bands: Bands allow OSD, Military Services, and Defense Agencies/Activities to group facilities by condition for the purposes of developing investment strategies.

2.2 FUNCTIONAL ADEQUACY

The functional adequacy study is comprised of two parts: spatial adequacy, and capacity coupled with specialized instructional programs at secondary campuses. Spatial adequacy examines the size of core spaces within the facility compared to the DoDEA educational specifications, and how these spaces affect the school’s capacity and learning environment. Information on state and local educational specifications is also collected. School capacity calculations consider the instructional spaces and the size of the cafeteria and kitchen. Middle schools and high schools may also offer professional and vocational preparatory courses that contribute to the educational environment. The survey includes interviews with administrative and facilities personnel with the Local Education Agencies, installation points of contact, and review of available construction drawings, space utilization plans, and current enrollment data. Representative photographs are taken to give readers a feel for instructional and support spaces at the facility.

2.2.1 SPATIAL ADEQUACY ANALYSIS

Typical school space types for the spatial adequacy analysis have been identified in the scope of work and include those that are common to the school categories identified. These spaces contribute heavily to the capacity of the school and the overall environment for learning. The spaces to be observed for the functional adequacy study are:

FACILITY CONDITION ASSESSMENT STANDARDS AND PROCESSES

The school space types listed were observed, measured on-site, and compared with the sizes from the DoDEA educational specifications.

The governing size standards used for this study are the DoDEA Educational Specifications, which represent a single and consistent benchmark for space type comparisons. A corresponding letter grade is shown for each space based on how closely it meets the DoDEA specifications. Neither the Local Education Agency nor State Education Agency educational specifications are used in determining grades or cost. The following ratios of actual size to DoDEA educational specifications summarize the letter grade rating system:

ROOM SPACE GRADING CRITERIA	
Grade	Description
A 90%-100%	Exceptional: Classroom exceeds the size standard and provides modern enhancements. Provides an exceptional learning environment.
B 80%-89%	Very Good: Classroom provides minimal standards in all areas.
C 75%-79%	Good: Classroom provides adequate learning environment, but does not meet all standards
D 60%-74%	Marginal: Classroom provides the minimally adequate learning environment.
F <59%	Inadequate: Classroom size does not provide a proper, adequate learning environment.

These ratios match the metric used by DoDEA. Spaces scoring a 'D' or 'F' do not meet the size standard for an adequate space and are assigned a cost for corrective action using the Uniform Facilities Pricing Guide (UFC 3-701-01, July 2017). The assessment also addresses key non-existent spaces such as auditoriums, cafeterias, gymnasium/multipurpose rooms, information centers and kitchens. Non-existent spaces are assigned a new construction cost for the entire square footage that is not provided.

2.2.1.1 COST MODEL FOR SPATIAL ADEQUACY

Costs for Marginal and Inadequately sized spaces (Grades D and F) are computed using the following formula:

Costs for Non-existent, required spaces (Grade R) are computed using the following formula:

$$\text{Grade R Cost} = (\text{DoDEA Ed Spec Size Std} \times \text{MILCON } \$/\text{SF}) \times (\text{Installation Area Location Factor}) \times (\text{Escalation to 2020}) \times (\text{Gross to Net SF ratio of 1.42}) \times (\text{State's Gross Receipts or excise tax, if applicable})$$

It is important to note that costs reported do not consider the modernization costs that could be incurred to other spaces in the facility as a result of modifying or adding to the space types noted in this report that show a corrective cost. For example, if a cafeteria or kitchen is enlarged to meet space needs, it might trigger life safety code or ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) improvements to the facilities or adjoining spaces that add cost. A detailed life safety and ADA review of facilities is not part of the scope of this report. Furthermore, there are cases where a local or state educational specification space type size is larger than the DoDEA size. These requirements can vary significantly as can their enforcement. As such, additional cost for these requirements is a potential that should be investigated further if improvements are planned. Costs for compliance with local and state education agency requirements are not included in this report. Information on these state and local educational specifications is part of the data collection phase so that additional analysis can be made if needed.

2.2.2 SCHOOL CAPACITY ANALYSIS

As part of the functional adequacy study, student capacities are computed for each facility using the data collected by the field assessment teams. The numbers of each contributing space are counted, measured, and their average size noted. Average sizes are based on a representative sampling of spaces. Capacity calculations are based on the DoDEA Facility Capacity Calculation Model. Two calculated capacity values are shown: one for the permanent construction type and one value for all building construction types. A capacity value from the Local Education Agency is also reported, when given. In facilities where inadequate space is identified to house the current student load, based on the DoDEA Capacity Model, a cost for the additional square footage needed to accommodate them is shown. This cost is only computed based on the permanent construction type capacity.

The DoDEA Capacity model calculates capacity for an elementary school as:

(Number of General Purpose, Kindergarten, Pre-Kindergarten, and General Science Classrooms, including classroom-sized spaces that could be used as classrooms) x 19 students per space

The DoDEA Capacity model calculates capacity for middle schools and high schools based on the number of teaching stations for full and partial contributing spaces:

Middle Schools

(Number of Full Contributing Teaching Stations) x (22 students each) x (85% efficiency factor) + (Number of Partial Contributing Teaching Stations) x (10 students each)

High Schools

(Number of Full Contributing Teaching Stations) x (20 students each) x (85% efficiency factor) + (Number of Partial Contributing Teaching Stations) x (10 students each)

Examples of full contributing spaces include classrooms, science labs, computer labs, gym/multipurpose, music suite, information center, art rooms, and classroom-sized spaces that could be used as classrooms. An example of a partial contributing space is a special needs room.

FACILITY CONDITION ASSESSMENT STANDARDS AND PROCESSES

An analysis of existing serving line capacity for the kitchen at each school is provided. Ideally, lunch periods will last less than 90 minutes. For the purposes of this study, when the total length of lunch period exceeds 90 minutes or has more than four different periods, the report will indicate that cafeteria usage for other activities, besides dining, may be limited. The serving line capacity shown is calculated using four students per minute at the elementary level and an average of five students per minute at the secondary level.

2.2.2.1 COST MODEL FOR CAPACITY

Additional Classrooms Needed (Grade ACN spaces) costs are also reported to address capacity shortfalls in the number of classrooms provided. The school's enrollment is compared to the permanent capacity calculated from the DoDEA Capacity Model. Where enrollment exceeds calculated permanent capacity, a number for additional classrooms is calculated using that difference in students, with the appropriate efficiency factor applied.

The cost for additional classrooms is:

Grade ACN Cost = (DoDEA Ed Spec Size Std for General Purpose Classroom x MILCON \$/SF) x (Installation Area Location Factor) x (Escalation to 2020) x (Gross to Net SF ratio of 1.42) x (State's Gross Receipts or excise tax, if applicable)

Costs for inadequate kitchen and cafeteria serving capacity are addressed within the cost model for inadequately sized or non-existent spaces.

Please see the discussion in Section VII of the report and Table 5, where the requirement for 29 additional classrooms, as well as an opinion of probable cost, is identified. No report revisions are determined to be necessary.

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1. Executive Summary

Campus Findings and Deficiencies

Historical Summary

The site is located on Marine Corps Base Camp Pendleton. The school was built in 1956 and was extensively renovated in 2010-2011. At that time, Buildings A (Administration), K (Kindergarten), and H (modular classroom) were constructed. During the renovation, essentially all finishes, fixtures and systems were replaced in the existing buildings. Most of the portable classrooms were installed in 2011, with some installed shortly thereafter. Five portables however are identified as being over 35 years old.

Architectural

Most building components date from the renovation of 2010-2011, and thus are approximately ten years old and in fair condition. The structural aspects of the 1956 buildings are assumed to be in good condition, as no problems were reported, and any issues would have been addressed at the time of the renovation. Interior and exterior finishes are in fair condition and are approaching their time of replacement. Typical lifecycle-based interior and exterior finish replacements are budgeted and anticipated. The five oldest portable classrooms were identified as needing immediate replacement, and costs are included for this in the tables. Accessibility was addressed at the time of remodel, and no issues were observed.

Mechanical, Electrical, Plumbing and Fire (MEPF)

Building systems likewise date from the major renovation, and are in fair condition, generally in the midpoint of their expected lifespan. No issues were reported or observed with the HVAC, electrical, and fire systems. Plumbing systems are in fair condition, but clogging waste piping was reported in Buildings E, F and G.

Site

The asphalt play and pedestrian surfaces, and the children's play areas, appear to be in good to fair condition. Areas of the asphalt parking lots have cracking and deterioration, and replacement of the asphalt in these areas is recommended. Some areas of the landscaping are dried due to an irrigation pump that requires repair. Concrete paving, such as the sidewalks, appears to be in good condition and will not require replacement during the reserve term. No accessibility problems were noted.

Recommended Additional Studies

An engineer or contractor must be retained to analyze the plumbing issues in the E, F and G buildings, provide recommendations and, if necessary, estimate the scope and cost of any required repairs. The cost of this study is included in the cost tables. Due to the ambiguity of the required repair scope at the time of this assessment, the cost for any possible subsequent repairs is not included.

Facility Condition Index (FCI)

One of the major goals of the FCA is to calculate each building's Facility Condition Index (FCI), which provides a theoretical objective indication of a building's overall condition. By definition, the FCI is defined as the ratio of the cost of current needs divided by current replacement value (CRV) of the facility. The chart below presents the industry standard ranges and cut-off points.

FCI Ranges and Description	
0 – 5%	In new or well-maintained condition, with little or no visual evidence of wear or deficiencies.
5 – 10%	Subjected to wear but is still in a serviceable and functioning condition.
10 – 30%	Subjected to hard or long-term wear. Nearing the end of its useful or serviceable life.
30% and above	Has reached the end of its useful or serviceable life. Renewal is now necessary.

The deficiencies and lifecycle needs identified in this assessment provide the basis for a portfolio-wide capital improvement funding strategy. In addition to the current FCI, extended FCI's have been developed to provide owners the intelligence needed to plan and budget for the "keep-up costs" for their facilities. As such the 3-year, 5-year, and 10-year FCI's are calculated by dividing the anticipated needs of those respective time periods by current replacement value. As a final point, the FCI's ultimately provide more value when used to relatively compare facilities across a portfolio instead of being over-analyzed and scrutinized as stand-alone values. The table below summarizes the individual findings for this FCA:


Campus Level FCI:

















10. Property Space Use and Observed Areas

Unit Allocation

All 55,985 square feet of the property are occupied by the Oceanside Unified School District. The spaces are a combination of offices, classrooms, athletic, assembly and food service areas, with supporting restrooms, mechanical and other utility spaces.

Areas Observed

The interior spaces were observed to gain a clear understanding of the property's overall condition. Other areas accessed included the site within the property boundaries, the exterior of the property, and the roofs.

See the *Key Spaces Not Observed Row* of the *Systems Summary* table in each building section to see specific areas of the various buildings that were not observed.

11. ADA Accessibility

Generally, Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) prohibits discrimination by entities to access and use of “areas of public accommodations” and “public facilities” on the basis of disability. Regardless of their age, these areas and facilities must be maintained and operated to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act Accessibility Guidelines (ADAAG).

A public entity (i.e. city governments) shall operate each service, program, or activity so that the service, program, or activity, when viewed in its entirety, is readily accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities.

However, this does not:

1. Necessarily require a public entity to make each of its existing facilities accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities.
2. Require a public entity to take any action that would threaten or destroy the historic significance of an historic property; or
3. Require a public entity to take any action that it can demonstrate would result in a fundamental alteration in the nature of a service, program, or activity or in undue financial and administrative burdens. In those circumstances where personnel of the public entity believe that the proposed action would fundamentally alter the service, program, or activity or would result in undue financial and administrative burdens, a public entity has the burden of proving that compliance with 35.150(a) of this part would result in such alteration or burdens. The decision that compliance would result in such alteration or burdens must be made by the head of a public entity or his or her designee after considering all resources available for use in the funding and operation of the service, program, or activity, and must be accompanied by a written statement of the reasons for reaching that conclusion. If an action would result in such an alteration or such burdens, a public entity shall take any other action that would not result in such an alteration or such burdens but would nevertheless ensure that individuals with disabilities receive the benefits or services provided by the public entity.

Removal of barriers to accessibility should be addressed from a liability standpoint in order to comply with federal law, but the barriers may or may not be building code violations. The Americans with Disabilities Act Accessibility Guidelines are part of the ADA federal civil rights law pertaining to the disabled and are not a construction code. State and local jurisdictions have adopted the ADA Guidelines or have adopted other standards for accessibility as part of their construction codes.

The campus was originally constructed in 1956 and substantially renovated in 2010-2011. Widespread accessibility improvements appear to have been implemented since the original construction.

Campus: Accessibility Summary

During the interview process with the client representatives, no complaints or pending litigation associated with potential accessibility issues within the campus were reported.

No detailed follow-up accessibility studies are included as recommendations since no major or moderate issues were identified at any of the campus facilities. Reference the appendix for specific data, photos, and tables or checklists associated with this limited accessibility survey.

12. Purpose and Scope

Purpose

Bureau Veritas was retained by the client to render an opinion as to the Property's current general physical condition on the day of the site visit.

Based on the observations, interviews and document review outlined below, this report identifies significant deferred maintenance issues, existing deficiencies, and material code violations of record, which affect the Property's use. Opinions are rendered as to its structural integrity, building system condition and the Property's overall condition. The report also notes building systems or components that have realized or exceeded their typical expected useful lives.

The physical condition of building systems and related components are typically defined as being in one of five condition ratings. For the purposes of this report, the following definitions are used:

Condition Ratings	
Excellent	New or very close to new; component or system typically has been installed within the past year, sound and performing its function. Eventual repair or replacement will be required when the component or system either reaches the end of its useful life or fails in service.
Good	Satisfactory as-is. Component or system is sound and performing its function, typically within the first third of its lifecycle. However, it may show minor signs of normal wear and tear. Repair or replacement will be required when the component or system either reaches the end of its useful life or fails in service.
Fair	Showing signs of wear and use but still satisfactory as-is, typically near the median of its estimated useful life. Component or system is performing adequately at this time but may exhibit some signs of wear, deferred maintenance, or evidence of previous repairs. Repair or replacement will be required due to the component or system's condition and/or its estimated remaining useful life.
Poor	Component or system is significantly aged, flawed, functioning intermittently or unreliably; displays obvious signs of deferred maintenance; shows evidence of previous repair or workmanship not in compliance with commonly accepted standards; has become obsolete; or exhibits an inherent deficiency. The present condition could contribute to or cause the deterioration of contiguous elements or systems. Either full component replacement is needed or repairs are required to restore to good condition, prevent premature failure, and/or prolong useful life.
Failed	Component or system has ceased functioning or performing as intended. Replacement, repair, or other significant corrective action is recommended or required.
Not Applicable	Assigning a condition does not apply or make logical sense, most commonly due to the item in question not being present.

Scope

The standard scope of the Facility Condition Assessment includes the following:

- Visit the Property to evaluate the general condition of the building and site improvements, review available construction documents in order to familiarize ourselves with, and be able to comment on, the in-place construction systems, life safety, mechanical, electrical, and plumbing systems, and the general built environment.
- Identify those components that are exhibiting deferred maintenance issues and provide cost estimates for Immediate Costs and Replacement Reserves based on observed conditions, maintenance history and industry standard useful life estimates. This will include the review of documented capital improvements completed within the last five-year period and work currently contracted for, if applicable.
- Provide a full description of the Property with descriptions of in-place systems and commentary on observed conditions.
- Provide a high-level categorical general statement regarding the subject Property's compliance to Title III of the Americans with Disabilities Act. This will not constitute a full ADA survey, but will help identify exposure to issues and the need for further review.
- Obtain background and historical information about the facility from a building engineer, property manager, maintenance staff, or other knowledgeable source. The preferred methodology is to have the client representative or building occupant complete a Pre-Survey Questionnaire (PSQ) in advance of the site visit. Common alternatives include a verbal interview just prior to or during the walk-through portion of the assessment.
- Review maintenance records and procedures with the in-place maintenance personnel.
- Observe a representative sample of the interior spaces/units, including vacant spaces/units, to gain a clear understanding of the property's overall condition. Other areas to be observed include the exterior of the property, the roofs, interior common areas, and the significant mechanical, electrical and elevator equipment rooms.
- Provide recommendations for additional studies, if required, with related budgetary information.
- Provide an Executive Summary at the beginning of this report, which highlights key findings and includes a Facility Condition Index as a basis for comparing the relative conditions of the buildings within the portfolio.

13. Opinions of Probable Costs

Cost estimates are attached throughout this report, with the Replacement Reserves in the appendix.

These estimates are based on Invoice or Bid Document/s provided either by the Owner/facility and construction costs developed by construction resources such as *R.S. Means*, *CBRE Whitestone*, and *Marshall & Swift*, Bureau Veritas's experience with past costs for similar properties, city cost indexes, and assumptions regarding future economic conditions.

Opinions of probable costs should only be construed as preliminary, order of magnitude budgets. Actual costs most probably will vary from the consultant's opinions of probable costs depending on such matters as type and design of suggested remedy, quality of materials and installation, manufacturer and type of equipment or system selected, field conditions, whether a physical deficiency is repaired or replaced in whole, phasing or bundling of the work (if applicable), quality of contractor, quality of project management exercised, market conditions, use of subcontractors, and whether competitive pricing is solicited, etc. Certain opinions of probable costs cannot be developed within the scope of this guide without further study. Opinions of probable cost for further study should be included in the FCA.

Methodology

Based upon site observations, research, and judgment, along with referencing Expected Useful Life (EUL) tables from various industry sources, Bureau Veritas opines as to when a system or component will most probably necessitate replacement. Accurate historical replacement records, if provided, are typically the best source of information. Exposure to the elements, initial quality and installation, extent of use, the quality and amount of preventive maintenance exercised, etc., are all factors that impact the effective age of a system or component. As a result, a system or component may have an effective age that is greater or less than its actual chronological age. The Remaining Useful Life (RUL) of a component or system equals the EUL less its *effective age*, whether explicitly or implicitly stated. Projections of Remaining Useful Life (RUL) are based primarily on age and condition with the presumption of continued use and maintenance of the Property similar to the observed and reported past use and maintenance practices, in conjunction with the professional judgment of Bureau Veritas's assessors. Significant changes in occupants and/or usage may affect the service life of some systems or components.

Where quantities could not be or were not derived from an actual construction document take-off or facility walk-through, and/or where systemic costs are more applicable or provide more intrinsic value, budgetary square foot and gross square foot costs are used. Estimated costs are based on professional judgment and the probable or actual extent of the observed defect, inclusive of the cost to design, procure, construct and manage the corrections.

Definitions

Immediate Needs

Immediate Needs are line items that require immediate action as a result of: (1) material existing or potential unsafe conditions, (2) failed or imminent failure of mission critical building systems or components, or (3) conditions that, if not addressed, have the potential to result in, or contribute to, critical element or system failure within one year or will most probably result in a significant escalation of its remedial cost.

For database and reporting purposes the line items with RUL=0, and commonly associated with *Safety* or *Performance/Integrity* Plan Types, are considered Immediate Needs.

Replacement Reserves

Cost line items traditionally called Replacement Reserves (equivalently referred to as Lifecycle/Renewals) are for recurring probable renewals or expenditures, which are not classified as operation or maintenance expenses. The replacement reserves should be budgeted for in advance on an annual basis. Replacement Reserves are reasonably predictable both in terms of frequency and cost. However, Replacement Reserves may also include components or systems that have an indeterminable life but, nonetheless, have a potential for failure within an estimated time period.

Replacement Reserves generally exclude systems or components that are estimated to expire after the reserve term and are not considered material to the structural and mechanical integrity of the subject property. Furthermore, systems and components that are not deemed to have a material effect on the use of the Property are also excluded. Costs that are caused by acts of God, accidents, or other occurrences that are typically covered by insurance, rather than reserved for, are also excluded.

Replacement costs are solicited from ownership/property management, Bureau Veritas's discussions with service companies, manufacturers' representatives, and previous experience in preparing such schedules for other similar facilities. Costs for work performed by the ownership's or property management's maintenance staff are also considered.

Bureau Veritas's reserve methodology involves identification and quantification of those systems or components requiring capital reserve funds within the assessment period. The assessment period is defined as the effective age plus the reserve term. Additional information concerning system's or component's respective replacement costs (in today's dollars), typical expected useful lives, and remaining useful lives were estimated so that a funding schedule could be prepared. The Replacement Reserves Schedule presupposes that all required remedial work has been performed or that monies for remediation have been budgeted for items defined as Immediate Needs.

For the purposes of 'bucketizing' the System Expenditure Forecasts in this report, the Replacement Reserves have been subdivided and grouped as follows: Short Term (years 1-3), Near Term (years 4-5), Medium Term (years 6-10), and Long Term (years 11-20).

Key Findings

In an effort to highlight the most significant cost items and not be overwhelmed by the Replacement Reserves report in its totality, a subsection of Key Findings is included within the Executive Summary section of this report. Key Findings typically include repairs or replacements of deficient items within the first five-year window, as well as the most significant high-dollar line items that fall anywhere within the ten-year term. Note that while there is some subjectivity associated with identifying the Key Findings, the Immediate Needs are always included as a subset.

Exceedingly Aged

A fairly common scenario encountered during the assessment process, and a frequent source of debate, occurs when classifying and describing "very old" systems or components that are still functioning adequately and do not appear nor were reported to be in any way deficient. To help provide some additional intelligence on these items, such components will be tagged in the database as Exceedingly Aged. This designation will be reserved for mechanical or electrical systems or components that have aged well beyond their industry standard lifecycles, typically at least 15 years beyond and/or twice their Estimated Useful Life (EUL). In tandem with this designation, these items will be assigned a Remaining Useful Life (RUL) not less than two years but not greater than 1/3 of their standard EUL. As such the recommended replacement time for these components will reside outside the typical Short Term window but will not be pushed 'irresponsibly' (too far) into the future.

14. Certification

DLR Group (the Client) retained Bureau Veritas to perform this Facility Condition Assessment in connection with master planning for North Terrace (K-8), 141 Santa Rosa Drive, Oceanside, California 92058, the "Property". It is our understanding that the primary interest of the Client is to locate and evaluate materials and building system defects that might significantly affect the value of the property and to determine if the present Property has conditions that will have a significant impact on its continued operations.

The conclusions and recommendations presented in this report are based on the brief review of the plans and records made available to our Project Manager during the site visit, interviews of available property management personnel and maintenance contractors familiar with the Property, appropriate inquiry of municipal authorities, our Project Manager's walk-through observations during the site visit, and our experience with similar properties.

No testing, exploratory probing, dismantling or operating of equipment or in-depth studies were performed unless specifically required under the *Purpose and Scope* section of this report. This assessment did not include engineering calculations to determine the adequacy of the Property's original design or existing systems. Although walk-through observations were performed, not all areas may have been observed (see Section 1 for specific details). There may be defects in the Property, which were in areas not observed or readily accessible, may not have been visible, or were not disclosed by management personnel when questioned. The report describes property conditions at the time that the observations and research were conducted.

This report has been prepared for and is exclusively for the use and benefit of the Client identified on the cover page of this report. The purpose for which this report shall be used shall be limited to the use as stated in the contract between the client and Bureau Veritas.

San Diego Unified School District requests that the State Allocation Board expedite a direct apportionment to reimburse project costs related to the modernization projects at Miller and Hancock Elementary Schools, OPSC application numbers 57/68338-00-290 and 57/68338-00-291, respectively.

The two schools serve our armed forces communities, were eligible for State Facility Program funding at the time of construction and were awarded grants under the Public Schools on Military Institutions (PSMI) program as well as being locally funded. Due to the State's bond authority being extinguished prior to the passage of Proposition 51, San Diego Unified committed local funds to the project, did not apply to the State, but is currently seeking reimbursement for the two projects which will relieve the District of local funding for the Chesterton Elementary School project, awarded a PSMI grant by the Office of Local Defense Community Cooperation (OLDCC).

Chesterton is in a military housing area with the project involving the demolition of all permanent buildings and portable classrooms. Five new buildings will be constructed to include a new administration building, a multi-purpose/food service building, and three new classroom buildings consisting of 25 classrooms to serve a student capacity of over 600. All existing play structures, landscaping, flatwork, and utilities will be replaced in addition to new fencing, parking, and drop-off areas.

The Chesterton project, estimated to cost approximately \$100 million, will receive close to \$80 million from OLDCC with San Diego Unified contributing about \$20 million of local funding to the project. The \$4.4 million in anticipated reimbursement for the Miller and Hancock projects will ease the burden of local funding for the Chesterton project, allowing San Diego Unified to allocate these resources to other needy campuses among its over 100 school sites.

The Sierra Sands Unified School District (SSUSD) respectfully requests an expedited review and apportionment for funding of the Richmond Elementary School modernization project, and approval to transfer existing modernization eligibility from the original Richmond Elementary site to a new school site. The modernization application entails like-for-like replacement of the Administration and Multipurpose buildings, physical therapy room and a kindergarten classroom. Due to the series of Ridgecrest earthquakes that occurred in July of 2019, many of the schools in the SSUSD have sustained significant damage or have been undergoing structural assessments. Richmond Elementary School is one of the SSUSD school sites that sustained significant earthquake damage due to its location in a liquefaction zone.

In 2019, at the time of the earthquakes, Richmond Elementary School was located on Kearsarge Avenue, within the boundaries of the Naval Air Weapons Station China Lake (NAWSCL). Due to structural safety concerns at Richmond Elementary, the school site was abandoned, and students and staff were relocated temporarily to the Vieweg School site. The District had been notified that a Department of Defense (DoD) Public Schools on Military Installations (PSMI) grant would be awarded for demolition and replacement of the Richmond school. Therefore, the District has chosen not to invest in earthquake damage repairs to the original site (estimated at ~\$2-3M) and to instead remain at the Vieweg site until the new school is completed.

Preliminary structural assessments and geological reports provided to SSUSD indicate the majority of the buildings on the Richmond Elementary school site meet the qualifications for Seismic Mitigation Program (SMP) funding. The District intends to pursue SMP funding for those buildings, and to request modernization funding on the remaining buildings.

SSUSD has decided to abandon the original Richmond Elementary School site on Kearsarge Avenue and to rebuild the replacement school outside of the Weapons Station boundaries. During the planning process for the PSMI grant, four sites were

assessed as possible locations for a new Richmond Elementary campus. The current site was selected for the replacement school because it is not an identified liquefaction zone; the property is “green” requiring no abatement; there are no identified earthquake faults requiring investigation; and it is outside the secure perimeter of NAWSCCL. The Navy has announced the goal of limiting non-military-connected personnel on the installation, which has posed challenges to the district in providing families access to their students at Richmond Elementary, and limiting transportation when the installation is in a high security posture.

The new site is located approximately 2.5 miles southwest of the original site and has received California Department of Education (CDE) site approval. The new school facilities have received plan approval from both the CDE and the Division of the State Architect (DSA) and construction on the new school has begun. The replacement school site is intended to be financed through a combination of grants from the DoD PSMI Federal Grant Program, SMP program, and modernization program, as well as district facility funds. SSUSD has nearly exhausted its available district facilities funds on this replacement project.

In addition to rebuilding Richmond Elementary, SSUSD is addressing critical modernization needs on the other school campuses. The District has been approached by the DoD with the offer to obtain additional PSMI funding for its Vieweg and Pierce campuses, as these schools have high priority on the DoD’s list of nationwide schools eligible for PSMI grants. In order to receive the PSMI grant, which would cover up to 80% of Vieweg School’s replacement and Pierce Elementary School’s eligible modernization costs, SSUSD is required to provide a 20% funding match, which SSUSD does not currently have available. The DoD has encouraged SSUSD to move swiftly on the current PSMI grant requests, as the DoD recently notified SSUSD that it is planning to re-assess the list of schools eligible for PSMI funding, and it is possible that SSUSD will lose its high-priority status when the list is revised.

SSUSD acknowledges that there are many other districts that have projects on the Applications Received Beyond Bond Authority List ahead of its Richmond Elementary School modernization application. However, in the past the Board has been supportive of assisting districts to maximize funding opportunities under the PSMI. By expediting the processing and funding of the Richmond Elementary School modernization project, SSUSD will be able to quickly obtain reimbursement funding for the eligible state matching grant to cover the current costs of the ongoing Richmond modernization project, which would then free up local funds that will allow the district to provide the required match for the PSMI grants to the Pierce and Vieweg campuses. Further, in allowing SSUSD to transfer its modernization eligibility from the original campus to the new campus the district will be better able to serve its student population in a location that is more accessible to families and meets the mission priorities of NAWSCCL.

Without the flexibility requested in this appeal, SSUSD will be unable to provide its required matching funds for the Vieweg and Pierce PSMI projects. Failure to provide

the required district matching funds would prohibit the district from pursuing and obtaining PSMI grants and, due to programmatic changes with the PSMI Grant Program, could preclude the district from ever receiving the 80% matching share of federal funding for these sites. SSUSD respectfully requests the Board's support of the appeal to allow the District to accept the unique opportunity to obtain additional Federal school facility funds.

We appreciate your consideration of this appeal and welcome any requests to provide further information or clarification of this request.

Action Items

PRIORITY FUNDING SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION APPORTIONMENTS

PURPOSE OF REPORT

To provide priority School Facility Program (SFP) funding Apportionments totaling approximately \$52.2 million for the projects that submitted a valid certification.

DESCRIPTION

SFP regulations establish two annual filing periods to prioritize school construction funding as cash proceeds become available to provide Apportionments. Specifically, the regulations provide two 30 calendar day periods in which school districts can request to receive an Apportionment upon meeting certain criteria, including acknowledgement that a *Fund Release Authorization* (Form SAB 50-05) must be submitted within 90 calendar days of receiving an Apportionment.

Based on SFP regulations, the recent filing period began on May 8, 2024, and closed on June 6, 2024. Requests must have been received by the Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) on or before June 6, 2024, and are valid from July 1, 2024 through December 31, 2024.

By approving this item, the State Allocation Board (Board) will provide approximately \$52.2 million in Apportionments for seven projects from six school districts and qualifying applicants.

AUTHORITY

See Attachment A.

BACKGROUND

Requests/Acknowledgements

Pursuant to SFP Regulations, applicants choosing to participate in the priority funding process must submit a request to convert an Unfunded Approval to an Apportionment. As part of the request, applicants are required to make the following acknowledgements:

- The applicant understands that the time limit on fund release shall be no more than 90 calendar days from the date of Apportionment.

BACKGROUND (cont.)

- The applicant acknowledges that failure to submit a valid *Fund Release Authorization* (Form SAB 50-05) within the 90-day period will result in the project being rescinded without further Board action. A rescinded application will revert to an Unfunded Approval with a new date on the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans) that is 90 calendar days from the date of Apportionment and cannot be guaranteed bond authority.
- In the case that multiple rescissions are made by the SAB, each separate application will be placed on the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans) with a new date that is 90 calendar days from the date of Apportionment, in the order of the original unfunded approval date. The district will not be required to resubmit the application and no further application review will be required.
- The applicant acknowledges that by participating in the priority funding process, the applicant is waiving its right to the timeline for fund release submittal described in Section 1859.90.
- The applicant acknowledges that a Grant Agreement must be submitted pursuant to SFP Regulation Section 1859.90.4 and received by OPSC prior to, or concurrently with, the Form SAB 50-05.

Current Priority Funding Round and the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans)

Requests submitted during the period that ended on June 6, 2024 will expire on December 31, 2024. This priority funding round generated approximately \$52.2 million in Apportionment requests from six applicants for seven out of 13 unique projects, which represents 53.8 percent of the projects on the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans) that could have submitted requests.

The attachments provide detailed lists of the Apportionment requests received during this filing period, as well as projects that remain on the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans). The applications receiving an Apportionment are highlighted in Attachments B and C. In addition, Attachment C includes six projects that will remain on the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans). All six remaining projects that have not requested an Apportionment represent unfunded approvals for site or design funding for the Charter School Facilities Program that are not subject to rescission after two occurrences of non-participation in the priority funding process.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS

Fund Release Requirements

Applicants receiving Adjusted Grant Apportionments are required to submit a valid Form SAB 50-05 containing an original or electronic signature for each approved application. The Form SAB 50-05 must be signed by the designated District Representative and must be received by the OPSC prior to 11:59 p.m. on December 24, 2024. The form may be submitted electronically via OPSC Online or via email to OPSCApplicationReviewTeam@dgs.ca.gov. OPSC will continue to accept hard copy versions that are mailed or hand delivered to the Office of Public School Construction at 707 Third Street, 4th Floor, West Sacramento, CA 95605. If a district fails to submit a valid Form SAB 50-05 within the allotted time frame, the project will be rescinded without further Board action and will receive a new unfunded approval date of December 24, 2024 on the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans).

Grant Agreement

For all projects approved for placement on the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans) on or after June 5, 2017, a Grant Agreement for the project with an original or electronic signature by an authorized District Representative must be submitted prior to, or concurrently with, the Form SAB 50-05 in order for the Form SAB 50-05 to be considered valid.

Non-Participation in the Priority Funding Process

SFP regulations effective on March 25, 2013, limit the number of times a district can choose not to participate in the priority funding process for a project on the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans). Projects receiving an Apportionment in this item that do not submit a valid Form SAB 50-05 prior to 11:59 p.m. on December 24, 2024 will receive one non-participation occurrence. If this is the project's second non-participation occurrence, the project will be fully rescinded without further Board action and will not return to the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans)¹. The bond authority associated with rescinded projects will return to the SFP.

¹ An exception exists for unfunded approvals for site or design funding for the Charter School Facilities Program, which are not subject to rescission after two occurrences of non-participation in the priority funding process.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS (cont.)

New Priority Funding Round

A new 30-day priority funding request filing period will begin on November 13, 2024, and will end on December 12, 2024. Requests submitted during that period will be valid from January 1, 2025, through June 30, 2025.

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ATTACHMENT A

AUTHORITY

Education Code Section 17070.35(a) states, “In addition to all other powers and duties as are granted to the board by this chapter, other statutes, or the California Constitution, the board shall do all of the following:

- (1) Adopt rules and regulations, pursuant to the rulemaking provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act, Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, for the administration of this chapter...
- (2) Establish and publish any procedures and policies in connection with the administration of this chapter as it deems necessary....”

Government Code Section 15503 states:

Whenever the board is required to make allocations or apportionments under this part, it shall prescribe rules and regulations for the administration of, and not inconsistent with, the act making the appropriation of funds to be allocated or apportioned. The board shall require the procedure, forms, and the submission of any information it may deem necessary or appropriate. Unless otherwise provided in the appropriation act, the board may require that applications for allocations or apportionments be submitted to it for approval.

Budget Letter 10-09 requires that if there are insufficient bond proceeds, departments and agencies are responsible for prioritizing the projects that will be funded consistent with the prioritization criteria outlined (including job creation). It also indicates that if bond proceeds are not managed efficiently, additional bonds may not be sold for the program.

School Facility Program (SFP) Regulation Section 1859.2 states:

“For the purpose of these regulations, the terms set forth below shall have the following meanings, subject to the provisions of the Act:

...

“Unfunded List” means an information list of unfunded projects, with the exception of the unfunded list defined below as “Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans)”.

“Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans)” means an information list of unfunded projects that was created due to the State’s inability to provide interim financing from the Pooled Money Investment Account (AB 55 loans) to fund school construction projects as declared in the Department of Finance Budget Letter #33 issued on December 18, 2008.

...”

SFP Regulation Section 1859.90.2, “Priority Funding Process” states:

“The priority funding process allows the Board to distribute available funds to districts or charter schools that request, pursuant to (a) or (b) below, as applicable, an Apportionment or an advance release of funds from a Preliminary Apportionment or Preliminary Charter School Apportionment, during specific 30-calendar day filing periods beginning with July 27, 2011 and continuing with the 2nd Wednesday of January and the 2nd Wednesday of July of 2012. Requests submitted during the filing periods described above are valid until the next filing period begins. The specific 30-calendar day filing periods subsequent to 2012 begin with January 9, 2013 and continue with the 2nd Wednesday of May and the

2nd Wednesday of November, each calendar year. Requests submitted during the filing period beginning with January 9, 2013 are valid until June 30, 2013. Requests submitted during a filing period beginning with the 2nd Wednesday of May are valid from July 1 until December 31 of that year. Requests submitted during a filing period beginning with the 2nd Wednesday in November are valid from January 1 until June 30 of the following year. Requests must be physically received by the OPSC by the 30th calendar day of each filing period to be considered valid.

(a) In order to be considered for an Apportionment, approved advance release of design funds from a Preliminary Charter School Apportionment, or approved advance release of environmental hardship site acquisition funds from a Preliminary Apportionment, the district or charter school must provide a priority funding request in the form of a written statement signed by an authorized representative that includes each of the project Application numbers, and the type of Apportionment request (e.g., Apportionment, separate Apportionment for design or site acquisition), within the 30-calendar day filing period, and shall contain the following: (1) Statement that the request is to convert the unfunded approval to an Apportionment or to receive an approved advance release of funds; and

(2) Acknowledgement that a valid, original signature Form SAB 50-05 must be submitted and physically received by the OPSC within 90 calendar days of Apportionment or approved advance release of funds request, except for a Career Technical Education Facilities Project in (a)(5), and that failure to do so will result in the rescission of the Apportionment or approved advance release of funds request without further Board action; and

(3) Acknowledgement that a Grant Agreement must be submitted pursuant to Section 1859.90.4 and physically received by the OPSC prior to, or concurrently with, the Form SAB 50-05 referenced in (a)(2); and

(4) Acknowledgement that, if the district submits the Form SAB 50-05 on or after July 1, 2013 and is required to submit an LCP third party report, pursuant to Section 1859.97(b), the report will be submitted to the OPSC and the DIR at least 60 days prior to submitting the Form SAB 50-05; and

(5) For those receiving an Apportionment, acknowledgement that by participating in the priority funding process, the district or charter school is waiving its right to the timeline for fund release submittal described in Section 1859.90.

(6) For a Career Technical Education Facilities Project that was granted an unfunded approval without the required CDE plan approval and/or required DSA-approved plans and specifications, the applicant's request must include: (A) Acknowledgement that the applicant must submit the required approval(s) to the OPSC within 12 months from the date of the Apportionment. If the required submittal(s) is not received within 12 months, the Apportionment shall be rescinded without further Board action pursuant to Section 1859.197(c)(1); and

(B) Acknowledgement that a valid, original signature Form SAB 50-05 must be submitted and physically received by the OPSC within 90 calendar days of the submittal described in (6)(A) and that failure to do so will result in the rescission of the Apportionment without further Board action; and (C) Acknowledgement that a Grant Agreement must be submitted pursuant to Section 1859.90.4 and physically received by the OPSC prior to, or concurrently with, the Form SAB 50-05 referenced in (a)(6)(B).

(b) In order to be considered for an approved advance release of site acquisition funds from a Preliminary Charter School Apportionment, the district or charter school must provide a priority funding request in the form of a written statement signed by an authorized representative within the 30-calendar day filing period, and shall contain all of the following: (1) Statement that the request is to convert the advance release of funds to an approved advance release of funds request; and,

(2) Acknowledgement that a valid, original signature Form SAB 50-05 must be submitted and physically received by the OPSC within 180 calendar days of the approved advance release of funds request and that failure to do so will result in the rescission of the approved advance release of funds request without further Board action; and

(3) Acknowledgement that a Grant Agreement must be submitted pursuant to Section 1859.90.4 and physically received by the OPSC prior to, or concurrently with, the Form SAB 50-05 referenced in (b)(2); and

(4) Acknowledgement that it must provide evidence that it has entered into the Charter School Agreements within 90 calendar days of approval of the advance release of funds request and that failure to do so will result in the rescission of the approval without further Board action.

(c) If a district or charter school receives an Apportionment or approved advance release of funds request through the priority funding process, the OPSC must receive a valid, original signature copy of the Form SAB 50-05 within the specified time period, pursuant to (a)(2), (a)(6) or (b)(2), as applicable, and a Grant Agreement, pursuant to (a)(3), (a)(6)(C), or (b)(3), as applicable. Upon submittal of the original signature copy of the Form SAB 50-05, if OPSC determines that the Form SAB 50-05 is not valid, the district will have ten business days to amend the Form SAB 50-05 in order to make the Form SAB 50-05 valid. If the OPSC does not receive a valid, original signature copy of the Form SAB 50-05 within the time period: (1) The priority funding Apportionment or approved advance release of funds request shall be rescinded without further Board action, and

(2) If the Application is not subject to rescission pursuant to Section 1859.90.3(c) as defined in Section 1859.90.3(d), the Application shall return to the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans) with a new unfunded approval date that is 90 calendar days from the date of Apportionment or approval of the advance release of funds request.

(d) In the event that the amount of requests received during a specific 30-calendar day filing period exceeds the funds available, the Board shall apportion based on the unfunded approval date and the Application received date up to the available cash from each bond source. Projects that have requested to participate in the priority funding process for which an Apportionment cannot be provided shall retain their date order position on the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans). Requests not converted to Apportionments will not be returned to the district or kept by the OPSC.

(e) In the event that unexpected cash proceeds from sources other than bond funds become available for use for priority funding Apportionments, at a public meeting the Board may, based on considerations relevant to the amount of time available to effect a distribution of funds, waive the 30-calendar day filing provision specified in this section for impacted school districts to provide funds more rapidly.

(1) OPSC shall identify and invite impacted school districts to submit a priority funding request that meets all other criteria in (a) above.

(2) Requests submitted under this provision shall be valid from the date the priority funding request is submitted until the end of the regularly scheduled filing period specified above.

(3) Requests submitted under this provision must comply with all other requirements of the priority funding process in this Section and Section 1859.90.3.

(4) Districts may decline to submit a request outside the normal 30-calendar day filing period without consequence. If the option to submit a request is declined, the requirements to participate in the standard 30-calendar day filing periods specified in (a) above remain in effect.

(5) Unexpected cash proceeds from sources other than bond funds include, but are not limited to, the \$250 million appropriated from the General Fund to the 2016 State School Facilities Fund as a result of the enactment of Statutes of 2021, Chapter 44, Section 163 (Assembly Bill 130).

(f) For purposes of this section “rescinded” or “rescission” shall mean that the Apportionment or approved advance release of funds request returns to unfunded approval status with a new unfunded approval date, except for (a)(5)(A). The new unfunded approval date will be 90 calendar days from the Apportionment date. The district or charter school will not be required to re-submit the Application and no further Application review will be required.”

SFP Regulation Section 1859.90.3, “Participation in the Priority Funding Process” states: This section applies to Applications for funding for new construction, modernization, Overcrowding Relief Grant, Career Technical Education Facilities Program, Facility Hardship pursuant to Section 1859.82.1 and 1859.82.2, and Charter School Facilities Program, excluding advance release of design and/or site acquisition funds from a Preliminary Charter School Apportionment.

(a) For each Application on the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans) for new construction, modernization, Facility Hardship pursuant to Sections 1859.82.1 or 1859.82.2, the occurrences of (1) or (2) below shall be limited after the effective date of this regulation section [March 25, 2013]. For each Application on the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans) for Overcrowding Relief Grant, Career Technical Education Facilities Program, and Charter School Facilities Program, excluding advance release of design and/or site acquisition funds from a Preliminary Charter School Apportionment, the occurrences of (1) or (2) below shall be limited after the effective date of this regulation section [October 1, 2014]:

(1) The district abstains from participating in a priority funding 30-calendar day filing period described in Section 1859.90.2 for the Application on the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans).

(2) The Application receives a priority funding Apportionment pursuant to Section 1859.90.2(a), and the district fails to meet the fund release requirements pursuant to Section 1859.90.2(c).

(b) The first occurrence of (a)(1) or (a)(2) shall result in the following, as applicable:

(1) If (a)(1) occurs, the Application shall retain its place on the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans).

(2) If (a)(2) occurs, the priority funding Apportionment shall be rescinded and the Application shall be returned to the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans) pursuant to Section 1859.90.2(c)(2).

(c) If subsection (b) has occurred, a subsequent occurrence of either (a)(1) or (a)(2) shall result in the rescission of the Application’s Apportionment and/or unfunded approval, as applicable, and the removal of the Application from the Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans) without further Board action. The Application shall be returned to the applicant.

(d) For purposes of subsection (c), “rescinded” or “rescission” of an unfunded approval shall mean that the bond authority associated with the Apportionment or unfunded approval, as applicable, returns to the appropriate School Facility Program bond authority source for reallocation. If applicable, the pupils housed in the project will be added back to the district’s baseline eligibility pursuant to Sections 1859.51(d) for new construction or 1859.61(d) for modernization.

SFP Regulation Section 1859.129(b) states, in part:

“(b) If the district received an apportionment for a Type II Joint-Use Project, not part of a qualifying SFP Modernization project, the district:

...

(2) Has 18 months from the date the DSA and CDE approved plans were submitted to the OPSC to submit a completed Form SAB 50-05 or the apportionment will be rescinded without further Board action. If the district is requesting an Apportionment pursuant to Section 1859.90.1 or 1859.90.2, the Board will require that this time limit be reduced to no more than 90 days from the date of the apportionment.”

SFP Regulation Section 1859.197 (b) states, in part:

(b) If Career Technical Education Facilities funds were reserved for the applicant pursuant to Section 1859.193(d) of these Regulations, the applicant:

...

(2) Has 18 months from the date the CDE plan approval and DSA-approved plans and specifications, as needed, are submitted to the OPSC to submit a completed Form SAB 50-05 or the Apportionment shall be rescinded without further Board action. If the district is requesting an Apportionment pursuant to Section 1859.90.1 or 1859.90.2, the Board will require that this time limit be reduced to no more than 90 days from the date of the Apportionment.”



PROPOSED EMERGENCY REGULATORY AMENDMENTS FOR THE SCHOOL
FACILITY PROGRAM

PURPOSE OF REPORT

To present to the State Allocation Board (Board) proposed regulatory amendments, on an emergency basis, to authorize extended fund release deadlines for projects where a school district has a school facility located on a military installation that is the recipient of a federal grant that requires a local matching share.

DESCRIPTION

Since 2012, the Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) has actively worked with school districts throughout California to obtain funding from the Board to provide the local match towards federally funded school construction and modernization projects on military installations under the Public Schools on Military Installations (PSMI) program.

For the PSMI program, school districts must submit verification that local matching funds are available to receive approval for federal funding. Due to the complexity, extended timelines, and deadlines involved with participation in the program, staff proposes an exception to the current School Facility Program (SFP) regulations for projects utilizing SFP funding for the local matching share.

Current SFP regulations require school districts to meet fund release requirements within 180 calendar days of Apportionment for non-financial hardship projects and within 365 calendar days of Apportionment for financial hardship projects.

Staff proposes to amend SFP regulations to authorize the Board to provide up to 18 months for a school district to meet fund release requirements for projects pertaining to a school facility located on a military installation that is the recipient of a federal grant that requires a local matching share.

AUTHORITY

See Attachment A.

BACKGROUND

Public Schools on Military Installations Program

In 2010, the Department of Defense (DOD) established the PSMI grant program to administer a federal appropriation designated for the construction, renovation, repair, or expansion of elementary and secondary public schools on military installations to address capacity needs or facility condition deficiencies.

BACKGROUND (cont.)

The DOD assessed the condition and capacity of public schools on military installations as part of the PSMI grant program. Based on the findings of the physical assessment, the DOD developed a priority list of public schools on military installations with the most serious condition and/or capacity deficiencies, which receive priority consideration under the PSMI. The PSMI program provides federal reimbursement of up to 80 percent of project costs to school districts, provided the school district matches federal funding with 20 percent of the project cost.

At the April 2012 meeting, the Board established the Department of Defense Sub-Committee. The purpose of the Board's Sub-Committee was to consider funding options to assist all California school districts with DOD schools in meeting their 20-percent matching share requirement. At the June 2012 DOD Sub-Committee meeting, OPSC presented an analysis of the potential SFP funding options that school districts could pursue to meet the 20-percent match requirement. The recommendations of the Sub-Committee were presented to the Board at the August 2012 meeting. These recommendations included consideration of SFP Regulation changes for DOD projects to provide preliminary apportionments and recommending to the Legislature that future bond funds be made available specifically for DOD schools. In considering the recommendations, the Board elected to recommend that the State Legislature provide funding for military base schools in California in the next bond proposal to cover the total need for these types of projects.

In 2018, the DOD continued an ongoing assessment of the condition and capacity of schools on military installations. Based on the findings of the physical assessment, the DOD developed an updated priority list. As federal funds have been appropriated for the PSMI, the Office of Local Defense Community Cooperation (OLDCC), which administers the grant funds, has continued to invite California school districts to participate in the PSMI grant program.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS

Since 2012, staff and the Board have provided support to school districts invited to participate in the PSMI program. To date, Board approvals have provided approximately \$78.9 million in state funding for 19 projects on 10 school sites, which has led to over \$365 million in federal funding for these projects across the state.

Previous Board support for PSMI projects has been in the form of expedited processing, financial hardship approvals under "other evidence," and expedited apportionments.

In this agenda, the Board's approval of five school districts' requests would provide approximately \$24.9 million in state funding that will be used towards the districts' local match in obtaining approximately \$336.6 million in federal funding.

STAFF ANALYSIS/STATEMENTS (cont.)

Since 2012, staff has observed the complex proposal, award, and construction timelines associated with PSMI projects. In most cases, it appears that from OLDCC's invitation for a school district to participate in the PSMI to project completion, between 5 to 10 years elapse. It can be challenging for school districts to align fund release deadlines under the SFP with the elongated timelines of federal projects on military installations, even with active guidance from OPSC staff.

Staff proposes to amend SFP regulations as shown on Attachment B to authorize the Board to provide up to 18 months for a school district to meet fund release requirements for projects pertaining to a school facility located on a military installation that is the recipient of a federal grant that requires a local matching share. This provides the Board the flexibility to set the fund release deadlines based on each individual PSMI project's circumstances; however, still within the maximum 18-month timeline allowed in statute.

Additional Amendments

The proposed regulations also include non-substantive cleanup language not addressed in prior regulatory packages.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Adopt the proposed emergency amendments to the SFP regulation as shown on Attachment B.
2. Authorize the Executive Officer to file the proposed regulatory amendments with the Office of Administrative Law on an emergency basis and make the regulation permanent.

This Item was approved by the State Allocation Board on September 25, 2024.

ATTACHMENT A

AUTHORITY

Education Code (EC) Section 17070.35: General Provisions

(a) In addition to all other powers and duties as are granted to the board by this chapter, other statutes, or the California Constitution, the board shall do all of the following:

(1) Adopt rules and regulations, pursuant to the rulemaking provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act, Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, for the administration of this chapter. However, the board shall have no authority to set the level of the fees of any architect, structural engineer, or other design professional on any project. The initial regulations adopted pursuant to this chapter shall be adopted as emergency regulations, and the circumstances related to the initial adoption are hereby deemed to constitute an emergency for this purpose. The initial regulations adopted pursuant to this chapter shall be adopted by November 4, 1998. If the initial regulations are not adopted by that date, the board shall report to the Legislature by that date, explaining the reasons for the delay.

(2) Establish and publish any procedures and policies in connection with the administration of this chapter as it deems necessary.

(3) Determine the eligibility of school districts to receive apportionments under this chapter.

(4) Apportion funds to eligible school districts under this chapter.

(b) The board shall review and amend its regulations as necessary to adjust its administration of this chapter to conform with the act that amended this section to add this subdivision. Regulations adopted pursuant to this subdivision shall be adopted by November 5, 2002, and shall be adopted as emergency regulations in accordance with the rulemaking provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code). The adoption of any emergency regulation pursuant to this subdivision filed with the Office of Administrative Law shall be deemed to be an emergency and necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, or general welfare. Notwithstanding subdivision (e) of Section 11346.1 of the Government Code, any emergency regulation adopted pursuant to this section shall remain in effect for no more than 365 days unless the board has complied with Sections 11346.2 to 11348, inclusive, of the Government Code.

EC Section 17076.10: Program Accountability

(a) A school district that receives any funds pursuant to this chapter shall submit a summary report of expenditure of state funds and of school district matching funds annually until all state funds and school district matching funds are expended, and shall then submit a final report to the board. The board may require an audit of these reports or other school district records to ensure that all funds received pursuant to this chapter are expended in accordance with program requirements.

(b) If the board finds that a participating school district has not made substantial progress towards increasing its pupil capacity or modernizing its facilities within 18 months of receiving any funding pursuant to this chapter, the board shall rescind the apportionment in an amount equal to the unexpended funds.

ATTACHMENT A

(c) (1) If the board, after the review of expenditures or audit has been conducted pursuant to subdivision (a), determines that a school district failed to expend funds in accordance with this chapter, the department shall notify the school district of the amount that must be repaid to the 1998 State School Facilities Fund, the 2002 State School Facilities Fund, the 2004 State School Facilities Fund, the 2006 State School Facilities Fund, or the 2016 State School Facilities Fund, as the case may be, within 60 days. If the school district fails to make the required payment within 60 days, the department shall notify the Controller and the school district in writing, and the Controller shall deduct an amount equal to the amount to be repaid by the school district under this subdivision, from the school district's next principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds to the school district, other than basic aid apportionments required by Section 6 of Article IX of the California Constitution. Any amounts obtained by the Controller shall be deposited into the 1998 State School Facilities Fund, the 2002 State School Facilities Fund, the 2004 State School Facilities Fund, the 2006 State School Facilities Fund, or the 2016 State School Facilities Fund, as appropriate.

(2) Notwithstanding paragraph (1), if the board determines that repayment of the full liability within 60 days after the board action would constitute a severe financial hardship, as defined by the board, for the school district, the board shall approve a plan of equal annual payments over a period of up to 20 years. The plan shall include interest on each year's outstanding balance at the rate earned on the state's Pooled Money Investment Account during that year. The Controller shall withhold amounts, other than basic aid apportionments required by Section 6 of Article IX of the California Constitution, pursuant to the plan.

(d) If a school district receives an apportionment, but has not met the criteria to have funds released pursuant to Section 17072.32 or 17074.15 within a period established by the board, but not to exceed 18 months, the board shall rescind the apportionment and deny the district's application.

ATTACHMENT B

Proposed Regulatory Amendments

SFP Regulation Section 1859.90. Fund Release Process

(a) With the exception of an ~~A~~pportionment made pursuant to Sections 1859.81.1(e) or 1859.81.2, ~~A~~pportionments provided through the Priority Funding Process and subject to 1859.90.2, the OPSC will release State funds that the Board has apportioned to the district after submittal, by the district, of the Form SAB 50-05 and a Grant Agreement, pursuant to Section 1859.90.4.

(b) With the exception of Apportionments described in paragraphs (1) and (2) of subsection (c), ~~an apportionment made for a Type II Joint-Use Project, not part of a qualifying SFP Modernization project, pursuant to Article 12 of these Regulations~~, a district must submit the Form SAB 50-05 and Grant Agreement, within 180 calendar days of the Apportionment of the SFP grant for the project or within 365 calendar days for Apportionments that include financial hardship assistance. If the district does not submit the Form SAB 50-05 and Grant Agreement within the above specified time, the entire New Construction Adjusted Grant, or Modernization Adjusted Grant or Type I or II, part of a qualifying SFP Modernization project, or Joint-Use Project ~~A~~pportionment shall be rescinded without further Board action, and the pupils housed in the project, if applicable, will be added back to the district's baseline eligibility. The district may refile a new ~~A~~pplication for the project subject to district eligibility and available State funds at the time of resubmittal.

(c)(1) Notwithstanding subsection (b), if an Apportionment is made for an Application pertaining to a school facility located on a military installation that is the recipient of a federal grant that requires a local matching share, the Board may require the district to submit the Form SAB 50-05 and Grant Agreement within a determined time period, not to exceed 18 months of the Apportionment of the SFP grant for the project. If the district does not submit the Form SAB 50-05 and Grant Agreement within the above specified time, the entire Apportionment shall be rescinded without further Board action, and the pupils housed in the project, if applicable, will be added back to the district's baseline eligibility. The district may refile a new Application for the project subject to district eligibility and available State funds at the time of resubmittal.

~~(c)(2) Notwithstanding subsection (b), if~~ If the Apportionment was made for a Type II Joint-Use Project, not part of a qualifying SFP Modernization project, pursuant to Article 12 of these Regulations, the district must submit Form SAB 50-05 and a Grant Agreement within 18 months of the date the plans and specifications for the Joint-Use Project that have been approved by the DSA and the CDE are submitted to the OPSC or the Apportionment shall be rescinded without further Board action.

(d) OPSC will release State funds that have been apportioned by the Board pursuant to Section 1859.81.1(e) to the district within 30 calendar days of the following, whichever occurs last: an Apportionment or upon submittal by the district of a Grant Agreement pursuant to Section 1859.90.4. Submittal of the Grant Agreement must occur within 365 days of the Apportionment. If the district received an Apportionment pursuant to 1859.90.2, the Grant Agreement must be submitted within the specified time period in 1859.90.2.



Section 1859.81. Financial Hardship.

Except for Joint-Use Projects and Career Technical Education Facilities Projects, a district is eligible for financial hardship to fund all or a portion of its matching share requirement after demonstrating the requirements of (a), (c), and (d) below:

(a) The district is financially unable to provide all necessary matching funds for an eligible project. To determine this, an analysis shall be made of the district's financial records by the OPSC including data and records maintained by the CDE and the County Office of Education. The analysis shall consist of a review of the district's latest Independent Audit regarding funds available from all capital facility accounts, including, but not limited to, developer fees, funds generated from capital facility certificates of participation, federal grants, redevelopment funds, sale proceeds from surplus property, the appraised value of facilities approved for replacement pursuant to Section 1859.82, bond funds either encumbered, unencumbered or authorized but unsold, and savings from other SFP projects. All funds thus identified that have not been expended or encumbered by a contractual agreement for a specific capital outlay purpose prior to the initial request for financial hardship status shall be deemed available as a matching contribution.

After the initial request for financial hardship status is granted, no further encumbrances will be approved by the OPSC and all prospective revenue made available to the district's capital facility accounts shall be deemed available as matching contribution on the subsequent financial hardship review, with the exception of:

- (1) Approved interim housing expenditures.
- (2) Funding to pay for previously recognized multi-year encumbrances approved at the initial financial hardship approval.
- (3) Funding that is transferred into a Special Reserve Fund and is used for the express purpose of the Federal Renovation Program when the amount expended out of that fund does not exceed the maximum Federal Renovation Grant amount.
- (4) Funding that is transferred into a Special Reserve Fund and is used for the express purpose of the School Facilities Needs Assessment Grant Program or Emergency Repair Program when the amount expended out of that fund does not exceed the maximum grant amount apportioned.
- (5) Funding that is transferred into a Special Reserve Fund and is used for the express purpose of the Career Technical Education Facilities Program when the amount expended out of that fund does not exceed the applicant's share of the maximum grant amount apportioned.
- (6) Funding that is transferred into a Special Reserve Fund and used for the express purpose of the Overcrowding Relief Grant when the amount expended out of that fund does not exceed the amount of the site acquisition and design costs of the project and the district has submitted an approved Form SAB 50-11.
- (7) Funding that is used for the express purpose of reimbursing the State a proportionate share of financial hardship received when there has been a transfer of a special education program and title to the facility. In addition, the funding was used within five years of the title transfer.
- (8) Funding to pay for obtaining a structural report pursuant to Section 1859.82.2 for an approvable and funded seismic mitigation project.
- (9) All other capital facility funding for a period of three years when no subsequent financial hardship request is made during this period, with the exception of the funding identified in (6). The three-year period begins with the date of the most recent financial hardship new construction or modernization adjusted grant funding apportionment.

When Overcrowding Relief Grant funding is set aside pursuant to (6) and the School District has not submitted, or the OPSC has not accepted, a Form SAB 50-04 for an Overcrowding Relief Grant within three years from the date of deposit into the Special Reserve Fund, or the School District has not met the requirements in Sections 1859.90 or 1859.105, remaining funds plus interest accrued at the Pooled Money Investment Board rate at that time period shall be deemed available as matching contribution on a subsequent financial hardship project or be captured through an audit adjustment pursuant to Section 1859.106.

The financial hardship analysis is subject to approval by the Board.

(b) From the funds deemed available as a matching contribution, the district may retain \$19,776 per classroom in each enrollment reporting period for the cost to provide interim housing for the currently unhoused pupils of the district. The amount shown shall be adjusted annually in the manner prescribed in Section 1859.71. The number of classrooms needed for interim housing for the currently unhoused pupils shall be the sum of the positive numbers determined in (b)(7) as follows:

(1) Determine the current enrollment of the district by grade level as shown on the latest Form SAB 50-01.

(2) Determine the New Construction Grants apportioned by grade level for all SFP projects and LPP funded under the provisions of Sections 1859.12 or 1859.13 where the district has submitted Form SAB 50-06 indicating that the project is 100 percent complete.

(3) Subtract (b)(2) from (b)(1).

(4) Determine the number of classrooms by grade level reported in Part 1, Line 8 on Form SAB 50-02.

(5) Multiply the classrooms determined in (b)(4) by 25 for K-6, 27 for 7-12, 13 for Non-Severe and 9 for Severe.

(6) Subtract the product determined in (b)(5) from the difference determined in (b)(3) by grade level.

(7) Divide the difference by grade level determined in (b)(6) by 25 for K-6, 27 for 7-12, 13 for Non-Severe and 9 for Severe and round up to the nearest whole number.

From the funds deemed available as a matching contribution, the district may also retain \$19,776 per portable toilet unit in each reporting period for the cost to provide necessary interim toilet facilities for the currently unhoused pupils of the district. The amount shown shall be adjusted annually in the manner prescribed in Section 1859.71. The number of toilet facilities needed for interim housing shall be the sum of the positive numbers determined in (b)(7) divided by eight rounded up to the nearest whole number.

From the funds deemed available as a matching contribution, the district may also retain \$19,776 per classroom in each reporting period for the cost to provide necessary interim housing for the currently unhoused pupils displaced as a result of a SAB approved seismic mitigation project pursuant to Section 1859.82.2. The amount shown shall be adjusted annually in the manner prescribed in Section 1859.71. The number of classrooms needed for interim housing shall be the quotient of the displaced pupils by 25 for K-6, 27 for 7-12, 13 for Non-Severe and 9 for Severe and round up to the nearest whole number.

If the district's available funds, as determined by the OPSC analysis less costs for interim housing, is less than its matching share, the district will be deemed to have met the requirements of this Subsection.

(c) The district has made all reasonable efforts to fund its matching share of the project by demonstrating it is levying the developer fee justified under law or an alternative revenue source equal to or greater than the developer fee otherwise justified under law at the time of request for hardship and the district meets at least one of the following:

(1) The current outstanding bonded indebtedness of the district issued for the purpose of constructing school facilities in accordance with Education Code Section 17072.35 or 17074.25 as appropriate, at the time of request for financial hardship status, is at least 60 percent of the district's total bonding capacity. Outstanding bonded indebtedness includes that part of general obligation bonds, Mello-Roos Bonds, School Facility Improvement District Bonds and certificates of participation which the district is paying a debt service that was issued for capital outlay school facility purposes.

(2) The district had a successful registered voter bond election for at least the maximum amount allowed under Proposition 39 within the previous two years from the date of request for financial hardship status. The proceeds from the bond election that represent the maximum amount allowed under the provisions of Proposition 39 must be used to fund the district's matching share requirement for SFP project(s).

(3) It is a County Superintendent of Schools.

(4) The district's total bonding capacity at the time of the request for financial hardship status is \$5 million or less.

(5) Other evidence of reasonable effort as approved by the SAB.

If the district's request for financial hardship status is denied by the Board, the district may be deemed eligible for rental payments of \$2,000 per year per classroom under the Emergency School Classroom Law of 1979 for a two year period when relocatable classroom buildings are available and the district provides financial documentation that it is unable to afford the full rental amount and any other information satisfactory to the Board that the rental reduction is necessary. The number of classrooms eligible for the \$2,000 rental payments shall be the sum of the numbers determined in (c)(5)(B) as follows:

(A) Determine the number of pupils by grade level that the district requested a New Construction Grant on the Form SAB 50-04 that were denied financial hardship status.

(B) Divide the number by grade level determined in (c)(5)(A) by 25 for K-6, 27 for 7-12, 13 for Non-Severe and 9 for Severe and round up to the nearest whole number.

(d) The district has not signed a contract for acquisition or construction of classrooms that replace existing facility(ies), which were included in the determination of the district's new construction eligibility pursuant to Education Code Section 17071.75, in a locally funded project during the five-year period immediately preceding the district's application for financial hardship assistance. This restriction may be lifted if the Board finds that unforeseen and extenuating circumstances existed that required the district to use local funds to replace the facility(ies).

(e) If the district meets the financial hardship requirements in this Section, the amount of financial hardship is equal to the district's matching share less funds deemed available in (a).

(1) Once a district has been notified by OPSC that it meets the requirements of financial hardship in this Section, the district may file Form SAB 50-04 under the

provisions of financial hardship anytime within a period of 180 calendar days from the date of the OPSC notification.

(2) If the district does not submit Form SAB 50-04 under the provisions of financial hardship within 180 calendar days of the OPSC notification of approval of financial hardship status, the district must re-qualify for financial hardship status under the provisions of this Section by submittal of a new request for financial hardship status.

(3) If the project(s) has been included on an unfunded list for more than 180 calendar days, a review of the district's funds pursuant to (a) will be made to determine if additional district funds are available to fund the district's matching share of the project(s).

Financial hardship approval status by the OPSC for a separate design and/or site apportionment does not apply to any subsequent funding for the project(s).

(f) If the district submits Form SAB 50-04 within 180 calendar days of the OPSC notification of approval of financial hardship and the project(s) has been included on the "Unfunded List (Lack of AB 55 Loans)" for more than 180 calendar days as a result of the State of California's inability to provide interim financing from the Pooled Money Investment Account (AB 55 loans), the Board may suspend the unfunded review requirement as defined in Regulation Section 1859.81(e). Projects added to any other unfunded list shall be subject to the review detailed in Regulation Section 1859.81(e). Regulation Section 1859.81(f) shall become inoperative July 1, 2011.

(g) A project added to an unfunded list on or after July 1, 2011 will be subject to the review detailed in section (e)(3). For projects added to an unfunded list between February 25, 2009 and June 30, 2011, only the district's financial records on or after July 1, 2011 will be considered in calculating any adjustment to the district's matching share.

(h) On or after September 22, 2017, a district may submit a request for funding in advance of obtaining a determination of Financial Hardship.

(1) To be considered for Financial Hardship, the district must check the box on the Form SAB 50-04 requesting Financial Hardship pursuant to this subsection when submitting a request for funding.

(2) Prior to processing an application OPSC will notify the district in writing to submit the necessary documentation for a Financial Hardship analysis pursuant to (a), (b), (c) and (d). OPSC will not accept any documents for a Financial Hardship analysis in advance of the notification. Failure to submit the requested documentation within 60 calendar days of OPSC's notification will result in either a. or b.:

a. District may amend their Form SAB 50-04 to exclude the request for Financial Hardship determination.

b. OPSC will return the request for funding and related materials to the district.

(3) Upon notification of Financial Hardship approval, any Form SAB 50-04 processed within 180 calendar days of the approval date will be included in the approval.

(4) For any Form SAB 50-04 processed more than 180 calendar days after the date of the Financial Hardship approval the district shall re-qualify for Financial Hardship status.
